## Marshalls president demands resignation of entire Cabinet

MAJURO - Saying that the Marshall Islands government "needs a new direction," President Imata Kabua on Tuesday gave all Cabinet ministers two days to turn in their resignations so that he can reorganize his Cabinet.

A Cabinet shuffle, the first since Kabua won the Presidency in January 1997, will now happen, after many months of speculation and rumor that one was

In an August 18 letter to each Cabinet minister, Kabua said that if the 10 Cabinet ministers didn't resign by Thursday as requested, he would remove them as minis-

In his letter, Kabua recognized the ministers and said they could be proud of their record of service to the Marshall Islands.

But, he said, "I am convinced that the economic and other problems facing the Marshall Islands are such that the government needs a new direction. New energy and new initiatives are required in order to meet the challenges confronting the government."

As a result, Kabua said he was "compelled to change the nature of complexion of the Cabinet."

The Marshalls is mid-way through an Asian Development Bank-backed reform program that has laid off or retired close to 25 percent of the government workforce, slashed subsidies to government agencies, and otherwise cutback government ser-

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) -Jordan's Cabinet resigned Wednesday amid a growing scandal over polluted drinking water in one of Amman's wealthy suburbs. King Hussein immediately appointed a close confidant to form a new government.

Hussein, from his hospital bed in the United States, appointed Fayez Tarawneh to form the new administration.

The move is expected to have no major impact on Jordan's foreign policy, which is usually handled by Hussein.

The change is widely seen as related to popular discontent over the policies of Prime Minister Abdul-Salam Majali's 24-member Cabinet, which has been accused of negligence in providing polluted drinking water to Amman and of mismanaging the economy.

In an urgent dispatch, the staterun Petra news agency said Hussein accepted Majali's resignation late in the evening and Tarawneh began forming his

One friend said that when Ms. Lewinsky filed a swom affidavit in January denying a sexual relationship, it was in an effort to protect the president.

When the president said in a televised address Monday night that he had an inappropriate relationship with Ms. Lewinsky, he "didn' treally speak to the pain everyone else has experi-

## People need to know story behind increases in prices

PERHAPS it was only a matter of time before such a thing happened, but this week's news about Mobil Oil Micronesia increasing prices of its gasoline products CNMI-wide came more of a shock to some people here

Announced increases in fuel prices are unusual, as most of the time they go up unnoticed.

But then the biggest jolt was in knowing that the adjustments are on prices that are relatively high already.

It was only recently that the issue of gas prices hugged headlines due to the alleged big disparity of prices between Saipan and Guam's.

There was even a time when then congressman Stanley Torres tried to initiate an Attorney General investigation into possible gasoline price fixing, apparently to bring things out in the open and in effect push the prices downwards.

The issue however died a natural death.

But gasoline remains so much of an essential commodity for people not to be concerned about.

Mobil in deciding it will now raise its diesel fuel by 5 cents per gallon (cpg) and regular and premium unleaded fuel by 3 cpg has gotten some people baffled as to what economic theories and formulas came into play

Since Mobil indicated the increase was due to the 5-cent increase in the liquid fuel tax rate, there were those who presumed this has something to do with the recently-enacted, so-called Fiscal Integrity Act which eliminated the sunset provision in the tax law which would have lowered excise tax rates on fuel and cigarettes.

Questions inevitably arose.

Wasn't the new law only about maintaining the excise tax rates and keeping it at the level dealers have factored into their prices for the last three

Or was there any other considerations, aside from the fuel tax rates, like additional costs in production, freight, processing, etc.?

Why only Mobil raised its prices and not Shell only adds on to the mystery but whatever other reasons Mobil may have had, the bottomline is residents may have to bear with it—it's a fact of life—there's just no other way for prices but up.

Mobil, Shell or any other fuel company has all the right to raise its prices as it deems necessary, as profit is what motivates any business.

After all, that is the very essence of a laissez-faire economy—the market will be allowed to dictate the prices.

If Mobil wants to adjust its prices, then it just had to contend with the consequences of its decision, including the prospect of seeing most of its buyers shifting to Shell, or vice versa. That's the beauty of having a competitive market, of not having a monopoly. People can go for the one with the best pricing, best value for their money.

One must bear in mind, however, that the shift to the other brand could be much quicker and more justified when the increase is price is not adequately backed with reason.

This is where a little explanation on the part of Mobil won't hurt.


Even if Mobil is by all means not required to disclose the circumstances behind the increase, the company owes it to the consumers to at least give a bit more justification on its latest pricing decision.

Evidently, the people need to live with the increase. All they ask is that they see what they are paying extra for.

It is all but a matter of them knowing what hit them especially during

At least, for as long as they are kept abreast of the situation, people can rest assured prices are not increased just for the heck of it.

And Mobil being a company that have remained responsive to the community it does business in over the years, surely would not want consumers to remain in the dark and have the wrong notion.







## Forgiven

"HE AIN'T done nothing against me," an Oakland resident told CNN shortly after President Clinton finally admitted that Monica Lewinsky was not bragging about those presidential knee-pads in her phone conversations with that scary woman, Linda Tripp, who, in fairness to her, has yet to be seen flying aboard a broom.

For his part, an Atlanta resident told Washington Post that though Mr. Clinton cheated on his wife, "he didn't cheat the country. He's not the first president this happened to, he's just the first person to have Ken Starr as his enemy.

Polls conducted by CNN reveal that most Americans share these citizens' views. After all, the President merely acknowledged what everyone had known since 1992, indeed, what his political opponents have tirelessly and constantly reminded us: Bubba likes chicks. ("There is," writes Gore Vidal two years ago, "a famous picture of him [around the age of 16] shaking President Kennedy's hand. The boy Clinton is radiant. 'How,' one can imagine him thinking, if not daring to ask, 'do you get l-d around here?' In a candid mood the 35th president could have had a lot of tips for the 42nd.")

To be sure, there are those among US Republicans who will continue to insist that the belief in the separation between a leader's private and public lives is not only illusory, but also fatal to the nation's moral fabric. And that, therefore, the President should not just suffer the wrath of the First Lady, but of Congress, as well. The GOP, of course, still can not accept the fact that though their ideas are currently in vogue, they still can't beat a Democratic politician who has been involved in more scandals than a supermarket tabloid could publish in a single issue. Greater men, the President's critics would say, have been felled by lesser

However, as French actor Catherine Denueve remarked recently, it is puzzling that the president of a country where most of the world's pornography is produced is now in trouble for having an affair. ("Yet another affair," would have been more accurate.) Which is her way of saying that the socalled moral fabric is tattered to begin with.

