THE LEGISLATURE.

SIXTH DAY.

THURSDAY, May 6th.

The Legislative Assembly met at 10 A. M., the President, Hon. J. S. Walker, in the chair. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. Waiamano, Chaplain. The minutes of previous meeting were read by Mr. Pierce, Secretary, and, after correction, were adopted on motion of Rep. Aholo.

PETITIONS.

Rep. Nahinu presented a petition from South Kona, that Hawaiian be made the official language, and that all accounts of the Government be kept in that language. Also, that the Government borrow an amount of money not to exceed \$10,000,000. Also, that new enterprises be started, by which the revenue of the Government would be largely increased.

Rep. Aholo said the member for Hilo (Kaulukou) had already given notice of a bill to make Hawaiian the official language, and also of one for a loan of \$2,500,000, and he therefore moved that this petition lie on the table to be considered with those measures. Carried.

Rep. Nahinu presented a petition from South Kona, that opium be licensed, and that the license fee be \$100. Also, that no restrictions be placed on the liquor traffic, but that the price of retail liquor licenses be made \$1,500, and that of jobbing licenses \$1,000. Also, that all tailor shops be required to take out licenses. Referred to Committee on Miscellaneous Petitions.

Rep. Kauai—a petition from Wai-mea, that a leper hospital be erected at Hanapepe. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Kaai—a petition that a leper hospital to cost \$4,000 be erected in Hana. Referred to Sanitary Committee.

REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Noble (Gov.) Dominis reported that His Majesty had approved the bill appropriating \$35,000 for legislative expenses.

Rep. Dole, by leave of the Assembly, read the bill of which he had given notice, to amend chapter 1053, Civil Code. The bill provides that no estate or interest in land for lease under one year shall be confirmed unless by act or operation of law.

Rep. Kaunamano, by permission, read a bill to amend sec. 1, chap. 90, Penal Code. It provides to strike out the word "English" and insert "Hawaiian," so that the section would read, "Whenever any radical difference occurs between the English and the Hawaiian versions, the Hawaiian version shall be binding."

Rep. Brown moved that the Appropriation Bill be made the order of business on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Rep. Castle moved in amendment that Tuesdays and Fridays be appointed.

Rep. Brown's motion carried.

Rep. Richardson gave notice of an act to amend chap. 18, laws of 1874, entitled, "An act to amend chap. 870, Civil Code."

The same member moved a resolution that a committee be appointed to take charge of the engrossing work of the session. Carried.

Rep. Kauai moved a resolution that each member of the Assembly be supplied with 500 2-cent postage stamps, to be paid for out of the appropriation for expenses of the session.

Rep. Keau moved in amendment that the number be 300.

Rep. Dickey moved in amendment to the amendment, that the number be 25.

The amendment, for 300 stamps, was carried.

Rep. Nahinu presented a resolution that \$5,000 be inserted in the Appropriation Bill, for building a wharf at Hookena, Hawaii, and moved it be laid on the table.

Rep. Dickey moved an amendment that it be referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements. Carried.

Rep. Nahale presented a resolution that \$1,000 be appropriated for a court house and lockup at

North Kona. Referred to Judiciary Committee.

Rep. Pachaole presented a resolution that \$1,000 be appropriated for erecting cranes, or other appliances for handling freight expeditiously, at Pelekunu, Molokai.

Rep. Aholo moved that before the house proceeded further the messenger should supply the member for Molokai with stationery. This being done the resolution was returned to the member to be written on appropriate paper.

A resolution by Rep. Castle being passed, that bills or resolutions relating to public works should be referred to the Committee on Public Works and Internal Improvements, the resolution of Rep. Pachaole was thus referred.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

On motion of Rep. Keau the order of the day was taken up.

Rep. Kaunamano introduced a bill relating to the distillation of spirituous liquors on plantations. It authorizes licenses to be granted to other than plantation managers for distilling liquor, and provides for a return of the quantity manufactured by licensees.

