A Gubernatorial Message.

Governor Dole on Saturday sent the following message to the Senate: To the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii:

Upon the approval of "An Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii," I requested Judge Walter F. Frear, of the Supreme Court, to prepare a revision of the Hawaiian laws as affected by such Act.

My reasons for doing so were as follows:

Judge Frear had been a member of the commission to recommend to Congress legislation concerning the Hawaiian Islands.

He had also prepared the text for publication printed by the Federal Government, entitled the Laws of Hawaii, which comprised the Civil Laws, Penal Laws and the Session Laws of 1898, modified in conformity with the recommendation of the Hawaiian commission.

The Organic Act as finally adopted, departed in many instances from the original draft as reported by the commission, and the publication referred to became thereby a defective statement of Hawaiian laws.

The familiarity with the subject which Judge Frear thus acquired gave him special qualifications for the work of putting the Hawaiian laws in a revised form for permanent use. Much time might be saved by such early revision.

The item of \$8,000 in the estimates for compiling and publishing revised laws, was intended to cover \$2,000 for the work of compiling and revising, about \$500 for translating into Hawaiian, \$5,000 for publishing in both languages, and \$500 for incidentals, including reading and preparation of an index and table of contents.

The cost of publishing the Civil and Penal Laws was, I understand, \$10,500. The English version of this work is now practically exhausted.

I recommend that the Legislature take measures to acquire Judge Frear's revision, which is now substantially complete, and enact the same at the present session as a Hawaiian Code, and provide for the publication thereof.

Mr. Franklin Austin is suddenly gaining some cheap notoriety as a temperance apostle (Mephisto must be laughing) and he appears in print and on the stage of the Orpheum as the advocate of the Dispensary bill, a measure which will increase intemperance among the Hawaiian to an alarming extent. When Mr. Austin used to go into saloons, and it wasn't infrequently that he "saw the slate" (by the way he ought to wipe off those small amounts), he went there for the sake of sociability and to talk the other fellows or the barkeeper to death or to a drink. Now he has joined hands with another "Nick" and he and Nick Russell or whatever the name of the medical politicians are holding forth in public as temperance lecturers. Whatever Franklin Austin says or does is of small account, however, but we object to the remarks of Dr. Russell when he is reported as follows:

"Senator Russell addressed the meeting, advocating the dispensary bill as a measure conducive to public health and morals. He didn't believe any one could be against such a reform unless influenced by self-interest. 'If you hear a man talking against the bill,' said the Senator, 'he either stupidly considers his own private interest before the public good, or is ignorant. Usually, he has shares in the liquor trust.'"

A bill which will furnish the people at large with cheaper liquor than is now obtainable and with plenty of it, is not a good bill and we neither think those opposed to it are stupid, considers his own interests or has shares in the liquor trust. As far as ignorance is concerned it is only shown by Dr. Russell, who has no practical knowledge of the Hawaiians.

No More Hanging.

The Senate yesterday passed the following bill at third reading.

"An Act to abolish capital punishment within the Territory of Hawaii, and to substitute in lieu thereof imprisonment for life.

"Section 1. That capital punishment within the limits of the Territory of Hawaii is hereby abolished.

"Section 2. That wherever capital punishment is provided in the Penal Laws or elsewhere in the laws of the Territory of Hawaii, such provision is hereby repealed, and imprisonment for life, with or without hard labor, at the discretion of the court, is hereby substituted instead of capital punishment."

SHALL WE TOLERATE THE CHURCHES?

A Reply to "Shall the Citizens of Hawaii Tolerate Iwilei?"

"Satan finds some mischief still for idle hands to do."

Principally the Churches.

Some one has published a discourse by the Reverend Abraham E. Cory, a pamphlet that should never have been published at all.

The subject is one that is proper for men to discuss, but not for women and children to read, particularly children.

As it stands today undoubtedly careless persons have left copies of this vicious publication around where it has fallen into tender hands, with its definition of certain words and descriptions of immoral life, opened the floodgates of knowledge to the innocent and pure.

Rev. Abraham E. Cory evidently had his misgivings as to the course he was pursuing when he delivered his lecture, for he says: "I have considered the propriety of discussing such questions in the presence of mixed audience, etc., etc." Then he said he decided it was "but a sacred duty." Consider the amazing impudence, the blasphemy. "Sacred duty!" What could the listeners have been thinking of to have permitted his continuance of the subject until the women and children had been dismissed?

