## THE RACES AT THE PARK

PLENTY OF GOOD SPORT AND A  
BIG CROWD.

The Usual Intermittent Delays Be-  
tween Races Causes Consider-  
able Disgust.

That bicycle racing is rapidly  
increasing in popularity was  
shown by the good attendance at  
the race track before the time of  
the first race, and farther by the  
fact that many people went out  
for the sole purpose of seeing that  
portion of the program only.  
Those people saw two good races  
and got home in time for dinner,  
while those whose fondness for  
horseracing led them to stay to  
the end had all they could do to  
get home in time for supper.  
There was no excuse in the world  
why the races should not have  
been over by 4 o'clock, but as a  
prominent member of the Jockey  
Club said to the writer: "It will  
never be any different as long as  
Captain Tripp is there. For  
twelve or fourteen years he has  
always been selected as a judge  
and naturally takes precedence  
over the other two. He has got  
into the habit of letting jockeys  
and drivers run over him and can't  
help it. It is time the club made  
a change for its own good. If we  
did not need Charley Wilson so  
much for a starter we would try  
and have him as a judge. It's all  
Tripp's fault."

The speaker evidently voiced  
the sentiments of other members,  
for there were loud and constant  
complaints in the Jockey Club  
quarters all through the day.

At 10 o'clock the proceedings  
opened with the

First Bicycle Race—Prize, gold  
medal valued at \$20, half mile,  
scratch, free for all. Henry  
Giles, R. A. Dexter, Geo. Angus,  
F. A. Damon, T. V. King and G.  
A. Martin.

The riders were all bunched to-  
gether until coming down to the  
wire, Damon leading. When about  
fifty yards from the post Dexter  
made a marvelous spurt and passed  
the others like a flash, winning  
easily, Damon second. Time 1:14.

Second Bicycle Race—Gold  
medal valued at \$30, one mile  
handicap. R. A. Dexter and  
George Angus, scratch; H. A.  
Giles, 22 yards; F. B. Damon, 34  
yards; G. A. Martin, 43 yards;  
T. V. King, 47 yards; John  
Sylvia, 66 yards; Albert Cunha, 70  
yards.

This race was well planned and  
prettily played by the Tribune  
men, it being understood that  
King was to win if he could, and  
if not that Dexter would be on  
hand with reserve enough for one  
of his old-time spurts and snatch  
the victory out of the jaws of de-  
feat. The scheme worked to a  
charm, King winning the race in  
2:32 2-5, Damon second.

Third Race—Honolulu Purse,  
\$200, running race, one-half mile  
dash, free for all. Lord Brock,  
Ballota and Star.

Lord Brock took the lead and  
kept it, winning hands down in  
:50 2-5.

Fourth Race—Merchants' purse,  
\$15, trotting and pacing to har-  
ness, best 2 in 3, 2:45 class.  
Charles S., Margaret H., Lottie  
L., Alvina and Ralph.

In this race the drivers got in  
their deadly work on the judges  
and the onlookers had to suffer a  
delay of about half an hour or  
more before the horses were final-  
ly sent off. When they did go  
the start was not as good as  
several previous ones in which  
the horses had been called back.  
Ralph took the lead and main-  
tained it to the end, winning in  
2:32, Margaret H. second.

In the second heat there was a  
repetition of the tiresome scoring.  
When the horses finally got off  
Ralph soon took the lead and  
won in 2:33 1-2.

## LEGISLATURE IN SESSION

THE SENATE KILLS THE WIDE  
T R ES BILL.

The House Finishing Up Its Business  
—Representatives Discuss Repeal  
of the Registration Act.

NINETY-EIGHTH DAY, JUNE 12TH.

THE SENATE.

After the usual preliminaries in  
the Senate this morning a com-  
munication was read from the  
House, noting bills passed on  
Wednesday and their transference  
to the Passed Bills Committee.

Under suspension of the rules  
Minister Cooper introduced a bill  
appropriating \$1300 for additional  
expenses of the Legislature. Passed  
first, second and third reading by  
a unanimous vote.

Senator Lyman from the Com-  
mittee on Passed Bills reported  
that Senate Bills 18, 19 and 20, re-  
lating to loans, and Senate Bill 55,  
additional appropriations for the  
Bureau of Education, had been  
presented to the President for his  
approval.

