AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 18 OF ORDINANCE NUMBER 7, EN-TITLED:- "AN ORDINANCE RE LATING TO THE REGISTRATION, IDENTIFICATION, USE AND OPE RATION OF MOTOR CARS; AND THE EXAMINATION AND QUALI-FICATION OF CHAUFFEURS."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Supervisors within and for the County of Mani. Section 1. Section 18 of Ordinance Number 7, is hereby amended so as to