As to the value of the pamphlet, it contains facts, misstatements and hypothetical deductions, but the glaring fact remains while probably it will fall of its purpose. The closing of Iwilei yet will remain as a sample of splendid (?) Christian literature for our women and children to digest.

Why We Should Not Tolerate Churches.

First, for giving asses the "moral right" to bring to the attention of our young subjects of which we (parents) are striving to keep them in happy ignorance of.

Yes, until such time as they are mature enough to decide on the right and wrong of social evils, a right that no human, be he a divine, has "moral right" to determine for us.

Second, The church confesses here and the world over its inability, to, by its teachings and example, overcome vice.

Whenever it meets vice it appeals to the law.

Poor Church! Alas! you sit around idly, yet levying tribute from the world under the pretense of doing good.

When there are a few souls to be saved, the combating of vice by Christian methods, you shirk your duty and call upon the law.

If the millions collected yearly by the churches were only given to the civil authorities for distribution what noble work could be accomplished.

What is needed is a sensible distribution of the countless amounts of money collected. The civil authorities wouldn't, with such means at hand, be crying for help to the churches for the suppression of vice, either. Confiscate the churches and use them for the public good.

Ostensibly the church exists and is supported because its mission in life is to seek and to save, and it ought to be content to do so, instead of howling for the civil arm to come to its help and do its (the church's) work.

Instead of killing the heathen abroad why not kill the wicked at home who do not agree with you? Besides, we feel more like patronizing home industry.

Past usefulness will not atone for present (admitted) deficiency. Neither will you be permitted by pamphlet or word of mouth to assume the "Moral Right" to defy common decency, without protest from the ungodly. There are a thousand ways to get at Iwilei problem. One is offered you; more can be if you desire them.

Would authorities grant the building of a Chapel there? Then we could see a few Christians laboring there in the right spirit. The church is supposed to meet and grapple with vice, not flee from it and yell for help.

In Conclusion.

There is only one excuse for the address of the Rev. Abraham E. Cory under the circumstance, viz: its delivery before a mixed audience.

The gentleman must be "crippled under the hat."

The same applies to those responsible for that nasty, filthy publication, "Shall the Citizens of Hawaii Tolerate Iwilei?" "Satan finds some mischief still for idle hands to do." It is really edifying to note the "suckers" he ensnares in his employ.

Meat hast thou, our Caesar, fed,

That the poor, benighted heathen

Thy name should fear and dread?

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

The band will play at Thomas Square this evening.

George T. Kluegel, assistant manager of the Club Stables, has also resigned, and is now acting as salesman for Schuman and Company.

R. H. Bamrose of the customs inspectors has been promoted to a captaincy, taking the place made vacant by the recent resignation of C. De Cuo.

It is reported that the Hawaiian Band has been notified by the powers that be that its services will be dispensed with at the end of the month.

Mr. Seaborn Luce has received the sad news of the death of his sister in England, Mrs. Alice Clapp. There are numerous kamaainas who remember the deceased as Alice Luce, a favorite in social circles.

Governor Dole yesterday officially ceded to the United States Government, in the name of the Territory of Hawaii, all buildings and premises occupied by the customs department at the port of Honolulu, Oahu, and Kahului, Maui.

G. S. McKenzie, the manager of the Volcano Stables at Hilo, will return to Hawaii by the Kinau after a brief visit to Honolulu. He says he will be here on June 11 and give the sports of the race track a surprise.

The Shriners owned the Opera House last evening and heartily appreciated the last performance for this season of the Belasco-Thall Company which rendered "Nell Gwynne" as the farewell performance to Honolulu.

Charles Bellina has resigned his position as manager of the Club Stables. Mr. Bellina will shortly start up in the carriage business on his own account, and will run his establishment in conjunction with that of W. W. Wright and Son's new place, on King street.

The Gospel Temperance League held a meeting at the Orpheum last evening. Mr. Franklin Austin assisted by Dr. Russell, Moses Nakunina and old Kanui of the plug-hat brigade were eloquent in the cause of temperance and the dispensary bill. The meeting was naturally not attended by any citizen of consequence.

The supply of kerosene and gasoline in Honolulu is rapidly becoming depleted and prices are advancing in proportion. The reason of the shortage is that vessels are meeting with such a demand that they do not deem it worth the risk to take inflammable stuff.

The reception and dance of the ladies of the Imperial Pilgrimage will take place this evening at the Moana Hotel. Invitations have been sent out to a large number of the townsfolk, as well as to the ladies of Aloha Temple, in whose honor the affair is given, and an enjoyable evening is anticipated.

