Choosing a Bicycle.

Every year it becomes more difficult to choose a good bieyele, simply because so many very good ones are offered. There is always a great diversity of opinion about the various makes. Questions of lightness, of comfort, and of durability have always to be decided, and for these points you may depend generally upon the catalogues. But there are a few "little" points about every machine which mark its value. These are often overlooked in purchasing. are often overlooked in purchasing, although they are of great importance. How to discover these is the

question. To begin with, try, if possible, several makes of bicycles which attract you for any reason. Almost any good dealer where you live will be glad to let you try the wheel he sells. Take it out for half a day, and try it on as many kinds of roads as you can find in the neighborhood. Take out each of the other makes in the same way on other days, up hill and down, climbing and coasting.

a wheel suited for general road riding. First notice whether the strain of your weight on saddle and paddles is well distributed over the rest of the machine by proper joints and connections. Is the frame well braced? Is the saddle hung well over the pedals, and not too far back? Can you sit up straight and

the sprocket wheel on which it runs. It ought to run almost noiselessly, without dragging or binding. Can you hear any grinding in any of the bearings—crank, pedal, wheels or head? They should run smoothly. Are all the bearings well protected from dust? The best machines have dust-caps on the pedals, and covered oil holes in all the wheel and crank bearings. And notice, too, whether the wheels and pedals as you spin them on their bearings stop short after a time, or whether they seem not to know just when to stop. The best ball bearings will not stop a wheel or pedal short, but will allow either to run back and forth until a

the back wheel be removed easily? and are the spokes rigid and easily replaced if one gets broken?
The methods for tightening and loosening the chain are too many and varied for mention here. Only be sure that on your machine the chain-tightening apparatus is thor-

Be eareful, also, to have the joint of the crank bearings with the frame particularly strong. A severe strain comes there continually, and should be met with the best material and

pneumatic tire. Certainly this tire insures the greatest comfort and speed. A light machine, provided it is strong and durable, as the best ones are, is no doubt the proper one for general riding. Of course a very hundred and eighty to two hundred

An Act to Increase the Facilities to Depositors and Providing for Term Deposits in the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank.

BRIT ENACTED by the Executive and Advisory Councils of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands:

SECTION L. The Postmaster-General, as Manager of the Postal Savings Bank, with the consent and approval of the Minister of Finance, may issue to any person Term Deposit Certificates in the name of the Hawaiian Postal Savings Bank for deposits of not less than Five Hundred Dollars nor more than Five Thousand Dollars.

Section 2. The amounts so deposited shall draw interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent. per annum to be computed in accordance with the law regulating the Bank. Such deposits shall not in the aggregate exceed \$150,000 at any one time. SECTION 3. The term for which any deposit shall be received under this Act shall not exceed twelve months.

Useless litigation to an interminable degree has been prevented by a series of decisions just rendered by the Supreme Court. The Franchise for Japanese. The Hawaiian question continues

to attract much journalistic atten-tion in Japan. The Radical party are evincing special interest in the matter. What action they will ulti-

mately take is more than we can predict. There seems, however, to be little doubt that they will bring strong pressure to bear upon the Government in the sense of securing the franchise for Japanese emigrants in Hawaii. The Jiyu observes that Hawaii is a small country possessing in itself little value for an annexing Power. Neither does Japan desire to annex it. But the question of obtaining the suffrages for Japanese residents there is of vital importance to Japan in more than one respect. It is directly important in respect of the interests of the 20,000 Japanese subjects residing in that country, and indirectly important because the status of the Japanese emigrants there affects the future position of Japan in the commercial world of the Pacific. But above all it is important as a means of drawing gen-Magistrate. The Court has put a eral attention to the Empire's real stop to this practice, which could position and strength.