Still, the more thoughtful American conservative commentators are right in noting that the President is already getting what he deserved to get. Considering the sheer humiliation this proud man will have to endure, is enduring, the President is already being punished for his indiscretion. He has truly carved a historical niche for himself, but it is now

likely that it will not be the one beside FDR's or TR's—his supposed model for the rest of his second term-or those of the other great presi-

At the same time, Mr. Clinton is expected to, again, survive this scandal. Indeed, this administration has made damage control/crisis management an art form. His strategists and advisers and Mr. Clinton himself did nothing before or after the Aug. 17th confession that was not carefully considered, weighed and calculated to minimize the expected backlash. So far, the public reaction to the confession is running its expected course. They still want him to remain in office. Meanwhile, some US Republicans are feigning to be frothing in the mouth regarding supposed legal issues involved, as in perjury and subornation. (One even said that he is "ashamed for the United States." To quote my mother whenever she smells b.s., "Oh really.")

Compare that to what the President said on TV: "I answered questions truthfully, including questions about my private life, questions no American citizen would ever want to answer." Guess what any citizen would likely remember—a word like subornation or a plea for privacy.

As the recent polls once again show, the American people no longer demand that their leader should be spotlessly moral regarding acts preferably done in the privacy of one's bedroom. He is expected to be discreet, and if caught, to say he's sorry. Further, and more important, he should competently perform his official duties.

Not surprisingly, this sentiment is shared by a sizable number of people elsewhere in the world. Most, like Ms Denueve, are wondering what the fuss is all about. Some say the President shouldn't even apologize.

But as this opinion column has noted during those early days of the scandal, a leader who can not control basic urges will command less respect, often to the point that his ability to lead is, itself, rendered problematic. However, men who aspire for leadership are usually those with unruly hormones. And they attract women, which is a sexist thing to say if not for the fact that I'm merely citing biological studies.

Which leaves us, the led, where? We are now more forgiving, but only because we know that we, too, want to be excused, if ever, for giving in to temptations. We,

too, prefer not to be publicly judged for private acts. Last Aug. 17th, the American people looked into the eyes of their President...and saw themselves.

## Yeltsin in bind over burying Lenin

WASHINGTON — You might call it Russia's own Curse of the Mummy — the way President Boris Yeltsin is too politically frightened to bury the body of Vladimir Lenin.

Since 1924, when the Soviet people asked for a prolonged open entombment of Lenin so that they could all pay their respects, his embalmed Bolshevik body has lain in an open, glass-encased coffin in Moscow's Red Square. For decades, Joseph Stalin used the giant mausoleum to help build a cult of deification around his predecessor's remains.

That cult is still strong, and it appears to our best Russian intelligence sources that the only man brave enough to remove the mummy is not Yeltsin, but a mere mayor — the popular chief executive of Moscow, Yuri Luzhkov.

Yeltsin has made it clear that he wants to bury the body, and last fall he called for a national referendum to decide the issue. But he quickly backed off after harsh criticism from Communist Party officials. Although capitalism is taking root in Russia, Communists are still in control of the national legislature, the Duma, and still command wide public support. Party leaders are aghast at the prospect that the founder of the Soviet state should be deposited six feet underground.

Lenin's only surviving relative, niece Olga Ulyanova, also wants to keep Uncle Vladimir in his oversized sarcophagus. So Yeltsin, fearing political and social upheaval, backed off his referendum.

Lenin himself wanted to be cremated and buried next to his mother in a St. Petersburg cemetery, but Stalin would have none of it. He needed the cult-like worship of the more popular Lenin to help build his own support.

The decision to display may have also have two other unusual roots: One was the discovery of King Tut about a year before Lenin died. More significant may be a Russian Orthodox belief that undecaying remains were a sign of sainthood, suggesting a Stalinist manipulation of religionists to elevate the incorruptible body of Lenin to demigod status.

So Stalin formed the "Immortalization Commission" with all the urgency of the Manhattan Project. Egyptians had their mummies, but no race in modern times had tried to preserve a body for permanent display. Until recently, the method used was a closely guarded state secret, the key component being a 60day-long chemical bath every 18 months.

Another key is the constant temperature inside the glass of 59 degrees and 70 percent humidity. Lenin's flesh-type hue is accomplished by a special light filter in his tomb, and twice a week Lenin's face and hands get chemical touch-ups. (His brain was shipped to the Institute of the Brain where it was sliced into 31,000 pieces for close inspection. No telltale signs of extraordinary intelligence were discovered, Russian officials confided to us.)

Until the fall of communism, lines would snake all through Red Square as Soviet citizens waited for hours for a glimpse of the body. But in the last several years, the crowds have shrunk to a relative trickle, mostly foreign tourists.

But President Yeltsin has balked at actually ordering the removal since Communists and nationalists had such a strong showing in the December 1993 parliamentary elections. He apparently fears the public removal would create more public outcry than he can afford — whereas now the body, bereft of its honor guard and the masses, is relatively ignored.

A similar fate has befallen other embalmed former dictators. Mao Zedong's tomb has also seen dwindling visitors in the years since Deng Xiaoping slowly demoted the despotic leader of China's Cultural revolution. Like Lenin, Mao also requested cremation, but was ignored after his death in 1976.

The same also goes for Ho Chi Minh, founder of the Vietnamese Communist Party who died in 1969 and wanted to be cremated. Vietnamese officials ignored his wishes and instead gave him the full Lenin treatment, with Soviet officials called in as experts on the embalming. In fact, Ho's body still makes regular pilgrimages to Moscow for its special chemical bath.

If there's a certain sign that times are changing, however, it can be found in the death of Kim Il Sung, the late dictator of North Korea. Again, the Russian experts were tapped for their secret embalming techniques, as the North Koreans wanted desperately to preserve the man who ruled that hermit kingdom for 46 years. Kim's, Kim Jong II, is particularly anxious to display dad's remains so junior can remain in power.

Yet what was once a closely guarded state secret that Soviet officials only shared with "friendly" regimes is now available to anyone — for a price. Our sources say the cash-strapped North Koreans paid \$300,000 for the embalming techniques, showing that cash is now king, even when it comes to preserving the decaying symbols of a failed ideology.