Senator Lyman made a further  
report from the conference com-  
mittee on the wide tires bill, re-  
commending the adoption of the  
House amendments thereto.

Senator Hoeking moved to lay  
the report on the table and Sen-  
ator Brown seconded the motion,  
which carried by a vote of 6 to 4,  
which kills the bill.

On the order of the day the bill  
relating to public holidays came  
up on third reading.

Senator Brown moved to strike  
out the third Saturday in Septem-  
ber.

Senator Schmidt moved to  
amend by striking out the third  
Saturday in September and sub-  
stitute a day to be fixed by the  
Minister of the Interior to cele-  
brate the opening of the harbor  
of Honolulu.

Senator Brown accepted the  
amendment, which was lost on a  
vote.

Senator Brown then renewed his  
motion to strike out the third  
Saturday of September, which  
was lost.

The bill then passed, Senators  
Wright and Brown voting no.

Minister Cooper asked recon-  
sideration of the vote on the wide  
tires bill, but a motion to that  
effect failed of the requisite two-  
thirds vote and the bill was not  
only killed but finally buried.

On the suggestion of Minister  
Cooper that a veto of a House  
Bill was on the way, a recess was  
taken to 1:30 p. m.

NINETY-EIGHTH DAY, JUNE 12TH.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

In the House this morning the  
report of the Conference Com-  
mittee on the wide tires bill was ap-  
proved.

Senate Bill 54, making appro-  
priations from the new loan,  
passed third reading.

Senate Bill 56, authorizing the  
expenditures of the refunding  
loan, passed third reading.

The Senate Concurrent Resolu-  
tion concerning the printing of  
departmental reports was again  
taken up on Rep. Richards' motion to adopt.

Rep. Bond again opposed the  
resolution on the ground that it  
required the Ministers to do  
something which the law did not  
give them the power to do, but  
when asked to explain by Rep.  
Robertson the member could not  
do so.

After some further argument a  
motion to lay the resolution on  
the table was defeated and the  
resolution was then adopted.

House Bill 60, amending the  
Land Act, passed third reading.

A communication was received  
from the Senate transmitting the  
bill appropriating \$1300 for addi-  
tional expenses of the Legislature

## SCIENCE IS TRIUMPHANT

THE ROENTGEN RAY DISPLAYED  
IN HONOLULU.

Successful Series of Experiments by  
J. J. Williams and Assistants—Hid-  
den Things Revealed.

Last evening another brilliant  
gem was added to the crown  
which surmounts the brow of the  
great discoverer of the Roentgen  
Ray, that marvelous and mysteri-  
ous light which shines through  
the densest of objects. At the  
same time our esteemed fellow  
citizens, James J. Williams and  
H. G. Rhodes, scored a triumph  
in scientific experimentation which  
will long be remembered in Hon-  
olulu.

By the last Monowai Mr.  
Williams received a large packing  
case filled with Crooke's tubes.  
They were carefully unpacked and  
laid away in a vaseline and gam-  
boge composition, in one of the  
apartments of Mr. Williams's  
photographic gallery. Yesterday,  
Messrs Williams and Rhodes,  
both of whom have been making  
a study of the properties of the X  
ray and its peculiar attributes, to-  
gether with Charles Weatherwax,  
the skilful manipulator of the  
cameras, set up the apparatus  
which is necessary for the proper  
development of Roentgen photo-  
graphs, and their effort in that  
new and wonderful art were  
crowned with the greatest success  
from the start.

At first a block of polished ma-  
hogany three inches in diameter  
was focused and a three-  
spot of diamonds placed be-  
hind it. The Crooke's tube was  
hung so as to send its rays  
through the wood and a perfect,  
although somewhat dim, photo-  
graph of the card was taken right  
through the solid mahogany. Next  
a huge iron safe, seven feet in di-  
ameter, was selected. This time  
the object to be photographed was  
a small stone idol, which decorates  
one corner of the reception room.  
The result was the same, only that  
more power being used the pic-  
ture, when developed, was much  
clearer than the first one.

"Now," said Mr. Williams, "I  
propose that we take a picture of  
Charlie," meaning Mr. Weather-  
wax.

