BUSSES RUN TO THE GATES.

## THE BIDDING WAS LIVELY DOLE LIKES SIMPLICITY

THE MOLOKAI RANCH BROUGHT \$251,000.

Arthur D. McClellan Purchases It for the Hartwell Company—Charles S. Desky was Strong Opposition.

The Molokai ranch was sold at noon today to Arthur Daggett McClellan, for \$251,000. Charles S. Desky, representing a strong company of capitalists, was in the race for the property up to the last moment, but when he offered \$250,000 he reached his limit, and allowed the successful bidder to take the big ranch for a sum that was but one thousand dollars higher.

When Auctioneer Morgan climbed up on top of a chair in front of the Judiciary building this noon to call for bids, there were some two or three hundred of the city's most representative men in attendance. Special Commissioner Henry Smith read to the assemblage the various bits of properties that had previously been sold by the trustees of the Bishop estate, as well as the several small grants that had been made from time to time. He then pointed to the map which was suspended in the hall and explained the property that was offered for sale. There were over 60,000 acres in fee simple and about half that number of acres held in lease. At least one-third of the purchase price would be required in cash and the other two-thirds to be secured by mortgage and payable within five years' time.

Mr. Morgan then called for bids. Judge Alfred W. Carter mentioned the upset price, \$150,000, as a starter. Charles S. Desky bid \$136,000. Judge Carter raised a thousand and Mr. Desky saw him. Then Judge Carter wanted to know who was bidding, and the auctioneer replied that he would learn that when the property was sold. But the judge insisted that he had the right to know and entered a protest. Attorney Kinney for the trustees noted the protest.

The bidding then went on, the price rising steadily one thousand dollars at a time. When it reached \$196,000, Mr. Desky jumped to \$200,000. But this did not discount Judge Carter and he went one thousand higher. Desky mentioned \$205,000, and Carter said \$206,000. Desky unhesitatingly went to \$210,000, and Carter bid \$211,000.

At this stage of the bidding Mr. McClellan, who was standing near Judge Carter, held a hasty conference, and the former continued the bidding. Mr. Desky went to \$250,000, and Mr. McClellan promptly named \$251,000. The bidding then stopped and the property was knocked down to the highest bidder.

## DOLE LIKES SIMPLICITY

NO GUNS WILL BOOM AT THE CAPITAL.

President McKinley's Private Secretary Will Escort the Party to the Arlington—The State Dinner.

The Peru brought this dispatch from Washington, dated January 25: With no sound of cannon, no military guards and no formal reception, President Dole of the Hawaiian Republic will enter the capital at noon tomorrow, to be greeted by the President's private secretary alone, and to be escorted to his hotel as a private citizen. All this will be at the express request of the distinguished guest, whose modesty and democracy have caused an entire change of plans for the reception of the Executive of the sister republic. It is expected that there will be a great gathering at the depot to see President Dole, but it will be a crowd of sightseers and not officials.

Secretary Porter will receive the Hawaiian President on behalf of Mr. McKinley at the depot, and will escort him to the Arlington hotel in the President's carriage. It is expected that the two Presidents will exchange visits during the day. The President and Mrs. McKinley will give a reception and dinner at the White House next Tuesday evening in honor of President and Mrs. Dole. They will be otherwise entertained during their stay in the city. Dinners and receptions are being planned by the Secretary of State and other officials who have enjoyed Hawaiian hospitality.

CHICAGO, January 25.—President Dole of Hawaii, after a visit of two days, left Chicago today. The party went out on a Baltimore and Ohio train in charge of T. W. Criddle, the third assistant Secretary of State, and Maj. Heintz, military attaché of President McKinley.

## CARTER IN WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, January 25.—J. O. Carter of Honolulu, who comes to work against the ratification of the Hawaiian annexation treaty, arrived in the city last night, after a hard trip across the continent. Mrs. Carter accompanied her husband, and they took quarters at the Ebbitt hotel, where Ex-Queen Lili and the native opponents of annexation are now stopping.

Despite the fact that Carter was very tired after his trip, he had many callers, among them Dr. Mary Walker, who is hard at work in opposition to annexation and in the interests of the ex-Queen. Mr. Carter will begin his work at once, taking advantage of the fact that the treaty is now laid aside for the time being.

## ARE NOT SATISFIED.

Carter Tells Why He is Opposed to the Annexation of the Islands.

