BY AUTHORITY.



The attention of all persons holding office under the Government is hereby called to Section 102 of the Election Law of 1888, which reads as follows:

SECTION 102. Any person holding any position of trust or profit under the Government who shall, either personally or through another, for pay or without pay, act as a runner, committeeman, clerk, secretary, or in any other capacity, for the purpose of procuring or assisting in the election of any person, except as a voter, and in casting his vote, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment at hard labor for any term not exceeding six months, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court. Besides the said punishment, the office of such person shall be at once vacated, and such person shall be disqualified for three years from holding any office under the Government, and from voting at any election, and from sitting in the Legislature. The provisions of this Section shall not, however, be construed to apply to Cabinet Ministers so as to preclude them from publicly or privately making oral or written statements of the policy of the Administration, or advocating the same.

## Daily Bulletin

Pledged to neither Sect nor Party,  
But established for the benefit of all.  
THURSDAY, DEC. 26, 1889.

A Washington dispatch of Dec. 9 reports the receipt at the State Department, from Consul-General Severance at Honolulu, of the resolutions of the mass meeting here in favor of Chinese restriction, also the reply of the Cabinet to the citizens who presented the resolutions.

A correspondent, writing of the political situation on Maui, makes a serious charge against the Minister of the Interior, to the effect that he is instigating breaches of the election law regarding officials participating in the present campaign. That Minister to-day, however, advertises the strict provision of the law on the point in question, after which the Ministry can scarcely have the hardihood to either connive at violations or collude with violators of the law, either before or after the fact.

Noisy fireworks are supposed to be appropriate solely to patriotic or political demonstrations. They have become common to all holidays in Honolulu and are a nuisance to be rigorously suppressed. Besides their disturbance of the quiet of night and the risk of creating fire, they render pleasure driving in daytime a matter of no small peril in searing horses. The letter elsewhere is what it purports to be, a complaint from a patient at the Queen's Hospital, of the nerve-racking nuisance the evil is to the sick. It is to be hoped that the authorities will prevent all occasion for similar complaints in the future.

**"THE GAUL AT OUR GATES."**

**EDITOR BULLETIN:**—The Cabinet, in reply to a demand from Hilo for a statement of their policy, have published a platform of generalities which no doubt are all very well as matter to be brought before the Legislature. I do not propose to question the wisdom of the Cabinet in thus coming before the public, but it does seem that as the Cabinet represent the executive part of the Government and not the legislative, that their province would be to execute the laws passed by the people through their representatives in the Legislature; but since they have done so in reply to a demand from Hilo, I would ask them to be more explicit on the subject of the proposed treaty with the United States. The public are well acquainted with the underhanded attempt of Mr. H. A. P. Carter, the Hawaiian Minister at Washington, to foist a treaty on this country which may have been satisfactory to a certain class, and behind the provisions of which this same class would be secure in their rule and control of the country, but to the Hawaiian and those who are anxious to maintain the independence and autonomy of the country, all such intrigue is distasteful and is the fruitful cause of most of the political trouble that has so long agitated this community. What assurance have the people, that Mr. Carter did not carry away with him this very same treaty, which caused such a burst of indignation from all well wishers of Hawaiian independence, with full power to negotiate the same if possible at Washington. No denunciation has ever been made by either the Cabinet or Mr. Carter, of the charges that were then made against them regarding the proposed treaty. The Cabinet should explain their connection with this matter, and prove to the people that they have no intention of taking advantage of a weak spot in the Constitution, which empowers them through the sovereign to make treaties without the knowledge of the people, but live up to the principles of those who overthrew absolutism, and placed them at the helm of the country to administer the affairs of state in the interests of the people. The public want something more definite than a mere allusion to "increased relations with the United States." What does it mean? Possibly nothing more or less than that the Cabinet propose placing before the representatives of the people a plan for cementing closer commercial relations with the United States, to which no reasonable objections can be made, but the ugly fact remains that an attempt was made whereby the independence of the country was practically ceded away, and how far the Cabinet were implicated in the scheme has never yet transpired. The independence of Hawaii should be, and is held dear to all those who have a right to demand it, and its sacrifice to the interests of sugar dividends must be carefully guarded against. Every voter and well-wisher of Hawaii should insist on this being made clear, and remember that the independence of their country depends on the judicious exercise of their voting privilege, for the "Gaul is at our Gates."

**TAX APPEAL DECISION IN HILO.**

The Hilo Record gives an account of the deliberations of the tax appeal board at that place. The appeal of the Hilo Sugar Co. was made a test case, and it took a day and a half to hear all the evidence. A decision was given on Thursday, the 12th inst., as follows: "Cane lands average value \$20 per acre. All the plantations had to abide by that decision. Value of crop canes \$25 per ton on estimated yield. Ripe canes uncut \$30 per ton on the estimated yield. Leasehold interests of the Waialea Mill Co. and Laupahoehoe Sugar Co. were re-

duced to the returns." The Record adds: "The assessor and planters feel satisfied with the decisions of the Board. But if this weather keeps up the value of cane lands ought to be reduced instead of enhanced. The planters are silently and sadly watching their lands go out to sea, accompanied with all the fertilizers put on the lands."
