UNIFORMITY OF SCHOOL BOOKS.

The desirableness of a uniform series of text books for the common schools of any country is readily admitted by most teachers of experience, and the wisdom of adopting a uniform series for use in all the Government Schools of this Kingdom will scarcely be questioned by any one competent to form an opinion in the matter. Some reasons for uniformity were given in Monday's *Advertiser*, and others might be adduced; but discussion in support of any measure is quite unnecessary where there is such a near approach to unanimity of opinion in its favor.

We are not surprised to find that the "views of our best teachers" accord with those of the most experienced and most successful modern educationists in America, England, and other parts of the world, and to learn that "they unanimously advised the Board to adopt a uniform series of books in the fundamental branches;" but we are not so ready to endorse their recommendation of "Swinton's Series of Readers, Monteith's Independent Geographies, and Barnes' Series of Mathematics, as among the latest and best." No doubt, these are excellent books, and palpably superior to most of those hitherto in use in our public schools; but are they the best extant and procurable? They may be. We do not say, do not even insinuate, that they are not; for we are not in a position to judge. But are those teachers who have recommended the adoption of these books in a much better position to judge of their relative merits than ourselves? That is, have they had opportunities of making themselves acquainted with all the various "latest and best series" of school books published in America and elsewhere, and having had such opportunities have they made a careful and thorough examination and comparison of those various series? If so, their recommendation is entitled to sufficient weight to insure, at least, favorable consideration by the Board. But if, on the other hand, this recommendation is not the outcome of careful and thorough examination and comparison, it is hasty and should be received with caution.

Great improvement has been made in the quality and methods of school books, within the last three or four years past, and it can scarcely be expected that teachers who have been any length of time in this country should be fully conversant with those improvements. In view of these facts, would it not be wise for the Board of Education to procure samples of all the most popular series, to be examined, compared, and reported on by a committee of teachers, before deciding what series to adopt? This, we think, would be the surest way of determining which is the best and the most adapted to the requirements of this kingdom.

LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

OUR thanks are due to Messrs. J. W. Robertson & Co. for files of paper by the late mails.

Mr. P. C. Jones' Book-keeping class at the Y. M. C. A. now meets twice a week, on Mondays and Fridays.

No less than 159 members of the different Companies of the Fire Department refrained from voting on Monday night.

AFTER the election was over, No. 1 and No. 2 companies each gave a little spread at which mirth and good fellowship abounded.

THE Myrtle Boat Club has elected the following officers, J. L. Torbert, Pres.; W. T. Monsarrat, Vice Pres.; A. Robertson, Treasurer; A. Brown, Secretary.

THE bill of expenses against the *Madras* has reached very nearly \$1900. We learn, however, that there are some prospects of a speedy settlement being arrived at.

WE have received a copy of Messrs W. O. Smith & Co's Monthly Circular of Hawaiian Stock Quotations for May. The dividends paid during the month amount to \$22,350.

It seems to us that rowdiness should be as far as possible expelled from the precincts of saloons and it certainly does not contribute to quiet and order to have music going on at all hours in any such place.

THIS month's *Friend* is now on our table where we have laid it after perusing its cheerful chat with pleasure. We commend to the notice of our readers the last of the articles on New Guinea and a short review of Emerson and Carlyle's correspondence.

THE following is the strength of the Fire Department in this city as given on their voting lists—Honolulu Engine No. 1, 87; Mechanic Engine No. 2, 105; Hawaii Engine No. 4, 60; China Engine No. 5, 61; Pacific Hose No. 1, 39; Protection Hook & Ladder 31. Total 383.

Sealed tenders for the erection of the proposed new building of the Library and Reading Room Association were opened at the office of A. J. Cartwright, Esq., Friday, at 12 noon. They were as follows: E. B. Thomas, \$11,108; G. Lucas, \$11,247; G. W. Lincoln, \$12,000; Walker & Treadway, \$14,700; R. W. Grannis, \$14,800; J. Bowler, for plastering, \$740.

A friend who has lived in different portions of Spanish America suggests that it would be a good idea for the Government to import swallows and bats. He says that there the swallows catch the mosquitoes in the day-time and the bats do the same at night. To these it would be safe to add the bird popularly known in Europe as the goat-sucker which is also known to catch insects on the wing.

Some time ago, when Mr. Carter was Minister of the Interior, the Chinese Theatre became noted as being little better than a gambling den, an opium den, and a house of assignation. In order to put a stop to these evil practices he refused to grant a license for it unless they paid for the services of two policemen to be constantly on the premises—one in each watch. In view of recent events, it would be advisable to adopt the same plan.

A case of cruelty to a dumb animal came under our notice yesterday. About six weeks ago a valuable dog was in the habit of frequenting a certain yard. The owner of the yard objected, and some days after the dog came home with evident marks of having been scalded with boiling water, so that a great portion of its hair came off. When shall we see a Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals started here? There is plenty of work for it.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

From Our Own Correspondent.

Nothing of national importance has happened during the present month—no Governor to instal or King to crown.

The daily papers—or rather their proprietors—will be glad when Parliament sits, to have something of interest to place before their readers. Nothing but a few mishaps on the railways have happened to break the monotony of an editor's life.

Several deputations have waited upon the Minister, controlling the Public Works Department, urging upon him the advisability of altering the proposed route for our intercolonial railway; but he seems adverse to any change. O. B. Adelaide, April 26, 1883.

INTER-COLONIAL NEWS.

NEW SOUTH WALES.
An Inter-colonial Postal conference has been held in Sydney at which the majority of the colonies agreed to apply for admission into the Postal Union. Other subjects were also discussed and at one of the recent sittings of the Conference there came forward for consideration the question of establishing federal quarantine stations at places on the extreme borders of the Australian Continent, as for instance at King George's Sound at one end, and Thursday Island at another. At these stations, it was pointed out, steam vessels on their way to any port in the colonies with disease on board, could land their sick passengers or seamen, and in that way reduce the time they would otherwise have to remain in quarantine at their final port; and at the same time lessen, if not entirely remove, the risk of the disease spreading on board. The Conference agreed that it was very desirable to establish such stations, if it were practicable, and resolved that steps should be taken to give effect to the proposition.

An adventurous walk across the entire continent of Australia has been completed by George Ernest Morrison, a son of the principal of the Geelong College. He started from the Gulf of Carpentaria, leaving Normanston the week before Christmas. After passing Cloncurry, he followed the course of the Diamantina and the Thomson, striking the Bulloo at Thargomindah, and the Paroo at Hungerford. Following the Paroo through a country inundated by the enormous rainfall that characterized this season, he encountered the most dangerous part of his route, having for nearly 350 miles to wade almost daily considerable distances, and to swim swollen creeks. He crossed the Darling at Wilcannia, the Lachlan at Booligal, the Murrumbidgee at Hay, and the River Murray at Echuca. The whole distance traversed from the Gulf of Carpentaria to Melbourne exceeded 2000 miles, and this was covered in 120 days. Passing through uninhabited wastes, where sometimes intervals of over 100 miles intervened between human habitations, he had to carry a swag with provision and apparatus for cooking, and this of course materially impeded his rate of travelling. He had to carry a supply of water in some part of his route, where water could only be found at very long intervals. Part of his way led through a district inhabited by hostile blacks, who, in revenge for being so mercilessly hunted down by the remote settlers, show little mercy to any white man who comes in their way. He walked every inch of the distance alone and unarmed, cooking for himself such provision as he could secure by the way, and generally sleeping in the open air, muffled up in the blanket he carried in his swag. Notwithstanding the hardships he endured, he finished his toilsome march in robust health.