"I am ready," said Weather-  
wax, taking his stand on a low  
pedestal, so as to get in line with  
the eye of the camera. Mr.  
Rhodes officiated as photographer.  
"A little to the right, please,"  
said he, "and elevate your chin a  
trifle more."

"Now turn on the light," and a  
moment later the dazzling glare  
played in fierce white aureoles  
about the body of the subject.

The sensitized plate was ex-  
posed for forty seconds and, when  
the preliminary washing and acid  
bath had been gone through  
with, the plate was brought  
to the light and a most  
startling disclosure resulted.  
Weatherwax is entirely without  
bones.

In place of the usual 208 pieces  
of hard lime formations usual in  
the human body, this man has  
run entirely to muscle and glu-  
cose. Besides this the organs of  
respiration are entirely misplaced,  
the right lung being on the left  
side and the left lung on the right  
side. There is an enormous de-  
velopment of bronchial tubing,  
more than is ordinarily found in  
a dray horse.

Besides these wonderful pheno-  
mena there are several minor dif-  
ferences between him and other  
people. This discovery seemed  
beyond belief until proven by  
personal examination of the sub-  
ject. For instance, Williams and  
Rhodes, aided by a BULLETIN  
representative grasped. Weather-  
wax firmly by the head and by  
pressing hard it was found to be  
perfectly flexible, like that of an  
India rubber doll, proving that  
there is no skull.

Further particulars will be given  
when Weatherwax gets his head  
straightened out.

## PACIFIC CABLE BILL

HOUSE COMMITTEE FAVORS THE  
NEW YORK COMPANY.

San Francisco to China via Hawaii  
and Japan—Estimate of Cost and  
Schedule of Rates.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—The  
House Committee on Commerce  
today authorized Mr. Bennett of  
New York to make a favorable re-  
port on a substitute for several  
bills, providing for a cable to  
Hawaii, Japan and China.

Under the terms of the bill the  
Postmaster-General, in his dis-  
cretion, may contract with the Pa-  
cific Cable Company of New York  
for the construction of a cable be-  
tween the United States and Ha-  
waii, Japan and China, via the  
Midway Island.

The bill grants the right of way  
over United States lands and pro-  
vides that the line may be con-  
trolled by the President in time of  
war or other extraordinary emer-  
gency. A subsidy of \$100,000 is  
granted. If advantage is taken of  
the measure, the line to the Ha-  
waiian Islands must be completed  
by January 1, 1898, and extended  
to China by the 1st of January,  
1899.

Later Mr. Bennett presented  
the bill to the House, accompa-  
nied by a report. From this report  
it appears that the cost of the ca-  
ble from San Francisco to Japan  
by the route contemplated, togeth-  
er with a repair ship, is estimated  
at \$7,500,000. The subsidy of  
\$100,000 per annum is to be paid  
for eighty years and the com-  
pany is to transmit free of cost for  
all time the official messages of  
the Government, giving them  
right of way. The rate for ordi-  
nary private dispatches is not to  
exceed \$1.25 per word on mes-  
sages between the United States and  
Japan and China, and 35 cents per  
word between the United States  
and Honolulu. Press rates are  
not to exceed one-quarter of these  
charges. The Pacific Cable Com-  
pany is organized with a capital  
of \$10,000,000, proposes to build  
the cable by sales of stock and  
does not propose to issue bonds.

FATHER CONRARDY.

Heroic Resolve to Study Medicine for  
Work in China.

Father L. L. Conrardy, who  
left here lately after laboring for  
many years at the Molokai Lep-  
er Settlement, has written to the  
Hollister Drug Company from  
Canton, China, ordering some  
packages of root beer for a brother  
priest, who was induced to try the  
beverage on the writer's recom-  
mendation. Father Conrardy  
says he found outside of Canton  
several thousand lepers. "They  
live in a most miserable condi-  
tion," he says. "I pity them from  
the bottom of my heart. Poor,  
poor people they are. My heart  
goes out to them. To do them  
good I must qualify myself as a  
physician. For this I will go to  
California and study medicine  
and the Chinese language, and  
then I will go back to Canton. I  
wish I had come to China when I  
first made up my mind to live in  
this country. That is over 40  
years ago, but although now over  
fifty I will fit myself for my posi-  
tion. I will not be tied up here  
as I was on Molokai, where much  
good could be done if free, but  
where much good is not done."