NEW YORK, January 25.—A special to the World from Washington says: Maj. J. O. Carter, one of the most prominent of Hawaiians who oppose annexation and the most influential of Queen Liliuokalani's adherents, has arrived. He is a white man of American parents, though born on the islands. In discussing the expediency of annexation Maj. Carter said tonight:

"I am too good an American to want to see the United States annex Hawaii, and too good an Hawaiian to want to see that country annexed to the United States. Personally, I like Mr. Dole, and the members of his cabinet are my friends; but Mr. Dole in saying that the Hawaiians are satisfied with the existing Government makes a great mistake if he means to include the natives. Moreover, the desire of the whites for annexation is waning."

## WANT TO CELEBRATE.

Next Saturday is the fifteenth anniversary of the organization of the Myrtle Boat club. A meeting of the directors will be held this afternoon to talk over plans for observing the event.

## HOTELS ARE OVERCROWDED

NEW COMERS FIND BUT SCANT ACCOMMODATIONS.

Great Influx of Investors and Sight-seers from the States—More Hotels are Needed.

Hotel accommodations are at a premium in Honolulu today. There has been a general scramble during the past twenty-four hours among the people who arrived on the Australia and Peru for places of entertainment, and many indeed have been the disappointments. Only eleven of the people who came down on the Australia could secure rooms at the Hawaiian, and a few more were accommodated at the Arlington and Queen. Not a few went out to Sans Souci and to Wright's Villa, while many have had to shift as best they could.

The prediction of C. S. Desky that the wide advertisement of the Islands would cause a great influx of visitors and investors seems about to be fulfilled earlier than expected. More than three score of strangers arrived on the Australia and Peru, and late advices say that the bookings at the coast for future passage are very large at present. The people who came yesterday represent a very large amount of capital, and a great many of them are looking for investment. It is discouraging to them to find no suitable abiding places. Many will have to seek private boarding places and lodging houses, while not a few are calculating on returning home sooner than they had anticipated.

Never has the actual need of a larger hotel been felt than at this time. Manager Lucas is doing all in his power to find rooms for the visitors and Col. Macfarlane is pushing ahead the work of enlarging the hotel as fast as possible. When the two new stories are added to the hotel, it will accommodate nearly twice as many as at the present time. Even then the accommodations will not be sufficient if the present great influx of new comers continues. It is more than likely that a new hotel will be erected in the near future.

Not in many years have there been so many visitors in the city as at the present time. Every department of business has been stimulated by the influx, and times are prosperous. The prediction is made that during the coming summer the Islands will see the greatest number of visitors in their history. The problem that now confronts the city is how they are to be entertained. It is a serious question, and will no doubt attract the attention of the government in the near future.

## ANNEXATION IS FAVORED.

Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce Comes Out Strong for It.

LOS ANGELES, January 25.—The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce by reason of the recent snap action of its Board of Directors finds itself in a dilemma. Some weeks ago a resolution, which it is said, was presented by W. A. Clarke, the Montana millionaire, who has become largely interested in beet sugar in this country, and was adopted. It was strongly against the annexation of Hawaii and was at once telegraphed to the opponents of that measure at Washington.

Since then some of the friends of annexation have made a systematic poll of the membership of the Chamber, which is the representative body of Los Angeles business men of all departments. There are 1000 members. Of these 265 are out of the city, and 101 have not been found after repeated calls. Of 632 who have been seen, 292 favor annexation, 295 are against it, and 135 have no opinion, making a majority of 87 in favor of acquiring the Islands.

The resolution undoubtedly represented the views of the half dozen or so directors who voted for them, but, as the figures prove, do not indicate the opinions of the business men who form the organization. The report that they were introduced at the instance of a millionaire who was actuated by what he thought to be his financial interests, is not regarded with favor by many of the members. It is suggested by the pro-annexationists that the directors notify the members of the Senate committee that the resolution did not represent the sentiments of the members, but simply the ideas of the few who voted for them.

## FROM FRIEND FARRINGTON.

Wallace R. Farrington, formerly editor of the Advertiser, has purchased the Fitchburg, Mass., Mail. He has assumed the editorial management of that paper. Under the new regime the Mail will be sold for annexation.

## NO DATE FIXED AS YET

DIFFICULT TO TELL WHEN THE VOTE WILL BE TAKEN.

Condition of the Annexation Fight—Annexationists Will Continue Arguing Until Enough Votes are Had.

