Kula People Honor Carley

Recognize his Efforts in Getting Pipe Line Through.

On Saturday, the 22nd at noon, the people of Kula gave a luau on the grounds of the Waiakeo government school in honor of Representative E. B. Carley of Paia.

This feast was tendered as a public recognition of Mr. Carley's services in the last legislature in helping to procure the \$100,000 appropriation for the Kula water-works.

It was participated in by all political parties and all nationalities. Several hundred people enjoyed the fine spread of Hawaiian dishes.

Mr. Carley made an address thanking the Kula people for their kindness.

Deputy Sheriff Edgar Morton acted as master of ceremonies and David Morton interpreted Mr. Carley's remarks into Hawaiian.

John Burroughs, the naturalist and writer accompanied by his secretary arrived on Maui by Saturday's Claudine. He was met at Kahului by W. O. Aiken who took him in an automobile up Iao Valley.

On Sunday under the guidance of Mr. Aiken he ascended Haleakala, spending the night on the summit. He witnessed a most beautiful sunset and a most gorgeous sunrise from the palace of the sun. On Tuesday he made a trip through the Haiku pineapple lands and continued on to Wailuku and Lahaina where he took the Mauna Kea for Hawaii.

John Burroughs told a Makawao boy that a pigeon always laid her first egg on the very day she was six months old, on her birthday in fact, and also that a male pigeon stands higher and has larger eyes than a female. This information may prove interesting to other youngsters.

Saturday afternoon, the 22nd, the finals of the tennis tournament, men's doubles, for the Sawyer cups took place on the Paia courts. It was a well-fought contest between Messrs. Nowell and Walsh and Messrs. Mellor and Rosecrans and was won by the former players in three straight sets: 9, 7, 6, 1; and 6, 4.

Both couples were scratch players.

Inspector H. M. Wells has been visiting Makawao schools during the last week or two, making farewell visits in truth owing to the fact that the last legislature failed to appropriate any money for a Maui school inspector.

It is a matter of regret that the schools of this county are to lose the services of so conscientious and valuable a man as Mr. Wells.

Charles Warren Stoddard, the poet, who died on the 15th in California, was well-known to Maui kamaainas. He made his last visit to Maui in 1884. At this time his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Stoddard, lived at Waihee, where his father afterward acted as postmaster for a number of years. His sister was the wife of Parker McKee, who was for many years manager of Waihee plantation. His brother, Fred, was at one time a photographer at Wailuku.

Stoddard was a true Bohemian who dearly loved the "dolei far niente" of tropical Hawaii. In the eighties he was a charming companion.

The concert given by the Maunaloa Seminary girls Saturday evening, the 22nd, was a great success.

Races For July Fourth

Good Races are Assured at Kahului.

The Glorious Fourth, the day of all days on Maui, will be celebrated as it should be at Kahului by the sport of Kings namely Horse racing in a manner that will bear inspection as it has been the last four or five years. No one can truly say that they did not have their moneys worth of square racing and this year will prove no exception to the rule only that there is prospects for better racing as the association has freed it self from the heavy debt it has been carrying so long and is now on even terms, with the world. If the public of Maui will be as generous with their patronage in the future has they have been in the past success is certainly in store for the Maui Racing Association and the men who strove so hard to keep the racing spirit alive.

While the time that will be made will not be marvelous it is just as exciting to see a close finish in an evenly and honestly contested race as it would be to see one that is faster and unevenly matched. We sincerely hope that the public will turn out in full force and patronize the association that only asks your contribution once a year.

Do not let Maui be outdone by Hilo or any where else.

If you will do your part by attending, the association will do the rest. Let us make this a banner meeting and next year we will be in a position to invite our friends from the other Islands.

Never before had such an event been so well attended. Baldwin Hall was crowded with people from all parts of Central Maui. The two large motor-trucks, of the railroad company brought forty-eight people from Kahului.

The new Paia school house which was erected at a cost of \$22,000 is about completed. It still lacks desks and other school furniture which must under the new law be provided by the County.

It was rumored that Makino, the walking labor delegate, was on Maui last week.

