

GREAT BRITAIN'S FINANCIAL CONDITION

London, August 25.—The Governor
of the Bank of England, William
Liddell, has consented to make a
statement to the public through the
Herald in consequence of the specu-
lating stories in America and on the
continent to the effect that a general
financial crash is near at hand and
that the British banks are about to
let the full situation be known, for
fear that it would precipitate a panic
throughout the world. These stories
have been growing in intensity since
the embarrassment of Messrs. Bar-
ring Brothers a few months ago. Mr.
Liddell is the official head of
British finances, and his statement is
probably the only one that would be
accepted as beyond suspicion and
beyond dispute. I saw Mr. Liddell
at the bank, and after listening to
me he said:

"I wish to say emphatically that
there is no basis for the reports that
a great financial disaster is impending
in Great Britain. It is quite
untrue that any important business
house is in danger even now, and the
affairs of that one are now in hand.
As for the chartered banks, they
are all sound, so far as I know.
There have been great losses in the
past, but those losses have been
spread over a large number of years,
and as a rule the losses have
been already met and paid, leaving
the losers poorer, but still solvent.
There will be a few failures, of
course, but none of any importance
—none that could affect the money
markets.

"The result of the great loss in
South America and elsewhere has
been to bring people to their senses.
Speculation has completely stopped.
The difference between the wisdom
of last year and the depression of
this is the difference between excess
and conserve—where there was a hole
there is now a hole. The people are
poorer and wiser; that is the truth
of the matter. The talk about the
coming panic is unfounded. There
are two ways in which losses can
come upon the market; one is the
acute form of panic, the other is the
watered form, dullness, lack of
speculation and distrust. As I said
before, the losses are already known,
and, in most cases, already paid.
One of the good results of the specu-
lates, trust companies and the like
is to divide losses among the public
and so prevent crashes."

Appreciating these good intentions, it pleases us to express to Your Majesty on our part the heartfelt desire to apply all our efforts towards the same end. With these sentiments coupled with sincere wishes for Your happiness we pray that to have Your Majesty in His Holy and Worthy keeping. Done at the Chateau de Loo, the 20th July, 1891.

Two notes have been received from Mr. Nielsen, Spreckelsville, giving information regarding the "brilliant meteor" and other shooting stars, as observed by him. They have been handed to Mr. C. J. Lyons for comparison with information from other sources.

A London telegram republished in this paper quotes the governor of the Bank of England as saying, referring to the late threatened panic on account of collapses of South American securities: "One of the good results of the syndicates, trust companies and the like is to divide losses among the multitude and so prevent crashes." That is, the multitude of investors, not the masses of producers. Trusts can be regarded as only an evil when considered as an arbitrary power, dictating both the buying and the selling prices of commodities in which they are concerned.

"New light on the Jewish question," is what Prof. Goldwin Smith essays to give in the North American Review for August. He maintains that the present persecution of the Jews in Russia is not on account of religion, but has its origin in resentment for the exactions of Jewish capitalists. Indeed, he doubts if this was not a potent incentive to the persecution of the race in former ages and other countries. The pro-

founder in his usual telling style gives deeply and bravely into the question, but in doing so shows that he looks at it in a sympathetically judicial spirit by the remark, "The thanks of all nations will be due to Baron Hirsch, or any other philanthropist, who can find the solution of a problem which now for two thousand years has formed not the least salient and pleasing part of the annals of humanity." It should be stated also that Prof. Smith quotes British consular reports of 1881 to show that the then recently published accounts of atrocities were exaggerated, and that the Russian authorities were not so idle in preventive measures as had been represented.

MURDER IN KOHALA.

A Japanese laborer has been mur-
dered in Kohala. Through the cour-
tesy of Mr. K. Okkots, acting In-
spector-General of Japanese Immi-
grants, the following translation has
been obtained of the official report
on the case by Dr. M. Yamashita,
Japanese physician and inspector,
dated Kohala, Aug. 24:

"Yoshida Kurakichi, who has been
employed by the Star Mill Co. of
Kohala, as a luna for cane carriers
the past year, was found murdered
by some person or persons unknown,
about half-past two o'clock in the
morning of the 16th inst., through
pistol shots whilst asleep.