A meeting of the Oahu Polo Club will be held tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Bishop & Co. tea rooms, on Bethel street. Arrangements will be perfected for the inter-club tournament which will take place before the match game with the Maui Polo Club. This game will be played in the latter part of April.

Many people will leave by the Mariposa tomorrow for the Mainland. Among those of the kamaainas who are about to depart are Mrs. S. T. Alexander and daughter, Mrs. John Waterhouse, who are returning to Oakland; T. M. Starkey, Mark Robinson, B. F. Dillingham and C. A. Brown and wife, who go to Boston. The members of the Belasco-Thall Dramatic Company, after a successful engagement here closing with last night's production of "Nell Gwynne," leave Honolulu.

An Important Resolution.

The following resolution was introduced by Senator White yesterday and carried:

Concurrent resolution providing for a joint session of the Senate and the House of Representatives for the purpose of electing and apportioning eight Senators from among the members of the Senate for the term and period of four years.

"Be it resolved by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, the House of Representatives concurring, that on the 30th day of March, A. D. 1901, the members of the Senate and the members of the House of Representatives do convene in joint session in the chamber of the House of Representatives at the hour of eleven of the clock in the forenoon of said day, with the president of the Senate presiding over such joint session, and the clerk of the House of Representatives and the secretary of the Senate acting as clerks of said joint session, and that the Senate and the House of Representatives in joint session aforesaid, shall directly upon being called to order by the presiding officer aforesaid of said joint session, proceed to nominate and elect two members of the Senate from the First Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the period and term of four years; two members of the Senate from the Second Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the term and period of four years; three members of the Senate from the Third Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the period and term of four years; one member of the Senate from the Fourth Senatorial District, who shall hold his office as Senator for the term and period of four years. The nominations of all such Senators shall be viva voce, and the vote thereon shall be viva voce by aye and nay on the roll call of the Senate by the secretary thereof, and House of Representatives by the clerk thereof, respectively. The said joint session may adjourn from time to time, and for such length of time as may be necessary until the election of the several Senators aforesaid is completed. The Senators who receive a majority of all of the votes of the joint session, a majority of all the members elected to both houses being present, shall be duly elected; provided, that the vote shall be taken so as to elect one Senator at the time, and

"Be it further resolved, by the Senate aforesaid, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Senators so elected as provided in the preceding resolution, be respectfully declared, assigned and apportioned to the Senatorial term of four years, in conformity with section thirty of an Act of the Fifty-sixth Congress of the United States, approved on the 30th day of April, 1900, and entitled, 'An Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii,' and that the eight Senators elected, as above provided, shall severally be furnished with a certificate of apportionment signed by the presiding officer and the clerks of said joint session aforesaid, which certificate shall entitle said Senators to hold their respective offices for the term of four years; and

"Be it further resolved by the Senate aforesaid, the House of Representatives concurring, that a copy of these resolutions and the proceedings of the Senate aforesaid, and House of Representatives aforesaid, in joint session as provided in the foregoing resolution, be entered at large upon the journal of the Senate, and the journal of the House of Representatives, respectively.

A Gubernatorial Message.

Governor Dole on Saturday sent the following message to the Senate: To the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii:

Upon the approval of "An Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii," I requested Judge Walter F. Frear, of the Supreme Court, to prepare a revision of the Hawaiian laws as affected by such Act.

My reasons for doing so were as follows:

Judge Frear had been a member of the commission to recommend to Congress legislation concerning the Hawaiian Islands.

He had also prepared the text for publication printed by the Federal Government, entitled the Laws of Hawaii, which comprised the Civil Laws, Penal Laws and the Session Laws of 1898, modified in conformity with the recommendation of the Hawaiian commission.

The Organic Act as finally adopted, departed in many instances from the original draft as reported by the commission, and the publication referred to became thereby a defective statement of Hawaiian laws.

The familiarity with the subject which Judge Frear thus acquired gave him special qualifications for the work of putting the Hawaiian laws in a revised form for permanent use. Much time might be saved by such early revision.

The item of \$8,000 in the estimates for compiling and publishing revised laws, was intended to cover \$2,000 for the work of compiling and revising, about \$500 for translating into Hawaiian, \$5,000 for publishing in both languages, and \$500 for incidentals, including reading and preparation of an index and table of contents.

The cost of publishing the Civil and Penal Laws was, I understand, \$10,500. The English version of this work is now practically exhausted.

