A MASTERLY STROKE.

During the last months the chances of the Democratic party the United States for political supremacy have been decidedly in waning. By the City of Peking we learn that a clever political move of President Cleveland has re-habilitated the standing of himself and his party. The leader of the Democratic party has made the eagle screech and has offered to twist the lion's tale.

The result was easy to foresee. The jingoes and the blatherskites and the common herd which follow the braying of the two legged asses with or without brass buttons fell into line and raised the earpiercing cry which told Mr. Cleveland that he is to-day the most popular man in the United States, with excellent prospects of a "third term."

And what did he do? He sent a message to Congress in which he stated that he was determined at all hazards to uphold the Monroe doctrine, and that he asked to be empowered to send a commission to Venezuela to settle the boundary question of that republic and British Guiana, and in case England was in the wrong in her dispute with the South American republic to use the necessary means to try to prevent her from enlarging her territory on the American continent at the cost of an American Republic.

The tenor of the message is dignified and it shows that the President is serious and believes himself to be in the right. It was undoubtedly not his intention that his message should confer the impression that an immediate war between Great Britain and the United States was either desirable or imminent. Such an interpretation was simply caused by the noisy politicians and jingoes who saw an excellent opportunity to give vent to their anglophobia and make themselves conspicuous by their offensive boasting and childish bragging.

The noise has not had any effect or been noticed in England or Europe except as causing ridicule and contempt. No sane person will believe that the two great powers will go to war over a miserable strip of land in South America. We don't doubt that Mr. Cleveland has played his card well, knowing the political effect it would have in the States, and with a complete understanding that everything will be amicably settled.

The most interesting feature in the event is the effect which the message had on the American money market. The collapse on Wall street and on the money markets of Chicago, Boston and Philadelphia proves distinctly the unsoundness of the American financial foundation, and shows the paramount influence of English gold in the United States. The English banks call in their loans; as a consequence the crash is heard in Wall street, and Mr. Cleveland was obliged to send a second message—this time an emergency message to Congress. If he succeeds in that measure, which means to make the Republican Congress adopt his financial policy, has to be seen.

Hans H. Kohler, a son of the late wine merchant, Charles Kohler, in San Francisco, and until recently head of the well-known wine firm of Kohler & Frohling, has been declared insolvent.

It is generally believed that ex-President Harrison will carry the nomination of the Republican Convention for the Presidential election.

A great strike of the motormen and conductors of the Union Traction Company has been started in Philadelphia. The company employs over 6000 men.

Amarino has not met better success on the Ingleside track than on the Bay District.

It is rumored that Emperor William of Germany has borrowed 35,000,000 marks for his personal use. The loan was arranged by a syndicate belonging to the nobility.

The cruiser Charleston is lying disabled at Nagasaki. The Boston has been thoroughly repaired. The Asiatic squadron is expected to be ordered home.

M. A. Gunst has been confirmed in his office as Police Commissioner in San Francisco by the Supreme Court.

Will Build in England.

VICTORIA, B. C., December 20.—Private advices from Japan by the Empress of India announce it as finally decided that the contracts for building the ten men-of-war by which the Japanese navy is to be increased will go to English firms. English manufacturers will also supply the whole of the machinery and gear for the enlargement of the docks at Sascho and Kure.

It is generally believed that the ship-building contracts would at least have been shared with the United States, but for an unhappy object lesson which the builders of the Charleston furnished, which was quickly emphasized by the wide-awake representatives of the British firms.

Must Fight.

KEY WEST, Fla., Dec. 20.—Advices from Havana state that Campos will make desperate efforts immediately to break the power of the insurgents. He has determined to force the fighting because of urgent orders from Madrid. The Cabinet has informed Campos unless decisive victories are won over the insurgents immediately it will be impossible for Spain to procure money to maintain her army on the island. The Minister of Finance has said that the Spanish Treasury is empty and the insurgents have made such a showing that is impossible to float a new loan in a European capital.

From Armenia

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—In accordance with the advice of Minister Terrill, the Administration has determined to remove American citizens from the disaffected district of Marash, in Asia Minor. This determination was reached at the Cabinet meeting to-day, and a member of the Cabinet said that the Navy Department had been ordered to issue the necessary orders to the Commander-in-Chief of the European squadron to effect the removal of the Americans now at Marash. The instructions were sent this evening to Rear-Admiral Selfridge by cable. These instructions are explicit. He will combine his fleet at Alexandretta, the nearest point to Marash, and will direct the American missionaries and other American citizens in Marash, to come on board his vessel. In case it should be necessary to give them protection during their journey from Marash to Alexandretta he has been authorized to land a force of marines.

The vessels which Admiral Selfridge will mobilize at Alexandretta will be the San Francisco, the Marblehead and the Minneapolis.

The action of the Administration in directing the removal of American citizens from Marash is a precedent for similar action in the cases of other disturbed districts of Asia Minor. Minister Terrill suggests that all Americans quit Turkey.

BERLIN, Dec. 20.—A dispatch from Constantinople to the "Frankfurter Zeitung" says:

"The Porte has ordered Mustapha Remezi Pasha to attack with 1000 troops and two batteries the city of Zeitoun, and to bombard and destroy it and to massacre the 12,000 Armenians in the city."

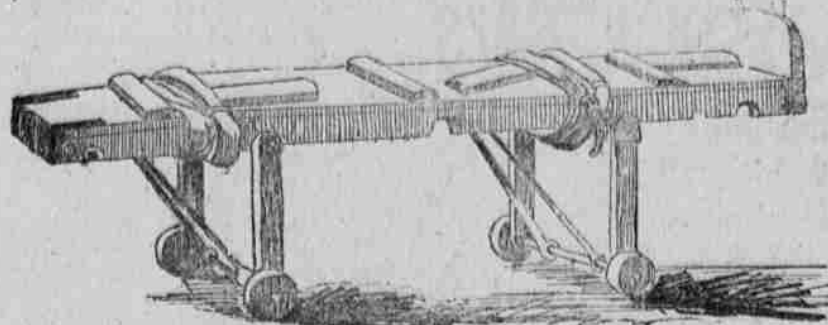