The Peru brought one day's later news this morning. A dispatch from Washington dated January 25 stated that the present out look for a speedy vote on the treaty is very bad. The opponents of annexation once more today asked for an agreement to vote, but Chairman Davis of the Foreign Relations committee would not fix the time.

Senator White said he hoped a vote would be reached soon, as he will be compelled to leave Washington for a short time next month on business, and other Senators have important matters to attend to, which may make it late in the spring before there is a final action. As matters stand, the opponents of the treaty have had only fifteen minutes time, all the remainder being consumed by those favoring annexation.

Senators White and Pettigrew make great claims of their strength, the former saying he can see nearer forty than thirty votes and the latter that he knows of thirty-nine. To offset this the Republican members of the Foreign Relations committee today said that every Republican but one would vote for the treaty, and that one, Senator Morrill, had decided that he will not be the only Republican to array himself against the President and the party policy, and so had decided not to vote, and would not pair against the treaty.

This reduces the two-thirds necessary to fifty-nine, and one Senator said he knew of fifty-seven votes pledged, while there were from five to eight Democrats who had not yet settled in their minds how to vote. He said arguments would go on until the treaty had the necessary votes assured.

There was an endeavor made by a Cuban enthusiast to secure a combination of Democrats with those in favor of granting belligerent rights to secure a postponement of the treaty, and thus endeavor to force the hand of President McKinley. This will not succeed, however, as Senator White is anxious to have a vote.

To show the fallacy of Senator White's position that Southern California opposes annexation, Senator Davis today presented in the Senate a petition from the Young Men's Republican club of Los Angeles, asking for the ratification of the treaty.

## WHAT SAILOR MEN TALK OF

FAIR WINDS AND FAIR WEATHER NOW PREVAIL.

S. S. Australia's Short Stay—Three Vessels Sail—S. S. Peru in Port—Water Front Gossip.

The S. S. Peru sails at 10 p. m.

The S. S. Australia sails for the Coast at 4 p. m. Saturday.

The Kate Davenport sailed in ballast for the Sound this morning.

The schooner Norma was towed out to sea by the tug this morning.

The schooner Emma Claudina sailed from Grey's Harbor for Mahukona on the 24th ult.

The American bark Amy Turner sailed from New York for this port on the 24th ult.

One deserter from the Adam W. Spies was captured by Harbor Police—man Evans this morning.

The schooner Aloha sailed for the Coast this morning with a full cargo of sugar and a fair wind. Captain Dabel expects to make a quick passage.

The Babcock will be fully discharged in order that she may be washed out before taking sugar. She will be propped up with floats to keep her on even keel when she is emptied.

The Mikahala secured 5045 bags of sugar at Hanamaulu, arriving here this morning. Captain Thompson reports fine weather prevailing on the Kauai coast. The Mikahala will be dispatched to Kilauea this afternoon.

Both the S. S. Peru and the S. S. Mameda had very stormy voyages going up last trip, while the Australia, which left two days astern of them, had a smooth sea all the way. The racks were not put on the table once.

So great is the demand for steamers in the Klondike trade that the Humbolt, a steamer a little larger than the Mauna Loa, has been chartered for six months at the enormous rate of \$700 per day. Her original cost was but \$100,000.

The American bark, Adam W. Spies has received sugar ballast and will sail this afternoon for Hilo, where she will finish loading for New York. A fair wind is blowing, and Captain Godelt hopes to make his anchorage by tomorrow afternoon.

The P. M. S. S. Peru arrived from San Francisco soon after midnight, with a little freight and about a dozen local passengers. She left San Francisco a day late, bringing the papers of the 24th. The Peru has but seven through passengers.

The schooner Anna, Capt. Everett, arrived at Mahukona on the 24th ult., 11 days from San Francisco, with a full load of general merchandise to Hawaii Railway Company, Limited. Consignees, S. G. Wilder & Co., Kohala Sugar Co., C. F. Hart, E. P. Low and J. S. Kay.

The James Makee arrived in from Kapaun this morning, with 2600 bags of sugar for the Rithet. She will sail again this afternoon. The Makee was able to load but 1000 bags of sugar inside the reef, because of the new sand bank. The weather, Captain Tillet says, has cleared up nicely.