## Retiree law reneges on deal

Last August 6, an article appeared in the Variety entitled, "Fund Will Not Pay Pension for 3-Year Government Employees.'

I would like to add some further information so that this article and the actions of the NMI Retirement Fund can be put into a complete context by readers of the Variety and by concerned citizens.

As the article said, PL 11-9 was enacted in April 1998, increasing the

time period necessary to be vested in the CNMI Government Retirement System from three to ten years. (To be vested in the retirement system means that a member is eligible to collect a lifetime pension when he or she reaches a certain age.)

This move makes very good sense and is essential to the long-term wellbeing of the retirement fund.

The article did not make clear though, that the reason that PL 11-9 has been and will continue to be challenged, in the courts if necessary, is that PL 11-9

the agreement already in place between the CNMI Retirement Fund and those employees who were hired by various agencies of the CNMI before April 1998 and have been working and contributing to the Retirement Fund as per the terms of their agreement, but have not yet reached the three-year term.

In other words, this one section of PL 11-9 means that the CNMI is simply backing out of a deal it had already agreed to when each of the affected Continued on page 37

## All about reading signs in English

Dear Editor:

Last night on the TV news, I heard about the new law requiring signs to be in English (PL-29). Last April, I read about this bill in the newspaper. I did not understand the law and think others might be confused by it as well.

Anyone who lives or visits Saipan can see that there are many signs in Korean, Japanese, and Chinese. In fact, before my daughter could

even read or write fluently in English, she was able to discriminate between several Asian language writing systems and identify them correctly.

It was a game we would play while driving on Beach Road or walking around Garapan.

What language is that?

I am pleased that she has been exposed to various non-romanized writing systems, but concerned that there might be some not-so-positive influences as well.

As a former teacher, still concerned with literacy issues and preservation of indigenous languages, I wonder non-official languages affect early literacy development of children.

I have also noticed how few signs there are in Chamorro and Carolin-My impression is that Guam has

more signs in Chamorro than we do. I cannot help but wonder how enriched my daughter's life would be had she been constantly exposed to signs in the official languages of the

The news coverage of this law led me to believe that it is encouraging or even mandating English signs. However, after reading a copy of

the law. I see this is not the case. It clearly states "All businesses...shall advertise this name in romanized lettering in addition to

any other lettering.' I hope that if other community members got the wrong impression that signs must be in English, as I did, you will be pleased that signs can be in any language, even the three official languages of the CNMI. In fact,

how this multitude of neon signs in the word "English" does not even appear in the PL-29!

Romanized means the using the Roman alphabet and many languages do use it (Chamorro & Refaluwasch, as well as Tagalog, Palauan, Vietnamese etc.). The Asian languages common in

the CNMI use characters and/or other symbols, but have an existing system to convert to lettering if necessary. Wouldn't tourists enjoy seeing the

local languages, even if they can't understand them? Wouldn't the residents of the CNMI be proud to see them on public and

private signs? Wouldn't the children benefit also? So the law is NOT English only

pendency from food stamp benefits but also, it will create a challenging atmosphere of self-reliance as well as family preparedness program.



HAGATNA---As a soldier during the Desert Storm campaign, Capt. David Francisco, 30, committed himself to finishing the job he was assigned to do without turning back.

Now he approaches the battle to keep kids off drugs in much the same way.

As the Drug Demand Reduction Administrator for the National Guard, his Parent to Parent Program is one of the ways he battles ice.

It aims to assist parents talk with their children about drugs, sex, crime and a variety of other important issues.

This week's "War on Ice" seminar at the Hyatt Regency proved a perfect forum for Francisco to stage yet another attack against drug abuse.

"Drugs aren't the issue," he told the audience during a "working" lunch session.

"Lack of self esteem, lack of confidence and a good self image are the real problems," he says.

"The family unit is where it starts. If it's not squared away at home, none of what we're doing here will help."

Francisco, a parent himself, says that children develop their selfesteem between the ages of one and four.

Attitudes, perceptions, behaviors and the like are also developed during those crucial years. "TV has become an electronic

baby-sitter," he told the audience. "With it we can do the things we need to do as adults and they'll sit and watch Barney. While there's nothing wrong with Barney per se, what we're teaching our kids when we plop them in front of him is that we don't have to communicate."



## Alleged pimp's assets may be seized

SUPERIOR Court Associate Judge Timothy H. Bellas has granted lawyer David A. Wiseman's motion to withdraw as counsel to Linda Wang, who is accused of promoting prostitution and illegally withholding documents.

Wiseman no longer has direct communication with
Wang, who is believed to be still in China.

The court has forfeited her \$10,000 cash bail, and the Attorney General's Office will

now go after her \$40,000 unsecured bail, the Variety learned.

Bellas has said that if Wang would no longer return to the CNMI, her assets and properties here will be seized by the government.

The court allowed Wang to visit her ailing father in China due to her having substantial investments on Saipan.

She left on July 12 and has yet to return.

"I guess she's throwing everything," a Variety source said.
Bellas has issued a bench warrant for her arrest, with bail set

at \$50.00

Wang is facing a maximum penalty of 60 years in jail.

She was charged with six counts of promoting prostitution, including five first degree counts, which involved threatening persons to commit prostitution.

Wang owned the Linda House Karaoke & Gift Shop in Garapan.

Besides the 60 year jail term, the maximum penalty for Wang's alleged offenses includes over \$110,000 in fines





## Victims' rights group helps out on Guam

HAGATNA — As the War on Ice
Seminar goes into its last day, emphasis is placed on ice, what it does
to the user, what can happen if one
is found with it and a variety of
other information.

On a small table in the area just outside the break-away rooms, brochures and flyers entice passers by to pay attention to the victims of crimes perpetrated by ice users and others.

Lt. Josephine Fernandez of the Guam Police Department heads up the Victims Assistance Unit, recently re-named the "Erica and Christina Victim's Assistance Unit"

Says Fernandez, "Erica (Crisostomo) and Christina (San Nicolas) were both victims of crimes perpetrated on them by family members.

Erica's father killed Erica and her mother before turning the gun on himself and Christina's father was charged with drowning her when he thought he might have made her pregnant."

Both of the highly publicized crimes spurred the Governor to rename the unit after the two girls.

Fernandez' unit acts as a liaison between crime victims and those who can help them out. "Our mission is to assist victims and family members by providing information. We're a liaison between the police and other service providers." She cites the example of a man who has lost a car to theft.

