### CRITICISM CRITICISED.

We like the article on "Criticism," in the *Anglican Church Chronicle*, so well that we have read it a second time. It is so kind, so pleasant, so friendly, and withal so candid and outspoken. Beside all this, it is, in the main, sound and just. But there is just one thing in it which seems to us a little inconsistent—a trifle contradictory. In the first place, the "petty strife and personal invective, the raking up of antecedents, and unjust criticism," practised by Honolulu newspapers, are alluded to and deprecated. So far so good. And yet farther on it is said that "no city or town in the world can produce newspapers purer in language, healthier in tone, readier to recognise the truth of religion, more liberal towards religion, more anxious for the promotion of good morals, and more eager to assist individuals and corporations than our Honolulu newspapers." This is certainly very high praise, and must be extremely gratifying to our editors and proprietors. But, how to reconcile "petty strife" and "unjust criticism" with a "healthy tone" is what puzzles us. Or to be more explicit, we cannot perceive how any newspaper which is guilty of engendering "petty strife" and indulging in "unjust criticism" can be said to have a "healthy tone," although the "purity" of its "language" may be unquestionable. But perhaps our friend, the *Church Chronicle*, simply means that Honolulu newspapers, notwithstanding certain indicated defects, are quite as good, in certain indicated matters, as the newspapers of any other "city or town in the world." If so, we have no wish to criminate ourselves by attempting to disprove his testimony.

### SHIPPING NOTES.

The American ship Oracle was caught in a hurricane, driven ashore and sunk on the third day near Cape Horn. The Captain and five men were two days and nights in an open boat, and rescued by a German bark. 17 persons of the company left on an island near the Cape, and relief sent from Valparaiso.

The *Alta* says that the Mariposa's and the State of California's, the fastest steamer of the Pacific, trial trips were identical in distance, time, and rate of speed.

The bktnr W. H. Dimond, Capt. Houdlett, arrived yesterday, 16 days from San Francisco. She brings 4 horses, 40 hogs, and 8,175 pkgs mdse. She is consigned to W. G. Irwin & Co.

Stmr Jas Makoe brought 1,250 bags of sugar, 194 sheep and 1 horse.

Stmr Waimanalo brought 500 bags of sugar.

Stmr Mokoli brought 200 hides.

On Wednesday afternoon as the Jennie Walker was going out of the harbor she got aground, but was soon got off.

### LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

On Monday last a roller was broken at Hanamauhi mill but fortunately they had a spare roller, so that work was only stopped a day.

The other night at the Post Office a gentleman lost a valuable diamond ring worth about \$500. He had not missed it when it was found and so when it was returned to him he rewarded the finder with—his thanks.

THE attention of those who intend to be exhibitors at the Agricultural and Horticultural Show is directed to the advertisement we publish this morning.

Those of our readers who haven't yet paid their water-rates will do well to read the notice from the Superintendent of water works in another column. He promises to faithfully carry out his expressed intentions.

YESTERDAY a circular was carried round to be signed by persons wishing to start a society for the Prevention of cruelty to animals in the city. It is announced that a meeting will be called shortly. We hope to see such a Society started on a good basis.

YESTERDAY morning an express was being driven along Merchant street, when the horse took fright at a wheelbarrow, and began to rear and plunge finally breaking the shaft. The driver, S. Ladd's, smart handling of the ribbons alone prevented a serious accident.

THE *Alta* of the 24th May states that Ex-congressman O. L. Spalding of Michigan, special agent of the U. S. Treasury B. K. Tingle, and J. E. Sarles Jr., of New York, forming a sugar commission to investigate the charges of fraudulent entry sugar into the port of San Francisco from the Hawaiian Islands, had arrived in Frisco.

WEDNESDAY afternoon at about 4:30, a dispute arose between a native boat-boy and a sailor from one of the vessels lying the harbour at the boat landing. They fought for about 20 minutes when the bystanders separated them. Considerable excitement kept up amongst the large crowd for about half-an-hour longer. The combatants finally separated promising to fight again for \$100 a side at a future time. No Policeman showed up the whole time.

