THE INSANE ASYLUM.

Quarterly Report of the Superintendent-Interesting Facts and Observations.

HONOLULU, Oct. 9, 1888. His Excellency Hon. Jona. Austin, Minister of Interior ad interim.

SIR:-I have the honor to submit to Your Excellency my report of the Insane Asylum for the quarter ending

Sept. 30, 1888: As per last report, there were in the Asylum on June 30, 1888, sixty-nine patients (69), out on furlough five (5) mak-

Whole number of males 60; females 9. Total 69. During the past quarter we have entirely remodelled the old building formerly called the noisy ward. It was an old barn-like building, filled closely with solitary cells, in which the patients were locked at about 5 p. m. each day, and

not allowed the liberty of the prison yard till about 5 a. m. of the following day. These cells have all been removed and one large open hall constructed, with spacious glazed windows and doors. No bars or gratings of any description have been retained. The walls and ceiling are papered and calcimined. A hand-some wainscot of light and dark woods has been added, giving the hall a very light, neat and handsome appearance. Externally the building has been thor-

oughly repaired and painted. It is now an ornament to the place.
Under the superintendence of Mr. William Auld, the whole of this work has been done by our own Hawaiian carpenters assisted by the keepers. The latter have, some of them, acquired quite

a knack at carpentry.

I should add that we have hired one painter who with the assistance of a patient-an expert painter-and some of the keepers, has done all the painting. We are rather proud of these improve-ments, and should be glad if those who were familiar with the old style would

favor us with an inspection of the new. This remodelled ward contains twentyeight beds-neat and comfortable-and, now, instead of being called the "noisy," it should be designated as the "quiet" ward! The patients are much more quiet and orderly than before. They evidently take pride in their improved quarters and fully appreciate the absence of restraint and the emblents of prison

We have built a fence of pickets from the office to the mauka gate. From thence on the ledge to the rear of the mauka building, a handsome and substantial stone wall has been constructed. This work has been done principally by prison labor. The patients and keeper assisted in building the picket fence.

We have made a beginning of grading the lawn and setting out of trees and shrubs. In the centre of the lawn a fountain of stone and concret has been built. The fountain head for this is a donation from Messrs. Lewers and Cooke. It represents in iron and copper a large double cluster of calla lilies. It is a most elegant and costly ornament; pro-bably the handsomest fountain head in the kingdom. Messrs. Lewers & Cooke are entitled to the thanks of the institution and all interested in it. This beautiful fountain will be a source of pleasure and improved mental health to many poor victims of the saddest of all diseases.

Additional radical improvements are about being made in the institution and its movements. We hope to be able greatly to improve the general appearance of the grounds during the present quarter. Our progress is necessarily slow, because we are doing the work so much within our own resources.

In other | lence at the hands of lawless men. 'As respects heavy reductions are made on tobacco and minor articles to the amount of about \$70,000,000. The great difference in the Mills and Senate bills claimed by the Republicans is that the former is aimed generally at the industries of the North leaving the South intact, while the other cuts down duties in articles which protection has not helped. The difference claimed is not wholly true, but there is ground for the claim and the most possible will be made of it. A compromise on the bill will very likely be, a reduction on sugar of thirty to forty per cent. and the restoration of some other articles.

> (From our Special Correspondent.) Points on Sugar.

The sugar market remains unchanged for raws, though there is a tendency to lower values. At this season of the year the demand for sugar always falls off, and as a result four eastern refineries have been closed down, viz.: the Boston and Bay State at Boston; the Dick and Meyer, and Castro and Donner refineries at Brooklyn. About 2,000 men are thrown out of work and at Boston there is talk of an independent refinery being built. The closing of these four establishments naturally lessens the demand for raw sugar and offers of 61% cents now rule for 96 degrees, holders, however, still remaining firm at 634 cents, the figure at which the last transactions were

The Senate Finance Committee has, through Senator Sherman, reported a bill which declares "unlawful and void all agreements, trusts or combinations between persons or corporations." Persons entering into such combinations are declared guilty of a high misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both.

The Republican Tariff bill has been presented to Congress and it makes, as was expected, a cut of 50 per cent. at the existing sugar duties. The following is the clause relating thereto:

All sugar not above No. 13, Dutch standard in color, tank bottoms, syrups of cane juice or of beet juice, melada, concentrated melada, concentrated molasses, testing by the polariscope, not above 75 degrees, 7 mills per pound, and for every additional degree shown by the polariscope 2 mills additional; all sugars above No. 13, Dutch standard, and not above No. 16, 138 cents (now 2 75-100 Minister of Finance a bond, conditioned | cents); all sugar above No. 16 and not above No. 20, 15% cents (now 3 cents); all sugars above No. 20, 2 cents (now 3½ cents). Molasses, testing above 56 degrees, 40 cents per gallon (now 86 cents). Sugar candy and all confectionery, including chocolate confectionery, made up wholly, or in part, of sugar, valued at 12 cents or less per pound, or sugars after being refined, when tinctured, colored or in any way adulterated, 5 cents per pound (now 5 and 10 cents) Glucose or grape sugar, 34 cent (now 20 per cent. ad valorem.)

The Samoan Situation. Later advices from Samoa, dated Auckland, September 27th, are to the effect that another engagement had taken place between the followers of Malietoa and Tamasese. The latter were under command of German officers and were defeated.

President Cleveland has now taken hold of the subject with a view to checking the arrogance of the Germans. Representative Morrow called upon Secretary Bayard explaining that the king just selected by the Malietoa men would be careful to see that American interests in the island are amply protected, and for this reason he felt that the moral aid of this Government ought to be extended

Mr. Bayard intimated that the matter was at the present time the subject of a diplomatic correspondence, which, judging from the tone of the dispatches from the German Foreign Office, would result in the ultimate withdrawal of the German forces at Apia, thus leaving matters in the same condition that they were betery, but she is awarded the custody of

fore the late King Malietoa was deposed. If it were not for the absence of a quorum in the House, which prevents the passage of any legislation by unanimous consent, a resolution would be introduced asking the State Department what steps it proposed taking in the matter, and calling on our Government to preserve by every means within its power the autonomy of the island.

The total reductions in the bill amount to \$75,000,000, made up as follows: \$27,759,000 on sugar; \$24,500,000 on tobacco, internal revenue; alcohol used in the arts \$6,500,000; free list \$6,500,-000; other reductions \$8,000,000. The duty on woolen cloth has been increased 1 cent per pound, which is the only change in the existing wool tariff.

As the Republicans claim that a reduction in tariff is advisable, it is diffi-cult to see much difference between the dry dock for overhauling and reclassifiprotection theory of either party. 