Labor strikes are not apt to come to the plantations of Central Maui [Puunene, Paia, Hamakua and Wailuku] the majority of Japanese are "contract" men earning much more than \$18 per month and being well treated in every way.

James Lindsay of Haiku has been harvesting recently a half acre of tobacco. The experiment was in every way most successful.

Mr. D. D. Baldwin's most valuable collection of Hawaiian land shell [the achatinella] and sea shells has been forwarded to Seattle for the exposition.

Home For The Aged

To be Erected on Mani by Hon. H. P. Baldwin.

In memory of Fred, C. Baldwin, son of Hon. and Mrs. H. P. Baldwin there will soon be erected a home for aged people. For some months past Hon. Henry P. Baldwin, Maui's philanthropist, has been making plans for the erection of such a building, and as he left for the Coast, it was understood that the plans were nearly completed. The building is to be located at Makawao in a climate not too warm nor too cold for a home of this sort. Indeed, a better location in the Islands could not be selected. It is understood that old people from all parts of the Territory can here find a home. Architect Kerr is making the designs, and construction will be begun in about two months' time, when Mr. Baldwin will return from the Mainland, where he has gone with Mrs. Baldwin for a much needed rest.

The Advertiser has the following comment to make upon the plans for the home that are now being completed:

The first buildings of the home will accommodate about forty people, and provision will be made for the extension and enlargement of the home to meet the requirements of the future. Homelike accommodations and privacy are the two essentials that Architect Kerr has obtained in the preliminary plan for the home that he has drawn up.

The buildings that will be first constructed will consist of four cottages, two to consist of eight rooms each and two to have six rooms. There will be a general sitting-room in each cottage. The cottages will be connected with the main building by verandas, the general plan of the buildings calling for the adaptation of the quadrangle system.

In the main building will be located the quarters for the help, offices, dining-room, hospital and auxiliary departments. In the center of the grounds there will be a sun bath, a swimming pool and a pergola.

The site for the home has been set aside by the Maui Agricultural Company and is an excellent one for the purpose in view. Particular attention has been made so as to allow for the enlargement of the home in the future if it be found necessary.

It is estimated that the cost of the buildings now planned will amount to \$30,000, all of which has been contributed by Mr. Baldwin.

and philanthropic work of this group of Islands, which has been left by the first missionaries, it has seemed best to some of those interested to incorporate the Association. This past week a charter was granted to the following incorporators: H. P. Baldwin, D. C. Lindsay, F. F. Baldwin, H. A. Baldwin, Rev. R. B. Dodge, Rev. E. B. Turner, Rev. T. A. Waltrip, all of Maui, and Rev. Henry P. Judd of Honolulu.

The Association has been organized for the purpose of rendering aid and assistance to Churches and religious institutions affiliated with the Board of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association, and to educational and charitable institutions of the County of Maui. It is provided that if there should be sufficient funds on hand that aid may be given similar objects outside of Maui County. The charter is granted for a period of fifty years. The Board of Trustees will consist of from seven to nine members, and there is a provision that other than trustees may be members of the Board, and that out of the total membership the Trustees are to be elected.

The by-laws of the Maui Aid Association provide that the Evangelical Association of Maui, Molokai and Lanai, shall have the right to nominate two ministers to membership on the Board of Trustees, but that these nominations are subject to ratification by the Board of the Hawaiian Evangelical Association. The officers of the Maui Aid Association shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and auditor. The first meeting for the election of these officers is soon to be held.

Maui is to be congratulated upon such an efficient organization of its religious and philanthropic activities.

A Good Record. The report of the County Attorney that has just been filed with the County Clerk shows a most excellent record in the criminal cases conducted by that office and one that it is claimed has never been equalled in any county at any time in the territory.

There were One Hundred and Thirty two cases presented by the County Attorneys office and a conviction was secured in each and every case. There was another case where the County Attorneys department had made a careful investigation and it was decided to ask that a nolle prosequere be entered. Private counsel was employed by the prosecuting witness and a request was made that the case be allowed to go to trial. This was done and the trial conducted by the private counsel and the accused was acquitted.