The S. S. Australia is booked for two quick round trips, in order to get into the new schedule just issued by the Oceanic company. Her inward freight is being discharged as fast as possible, in order that she may get away on Saturday afternoon. She will remain in San Francisco but five days on her arrival there, and again make a brief stay on her arrival here. Under the new schedule the Australia will hereafter arrive here on Wednesday, at 4 p. m., spending but six days in port here, and only eight days at San Francisco.

The American brig W. G. Irwin, which won the big race to San Francisco, last month, cleared from there on the 25th ult., for this port, with the following cargo: 300 bbls lime, 1750 lbs rolled barley, 107 cs liquors, 1705 lbs meals, 21 lbs and 85 cs bread, 50 cs oil, 105 pkgs groceries and provisions, 100 cs coal oil, 7 cs drugs, 2500 lbs oleomargarine, 500 lbs manufactured tobacco, 4680 lbs lard, 1815 gals and 85 cs wine, 2275 lbs oats, 150 sks bran, 25 sks middlings, 37 cts wheat, 472 gals whiskey, 261 cs canned goods, 650 gals beer, 4000 lbs lead, 45 carboys acid, 125 bales hay, 5 pkgs hardware, 2775 lbs peas, 500 lbs butter, 950 lbs dried fruit, 60 bbls flour, 625 lbs sago, 920 lbs nuts.

# GERMANY HAS HER LEASE

IT WILL RUN FOR NINETY-NINE  
YEARS.

British Attitude in the Orient—Rus-  
sia and England Bidding for the  
Chinese Loan—Hicks Beach's Speech

PEKIN, January 25.—German's lease  
has finally been fixed at ninety-nine  
years. The Chinese Emperor is great-  
ly displeased.

LONDON, January 25.—The St.  
James Gazette this afternoon says that  
it has it that Russia is not likely to  
persist in her opposition to the open-  
ing of Taitien-Wan.

PEKIN, January 25.—Another loan  
conference with the Tsung Li Yamen  
has taken place, the latter receiving  
the Russian representative in the  
morning and the British Minister in  
the afternoon. It is believed that  
the British Minister, Sir Claude McDon-  
ald, insists upon the opening of the  
port of Taitien-Wan, and that Great  
Britain will not recede from that de-  
mand.

Whether Great Britain or Russia se-  
cures the loan depends upon which  
exerts the greatest pressure. If En-  
gland undertakes to protect China as  
against Russia's displeasure, it is be-  
lieved the loan will be completed on  
the terms offered by Sir Claude Mc-  
Donald.

NEW YORK, January 25.—Accord-  
ing to the World's correspondent, the  
speech of Sir Michael Hicks Beach, de-  
claring that Great Britain will de-  
mand free commerce for the world in  
Chinese ports, continued to be the  
sensational feature of all discussion  
of the complications in China.

George W. Smalley's Times dispatch  
today quoting editorials from New  
York papers praising England's atti-  
tude as exemplified in Beach's speech is  
prominently reproduced by the even-  
ing papers as evidence that England,  
in keeping open the Chinese markets,  
will find an ally not only in Japan but  
in the United States.

The Times this morning publishes  
an officially inspired editorial, mini-  
mizing the gravity of the Chancellor's  
words, "whose strong expressions," it  
complains, "have been strangely mis-  
interpreted."

The Times continues: "It has been  
imagined that the Chancellor of the  
Exchequer delivered something like an  
ultimatum with regard to the pro-  
posed loan. In reality he did nothing  
of the kind. He merely said that  
England would never allow her com-  
merce to be excluded from the Chinese  
markets. Our attitude is in no sense  
aggressive, but merely self-defensive."

This remarkable attempt to explain  
away the Chancellor's belittling de-  
claration is made to placate Russia.

## REPUBLICAN SIMPLICITY.

President Dole is, and always has been, a believer in republican simplicity. At his own special desire he will be received in Washington with no flourish of trumpets and executive display. The effect will be good, just as the simple evening dress of the American representative at the courts of Europe, makes him distinguished amid the brilliant uniforms and glittering orders among which he mingles.

People will understand that Sanford B. Dole became President of this Republic, not from any intrigue of personal ambition, not from a desire to pose as a leader of men, not to be flattered and fawned upon, as the Presidents of South American Republics delight to be, but simply for the benefit of the country of his birth, at the desire of the men who were working for the success of a just cause and for good government.

In pursuance of this desire President Dole has gone to Washington to see President McKinley and to meet the members of the Senate. He has not gone to receive salutes and to be honored by military display, but he has gone to try and benefit the country. An attitude of this kind, will be fully appreciated, and President Dole has struck a keynote by his action.