Narrow Escape.

While W. A. Bowen was riding  
into town from the railway station  
on a crowded street car yesterday  
afternoon, standing on the side of  
the car, a basket he carried was  
crushed against a telephone post  
and forced out of his hands. His  
crutches caught on the same ob-  
stacle and were hurled to the  
ground. It was a narrow escape  
from serious injury for himself.  
That particular telephone post has  
been written about years ago as  
dangerous to car passengers.



## LATEST FOREIGN NEWS

STRICKEN ST. LOUIS OVERRUN BY DEVILISH CRIMINALS.

Rob Vengeance Threatens the San Jose Murderer—President Krueger Forgiving to His Enemies.

By the barkentine S. N. Castle one day's later San Francisco papers have been received, from which the following news is culled:

### UNITED STATES.

Early in the morning of the 29th San Francisco was visited by the heaviest thunder storm on record in the summer months. It was accompanied by heavy hail.

William H. Baxter, a pioneer, died on the 29th in Oakland, aged seventy-one years. He was the first man to receive from the Panama steamer the official news of the State's admission into the Union. He rowed out beyond Fort Point to intercept the vessel which brought the tidings. He established the Grangers in California and founded a town in Florida.

### THE SEXTUPLE MURDERER.

A San Jose dispatch of the 29th says: James C. Dunham, the fugitive murderer, has abandoned the horse on which he made his escape. He is believed to be hidden in the thick brush of a canyon three miles from Smith's creek. Sheriff Lyndon says that the murderer cannot elude his pursuers much longer, and several hundred men have been waiting for hours on First and Santa Clara streets in this city determined that if he is captured he shall never reach the jail alive. Dunham is the man who murdered his wife and five others.

### THE VICTORIA DISASTER.

One of the cross beams in the Point Ellice bridge at Victoria was found to have broken across, the break showing it to be so thoroughly rotten that the wonder is it did not give way long ago.

The identification of fifty-five bodies and the reporting as alive of eighty-six others give a total of 141 known to have been passengers on the death car.

Petitions are in circulation asking the Provincial Government to appoint a commission of inquiry immediately.

### THE ST. LOUIS DISASTER.

Professor Willis M. Moore of Washington, Chief of the United States Weather Bureau, who is in St. Louis, said, after viewing the wrecked district:

"The tornado was the result of a moderate cyclonic system central in Western Kansas. The State of Missouri, Wednesday morning, was in the southeastern quadrant of the cyclone, therefore in the most dangerous part of the storm area. The popular term used by the press is cyclone. The term is erroneous, as the term cyclone technically refers to a gyrating mass of air probably one thousand miles in diameter and which is often harmless so far as the destruction of life and property is concerned, unless it is on the seaboard or at lake ports. The tornado is a mass of air rapidly rotating about a vertical or nearly vertical axis, the diameter of rotation varying from five hundred yards to two miles, and the velocity of rotation is so terrific that human ingenuity has never devised means for measuring it. The most powerful structures that man is able to devise crumble when in the grasp of this powerful giant of nature."

Professor Moore describes the results of the storm that struck St. Louis, and says this season has been unusually prolific in the production of tornadoes.

The city officials are making no effort to recover the bodies, hundreds of which are still buried in the ruins. Three children were found unharmed under the ruins of a house. Nearly 30 per cent. of the entire population of East St. Louis are either dead, missing or injured.