I recommend that the Legislature take measures to acquire Judge Frear's revision, which is now substantially complete, and enact the same at the present session as a Hawaiian Code, and provide for the publication thereof.

Mr. Franklin Austin is suddenly gaining some cheap notoriety as a temperance apostle (Mephisto must be laughing) and he appears in print and on the stage of the Orpheum as the advocate of the Dispensary bill, a measure which will increase intemperance among the Hawaiian to an alarming extent. When Mr. Austin used to go into saloons, and it wasn't infrequently that he "saw the slate" (by the way he ought to wipe off those small amounts), he went there for the sake of sociability and to talk the other fellows or the barkeeper to death or to a drink. Now he has joined hands with another "Nick" and he and Nick Russell or whatever the name of the medical politicians are holding forth in public as temperance lecturers. Whatever Franklin Austin says or does is of small account, however, but we object to the remarks of Dr. Russell when he is reported as follows:

"Senator Russell addressed the meeting, advocating the dispensary bill as a measure conducive to public health and morals. He didn't believe any one could be against such a reform unless influenced by self-interest. 'If you hear a man talking against the bill,' said the Senator, 'he either stupidly considers his own private interest before the public good, or is ignorant. Usually, he has shares in the liquor trust.'"

A bill which will furnish the people at large with cheaper liquor than is now obtainable and with plenty of it, is not a good bill and we neither think those opposed to it are stupid, considers his own interests or has shares in the liquor trust. As far as ignorance is concerned it is only shown by Dr. Russell, who has no practical knowledge of the Hawaiians.

No More Hanging.

The Senate yesterday passed the following bill at third reading.

"An Act to abolish capital punishment within the Territory of Hawaii, and to substitute in lieu thereof imprisonment for life.

"Section 1. That capital punishment within the limits of the Territory of Hawaii is hereby abolished.

"Section 2. That wherever capital punishment is provided in the Penal Laws or elsewhere in the laws of the Territory of Hawaii, such provision is hereby repealed, and imprisonment for life, with or without hard labor, at the discretion of the court, is hereby substituted instead of capital punishment."

A Common Illness.

Son—"Well, mamma, I think I'm too sick to go to school, but I don't think I'll be sick enough to be put to bed till about bed-time."

SHALL WE TOLERATE THE CHURCHES?

A Reply to "Shall the Citizens of Hawaii Tolerate Iwilei?"

"Satan finds some mischief still for idle hands to do."

Principally the Churches.

Some one has published a discourse by the Reverend Abraham E. Cory, a pamphlet that should never have been published at all.

The subject is one that is proper for men to discuss, but not for women and children to read, particularly children.

As it stands today undoubtedly careless persons have left copies of this vicious publication around where it has fallen into tender hands, with its definition of certain words and descriptions of immoral life, opened the floodgates of knowledge to the innocent and pure.

Rev. Abraham E. Cory evidently had his misgivings as to the course he was pursuing when he delivered his lecture, for he says: "I have considered the propriety of discussing such questions in the presence of mixed audience, etc., etc." Then he said he decided it was "but a sacred duty." Consider the amazing impudence, the blasphemy. "Sacred duty!" What could the listeners have been thinking of to have permitted his continuance of the subject until the women and children had been dismissed?

As to the value of the pamphlet, it contains facts, misstatements and hypothetical deductions, but the glaring fact remains while probably it will fall of its purpose. The closing of Iwilei yet will remain as a sample of splendid (?) Christian literature for our women and children to digest.

Why We Should Not Tolerate Churches.

First, for giving asses the "moral right" to bring to the attention of our young subjects of which we (parents) are striving to keep them in happy ignorance of.

Yes, until such time as they are mature enough to decide on the right and wrong of social evils, a right that no human, be he a divine, has "moral right" to determine for us.

Second, The church confesses here and the world over its inability, to, by its teachings and example, overcome vice.

Whenever it meets vice it appeals to the law.

Poor Church! Alas! you sit around idly, yet levying tribute from the world under the pretense of doing good.

When there are a few souls to be saved, the combating of vice by Christian methods, you shirk your duty and call upon the law.

If the millions collected yearly by the churches were only given to the civil authorities for distribution what noble work could be accomplished.

What is needed is a sensible distribution of the countless amounts of money collected. The civil authorities wouldn't, with such means at hand, be crying for help to the churches for the suppression of vice, either. Confiscate the churches and use them for the public good.