Those who are opposed to annexation have been working hard against it and have sent special representatives to bolster up their cause. It is a good thing that the Senators should see what kind of a man the annexationists have chosen as the head of their cause, his simple manners and earnest devotion to the cause he has espoused, will have greater weight than many think.

## ANNEXATION.

The position of the annexation cause is a great deal stronger after the recess than it was before. The phalanx of Republican Senators seems to be quite solid, and there is no doubt about several of the Democratic Senators, but there are some Senators who are pledged to neither side in the cause, and who occupy very much the position that the Irish party used to hold in the British House of Commons, to whichever side they lean will go victory. The day's later news by the Peru seems to promise still better for annexation, but no one need look for much decisive action before the 16th of this month. From private sources of information from the Senate house that seems to be the day when the great struggle will come, oddly enough, it is the day that our own Legislature will meet.

The opinion, that the move made to tack annexation and Cuba upon the appropriation bill is unwise policy, is combatted by many who are personally conversant with political workings in Washington itself. It is, by these men, said to be a strong move and one that has changed so much since the Congress closed for the recess, that what seemed inadvisable then, may be decidedly advisable now. But of this we may be sure, we have keen and experienced men fighting for our side, men who cannot afford to make a mistake, and we may feel satisfied that our cause is being managed with all the skill that can be brought to bear.

## THE EASTERN QUESTION.

The situation in the East appears to be more peaceful than it has been for the last few months. The only factor which seems doubtful now is Japan. With a population which over-estimates its power, with a large army and a commanding navy, Japan is dangerous to the peace of the Orient. However, Japan has shrewd statesmen, who know her power far better than her people do, and who act as curb upon the popular will.

The plans of Russia seem to have been countered by Lord Salisbury's determination to have Tientsin-Wan declared a treaty port, because unless this port is in the hands of the power holding Port Arthur, the military value of the latter is much lessened. The action of the British cabinet is evidently backed up by the opinion of both parties in the State. Of course there might occur a combination of circumstances which would bring about war, but it is to the interest of

the European powers to reach a powerful solution. There is everything to lose, and a very doubtful chance of gain by getting into a war.

If the powers were able to keep from a crash when the Greeks were flying at the throats of the Turks, and when everyone was prophesying that war, the long talked of war, must ensue, it is not very likely that the situation in the Far East will bring it about.

The fact is all civilized nations dread a war. They are so inter-dependent, that even victory inflicts enormous losses upon the victor, totally apart from the actual sacrifice of blood and treasure in the war. The object of statesmen is to obtain their successes by a series of compromises. And this is the actual condition of affairs in China. The only party in the matter, whose desire or advantage is not considered, is China herself. She, however, is not in a position to even protest, but has to acquiesce in what the European powers consider is best for their individual interests. It is a curious condition of affairs. The ultimate outcome of it, of course, will be the complete dismemberment of the Chinese Empire.

## AN INTERESTING REPORT.

Consul General Haywood's report upon coffee culture on the Hawaiian Islands, was published in the advance sheets of the Consular Reports on January 17, 1898. The report occupies twenty-six pages and has also tabulated information of twenty-nine coffee plantations upon the Island of Hawaii, embracing the Olan, Puna and Hamakua districts. The information is put in crisp, newsy form, and reflects credit upon the Consul General, not only for the amount obtained, but for the manner in which it has been put together.

After telling of how many coffee plantations there are, Mr. Haywood speaks of the school system, the churches and labor. Upon labor he gives a suggestion of J. M. Horner of Hamakua, who says that it would be a good plan to invite Hawaiians to a series of loans upon condition of their picking a certain number of berries a day, but this must be sarcasm. He gives other views which are much more practical, especially that of Harry Rycroft of Puna.

Following this the Consul-General enters upon the methods of acquiring lands, of actual cultivation, clearing, cost of building, choice of plants and so forth, and figures cost upon a basis supplied by Commissioner Marsden, the whole being very valuable to the intending coffee planter.

Mr. Haywood's advisory remarks at the conclusion of the article are essentially to the point. He shows that coffee is no el dorado from which a man may reap a fortune merely by his sinews. He points out that an investment of at least \$5000 is required, and that \$20,000 is better. He shows how people of certain incomes in the United States may find a pleasant home and a return for their money. Throughout he gives good information and is conservative in his views. The report is a credit to the Consular department of the United States.