The County Attorney in his report gives much praise to the deputies in the office and to Deputy Sheriffs Crowell and Morton.

Strikers' Aid Association

Is Formed In Wailuku By Japanese.

The Maui Strikers' Aid Association was formed last Sunday after a five hours session held in the school house. A few of the leaders from Honolulu were present.

The session lasted from nine o'clock to two at which time the organization had been perfected and the officers elected and a plan of action perfected.

N. K. Otsuka, the court interpreter, came into the News office and stated that the members of the organization especially desired that they be not misunderstood. That they did not expect to call a strike here unless the employers interfered with their programme. That their object is to collect money from local people to assist the strikers of Oahu and forward the money to the Higher Wage Association of Honolulu.

Their plan is to collect money from the laborers and others and demand money from the business men, professional men and contractors. In case any business man refuses to give the amount demanded he will be boycotted. In case any contractor refuses to pay the amount asked by the organization then a strike will be ordered of the men in his employ.

The large contractors will be expected to put up from \$500 to \$1,000 each and others in proportion.

ORDINANCE NO. 14.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 18 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 7, ENTITLED: "AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE REGISTRATION, IDENTIFICATION, USE AND OPERATION OF MOTOR CARS; AND THE EXAMINATION AND QUALIFICATION OF CHAUFFEURS."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Supervisors within and for the County of Maui, Section 1. Section 18 of Ordinance Number 7, is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Any person violating, or failing to conform to, any of the provisions in this Ordinance contained shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in a sum not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, together with costs of Court, and in event of default of payment of such fine and costs, shall be imprisoned until the same shall have been discharged by operation of the general laws applicable to such cases."

Minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and the same were ordered approved as read.

Communication No. 155, one same being a tender for the construction of the Wailuku Stables and Engine Shed from Chas. O'Sullivan was read.

The Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Chas. O'Sullivan that his bid is received too late, and to return to him his check.

Mr. Meyer moved that the Chairman be authorized to endorse the check. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Claim demands for the Makawao Belt Road deferred from yesterday were taken up for examination.

Mr. Lyons moved to defer action on claim demand No. 646 to the next meeting of the Board. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Mr. Lyons presented Resolution No. 214 thereby approving payroll and material and supply demands for the Makawao Belt Road and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Communication No. 145 together with report No. 101 of the County Attorney on the communication were taken up for consideration.

Mr. Haia moved to adopt the report of the County Attorney in the matter of the claim of A. Fernandez Jr. thereby refusing the payment of the claim. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Communication No. 145 and Report No. 101 ordered placed on file. The matter of the authorization to engage an Assistant Engineer was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Meyer moved that the matter of Assistant County Engineer be referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. Seconded by Mr. Lyons and carried.

Communication No. 147 taken up for consideration.

Mr. Lyons moved that we approve the appointment of Jas. R. Love as Clerk of the Treasurer at a salary of \$60.00 per month, appointment to take effect from the 15th of May, 1909. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried.

Matter of License Inspector was referred to the Ways and Means Communication Matter of securing a seal for the County Treasurer was taken up.

Mr. Lyons moved that the design submitted by the County Clerk be adopted as a seal for the Treasurer. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Mr. Lyons moved that the request for changes in the office as recommended by the treasurer be referred to the Ways and Means Communication. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Matter of furniture for the Treasurer's office was referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

Communication No. 147 ordered placed on file.

Matter of Fish Markets taken up for consideration. After some discussion Mr. Haia moved to postpone Mr. Haia moved to postpone further consideration until 3 p. m. this afternoon. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Communication No. 141 ordered placed on file.

Communication No. 148 was taken up for consideration.

Communication No. 156 of Chas. Wilcox, Secretary pro tem County Executive Committee of the Republican Party in re recommendation

was read. The matter of the endorsement of the application of John Garcia as Clerk for the Sheriff was ordered referred to the Sheriff.

