## SIR CHARLES DILKE.

London, June 6.—Sir Charles Dilke and Lady Dilke are in Paris, on their way back to England. Dilke has been interviewed by a reporter. He says that he is giving his entire attention to literary work. ## AN EARTHQUAKE IN CANADA.

Quebec, June 6.—News has been received of an earthquake which recently occurred in the vicinity of Saint Louis, in County Lister, Quebec. The mountain in the second range of Roch Des Aulnais were greatly disturbed. Masses of rock from forty to fifty feet square were dislodged and sent hurtling into the valley below. Some of the largest trees in the forest were uprooted. No serious accidents are reported.

## BLUE RIBBON LEAGUE.

It was intended that the Blue Ribbon League unite with the ladies of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union to-morrow evening in a reception and sociable in honor of Mrs. Margaret Parker, the world's organizer of the W. C. T. U., who was expected to arrive. For some reason the lady was detained in California, and the proposed reception is postponed. Meantime a programme of the usual high order has been prepared, and will be given by the League to-morrow evening at 7:30 o'clock at the hall of the Y. M. C. A.

## FITCH VERSUS FITCH.

Judge Wallace has granted Mary Emma Fitch a divorce from George L. Fitch, with permission to resume her maiden name on the ground of the husband's extreme cruelty.

The motion for alimony was withdrawn, upon the defendant's surrendering to the wife the community property, consisting of a house and lot on Haigh street, valued at \$8,000, and receiving as his share \$3,750. The plaintiff also retains all the household furniture, carpets, etc., valued at \$2,000, and all the pictures, valuable paintings, etc.—[S. F. Daily Report, June 30.]

## COMPLIMENTARY TO CAPTAIN MORSE.

Captain H. G. Morse of the Royal Mail Steamship Alameda, was the recipient of a handsome testimonial and pleasing personal recognition by the Earl and Countess of Aberdeen and the other passengers on board, on her last upward trip. The passengers as a body presented the popular commander of the equally popular Alameda with an address and purse. Upon the termination of the voyage Lord and Lady Aberdeen expressed themselves as being greatly delighted with the trip from the Colonies, and with the attendance, equipment and performance of the ship. As an expression of personal appreciation they presented Captain Morse with a valuable breast pin, shamrock device, in diamonds, sapphire and rubies, in a box suitably addressed. The Countess likewise gave him a large square for framing, having a sketch in circle at each corner, of Sydney, Auckland, Honolulu and San Francisco, drawn by herself when entering and leaving these harbors; also the ad-

dress of the passengers with the original signatures engrossed on parchment, and bound in book form in Morocco.

## THE THISTLE AND IREX.

A match race between the yachts Thistle and Irex, was sailed on the 27th June, over the Northern Yacht Club course. The Irex is allowed 7 minutes and 30 seconds on a full course of fifty miles.

The Thistle won the race, covering the course in 4 hours 9 minutes and 40 seconds, the Irex' time being 4 hours 17 minutes and 46 seconds. The Thistle saved her time allowed the Irex and won by 1 minute and 3 seconds.

## MEN-OF-WAR COMING.

In the course of the next month or two several men-of-war may be looked for at Honolulu, comprising ships of American, English, French and Chilean flags. Of the British flags, the Conquest, Cormorant and Triumph may be expected. A French man-of-war, the Decres, and another vessel about as large have been ordered from Tahiti, and the finest cruiser of the Chilean navy, the Esmeralda, a craft comparable to the Charleston, is making ready for sea. Provided these vessels arrive about the same time, the natives will have a chance to see quite a concentration of naval forces in this harbor.

## FRIENDS FROM AFAR.

Just before sailing from Honolulu in the Alameda on the 4th of June, the Earl and Countess of Aberdeen were much gratified by receiving from some unknown friend, a thoughtful greeting in the form of a portion of the map of the Hawaiian Islands, showing Honolulu, and on the other side of the paper a similar map of Lord Aberdeen's own home district in Aberdeenshire, Scotland; also some copies of local Scotch newspapers of interest to Lord Aberdeen. Some kindly words of good-will were added. This souvenir gave no clue to the name of the sender, although Lord Aberdeen endeavored to ascertain from whom it came.

Leaving a balance of \$14,249 82 cents out of \$40,000 appropriated by the Legislature of 1886.

The approximate cost of other goods expected from Allen & Robinson, to wit, fire-axes, buckets, iron smoke tubes, valves, springs, copper, etc., is \$830.00.