### Where were the Nihilists?

#### THE CZAR AND HIS PEOPLE.

Moscow, May 22.—The weather this morning for the entry into Moscow by the Czar was splendid. The whole route from the Petrofsky Palace to the Kremlin, four and one-half miles, was crowded with people. At every point the Imperial standards were displayed and the balconies were hung with gay colored materials and Russian colors. The only foreign colors allowed to be displayed are those over the various embassies along the road which the procession traversed. There are one hundred Venetian masts from which banners are flying. All the domes and spires of the buildings in the city are decked with flags. Thousands passed the night out of doors so they might secure good places to witness the procession. A multitude of persons thronged the churches, praying for the safety of the Emperor.

The Czar left Petrofsky Palace at noon and reached the Kremlin at 12:50 o'clock. There was a slight fall of rain during the march of the procession, but otherwise the affair was a complete success. The enthusiasm of the people along the route was unbounded.

The signal for the starting of the procession was the firing of artillery and ringing of the bells of the Cathedral of the Assumption. On the Emperor mounting, other salutes were fired. The order of procession was as follows:

The chief officer or police and twelve gendarmes.  
Private escort of the Emperor.  
First squadron of Cossacks of the guard and one squadron of dragoons.  
Mounted Asiatic deputations.  
Representatives of the nobility.  
Court servants, couriers and huntsmen.  
Master of Ceremonies, in a carriage drawn by six horses, and followed by large numbers of court officials and their suites.  
Foreign princes.

Members of the Council of the Empire.  
Grand Marshal of the Court.  
Squadron of Chevalier Guards.  
The Emperor, on horseback, followed by the Minister of War and Aide-de-camp, the Czarovich and Grand Dukes.

After all the male members of the Imperial family, who were on horseback, came the Empress, accompanied by the Grand Duchess Xenia, in a state carriage drawn by eight horses, a groom leading each horse, equerries on either side of the carriage, mounted pages and grooms following.

Then came state carriages containing the Grand Duchesses.  
A squadron of cuirassiers.  
A regiment of guards.  
Ladies of honor in carriages.  
A squadron of lancers of the guard.

The Mayor and deputations of tradesmen joined the procession at the old triumphal arch of the marshals. The nobility of Warsaw and several other districts did homage to the Emperor at Everskaya place.

The Civil Governor, the Judges and other city officers received the Emperor at the Gate of the Resurrection, where his Imperial Majesty and the Grand Dukes and Empress alighted and knelt in prayer before the picture of the Virgin. The Archbishop of Warsaw received their Majesties at the steps of the Cathedral of Assumption with a cross and holy water. At this point the cheering of the people was perfectly deafening. The procession then entered the Kremlin.

The Emperor wore the uniform of a general and was mounted on a splendid charger. He rode a little in advance of four generals who were directly attending him. He maintained a calm demeanor all through. He often smiled graciously in response to the wild enthusiasm which greeted him at every point. Cheer upon cheer followed each other incessantly from the densely packed multitude on the streets and from the thousands of people in the balconies and windows. The Empress was greeted with every mark of enthusiasm and loyalty. Her daughter, the Grand Duchess Xenia, threw kisses to the people. The mounted grand dukes formed a very brilliant group. The Asiatic deputations were also magnificently attired. The state carriages were splendidly decorated, and the whole was most gorgeous. The entire route was lined with troops. At the moment the cortege entered the city a salute of 71 guns was fired from Tsarikaia Palace.

The Emperor wore the broad blue ribbon of the Order of St. Andrew over his uniform. The Empress and Grand Duchesses wore the national Russian dresses. After entering the Kremlin the court officers presented their Majesties with bread and salt on plates of silver and gold. When their Majesties retired bells pealed and a salute of 101 guns was fired. At this point the enthusiasm of the multitude and the playing of the bands produced a great effect. The general verdict was that the pageant was a great success.

The streets through which the procession passed were badly paved. The Duke of Edinburgh rode in the rear and on the left of the Czar. The Duchess of Edinburgh sat in the second coach from that in which was the Empress. In the Red square 6,000 school children in white robes sang "Life for the Czar."

General Sturm, head master of ceremonies, was thrown from his horse and had his skull fractured.

Berlin, May 22.—A report, which is not yet confirmed, comes from St. Petersburg that previous to the departure of the Emperor for Moscow, an explosion occurred under the washstand and in the fireplace in his dressing-room, but nobody was injured, the Emperor and Empress being in the dining-room at the time.

A Nihilist emissary from Russia has been arrested in South Bavaria.