## BETTER CABLE PROSPECTS.

In the last days of Congress a bill offering the contract for a Pacific cable to the New York company is reported favorably to the House of Representatives. It is earnestly to be hoped that the bill will pass at the present session and receive President Cleveland's sign manual. The favored company will have to buy Mr. Spalding's right to land on these islands, owing to the impetuous action of the Hawaiian Legislature at its special session last year. This may or may not prove a serious impediment, involving danger from loss of time to the American franchise, but it at least illustrates the unwisdom of our Legislature's granting a personal instead of an open franchise. If, however, any danger of delay from this cause prove to be real, it will be the duty of President Dole to call a special session for the sole purpose of revoking the Spalding franchise and transferring the landing privilege to the company holding the American franchise. This country cannot afford to permit the dickerings of any individual for terms in his own private interest to interfere with the opportunity of obtaining the long-desired boon of telegraphic communication with the outside world. At the same time, if special legislation here should under the circumstances mentioned become necessary, it would give this Government the opportunity of getting off lighter in the matter of annual subsidy than the engagement in the Spalding franchise. Forty thousand dollars a year from this country is away out of proportion to one hundred thousand dollars from the United States. All that the British Government is asked for, as encouragement to the projected British cable, is a guarantee of interest on the outlay, and, according to a lately published expert estimate, no demand for any payment even on that score is ever likely to be required. In view of the fact that a conference to expedite the British cable is just about this moment sitting in London, with greatly increased prospects of a practical outcome over those existing at the close of the recent Ottawa conference, the situation so far as Hawaii is regarded may be described as terribly critical. For, if the British cable should have a certainty of coming in first

for round-the-world business, it is doubtful if American capital would be forthcoming for a rival line, under the now pending franchise, until that business had increased sufficiently to remove all hazard from the over-doing of the business by a competing cable. A British cable alone would leave Hawaii still out in the cold, for there is no talk of even a branch from Fanning Island to Hawaii in the calculations of its promoters.

## LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

Continued from 1st Page.

and detailing the proceedings of the morning.

The Senate bill concerning naturalization of aliens was taken up on second reading, passed, and was made the special order for tomorrow.

Senate Bill 58, appropriating \$1300 for additional expenses of the Legislature, passed first and second reading.

A motion to put the bill through a third reading was defeated and the bill was put on the order for tomorrow.

Rep. Robertson moved that the Judiciary Committee be instructed to bring in a bill repealing the Registration Bill. In support of his motion he said the Executive favored the elimination of the thumb mark, but that was not going far enough. He thought the Legislature was right in passing the bill, but it had turned out that those who were at first in favor of it and for whose benefit it was passed were now opposed to it. It was only by the intelligent cooperation of the masses that the bill would be a success. What ever may have been the feeling at the beginning of the session it was evident now that the great majority of the people did not want it. From present appearances it was evident that by the 1st of August fully one-half the people would not register. It would be useless to try to enforce the law with such a powerful opposition and the effort to do so would lead to arrests by the hundred which could not be thought of. It was better to wipe the law off the statute book at once.

Rep. Richards thought the opposition to the bill came from a lot of agitators and politicians, who were opposing the law to serve their own ends. He did not believe in enforcing unpopular laws, but he had yet to learn that the Act was really unpopular. He believed that time would show the measure to be wise, and for that reason he would oppose any move to repeal it. The objectionable feature of the bill was the thumb mark, and the Minister of the Interior could strike that out if he desired.

Rep. Ryeroff supported the views of Mr. Robertson. The bill was not a new one, it was up in 1892 when the Mechanics' Union had the bill introduced and tried to secure its passage. They were in favor of it then, but the same people are now opposed to it. The plantations had no use for the bill as far as he could learn, and they did not care about it either way. As the very people for whose benefit the Act was passed were now foremost in opposing it, he would vote for its repeal, or at least to strike out that portion of the bill relating to tourists and thumb marks.

Under suspension of the rules Minister Cooper presented a message of the President vetoing House Bill 26, relating to the recording of decrees of courts in the Registrar's office, on the ground that the terms of the Act are too indefinite, that no time is set for the compliance with the terms of the Act, and no provision made for the expense thereof. On motion the veto was made the special order of the day for tomorrow.

Recess to 1:30 p. m.

There was a good-sized audience at the circus last night and the show went off first-rate. Rowley, Scott and Miss Martin all sang new songs and Leonardo had some new items, especially in his trapeze act. There will be a very heavy bill put on tomorrow night including many changes.

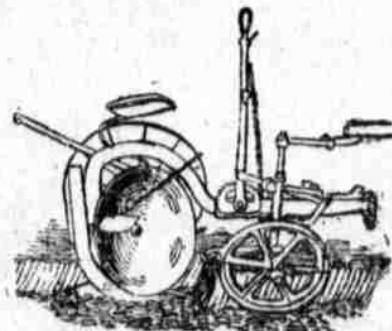

## SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNICS.

Many Hundreds of Children Have a Day's Pleasure.

