CAMOUFLAGE ART TO BE ENCOURAGED BY **JAPANESE**

TOKYO, June 2-Camouflaging industrial centers and important cities throughout Japan is to get under way in the near future under plans being discussed by a mixed commission of civilian and government experts at the planning section home office.

Upon completion of a survey toward the latter part of June, pamphlets on camouflaging will be distributed. District and prefectural officers will be instructed to take appropriate steps to disguise recognizable buildings.

Heretofore, air defense and building regulations stipulated that local authorities should designate when, where and how to camouflage possible war targets, but response has been found to be unenthusiastic and incomplete.

Partial reconstruction of wire netting, paint and trees are among measures calculated to make Japan unrecognizable and hard to hit.

WITH BRITAIN AGAINST NA

Commentators See U.S. Occupation of Dakar And Atlantic Islands In Very **Immediate Future**

WASHINGTON, June -_ Joseph Alsop and Robert Kintner, co-authors of the American-White paper, discussing President Roosevelt's war strategy in their column in the Washington Post, predict that active steps will be taken shortly to assist Great Britain with American naval airpow-

ATLANTIC BATTLE TO BE SHORT

It is asserted that steps have been fully completed and the President is assured by navy advisers that the Battle of the Atlantic will be won within a little more than one month from the date the fleet is sent into action.

Preparations, it is reported, have been made in three stages, (1) a joint Anglo-American committee of air and naval experts who met in Washington last winter, has devised a scheme of shipping protection whereby American warships, with long-range aircraft assisting, will endeavor to drive German submarines and bombers from trans-Atlantic convoy sea-lanes; (2) following further talks with London, the United States took over Greeland bases, while the British expanded bases in Iceland and began constructing additional naval airbases in north Scotland; (3) the Atlantic patrol was instituted and after a bitter controversy within the Navy Department, part of Pacific fleet has been transferred to the Atlantic.

Thus, ships and planes are now where they are needed and everything is ready. There is every reason to expect that

Simultaneously, or a little later, President Roosevelt may also order a preventive occupation of Dakar and Atlantic islands for which plans are all ready. The columnists declare a powerful faction of the President's advisors are urging him to do this before the opportunity is lost.

The President, meanwhile, is still convinced that American war effort, except in limited special cases, can be restricted to air and naval action.







Sutter's Gold Discovery In Dispute; Oregonians Give Honor to Bennett

SALEM, Ore. Was it James Marshall or Charles Bennett who discovered gold in California?

Down in this state capital and pioneer Oregon settlement there still are those who debate the question, and back Bennett as the man who brought the gold rush of 1849.

An Oregon historian and others recently placed a marker on Bennett's grave here and thus renewed the controv-

Bennett and Marshall came to Oregon in 1844. Bennett joined the company of Col. Ford as it passed Fort Leavenworth. He worked on a sawmill on Abernathy island in the winter of 1844-45 and organized the first company of Ore-

The trail-blazer built a keel boat to operate on the Willamette River above Oregon City, but the boat was a fail-

It was in 1847, two years later that both Bennett and Marshall traveled to California, and had not been there long when they entered into a contract to build a sawmill at Fort

While construction of the mill was underway, the first gold discovery was made.

The historian, George Bancroft, gives the honor of the discovery to Marshall, but he admits that in San Francisco in 1847, Bennett had two small bags containing what he Beery, in The Bad Man, showing claimed to be gold. The following year he was in San Fran- for the last times at the Hilo thecisco again with a large amount of gold dust.

By the time the gold discovery in California assumed importance in history, Bennett was dead. No one disputed Marshall's claim, say his proponents.

Of the eight present when the gold was discovered, Ben- rogue, Robin Hood of the range. nett was the only one who had previous experience in gold mining, according to his backers. They say Bennett had mined in Georgia and identified the shinning pebbles as gold.

Bennett returned to Oregon in 1849 and helped construct the first steamboat on the upper Willamette.

When the Indian war of 1855 broke upon the Northwest, Bennett was appointed a captain, raised a company of volunteers, and marched to Walla Walla. He was killed while attempting to dislodge a band of Indians which had seized a settler's house.


