

The rain is trying the structure of our streets to its utmost capacity. When it is over, there will be thou sands of dollars' worth of repair work to be done. Where is the money to come from? We fail to see what object the government has in issuing a special license to a Chinese firm for the sale of liquor at retail. No such license has been known in these islands heretofore and we do not hesitate in stating that it is illegal. Whole-sale dealers of liquor are allowed to sale dealers of induct are anoved to sell by the case only. Jobbers can only sell by the gallon. Retail deal-ers—that is the saloons – can sell by bottle or glass and liquor can be consumed on the premises. The license now granted to the Chinaman on Numero fixed to institute ford on on Nuuanu street is neither fowl or fish. He is allowed to sell liquor in quantity but not allow to serve them on the premises. The saloons in town pay big rents, good salaries to their employees besides heavy fee to the government. The Chinese firm, now under the patronage o the government will be able to sell liquor at retail or wholesale prices and seriously injure the interests of the retail dealers. The Chinese liquor firm pays a small reat, de mands small profit and pays no wages. Under such circumstances what show has the heavily taxed white saloon-keeper to gain a living? Mr. Thurstou at one time was the leading anti-Asiatic in Hawaii. Is it not time for him to come to the front again. The majority of the people irrespective of politics rather prefer Thurston to Chicamen. If the saloon men of Honolulu have got any spunk they may put up enough coin and test the legality of this new and very peculiar license.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Relating to Fishing and the Sale of Fish in the City of Honolulu.

SECTION 1-The taking of scale fish, shell fish or any product of the sea or water from any part, inlet or branch of the Honolulu Harbor, or from any stream emptying into said ha bor to and within one hundred feet beyond any point affected by the tides towards the land from said harbor and within a line running from the point at Iwilei near the Pork Packing Company's slrughter house to the office of the quarantine station, thence to the can buoy, and from the can buoy to and along the western wall of the coral enclosure for dredgings at Kakaako, is strictly prohibited.

SECTION 2-The sale of fish and of all products of the sea is prohibited in the district of Honolulu, excepting at the new market building and such other places as are specially permitted where fish and the prosale under supervision of Inspectors appointed by the Board of Health. SECTION 3-Such Inspectors shall have power to seize, condemn and destroy any fish or product of the the market which they shall have resson to believe was taken from the locality prohibited by these regulations, or which shall appear to be unfit for food.

SECTION 4-The Regulations of the Board of Health relating to the sale and taking of fish dated November 13, 1895, are hereby rescinded.