"When he calls to find out what's going on with his case, we put him in touch with the unit investigating the crime. But we are short of manpower so sometimes it takes a long time for the victim to get the information needed, so we assist in following up."

following up."
Fernandez unit works closely with VARO or Victim Advocates

Reaching Out. VARO's mission statement reads, "...to not only respond to all victims of violent crime and trauma but also to elevate the stature of women and children on our island, those most often victimized by physical and sexual abuse."

The part about victimization via physical and sexual abuse stands as paramount in the services VARO offers. VARO workers are dispatched through a crisis intervention line where callers can call in 24 hours a day.

VARO can connect a battered woman with a shelter, medical, legal, psychological and financial help and other resources she may need to disconnect with her abusive partner. VARO goes as far as to assert to women in their information just exactly what domestic violence is.

"Are you Abused?" reads the headline on the beige colored page. "Does the person you love criticize you for little things? Humiliate you in front of others? Threaten or use a weapon against you?"

The list goes on to include tracking an individual's time, discouraging relationships with friends and family, accusing the woman of being unfaithful. Other flyers talk about how to get away from an abusive relationship — what steps to take and how to help friends and relatives who may be experiencing violence at home.

Fernandez says that her unit works often with VARO especially in concealing the identities and whereabouts of people who fear reprisals.

The increase in drug use on island has kept both her unit and the victim's agency busy.

"We've worked with over 216 cases since March." Fernandez' unit and VARO also work with victims of sexual violence, elder abuse and other crimes on the island.

# DOLI warns against 'illegal wage policy'

THE DEPARTMENT of Labor Immigration has warned a private firm for allegedly practising illegal wage payment policy to its employees.

Labor Hearing Officer Herbert D. Soll ordered Mai Thai Inc. to immediately conect such payment policy in connection with a labor complaint filed by Sunisa Boonprakob.

Soll, however, didnot impose sanction against MTI, but asked the company to remain in compliance or risk an accelerated penalty if future violations are found.

Soll in an administrative order dismissed Boonprakob's complaint against MTI, citing that the claim has been satisfied.

The hearing was set last Aug. 13 at DOLI's office. The formal proceeding did not begin because the complainant accepted the wage offer that was earlier tendered at the time of mediation.

Soll said MTI admitted the investigator's determination about improper method of payment.

The hearing officer said MTI demonstrated that the firm is now in compliance with the legally required method of paying wages.

Boonprakob was declared eligible for transfer and was given 30 days to come forward with an employer.

"Failure to transfer shall cause the complainant to depart within three days with the repatriation ticket now in the possession of the case investigator," Soll said.

BARELY a week before the Department of Public Lands announces the bidders for the Managaha Island concession, Representative Max "Timmo" Olopai requested that the burial place of Carolinian Chief Aghurubw be left untouched once they win in the bidding.

Olopai advised the Carolinian people to place themselves both in the modern and traditional side.

However, he stressed that Carolinian Affairs Office should look into all bidders and their proposals and see what things would adversely affect the Carolinian people and the whole NMI descent in general.

# NMHC intensifies collection efforts

THE NORTHERN Marianas Housing Corporation has intensified its collection efforts against delinquent housing tenants, according to NMHC director Marylou Ada.

Ada said the NMHC staff are more active now in collecting rents and engaging in meetings with tenants to stress the need in complying with the lease agreement.

NMHC staff have reminded the tenants to be good tenants by paying their rent regularly, said Ada in an interview.

"It's another way of teaching them that when you go out into the real world and you rent a house or get a loan one of the responsibilities is that you have to pay," she said.

The housing agency has no problem in its collection efforts because the tenants have been very cooperative, said Ada, citing that NMHC has only an estimated \$16,000 in unpaid rents from out of 177 tenants at the Section 8 housing project.

NMHC's accounting division has been sending the billings to collect back rents from tenants who have moved out from the Section 8 program.

"They (some tenants) are still owing NMHC money for their share of their rentals. So we are suing them to collect those uncollected or unpaid outstanding obligations from the tenants who moved out," she said.

Most of the delinquency now, Ada said, is attributed to tenants who moved out and have unsettled accounts with NMHC.

"Our housing specialists are very much active in trying to collect. And we are sending out a message that if you do not maintain your rental payment then we will try to instigate legal actions," said the corporate director.

One of the objectives of living in a public housing, Ada said, is you have to be a good tenant by abiding to the terms and conditions of the lease agreement.



## Decomissioning the USS Guam

NORFOLK, VA-On August 25th of this year, the Norfolk Naval Yard will be the site of the decommissioning of the amphibious assault ship, USS

The decommissioning will prove a bittersweet event for her crew and for the morethan 500 Navy and Marine veterans who comprise The USS Guam Association.

During thirty-three years of service, the USS Guam has been their home and their missions as diverse as recovering a Gemini space capsule to supporting Operation Desert Storm.

First commissioned January 16 of 1965, the Guam was named in honor of theisland and people of Guam who fought alongside U.S. service personnel inGuam's liberation from Japanese Imperial forces in 1944.

The last ofseven Iwo-Jima class ships named for the great amphibious assaults of thePacific Campaign, the ship was the latest of three distinguished warships tocarry her

In the early 1920s, a gunboat deployed on Chinas' Yangtze River waschristened the USS Guam. On December 7, 1941, this ship fell into enemyhands as Japanese forces overran the port city of Shanghai.

The absence ofthe islands' name from the naval rolls was short-lived.

Four years later anew USS Guam steamed into history.

This time, rather than a small gunboat, she was the second largest battle cruiser in the U.S. Fleet when it enteredthe war in the South Pacific.

She served with distinction as the AlliedForces completed their sweeps through the region.

Today rumors persist that secreted away somewhere aboard the current USSGuam is a "time capsule" filled with information on the history of herpredecessors and the hopes for her future.

The only man who would haveknown for sure was Captain Norman E. Thurman, a naval aviator who served as a dive bomber pilot in the Liberation







tory Administration. It added that the old statute is already outdated and no longer meets the needs of the CNMI's dynamic, growing

"An update on these old provisions is needed to ensure that all lifeguards are certified with newer requirements and guidelines in their field of work . . . " it said.