Ostensibly the church exists and is supported because its mission in life is to seek and to save, and it ought to be content to do so, instead of howling for the civil arm to come to its help and do its (the church's) work.

Instead of killing the heathen abroad why not kill the wicked at home who do not agree with you? Besides, we feel more like patronizing home industry.

Past usefulness will not atone for present (admitted) deficiency. Neither will you be permitted by pamphlet or word of mouth to assume the "Moral Right" to defy common decency, without protest from the ungodly. There are a thousand ways to get at Iwilei problem. One is offered you; more can be if you desire them.

Would authorities grant the building of a Chapel there? Then we could see a few Christians laboring there in the right spirit. The church is supposed to meet and grapple with vice, not flee from it and yell for help.

In Conclusion.

There is only one excuse for the address of the Rev. Abraham E. Cory under the circumstance, viz: its delivery before a mixed audience.

The gentleman must be "crippled under the hat."

The same applies to those responsible for that nasty, filthy publication, "Shall the Citizens of Hawaii Tolerate Iwilei?" "Satan finds some mischief still for idle hands to do." It is really edifying to note the "suckers" he ensnares in his employ.

Oh, Cory! Brother Cory, on what meat hast thou, our Caesar, fed, That the poor, benighted heathen Thy name should fear and dread? Could'st thou have searched the Scriptures

And found that He above Would not that we fear His wrath, But teach that God is Love?

Oh, Cory! Brother Cory, A purpose you have served, And served it mighty well; Our laws and not our ministers Must save us all from hell.

It is reported that the Hawaiian Band has been notified by the powers that be that its services will be dispensed with at the end of the month.

Governor Dole yesterday officially ceded to the United States Government, in the name of the Territory of Hawaii, all buildings and premises occupied by the customs department at the port of Honolulu, Oahu, and Kahului, Maui.

The Gospel Temperance League held a meeting at the Orpheum last evening. The members of the Belasco-Thall Dramatic Company, after a successful engagement here closing with last night's production of "Nell Gwynne," leave Honolulu.

An Important Resolution.

The following resolution was introduced by Senator White yesterday and carried:

Concurrent resolution providing for a joint session of the Senate and the House of Representatives for the purpose of electing and apportioning eight Senators from among the members of the Senate for the term and period of four years.

"Be it resolved by the Senate of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, the House of Representatives concurring, that on the 30th day of March, A. D. 1901, the members of the Senate and the members of the House of Representatives do convene in joint session in the chamber of the House of Representatives at the hour of eleven of the clock in the forenoon of said day, with the president of the Senate presiding over such joint session, and the clerk of the House of Representatives and the secretary of the Senate acting as clerks of said joint session, and that the Senate and the House of Representatives in joint session aforesaid, shall directly upon being called to order by the presiding officer aforesaid of said joint session, proceed to nominate and elect two members of the Senate from the First Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the period and term of four years; two members of the Senate from the Second Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the term and period of four years; three members of the Senate from the Third Senatorial District, who shall hold their respective offices as Senators for the period and term of four years; one member of the Senate from the Fourth Senatorial District, who shall hold his office as Senator for the term and period of four years. The nominations of all such Senators shall be viva voce, and the vote thereon shall be viva voce by aye and nay on the roll call of the Senate by the secretary thereof, and House of Representatives by the clerk thereof, respectively. The said joint session may adjourn from time to time, and for such length of time as may be necessary until the election of the several Senators aforesaid is completed. The Senators who receive a majority of all of the votes of the joint session, a majority of all the members elected to both houses being present, shall be duly elected; provided, that the vote shall be taken so as to elect one Senator at the time, and

"Be it further resolved, by the Senate aforesaid, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Senators so elected as provided in the preceding resolution, be respectfully declared, assigned and apportioned to the Senatorial term of four years, in conformity with section thirty of an Act of the Fifty-sixth Congress of the United States, approved on the 30th day of April, 1900, and entitled, 'An Act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii,' and that the eight Senators elected, as above provided, shall severally be furnished with a certificate of apportionment signed by the presiding officer and the clerks of said joint session aforesaid, which certificate shall entitle said Senators to hold their respective offices for the term of four years; and

"Be it further resolved by the Senate aforesaid, the House of Representatives concurring, that a copy of these resolutions and the proceedings of the Senate aforesaid, and House of Representatives aforesaid, in joint session as provided in the foregoing resolution, be entered at large upon the journal of the Senate, and the journal of the House of Representatives, respectively.