Seven thousand two hundred and twenty-four dollars and twenty-five cents will be required for wages, bills, rents, wood, coal, oil and telephones, up to March 31, 1888, which deducted from the balance of the appropriation leaves \$6,195.57, to keep up the wear breakages, and losses of apparatus.

Balance in favor of the Department as per Engineer's books, \$21,429 82.

Balance by Interior Department books, \$21,146 58; a difference of \$283.34.

Goods to the amount of \$1,590 47 were ordered on the former appropriation, but had to be paid by this which reduces the present appropriation to \$38,409 50 instead of \$40,000.

The Chief Engineer said the difference of \$200 between the books of the Survey Engineer and the Interior Department's was caused by the Minister purchasing fire-axes, etc., on his own responsibility during the April blaze and it was all right.

After reading several communications it was agreed to follow the advice of Judge Preston by allowing the same Engineers—Wilson, Asch and Hustace—to remain in their positions until another election.

The Board will meet again next Thursday when instructions will be received from the Court.

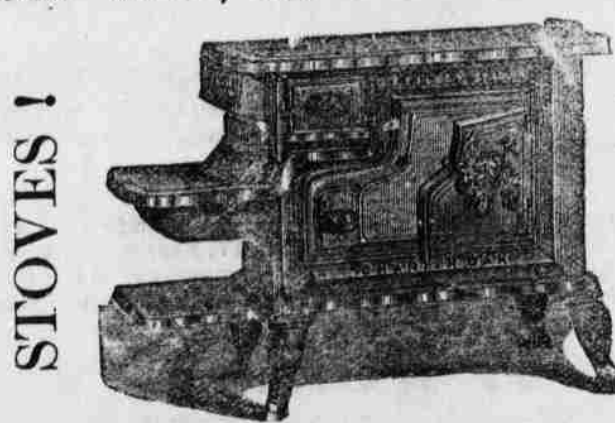

### PANAMA CANAL.

Chicago, June 27.—W. J. Gillespie, a native of Chicago, who for the last two years has worked in a responsible position on the Panama Canal, arrived here from Panama Saturday. He is in the employ of an American dredging company which is working on the canal.

There are from 12,000 to 14,000 men altogether at work on the canal at present," said Mr. Gillespie, "but if the canal company does not soon get another loan the work cannot go on much longer. There has been the grossest mismanagement in every direction. The parts of the canal that have been excavated have been allowed to fill up with clay washed down by the river, so that much of the work has to be done twice. Immense quantities of useless machinery, made principally in Belgium, are strewn all along the route, lying idle and rusting. In some places the line of the canal has been changed after being cut, so that a new cutting had to be made to fill in the old one. There is much mismanagement in every direction, and such a general slipshod way of carrying on the business that if they had all the money they wanted, I don't believe they could have the canal finished for ten years.

#### THE GREAT PROBLEM UNSOLVED.

New York, June 27.—The Times, in editorial concerning the Panama Canal, says: Those familiar with the official reports concerning the Panama Canal will not be surprised by the announcement that the chief executive officers of the canal company have left the isthmus in a hopeless frame of mind. The end seems to be near. The company's money is almost exhausted. Unless the shareholders and bondholders shall without delay raise additional millions to be thrown into the ditch, the work will be entirely suspended and a great scheme will collapse. But it is possible to procure more money. The cost of the Suez Canal was less than \$100,000,000. The Panama Company's obligations already exceed \$245,000,000 and only a beginning of the work has been made, while new and apparently insurmountable obstacles have recently been encountered and must be added to the great problems still unsolved that had been foreseen. It may be noted that at least we have confessions of serious embarrassment and probable failure from some of the company's prominent officers and employees. The time seems to be at hand when De Lesseps must lose the confidence of the French people.

The Times also asks: If the company shall abandon the work what becomes of the proposed canal? It is said that some disgusted officers expect that the United States will finish it. But the people of this country do not long for an opportunity to make such an investment. Probably the shareholders and bondholders will exert great influence in an attempt to induce the French Government to complete the ditch in the hope that thus a part of their money may be saved. If that attempt shall be made a new chapter in the history of the canal will be opened, in which certain international questions must be considered.

#### A COLPORTEUR AND TOBACCO.

Terms of membership, fifty cents a month, payable quarterly in advance. No formality required in joining except signing the roll.

Strangers from foreign countries and visitors from the other islands are welcome to the rooms at all times as guests.

This Association having no regular means of support except the dues of members, it is expected that residents of Honolulu who desire to avail themselves of its privileges, and all who feel an interest in maintaining an institution of this kind, will put down their names and become regular contributors.