PL 11-26 also defines "qualified lifeguard" as a person who holds a certificate from organizations or agencies approved by the CNMI government to administer a lifeguard training program, to guarantee that he or she is qualified to save lives of persons who are in the water and

These agencies include either the Public School System or the Northern Marianas ColRed Cross, YMCA, US Lifesavers Association, Hawaii State Life Guard Association, Ellis & Associates, Canadian Lifeguard Society and Australia Lifeguard Association.

The said law also mandates all hotels using swimming pools for commercial and recreational purposes to employ a qualified lifeguard.

It, however, said that a lifeguard need not be on duty during any period of the day so long as warning signs are prominently placed, notifying potential users of the hours that the pool is either open or closed for swimmers, and that no lifeguard is on duty

## Audit faults Marshalls spending

For the Variety

Majuro — The Marshall Islands government issued checks totalling more than \$500,000 last year without proper documentation or authorization, according to an independent audit by Deloitte and Touche.

In addition, for the fifth year in a row, the audit warned the government that it did not have adequate control over petty cash funds at its embassies totalling more than \$280,000.

The annual audit of the Marshall Islands government, submitted earlier this week to the Nitijela (parliament), said that during fiscal year



Police later discovered that the man they arrested a, Nemesio Mallo Franciliso, got into a verbal argument with Cabial, where he ended up shooting the pair.

Franciliso has been charged with two counts of attempted murder, possession of a firearm without an identification card, possession of a unregistered firearm, unlawful discharge of a firearm, family violence, and the use of a deadly weapon in the commission of a felony.

The case is still under investigation, he was booked and confined.

## RPSDESO stronger stocks rally

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Philippine shares finished higher Thursday as investors continued buying stocks on the back of an advancing peso and other regional currencies, traders said.

The Philippine peso advanced against the dollar in moderate trading, buoyed by the continued strength of the Japanese yen, traders said.

Sufficient supply of dollars on the spot market is also boosting the peso, with most banks willing to sell dollars in anticipation of a further rise in the local currency.

#### Troubled firm has its ships stranded in Asia

**SINGAPORE** (AP) — Five ships of a financially troubled Singapore company have been stranded in ports in Japan, India and Indonesia, unable to pay salaries or port duties, a newspaper reported Wednesday.

The vessels belonging to Thon Soon Shipping have been detained, some since June, over disputes over cargo, unpaidcrew salaries and repair and port bills, The Straits Times said.


The troubles for the Singapore ship ping firm started last May when its parent company, Thong Soon Holding, was reported to have debts exceeding 55 million Singapore dollars (\$32 million), while its net assets were estimated at less than 30 million Singapore dollars (\$17 million).

The company's appeal last May for protection from creditors was reiected, leaving the fate of five of its ships uncertain.

The number of crew members on board and their nationalities are unknown, the Straits Times said.

The Maritime and Port Authority of Singapore has been involved in negotiations among the ship owner, local port authorities, cargo owners and crew.

# Japan opposition vow flexibility on reform by Prime Minister Keizo enough.

cial of Japan's largest opposition party offered Wednesday to be flexible on crucial financial reform legislation - but only if the ruling party makes concessions first.

Yukio Hatoyama, deputy secretary general of the Democratic Party of Japan, urged the ruling Liberal Democratic Party to be more aggressive on financial system restruc-

In a luncheon speech. Hatoyama called for deeper disclosure of bank finances and penalizing managers of failed financial institutions for missteps.

"When and if the government shows flexibility in adopting all of the above in principle, I believe the DPJ will adopt a flexible response," Hatoyama said.

Obuchi's government aimed at cleaning up Japan's massive bad loan problem.

The opposition, however, has threatened to block the measures unless they are strengthened.

Hatoyama said that the government did not seem to be headed for stronger measures to clear up the banking mess, pointing to comments by Finance Minister Kiichi Miyazawa that he would not allow any of Japan's top 19 banks to fail.

"It is clear that the LDP, the Finance Ministry and banks continue to maintain their secretive system," Hatoyama Debate on the six financial

bills being discussed in parliament has been rancorous in recent days, as the opposition party has stuck by its stance

At the center of the government's banking plan is a "bridge bank" proposal to allow the government to use public funds to take over failed banks and keep them lending to healthy corporate customers for up to five years while buyers for the institutions. were sought.

The opposition's plan is similar, but the Democratic Party says it would be faster and more aggressive in closing insolvent banks.

Hatoyama offered the DPJ's plan of temporarily nationalizing failed banks as a more stable alternative to the government's proposal.

## Thai Central Bank to settle debts by this month

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - The Bank of Thailand will settle by the end of August the last \$1 billion of offshore debt it accumulated during last year's failed defense of the country's currency, the central bank governor said Wednesday.

The previous central bank administration squandered nearly all of the country's foreign reserves defending the currency, the baht, from repeated attacks by speculators.

That forced the government to unmoor the baht from its fixed exchange rate and let it float, a de facto devaluation.

The move touched off a regional economic crisis and forced Thailand to accept a \$17.2 billion rescue package from the International Monetary Fund.

As of Aug. 7, the central bank still had \$11.3 billion in forward obligations, most in onshore markets, out of more than \$23 billion built up in the failed defense of the baht.

The baht has dropped 37.8 percent against the dollar since the central bank abandoned a basket-pegged exchange mechanism on July 2 last year.


The news helped the baht rise on Wednesday. Other factors that pushed the baht higher were the Japanese yen's rise against the dollar, and a statement by Standard and Poor's credit rating agency.

Standard and Poor's voiced support for the government's financial sector restructuring plan, and affirmed ratings on five state-owned or state-related institutions affected by the plan, dealers said.

At 11:58 a.m. (0358 GMT), the baht was trading at 41.59 to the dollar, up from 41.72 to the dollar at the close of Asian trading Tuesday.

# Polls marred by threats

(AP) — Scores of opposition members have been threatened or attacked by Cambodian strongman Hun Sen's forces since last month's elections, but there have been no confirmed political killings, a U.N. report said Wednesday.

The U.N.'s special representative for human rights in Cambodia said in the sevenpage report that victims allied with the opposition have been threatened at gunpoint, had shots fired over their heads and been beaten.

But the report stated that the U.N. Human Rights Center "has not received a single report of killing showing possible political motives since the election" and most acts of intimidation appear to have been initiated at a local level.

In contrast, the office recorded at least 30 deaths alleged to be political killings in the weeks that led up to the parliamentary elections July 26. There was only enough evidence to support claims for about six to be considered political.