Rep. Brown gave notice of a bill to regulate proceedings in bankruptcy.

Rep. Kauai presented a resolution that \$3,000 be appropriated for making roads in the town of Wai-mea. Referred to Lands and Improvements Committee.

Rep. Palohau gave notice of a bill to amend sec. 55, chap. 43, laws of 1882.

Rep. Kalua presented a resolution to the following effect: Whereas it appears that large numbers of Chinese are continually coming into this country, and whereas certain regulations were published restricting the coming in of Chinese, and certain rules were published by His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs that no more than 25 Chinese would be permitted to come by a single vessel; therefore resolved, that the Minister of Foreign Affairs be requested to report to this house in writing if the said restrictions have been carried out since those regulations were published, and to state whether any more than the number allowed by the regulations, have been permitted to enter. He said that long before the representatives in this Assembly were elected certain regulations were published stating that no more than a certain number of Chinese were to be permitted. The public seeing that notice were generally much pleased with it, considering it a measure that would check a large number of Chinese from coming into the country. But while the notice still appeared in the newspapers it was observed that large numbers of Chinese were permitted to come in. Nearly every vessel that entered took large numbers of them—very much in excess of the number stated to be allowed. The last steamer brought a large number, and small-pox with them, yet they were allowed to land. Fortunately they were segregated and the disease did not spread. This resolution simply meant to inquire whether the regulation of the Minister of Foreign Affairs had been carried out and the restrictions enforced.

Rep. Kaulukou was very much in favor of the resolution, but if its wording was strictly followed what the member was trying to obtain would not be accomplished. If it asked whether any more than the regulation allowed were permitted to enter then the Minister would have something to answer. It was not the people of the country who wanted Chinese: it was the plantation owners who would flood the country with them. One thing about the Chinese, however, was that they never attempted to meddle with politics like some other nationalities. He could not support the resolution.

Rep. Aholo was in favor of the resolution, except that part which asked for a report in writing.

Rep. Thurston believed that the member for Hilo (Kaulukou) was correct, that the resolution would not accomplish its object. He moved in amendment, to add, "that if such rules have not been enforced, what is the reason for their non-enforcement."

Rep. Dole said the reply should be in writing. He had an impression that the regulations, although they had the appearance of restricting Chinese, had a clause which nullified them. He was informed that under that clause blank forms of passports were supplied to parties to import Chinese for laborers. If that was true then the regulations were destroyed in effect. Judging from the very large number of Chinese which had landed during the last few months by nearly every ship there might be some truth in that information. He was also informed that the Hawaiian Consul-General in San Francisco, Mr. McKinley, issues passports freely, and sells them, and receives large fees for them.

Rep. Kaunamano moved a resolution that the Minister give the desired information verbally.

Minister Gibson seconded this motion, which carried, and the resolution as amended then passed.

Minister Gibson said that, as he stated yesterday, he had prepared a report of the Foreign Office for the past biennial period. Among other matters in that report there would be found a full statement of the restrictions placed upon Chinese, including the recent rules passed by the Cabinet Council. With respect to this particular matter the report would satisfy the desire of honorable members who wished a statement in writing. He hoped to be able to present his report the day after tomorrow. Anticipating the report to make an immediate reply, he said there were three or four occasions on which regulations had been issued. The first one was to grant return passports to all Chinamen leaving the country. The next one was limiting the number of Chinese admitted by one vessel, outside of those having return passports, to 25. Since this had little effect, it was ordered that none but holders of passports should be admitted. That regulation could not have reached the Hawaiian Consul-General at Hongkong earlier than March 25th, so that the arrivals by the Gaelic and other vessels were not an infringement of that rule. Regarding the member for Lihue's understanding that passports were issued for importing Chinese laborers, that referred to two or three instances when the Planters' Labor and Supply Company were making demands for laborers, but that would not be permitted under the new regulations. It must not be understood that those requests, to the amount of six or seven thousand, were complied with, as passports were only issued for a few hundred. With regard to reports that Consul-General McKinley was issuing passports, and charging \$5 or \$10 for them, he begged to inform the honorable member that he was entirely incorrect. The Consul-General was not issuing a single passport, but simply vised the passports of Chinamen coming from Hongkong, charging \$1 for each. He felt sure that, when the said regulations were fully in force, the stream of Chinamen coming here would cease, because there are no longer any passports issued for returning Chinamen except for those well-known Chinamen doing business here, and it would be a great hardship to prevent them returning. It was the earnest desire of His Majesty's Government to restrict the immigration of Chinese, consisting as it did almost wholly of males. It would be their duty to restrict the immigration of any nationality with so large a proportion of males. A perusal of his report would leave nothing further to be desired in the way of information on this subject.