Queen Victoria's head, added the writer, from a close view I once got, I take to be 6½ size.

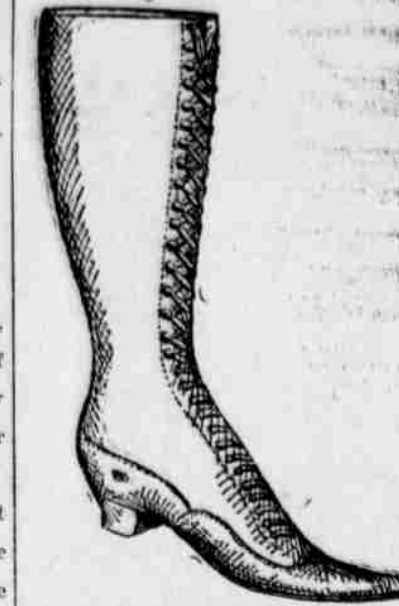

### WIND AND WEATHER.

Forecast in the North Pacific Ocean for February.

The following forecast has just been received from the Hydrographic Office in Washington, D. C.

Along its south side, in that part of the ocean east of the Hawaiian Islands, the trade winds may be expected to blow with a decidedly northerly slant, while to the westward of them the trades may be expected generally to be easterly or east-northeasterly. During February the belt of calms and variable winds between the trades may be expected to be narrow, so narrow in some places that a vessel may pass from one trade wind into the other without any perceptible break. North of the 35th parallel frequent westerly gales, accompanied by rain or snow, may be expected.

During this month occasional dangerous gales may be expected on the American coast north of the 40th parallel. Occasional squalls may be expected in the vicinity of the Hawaiian Islands.

Typhoons are usually infrequent during February. The northeast monsoon on the coast of China may be expected to continue to blow steadily during the month.

Occasional fog will be found along the American coast, though not sufficient to warrant its probable limits being shown on the chart.

## MR. BERGER AND HIS BAND

MAY POSSIBLY GO TO THE STATES THIS YEAR.

Invited to Attend the Trans-Mississippi Exposition—Hawaii Will be Asked to Make an Official Exhibit.

The Hawaiian National band, with its leader, Capt. Berger, may leave this year for Omaha to spend a month at the Trans-Mississippi and International Exposition, which holds forth in that city from June to November.

Capt. Berger has conducted his negotiations through George C. Sellner, a wholesale jeweler of Omaha, who is at present in Honolulu, on an extended pleasure trip to Honolulu and the Islands. The bandmaster has stated his willingness to go should the exposition people advance him the necessary cash for expenses. Mr. Sellner will send this proposition on to Omaha by the Mariposa, accompanying it with a strong recommendation that it be accepted.

Mr. Sellner has letters from Senator John M. Thurston and other distinguished Nebraska statesmen, to American Minister Sewall. He will interview government officials this week on the advisability of Hawaii making an official exhibit at the exposition.

"My appointment as commissioner for the exposition is honorary," said Mr. Sellner today, "and I am doing this work as a patriotic citizen. I know that you are all waiting for developments from Washington but to my mind an exhibit at the exposition would be advantageous to these islands in any event. If you are annexed you are naturally a Trans-Mississippi state, and one of us. If the treaty is not ratified at this time it is more than likely that the whole proposition will be shelved until the next session of Congress. In such an event, a representative display of Hawaii's resources at the exposition, would undoubtedly make many converts for the cause. Within a radius of 500 miles of Omaha there are living some twenty millions of people, and out of these we look for some six million to visit us. New Englanders are coming down in full force. This is the first opportunity that they have had to come west on railroad rates that are really remarkably low."

"We have made arrangements with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company to carry exhibits from Japan, China and Hawaii. The rate is full tariff, but on shipments to Omaha with return free in case goods have not changed hands. The railroads have all offered big concessions for all exhibits."

### WHEN TO PUBLISH.

In an interview with a reporter Mark Twain states that in his opinion "Christmas is a good time to bring out a book. Everybody is thinking about Christmas presents, and the pious are praying that Divine Providence may give them some clue as to what to give for a present, and the book, if it comes just at the right time, is about as good a thing as one could desire. It must come just at the right time, though. In other words, the opportunity to secure the presents must happen just at the moment when the impulse to give one is felt."