In the matter of the endorsement of the Fish and Food Inspector for Hana Mr. Haia moved that the application of S. K. Pupuli for said office be tabled. Seconded by Mr. Lyons and carried.

Communication No. 148 and No. 156 ordered placed on file.

Communication No. 157 of Henry Birch for compensation for right-of-way at Papaea was read. Action deferred temporarily.

Mr. Haia presented Resolution No. 215 thereby authorizing the Clerk to purchase flags and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution No. 216 thereby appropriating the sum of \$1086.07 to a fund to be known as Unpaid Claims County Government 1904 and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried, by the following vote: W. F. Pogue, W. P. Haia and T. T. Meyer, T. B. Lyons and Geo. Kauhi excused from voting on account of pecuniary interest. Matter of the Park site for Wailuku was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Lyons moved that the Governor be requested to perfect an exchange of Government land for 6.65 acres more or less immediately south of the K. R. R. depot at Wailuku as shown by the accompanying blue print, and 1 acre more or less near Hon. S. E. Kaiue's residence the latter lot to be for stable purposes. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Copies of this motion to be sent to the Commissioners of Public Lands and the Manager of Wailuku Sugar Co.

The Clerk was also instructed to communicate with the Governor and state to him that the matter of the exchange for the park site has been taken up by the Board with Mr. Penhallow, Manager Wailuku Sugar Co. and he has promised to communicate with the directors of the Wailuku Sugar Co. in regard to the matter.

Communication No. 157 again taken up for consideration. Mr. Haia moved to defer action to 2 p. m. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

At 12:30 p. m. the Chairman ordered a recess to 2 p. m.

Afternoon Session.
The Board was called to order at 2 p. m. Chairman W. F. Pogue presiding.

Mr. Haia moved that the Clerk be instructed to notify Mr. Henry Birch that the County will live up to the agreement made on May 6, 1907 and will pay him for all land taken according to the terms of said agreement. Seconded by Mr. Lyons and carried. Communication ordered placed on file.

Mr. Haia moved that the Chairman be authorized to sign on behalf of the County the agreement between Mr. Birch and the County of Maui of date May 6, 1907. Seconded by Mr. Lyons and carried.

Communication No. 158 of J. M. Vivas was read. Mr. Haia moved to refer the communication to the Market Communication. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Mr. Haia moved the matter of the rearrangement of offices be referred to Ways and Means Communication. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

Mr. Haia moved that the Board meet in special session on the 26th of May to consider matters in connection with the reorganization of the treasurer's office, and all other matters that may be brought before said meeting. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

The County Attorney presented a draft of an Ordinance to amend Section 18 of Ordinance 7. The same was read.

Mr. Haia moved that the Ordinance be approved as read. Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried. The Ordinance adopted is as follows:

The matter of the fences on Vineyard Street was taken up for consideration. The County Engineer submitted plans showing street lines of Vineyard St. Mr. Lyons moved

that the matter should be referred to the County Attorney with instructions to take such action as may be necessary to protect the interests of the County in the premises. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Report 103 of the County Engineer as submitted above was ordered placed on file.

Report No. 78 was ordered placed on file.

The Clerk submitted the bond of Chas. Wilcox Auditor. The County Attorney having certified to its being in due form, Mr. Haia moved to approve the said bond and have the same filed with the County Treasurer. Seconded Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Mr. Meyer presented Resolution No. 216 thereby declaring the office of Sanitary Inspector for Molokai vacant and moved the adoption of the same. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

Mr. Lyons moved that the matter of the complaint of Lui Sylva be postponed to this evening at 7:30 p. m. and that Mr. Sommerfeld be notified to be present.

Seconded by Mr. Meyer and carried.

The matter of the complaint of Lui Sylva was taken up for consideration. Mr. Sommerfeld explained his position in the matter. No action taken.

At 9 p. m. Mr. Meyer asked to be excused. Permission granted.

The matter of the changes in the Aheong contract recommended by the County Engineer was taken up for consideration. Mr. Lyons moved to approve the estimate of the County Engineer on the new culvert at Kuiaha and to authorize the County Engineer to negotiate with Contractor Aheong the changes up to and not to exceed \$1200.00. Seconded by Mr. Kauhi and carried.