Rep. Thurston said one point was not covered by the reply, and asked if the Consul at Hongkong did not know that no more than 25 could come before the 25th March. Minister Gibson said of the 120 or 130 arrived by the last steamer every one above the prescribed 25 had a passport, recognized at the Custom House as in due form. Minister Gulick introduced an act to provide for the issuance of copyright, and moved its first reading by title. Carried.

Rep. Dickey gave notice of an act to repeal an act to regulate the remission of tuition fees in the public schools. Also, an act to exempt all native-born Hawaiian subjects from payment of the road tax.

The President reported that the address in reply to His Majesty's speech had been engrossed and was ready for presentation.

Rep. Kalua moved, seconded by Minister Gibson, that the committee who prepared the address present it to His Majesty. Carried.

Rep. Aholo moved, as the house would not have enough work to keep it in session unless it made work for itself, that the copyright bill be read a second time tomorrow. Carried.

Rep. Castle moved an adjournment till 10 to-morrow, which carried, the house rising at 12:10.

MALICIOUS INJURY.

FOREIGN jurors of the April term are required to call on Mr. William Foster, Clerk of the Supreme Court, for their jury fees.

MESSRS. J. A. Mackenzie, plumber, and Alex. Flohr, locksmith, have joined the Bell telephone exchange, their number being 424.

THE six sailors that deserted the Norwegian bark Apollo shortly after her arrival here have not been caught and to-day the vessel sail with recruits shipped by Henry Hart.

THE Gleaners will give a missionary concert Friday evening, at 7:30 o'clock, at the Y. M. C. A. hall, for the benefit of the Kawaiahae Seminary. Admission 25 cents.

THE baseball match announced for next Saturday—Honolulu vs. Benedict—has been postponed, to admit a cricket match on the grounds between the Honolulu Cricket Club and an eleven from the British men-of-war.

LAHAINA mill is grinding between 18 and 20 tons of sugar per day. This season's crop, which will amount to over 2,000 tons, will be off in about 5 weeks. The old pioneer, Mr. Jas. Campbell, is still at Lahaina and everything is as merry as a marriage bell.

NIGHT before last several Chinese boys employed as domestics in private families on Nuuanu avenue were waylaid by foreigners and demanded money. These Chinamen are preparing to make the highway-men suffer if the act of Tuesday night is repeated.

THE farewell concert of the Campobello troupe last night was patronized by a moderately good house. The concert itself was superb, and the audience testified its appreciation by thunders of long-drawn applause, and by repeated encores that would not take "no" for an answer.

LAST evening Engine Co. No. 1 nominated the following Department officers for the June election: Chief Engineer, John Nott; 1st Assistant, M. D. Monsarrat; 2nd Assistant, Robt. More. *Engine Co. No. 2 the same time nominated, as Chief Engineer, C. B. Wilson; 1st Assistant, M. D. Monsarrat; 2nd Assistant, Frank Hustace.

THE steamer C. R. Bishop, which arrived yesterday from Hamakua, brings news of superb weather. Kukuihaele and Honokaa mills are each grinding 17 tons of sugar per day. The Ke Au Hou arrived at Waipio Monday last, and the Kulamau at Honokaa on the same day. The latter vessel was to sail yesterday noon for Honolulu with sugar.