**GOLDEN SPIKES WAITING**TO BE DRIVEN ON COMPLETION  
OF THE EXTENSION.A Handy Construction Train Outfitted  
—From One-half to One Mile of  
Track Laid a Day.Two golden spikes, to be driven into  
the last tie on the Waialua railway ex-  
tension, are now in the hands of Sta-  
tion Agent R. W. Filler at Pearl City.  
In all probability the honor of putting  
in these spikes will fall to Robert Hal-  
stead, proprietor of Waialua planta-  
tion, and General Manager Dillingham.  
A special train will be run from  
Honolulu, carrying on board invited  
guests, who will participate in the festi-  
vities on that occasion.There will be genuine excitement  
when the track laying on the new ex-  
tension gets well under way. Carl  
Jensen, who has this contract, has  
accepted the plans for a very clever  
construction train suggested by his  
foreman, Charles Lambert. The train  
consists of four flat cars and a loco-  
motive. The engine is kept in the rear  
and pushes the train along as the new  
track is made, piece by piece.The two cars next to the locomotive  
are loaded with railroad ties, while  
the two end cars contain the rails. The  
rails are placed on either side of these  
cars, leaving an open space in the cen-  
ter through which a narrow gauge  
track is laid for the cars containing the  
ties to run over.Thus the material is discharged in  
front of the train. The ties are first  
distributed and then the rails are  
handed out. The rails are placed on  
small rollers which are attached to the  
cars and slide out to four men on either  
side, who place them in position on  
the ties; only enough spikes are driven  
in to allow the train to move on. A  
second gang of workmen follow up  
the train, ballasting the track and  
completing it for traffic.Contractor Jensen is calculating on  
laying from one-half to one mile of  
track a day. The construction train  
advances just thirty feet each time,  
the length of one rail.In the twenty-four miles of exten-  
sion there are at least a half dozen  
bridges to be built. The biggest of  
these are located about one-half mile  
from Waialua and at Waialua, cross-  
ing Waialua stream. This latter  
bridge will be some ninety feet long.  
There are any number of open and  
box culverts to be put in, but these  
have already been measured and will  
be constructed in Honolulu. They will  
cause no delay as the builders can  
drop them in, lay the rails and pass

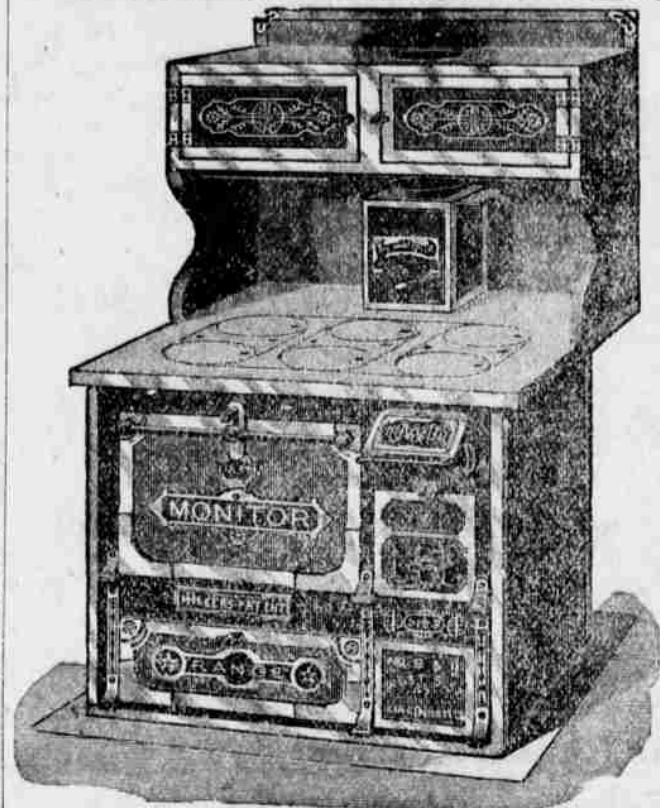

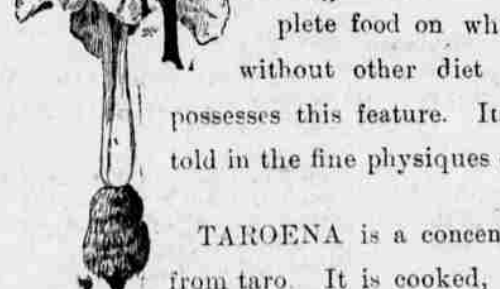