There being no further business, Mr. Kauhi moved to adjourn. Seconded by Mr. Haia and carried. Adjourned 9:30 p. m.

Kahului Railroad Wants to Build Wharf.

Honolulu, May 11.—The directors of the Kahului railroad, Maui, met yesterday at Alexander & Baldwin's head office and took preliminary action in regard to harbor improvement. It was decided to apply for a license from the Territorial government to construct a wharf and dredge a slip capable of accommodating the largest A. H. vessels that call at the port. Major Winslow will visit Kahului shortly to investigate the matter for the Federal government, which also has some jurisdiction in the premises.

Until the return of Superintendent of Public Works Marston Campbell, no further work can be done in the matter of a new wharf at Kahului. A meeting of the directors of the Kahului railroad company was held yesterday morning, at which the matter was discussed.—Advertiser.

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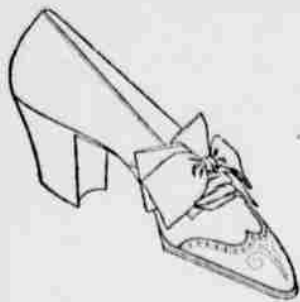

HONOLULU, May 25.—Nearly all Japanese laborers on Oahu are now on strike.

Waialua and Ewa men quit yesterday.

It is estimated that there are 7,000 laborers out.

Waianae Japs return to work after one day's rest.

Consul Uyeno visited all of the plantations in an automobile. It is claimed the strikers can hold out three months. The plantations were never in better shape to resist.

The Japanese Merchants Association yesterday passed resolutions to endeavor to prevent the spreading of the strike and to cultivate a better understanding between capital and labor for the furtherance of general peace and prosperity.

A special meeting of all plantation managers of Oahu was held yesterday.

Baker is in jail charged with bigamy on cable advices from Chicago.

H. P. Baldwin sailed on the Makura today.

The Supreme Court has decided that private counsel may be employed to prosecute cases.

Humorist George Ade passed through for the Coast on the Siberia yesterday.

MESSINA, May 25.—The severest seismic shock since the great earthquake was felt yesterday. There was a fearful panic but no casualties reported.

REGGIO, May 25.—Earthquake refugees attacked the barracks. The soldiers fired killing six and wounding many others.

LONDON, May 25.—Langford knocked out Hague, the new British heavyweight, in the fourth round of a twenty round go.

ATLANTA, May 25.—Striking employees of the Georgia Central Railroad want all negroes discharged from the service of the company. Arbitration has been refused by the Company and the strike may spread to other roads.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The Supreme Court has found Tennessee deputy sheriff and four others guilty of contempt of court in not preventing the lynching of a negro who had been granted an appeal.

HONOLULU, May 23.—The strike procession failed to materialize.

Waianae Japanese out and the situation at Kahuku is in abeyance.

Japanese merchant feels the pinch and will use their influence to stop the strike.

All of the small stores in the vicinity of the strike will have to close if the strike continues.

Chinese strike breakers threaten to strike because of discrimination.

Oahu plantation has 300 men at work.

HONOLULU, May 24.—Waialua threatens to strike this morning.

Waianae men talk of returning to work today.

Makino is agitating at Waimanalo with the hope of getting the men out.

The Kamehameha was the only yacht to get over the course in the Irwin Cup race yesterday. There was no wind.

H. P. Baldwin will build a home on Maui for aged white persons.

LISBON, May 24.—China has made a demand on Portugal to renounce her claim on Macao and dependencies. British intervention is threatened.

AGUSTEA, May 24.—As a result of strikes the Georgia Central Railroad has shut down. The management asks for the protection of the militia.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Meyer announces the naval programme to be two Dreadnaughts, two destroyers, and one repair ship.

HONOLULU, May 22.—There is an unconfirmed rumor here that the Wailuku Japanese have walked out.

The Waianae men quit yesterday but have made no demands.

Kahuku is quiet. All of the Japs are out.