THE erection of a lighthouse two miles from Makana, Maui, by the Wilder Steamship Co. for the Hawaiian Government has proved a great boon to that district. It has two powerful lights three feet apart and is a very durable structure. Before the erection of the lighthouse the landing there was very dangerous it being the place where the Kinau struck sometime ago, incurring a loss of several thousand dollars.

EXTENSION OF FIRE LIMITS.

Section 1 of the bill to be brought before the legislature to regulate the re-building of the city, provides: That part of the city of Honolulu, which is bounded as follows, to wit: By the water front; by the easterly side of Maunakea street, extending from the water front to a point one hundred feet mauka of the mauka side of Hotel street; thence on a line one hundred feet mauka of and parallel with Hotel street to a point eighty feet easterly of the Waikiki side of Alakea street to the water front, including the tide lands now reclaimed, or which may hereafter be reclaimed, makai of Queen street from the land of Waikahulu, shall be known as the fire limits of Honolulu.

MISSION CONCERT.

At the Fort-street Church vestry, last evening, Mr. J. A. Magoon read an able and eloquent paper on "The Indians of the United States," showing the principal theories prevailing as to their origin, their treatment by the pale-face invaders, the policy of the Federal Government in dealing with them and the efforts in progress by Christian people for their moral improvement.

Captain Bray gave a series of very interesting notes about the recent voyage of the Morning Star, among other things reading a very stringent prohibitory liquor law promulgated by the chiefs on one of the islands. He said that a result of the German occupation, in the case of at least one of the islands of Micronesia, is that the fighting chiefs have been notified that they must behave themselves or leave the island, and that order, previously unknown, is established. The captain closed his remarks by referring to an impression which seems to have got abroad that he had superintended the building of the Morning Star, on which he wished to say that he had had nothing whatever to do with either the planning or building of the vessel,—she was brought to Boston, and he was placed in command of her.

THE SATELLITE PARTY.

A reception and dance was given on board H.B.M.S. Satellite yesterday afternoon, and although the weather was showery and disagreeable the attendance was good. The ship's decks were sheltered by an awning of canvas, and below this profuse decorations of flags and flowers. All the boats of the Heroine and Satellite were employed in conveying the guests to the ship. Among those present were the British Commissioner Major Wodehouse, British Vice-Consul Mr. T. H. Davies, Mr. Canavarro, Portuguese Consul, Mons. Feer, French Consul and wife, Col. C. H. Judd, His Majesty's Chamberlain, Sir Richard Musgrave, Major Haley and wife, Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Walker, Rev. W. H. Barnes, Mr. F. B. Hastings, U. S. Vice-Consul, and wife, Rev. G. Wallace, Captain and Mrs. Mist, Mrs. Mackintosh, Miss Massey, Miss Wight, Miss D. Dowsett, Miss Green, the Misses Wodehouse, the Misses Feer, Miss Makee, Miss A. Cleghorn, Mr. Brealey, Miss E. Rickard, Miss Hawes, Mrs. Freeth, Miss Parke, Miss Gardiner, Miss Rhoades, Miss Barnard, the Misses Von Holt and Mr. T. H. Dodge. Captain Rose and officers of the Triumph, Capt. Blackburne and officers of the Heroine were also present. The Royal Hawaiian Band was in attendance, and discoursed excellent music throughout the afternoon. Dainty refreshments were served during the dances, and a most enjoyable time was had.

DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING POI.—Take the desired amount of flour and mix with cold water, being sure there are no lumps. Continue this in a bag or cloth and place in a kettle of boiling water, and let it continue to boil 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 hours, according to quantity used, care being taken to place a piece of perforated tin at the bottom of the kettle so as to prevent the cloth from burning. When done (which will be found by stirring with a stout spoon, adding a little water until the whole is well mixed). Let it stand from five to six hours. Then add water in small quantities, mixing thoroughly and kneading until the desired consistency is obtained. Owing to its purity it takes from three to four days to become acid or sour. [313 3m