# China Songhua River floods city

HARBIN, China (AP) — Soldiers bailed floodwater Wednesday that seeped through dikes protecting an industrial city, while oil workers in life jackets tried to keep partly submerged wells pumping in China's largest oil field.

The raging Songhua River punched through two 100-footlong dikes in Harbin, forcing people protecting the dikes to flee and cutting traffic on a highway bridge in the northeast provincial capital of 9 million people, the state-run Xinhua News Agency reported

Unusually heavy seasonal rain has prompted the worst flooding in 44 years on central China's Yangtze River and potentially the worst in 50 years in the northeast.

More than 2.000 people have died nationwide, and economic losses total at least \$24.1 billion.

Flooding in the northeast also poses one of the severest economic risks. The Nen River threatens to overwhelm the Daqing oil field, which accounts for at least a third of the country's production.

More than 270,000 soldiers, oil workers and civilians have worked round-the-clock to keep the Nen back. Local officials interviewed by China Central Television said wells were continuing to pump oil. CCTV footage showed oil workers in blaze-orange life vests using boats to

pair and check wells.

A 9-mile-long dike, the last defense protecting Daqing city's 2.3 million people, was completed Tuesday.

In Harbin, soldiers guarded a 5-foot-high restraining wall of metal rods and wood planks built atop a 15-mile-long levee protecting the city. State television showed soldiers using shovels and wash basins to bail water leaking through the sandbag dikes.

More than 2 million soldiers, paramilitary police and reservists have been sent to reinforce levees and rescue civilians. Gen. Zhang Wannian called it "the largest military deployment" along the Yangtze since the 1945-49 civil war that brought the communists to power, Xinhua reported.

Military commanders sent 13,500 troops to help 30,000 soldiers shore up weakened dikes around three cities in the hard-hit Dongting Lake area, Xinhua said.

Although the sixth flood crest since early July passed through the region with no reported problems, the river has receded slowly and was likely to rise again. Xinhua said as much as 4 inches of rain hit cities upstream in Sichuan province on Wednesday.

Flooding also was severe in neighboring Jilin province, where floods drove nearly half of the 2 million people of

Baicheng city out of their homes this summer, and nearly half of Zhenlai County's 17 townships are under water, Xinhua re-

The central government issued an urgent order Tuesday demanding that local governments stabilize prices of necessities and calling for punishment for hoarding. It said provincial governments could impose price ceil-

ings on food and materials for flood control and rebuilding.

Also Wednesday, Taiwan's pro-independence opposition party warned about possible price adjustments of agricultural products and other economic effects from China's flooding.

The party also called for financial assistance to Taiwanese businesses damaged in the flooding and expressed opposi-

tion to flood taxes levied by China's local governments on Taiwanese investments. Taiwanese investors have sunk \$30 billion into China.

Taiwan is the seat of the Nationalist government driven from the mainland by Communist forces in 1949. China considers Taiwan a renegade province, and the two governments do not recognize each other.



## 2M died in N. Korea famine

BEIJING (AP) — Three years of famine in North Korea has killed up to 2 million people, U.S. con-

up to 2 million people, U.S. congressional aides said Wednesday, describing children with stick-thin bodies and people making noodles from weeds, grasses and cornstalks.

The deaths most likely were from famine-related illnesses, such as pneumonia, tuberculosis and diarrhea, rather than starvation itself, said Mark Kirk, one of the bipartisan delegation's four members.

The group brought back video footage from the secretive communist country that showed sickly, emaciated children.

One young child too weak to sit

up had to be propped up in the corner in an orphanage. Older children filmed during the delegation's weeklong visit appeared severely stunted by malnutrition.

To survive North Koreans have

To survive, North Koreans have been eating weeds, grasses and corn stalks that are mashed into powder and sometimes mixed with flour to make noodles or cakes.

"The food shortage continues,"
Kirk said. "They are out of food.
That's clear."
During the past three years, the

famine has killed an estimated 300,000 to 800,000 people annually, with the number of deaths peaking in 1997, Kirk said. He said the figures came from U.S. government sources, refugees and North Korean exiles.

"Two million would be the highest possible estimate," Kirk said.

Last September, the Christian relief group World Vision also said that 1 to 2 million North Koreans may have died in "a full-scale famine"

The food shortages were precipitated by two years of flooding followed by a drought last year that pushed the country's inefficient collective farming system to the brink of collapse. The famine has left North Korea's 23 million people largely dependent on foreign aid. Foreign food aid is clearly sav-

# Embassy security bill mulled

as \$5 billion or \$6 billion if extensive renovations at other U.S. embassies are included as well as reparations for African families.

There's a worldwide review of U.S. embassies to determine which ones are vulnerable and where renovations are needed, said one State Department official.

One installation being carefully looked at: a new embassy planned for Berlin. It would not meet the State Department's criteria for safety, including a 100-foot setback from the nearest street, if construction proceeds according to plans.

State Department spokesman Lee McClenny told reporters Wednesday he had no comment on the security review except to say

He said the review encompasses plans for the new embassy in Berlin. He acknowledged that it would be difficult — given the planned location of the embassy — for it to meet security standards adopted in 1986. He indicated that no decision has been made on how that problem will be resolved.

The \$140 million facility, to be built on a major thoroughfare near the Brandenburg Gate, is to be opened in 2000 after the seat of the German government moves from Bonn to Berlin.

During her visit to Africa on Tuesday, Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said the emergency legislation also would compensate families that "suffered irreparable harm."

# For Clinton, a quiet birthday with family

EDGARTOWN, Massachusetts (AP) — President Clinton tallied the years — 52 this time — in a contemplative and muted birthday that held at least one stark reminder of the controversy back in Washington.

It was Vernon Jordan — golfing partner, political fix-it man and witness before the grand jury dissecting Clinton's affair with Monica Lewinsky. Jordan and his wife were having Clinton, the first lady and Chelsea to their Martha's Vineyard home for dinner and birthday presents.

With the investigation continuing, White House spokesman Mike McCurry dismissed any raised eyebrows about Wednesday's convergence of Clinton's legal problems and social life.

"He's spending his birthday evening with his friend. That's all I would read into that," McCurry said.

Another longtime Clinton friend, Carolyn Staley, guessed that the president was counting his blessings Wednesday — his family's and Jordan's enduring loyalty among them.

Clinton "treats birthdays like New Year's Day. They're a time to kind of do an accounting," Staley said in an interview.