Oahu and Honolulu Japs will march to town behind a brass band this afternoon.

No disturbance is feared but the sheriff is prepared.

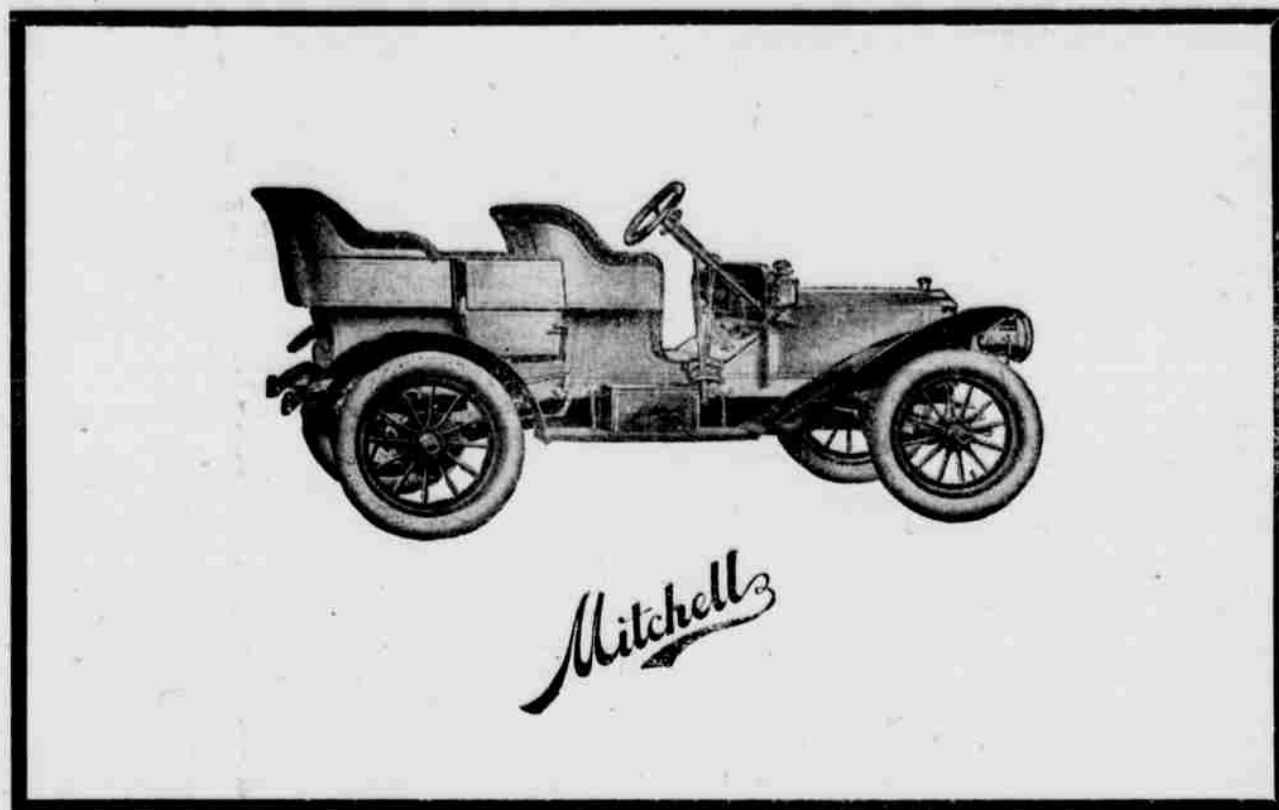

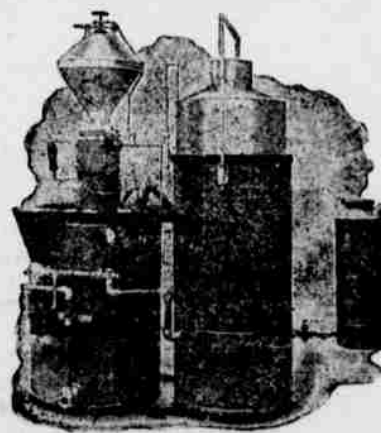