Oahu College campus at Punahou was as usual the scene of the annual picnic of the Sunday school of Central Union church on the eleventh. On this occasion the Sunday school of the Methodist church joined that of the Congregationalists. There was a grand turnout of children and parents, teachers and friends, the assembly totalling about 800 people. The day was joyously spent in games and athletic sports, with a great feast of good things to eat and drink in the middle. F. J. Lowrey, A. B. Wood, H. F. Wichman, E. A. Jones and John Waterhouse were the chief executive officers, being unstintingly assisted in the work by many of the young men and women. Street cars and omnibuses got big business out of this picnic.

Rev. T. D. Garvin selected Pearl City as the place for the Christian church Sunday school picnic. B. F. Dillingham engaged to furnish satisfactory accommodation in the cars of the Oahu Railway & Land Company, at the extremely low fare of twenty-five cents for the round trip, besides obtaining the grounds of Mrs. J. N. Robinson on the shore of Pearl harbor and furnishing lumber for the tables. Not only these favors did the generous railway superintendent tender, but he personally contributed the fares of fifteen out of the forty children attending the Smith-street mission school of the church.

Five of the largest cars were required to carry this party. An enormous quantity of refreshments in baskets and boxes, together with dozens of folding chairs, was carried from the Peninsula station to the grounds by the men and boys. Immediately on arrival the men began putting up swings and hammocks for the youngsters, and several of the women set to work cutting up roast duck and material for sandwiches. It took two hours of hard work to prepare the feast, and then the children were seated in groups on the grass. Amidst perfect stillness Pastor Garvin said grace and then the children were served first, with the best that was going. So well were the arrangements made, there was not the slightest confusion, and none of the little ones were missed. It was pleasure enough to the grown people to see the children's supreme enjoyment.

What with swings and beanbag throwing, sky ball and gathering shells, chasing and racing, the children had a grand day. Prizes of real value were given the winners of foot races, for girls as well as boys, including a race for "boys" over forty years of age which was hotly contested. When the time approached for taking the train for town, ice cream and cake were served. Lemonade was ladled out all day and yet it was to spare at the end. Before leaving the grounds several familiar hymns were sung. Three rousing cheers were given for Mr. Dillingham as a vote of thanks, followed by an enthusiastic cheer for Mr. Garvin. Mr. and Mrs. Dillingham and their daughter, Mrs. Frear, were present at the conclusion of the picnic.

Three cars were occupied on the same train by the Portuguese church and Sunday school for a picnic excursion to Remond Grove. Rev. A. V. Forbes, pastor, and A. Frank Cooke, superintendent, were in charge of the party, which had a very happy day. Adjutant Egner had the Salvation Army, with a band of children, out for a picnic on Mr. Dillingham's beach premises at the Peninsula, adjoining the grounds where the Christian church folks had their outing. They marched with banners and music to the Honolulu station, and space was reserved for them on the train.

Although there was a large number of passengers outside of the picnic parties, the train was not unduly crowded either going or returning. Through good management all had seating accommodation.

## BOARD OF HEALTH.

Proceedings at the Meeting on Wednesday Afternoon.

Four members and the secretary and agent were present at the meeting of the Board held on Wednesday afternoon.

Dr. Monsarrat and Fish Inspector Kelipio made the regular weekly reports which were filed.

The question of raising taro at the settlement was finally referred to Superintendent Meyers.

In the matter of medical examination of the public school children, the Board decided to require all school teachers to have the prescribed examination completed at the end of two weeks after the opening of the schools.

A discussion was had on the odorless excavators and the vile smells caused by them in the neighborhood of the Pacific Mail wharf but no action was taken towards abating the nuisance.

The application of a Japanese for permission to open a drug-store was brought up and the applicant examined. As it appeared that he intended to go into the business of dispensing physicians, prescriptions without any knowledge of the English or Latin languages the matter was deferred for further consideration.

The Board then went into executive session, without which it seems impossible to do the regular business.

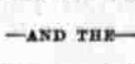