The president slept late and took "Happy Birthday" calls from a few close relatives, McCurry said. The lone piece of business was his daily foreign-policy briefing via telephone call from National Security Council Adviser Sandy Berger.

By McCurry's account, the Clintons were nesting—hurting, maybe, but together. They shared a late breakfast, lunch and walks in the secluded tall grasses around Oyster Pond, where they are staying.

Staley and other friends dating back to Clinton's Arkansas boyhood speculated this birthday would be particularly sober, coming two days after he publicly apologized to his family for an inappropriate relationship with the young White House intern.

"It will be painful as he looks back over this year and tries to see how he could put it right," said Staley, who visited with the Clintons before his televised confession.

"He does believe in second, third and fourth chances. He wants to give himself today a fresh start."

Starr scores victory in court for Meineke

RICHMOND, Va.(AP)-Kenneth Starr won a \$390 million victory for a muffler chain Wednesday, two days after the independent counsel wrangled a confession from President Clinton that he had an inappropriate relationship with a White House intern.

A three-judge panel of the 4th U.S.CircuitCourt of Appeals threw out a jury's verdict against Starr's client, Meineke Discount Muffler Shops, in a class-action suitfiled by the company's franchise dealers.

The lawsuit was returned to a federal judge to give the dealers a chance to pursue a smaller award.

The appeals court agreed with Starr's argument that the case arose from a simple contract dispute and snowballed into a huge lawsuit alleging fraud and unfair trade prac-

Franchise dealers accused Meineke, a subsidiary of the British conglomerate GKN, of illegally skimming as much as \$32 million they contributed to head-

The appeals court said the franchisees' case should not have been certified as a class action because many dealers did not want to par-

The lawsuit is one of a few private cases Starr has taken while serving as the special counsel investigating the Whitewater land deal and Clinton's relationship with Monica Lewinsky.

Clinton for months denied having sexual relations with Ms. Lewinsky. On Monday, he testified about their relationship before a grand jury, admitted on national television to a relationship that he said was "not appropriate" and called for Starr to end his inquiry.

The administration has criticized Starr for taking outside cases like the Meineke lawsuit while serving as independent counsel, although the moonlighting is allowed by law.

In addition to Meineke, Starr has represented the tobacco industry, the National Football League Players Association and Chiquita Brands International.

# FCC's rate plan OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal appeals court upheld a government plan that overhauls telephone fees in an attempt to lower longdistance rates.

Wednesday's decision by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 8th Circuit is a rare victory for the Federal Communications Commission, which in the last year has lost several highprofile telecommunications cases.

"We are very pleased," said FCC Chairman Bill Kennard.

Local and long-distance companies had waged for different reasons a broad legal assault on the plan, which the FCC adopted in May 1997. They didn't say whether they will

The court, based in St. Louis, affirmed the FCC on all counts. That means the status quo prevails, and customers will experience no change in phone bills because of the court's ruling.

At the heart of the FCC's plan to overhaul telephone fees was its decision to cut "access" fees by \$1.7 billion. These are fees that long-distance companies pay local phone companies to connect calls.

## Islamic militants warn Americans of new attacks

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A coalition of Islamic militant groups warned in an Arabic newspaper Wednesday that "strikes will continue from everywhere" against the United States.

The statement from the World Islamic Front for Jihad Against Jews and Crusaders, formed by exiled Saudi millionaire Osama bin Laden in February, was printed Wednesday in the London-based daily Al-Hayat.

"The coming days will guarantee, God willing, that America will face a black fate," the statement said. "Strikes will continue from everywhere, and Islamic groups will appear one after

the other to fight American interests."

The Jihad front is believed to be a coalition of six fundamentalist groups from Egypt, Pakistan and Bangladesh. Its statement was sent Tuesday to Al-Hayat's bureau in Cairo.

Al-Hayat said it came with three other statements from the Islamic Army for the Liberation of Holy Shrines, which claimed responsibility for the two deadly bombings of U.S. embassies in Tanzania and Kenya on Aug. 7.

In one statement, the Holy Shrines group said it would "continue shipping more American dead bodies to their unjust government ... until we humiliate America's arrogance and roll its dignity in the mud of defeat."

The group had not been heard of before the explosions in Nairobi, Kenya, and Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, which left 257 people dead and more than 5.500 injured. Among the dead were 12 Americans.

In Washington, State Department spokesman Lee McClenny said the administration was unable to say whether the threats were cred-

"Naturally, we'll be watching closely and taking prudent security measures," he said.

## Israel wants WWII bones returned

HOLON, Israel (AP) — While the bodies of dozens of his relatives, all victims of the Nazi Holocaust, lie in unmarked mass graves in Poland, Zvi Kamionka says he cannot rest.

Kamionka, like dozens of other Polish Israelis, wants to bring the bones of his relatives to Israel for burial - a task suddenly made possible when Polish pathologists agreed to help their Israeli colleagues identify the victims' re-

"My greatest fear is that nothing will be remembered of my relatives," Kamionka said Wednesday, speaking in his apartment in Holon, a Tel Aviv suburb. "My mission is not finished as long as ... all the bones are not brought back here to be buried."

That is a formidable challenge. Zamionka's 70 relatives are buried in a green field dotted with daisies in the Polish town of Kalushin — along with 2,000 other Jewish victims of the Holo-

Dr. Yehuda Hiss, head of Israel's Institute of Forensic Medicine, said families have brought remains home to Israel in the past, only to be disappointed when tests showed they were not those of their relatives.

That is likely to change now that the head of the Forensic Medicine Institute in Warsaw, Dr. Aleksander Dobrzynski, has agreed to carry out tests on the

Hiss called the development "a major turning point and a humanitarian act on the part of the Poles." It has prompted a flood of phone calls to the Israeli Institute of Forensic Medicine from the rela-

tives of Holocaust victims.

Kamionka, 66, escaped to Russia from Kalushin in 1940, just months before thousands of the town's Jewish residents - including 70 of his relatives --- were shot to death.

He knows that even with the help of Polish pathologists, finding his relatives' remains among the 2,000 buried in that desolate field in Kalushin may be an impossible task.

"It's a good idea ... but it's not very realistic," the retired electronics technician said Wednes-

"Hundreds of thousands of Jews were buried all over Poland and to do DNA tests on them all is an impossible task."