"Having examined the corpse the
same day, I have found one bullet
having entered from his back, one
through the arm, and another pen-
etrating the heart. With these three
shots death must have been instan-
taneous.

"The following laborers are lock-
ed up on suspicion: Kuroda Mat-
suzo, contract laborer, Hawi mill;
Inaturo Fiyiware and wife, Hawi
mill, and Nakagawa, lately employed
by Paauhau Plantation, Hamakua.

"In connection with the above out-
rage, Deputy Sheriff Geo. Williams
and Mr. Izarashi (the latter by
special request of Sheriff Hitchcock)
are here vigorously investigating the
matter, but as yet they are unable to
find any clue of murderer or mur-
derers."

FOUR-OARED RACE.

Only a Tansum Practice Race led by
the Myrtles.

The four-oared sliding seat boat
race, for which a purse of \$100 was
deposited at the BULLETIN Office,
purported to have come off yesterday
afternoon. It had the appearance of
an easy practice over the three mile
course, with the Myrtle crew leading
by mutual consent.

The Myrtle Boat Club crew was
not changed from the first announce-
ment—A. W. Carter, stroke, E. H.
Wodehouse, Alex. Lyle and Horace
C. Lyle; Arthur Wilder, coxswain.

When they drew up to the line they
were disgusted to find that the Hea-
lani Boat Club had substituted a
"kid" crew for the recognized
seniors. Had there been time the
Myrtle boys declare they would have
"trumped the trick" by putting in a
junior crew also. The crew of the
Healanis were: L. Ward, F. Ham-
mer, Chris. Holt and A. T. C. Atkin-
son; Chas. Herriek, coxswain. The
Myrtle boat was the Alf. Rogers,
hon. of the Healanis the Poomakalani.

Hon. C. B. Wilson was judge and
starter; Mr. Archie Gillilan, time
keeper.

The Myrtles led from the start,
pulling a lazy stroke of 32 to the
minute till opposite the lighthouse,
where they were 10 seconds ahead
and put on a brief spurt. The lead
was maintained to the finish, although
the Myrtles were waiting for their
opponents most of the way. The
time was 18 minutes 24 seconds.

The captain of the Myrtles offered
to row, allowing the Healanis to pick
four men all over town. A race is
promised for Sept. 2 between the
junior crew of the Myrtles and the
Healanis crew that rowed yesterday.

LANTERN EXHIBITION.

A very fine exhibition of lantern
slides was given by the Hawaiian
Camera Club at its rooms, Alakea
street, Saturday evening. The hall
was filled with members and guests.
Nearly fifty slides of Hawaiian scen-
ery were displayed, the lantern being
operated by Dr. C. B. Wood and
Mr. C. Hedeman. Mr. C. W. Ash-
ford gave a running explanation of
the different views. The pictures
seemed to be clearer on the screen
than at any of the public exhibitions.
This was due to an improvement in
the lime lights. Messrs. Colville,
Lackland and Stackable had charge
of the arrangements, paying every
attention to the reception and com-
fort of the company. After the ex-
hibition of Hawaiian views the com-
pany was treated to an ice cream
feast. Afterward views of American
scenery were shown. The Hawaiian
slides are all the work of the mem-
bers of the club, and show great
progress made in the art since the
start of the organization.

A SUICIDE.

A telephone message was received
at the Police Station yesterday after-
noon about 5:50 o'clock, from Mr.
Geo. Campbell, Moanalua, stating
that a Chinaman had committed sui-
cide and was lying on the Govern-
ment road. A wagon was despatched
to the scene and the body brought
to the Station house. Dr. Peterson
examined the corpse and found five
gashes across the man's throat, al-
most severing the head from the
body. The razor with which the
slashing was done was still tightly
retained in the man's hand. The
man's identity was made known by
his brother as Ning Fai, but the
cause of his self-destruction unknown.
No inquest was held.