Kamionka hopes all the bones from the mass graves - whether they can be identified or not will be brought to Israel, for a dignified and permanent burial.

Still, for the relatives of most Holocaust victims, there are no million Jews who perished in the Holocaust—the majority of them in Poland — were gassed and cremated, and their ashes dumped.

"The remains represent a very small number of those who died in the Holocaust," said Jonathan Lemberger, the head of AMCHA, an organization that helps Israeli Holocaust survivors.

· Lemberger also expressed concern the scientists' efforts might only raise tragic memories for those survivors who have no remains of loved ones to bury.

"This is a reminder that they have no grave and that they had no proper mourning process," he said. "That is going to be very difficult for most survivors."

garment industry. We cannot do that because there is no law that supports this," Faisao stressed.

Cepeda's resolution wants to prevent garment manufacturers from hiring nonresident workers in farming, fishing and construction sectors to protect local and small scale businesses engaged in

Faisao said this is not fair.

"Although Public Law 10-44 provides for the protection of local businesses in farming and fishing, it addresses all businesses and not the garment industry in particular as the resolution requests.'

He also said that the resolution is a redundancy of Public Laws 10-9 and 11-6 as far as the importation of guest workers is concerned, adding that these policies have made it impossible for the garment industry to hire more for-

"The importation of nonresident workers to work in areas not pertinent to the manufacturing of garments cannot be restricted if all proper work permits and business licensing is done," he said.

He explained that what is illegal is when companies or employers engage their workers in jobs or fields other than what is stated in their work permits. "Those caught in violation are dealt with accordingly by the commerce department already.'

At the same time, Faisao raiseo concerns that the local garment industry is already hurting because the financial crisis and currency devaluation experienced by Pakistan, Thailand and Indonesia have resulted in increase export of their textile and apparel products to the US markets.

"There must be confidence in the continuity of CNMI policies, laws and taxes in order for our local garment manufacturing companies to sustain the image and reliability of the industry," he

BOSTON (AP) — A Boston teacher completed swimming the English Channel for the sixth time Wednesday, just two weeks after he called off a crossing 10 hours into the swim.

"I guess God was on my side," said Peter Jurzynski, 47. "I was a little burnt out because of the earlier swim."

It took Jurzynski 16 hours and 16 minutes to complete the crossing, more than four hours longer than his best time of 12 hours and seven minutes. He made that time in his first outing in 1987, when

he was 36. He also successfully swam the channel in 1988, 1992, 1996 and 1997. He tried several times unsuccessfully including 1993 and 1994, and two weeks ago, when he swam several hours and then turned back.

## Sampras settles down, advances

**NEW HAVEN, Connecticut (AP)** 

—Pete Sampras, still haunted by a 3day-old controversial call, allowed Lleyton Hewitt to break him twice and force a tiebreaker before dismissing the young Australian 6-1, 7-6 (7-4) to advance to the third round of the Pilot Pen International Wednesday.

Sampras, the No. 1 seed, dropped the first game of the match, serving, and later said he was having trouble acclimating himself to his first appearence in New Haven.

"My tennis will get better. I certainly hope it will get better," he said, after the 1 hour, 12 minute duel.

Sampras also said he was dwelling on Sunday's loss to Patrick Rafter in the finals of the ATP Championship in Cincinnati, which placed in jeopardy his goal to end the year at No. I in the world.

The match ended on a serve by

Rafter that was first called out, then ruled an ace by the umpire.

"Idon't like losing matches. Idon't like losing, period, especially that way," he said, adding that he most wants to play Rafter this week.

Rafter, seeded second, was slated to play Jeff Tarango in a night match. Rafter, ranked No. 3 in the world, and Sampras would meet in the tournament finals.

Hewitt, whom Sampras called an up-and-coming player in need of a bigweapon, saidhe was overwhelmed by the Wimbledon champion's serve. Sampras rocketed 12 aces, consistently serving faster than 120 mph.

Hewitt had beaten Andre Agassi earlier in the year to win the Australian Hardcourt Championships.

He had said his goal in playing Sampras was to stay relaxed. But after falling behind 4-1 in the first set and in the middle of dropping one of four service games, the 17-year-old struck his racket on the court, breaking it.

"I was a set down before I knew it," Hewitt said. "At the time you really don't know what to do."

Also Wednesday, third-seeded Petr Korda defeated Andrei Medvedev 6-3,2-6,6-1. Korda, ranked No. 4 in the world, will face fellow Czech Bohdan Ulihrach, seeded 13th.

Korda, the Australian Open champ, acknowleged he is the favorite of the

## Kournikova, Sanchez-Vicario advance at du Maurier Open

MONTREAL (AP) - Old favorite Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and the spicy teen-ager Anna Kournikova both survived tough second-round matches Wednesday at the dlrs 1.3 million du Maurier Canadian Open tennis

Wimbledon champion Jana Novotna of the Czech Republic, riding a three-tournament winning streak, downed Russia's Elena Likhovtseva 7-5. 6-2 to run her consecutive match victory streak to 17.

Top-seeded Martina Hingis of Switzerland was scheduled to play Austria's Silvia Plischke later Wednesday.

Sanchez, 26, of Spain, struggled with her serve on a windy center court in a 0-6, 7-5, 6-2 victory over Karina Habsudova of Slovakia.

Kournikova, 17, of Russia, emergeda 4-6, 6-2, 6-4 winner over Romania's Ruxandra Dragomir.

"For the first 20 or 25 minutes, Ididn't see the ball\_I just saw her winners," the third-seeded Sanchez said of Habsudova, who is ranked 61st in the world. "I just tried to stay in the match, keep the ball in the court and try to move her around. Obviously, it worked."

The three-time French Open champion caught a break when, leading 6-5 in the second set, a missed line call on set point helped her avoid a tiebreaker.

Video replays showed Habsudova's shot landed squarely on the line, but it was ruled to be out.

Sanchez won the du Maurier in 1992 and 1994 in Montreal and reached the final the last time the women were at Jarry Stadium in 1996, losing to Monica Seles.

Autograph seekers lined up 10 deep to catch the attractive Kournikova, the 15th seed, on her way to and from the court for what turned out to be a spirited first meeting with the 38th-ranked Dragomir.

"I knew she was a good, whole-court player," said Kournikova, who shot frequent glances ather "good friend" Sergei Fedorov, the Detroit Red Wings center who watched from courtside. "It was windy and it was difficult to adjust. I think she handled the wind well."
