The Bishop's Notices.

The Anglican Church in Hawaii, having its synod, held in the city of Honelula, on the second and following days of December, 1901, solemnly promised allegiance to the constitution and canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America; the said constitution will go into effect on January 1 1908, and all appointments made by the Bishop of Honclulu and licenses sened by him subject to the order of the Church of England will require, provided they are in accordance with the constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church to be renewed subtook of common prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, and if not renewed within nifteen days after the said first day of January, 1902, will become null and

Election of wardens and vestrymen for St. Andrew's Cathedral under the new order, in effect January 1, 1902. All male communicants of the

Anglican Church in Hawaii, or of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States (not under the age of eighteen years), who have been residents in Hawali since July 1. 1901, or who shall have registered their names in the registry book of the Cathedral wardens on or before the 9th day of January, 1902, will be entitled to vote at the election of wardens and vestrymen of St. Andrew's Cathedral for the ensuing year, to be held in the Cathedral school room on Friday, the 10th day

of January, 1902. The registry book will be open for signatures every evening in the cathedral school room from Monday, December 30, 1901, to Thursday, January 9, 1902, from 7:30 to 9 p. m., inclusive, excepting Tuesday, December 30. Wednesday, January 1, and

Petition for Charter. Yesterday morning the Bishop fil ed with Treasurer Wright a petition for an amendment of the charter of the Anglican Church. The petition was accompanied by an engrossed copy of the new charter and was signed by Alfred Willis, Bishop of Honolulu, president; Alex. Mackintosh, secretary; Henry Smith, treasurer; Geo. S. Harris, Vincent Howard Kitcat, Luke Aseu, Edmund Stiles and Solomon Meheula.

The petition includes certified copies of the minutes of the proceedings of the synod and the special meetings of the Trustees, which give the reasons for the application for an amended charter as follows:

Petition to Treasurer.

The petition, after setting forth the decisions in favor of amending the charter, at the recent meetings of the Diocesan Synod and of the trustees of the church, proceeds asfollows, giving reasons for the change:

"In consequence of the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands by the United States of America. an arrangement has been made between the Ec clesiastical authorities of the American church in Hawali and the Ecclesiastical authorities of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, whereby the Anglican Church in Hawaii accepts the jurisdiction in spiritual matters of the Protestant Episcopal Church

"Under its present charter, the corporation of the Anglican Church in Hawaii holds all its property to be faithfully applied to the purpose and use of establishing and maintaining the church of the Anglican Communion within the Hawaiian Islands. according to the Doctrines of the Church of England, as the same are explained and contained in the book of Common Prayer and in the form

"The circumstances in which the Anglican Church in Hawaii is placed in consequence of the annexation of the Islands by the United States of America require the adoption by the said church of the same changes in the Formularies of the Church of England as were made by the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States in America, when the American colonies became independent of Great Britain. "That the changes made in these

Formularies in the United States did

not affect Doctrine, may be shown first by the solemn declaration in the Preface to the Book of Common Prayer and administration of the sacraments and other rites and ceremouse of the Protestant Episcopa Church in the United States of America, in which, after inviting a com parison of the Book of Prayer of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States with the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England It is said: which it will also appear that this church is far from intending to depart from the Church of England in any essential point of doctrine, discipline or worship, or further than local circumstances require; and secondly by the close inter-communion which has always been maintained between the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States and the Church of England.

## DANGEROUS TO LIFE AND PROPERTY

## Recommend Electrical Inspector

Coroner's Jury Devotes Much Time to Seeking Information Leading to Cause of Ah Fai's Death-The Verdict Calls for Some Needed Reforms.

Had the wires of the Hawalian Electric Company, entering the store of A. E. McInerny, and carrying a high voltage of electric fluid, been subjected to necessary and proper precautions, would young Charles Ah Fai have met his tragic death Saturday evening?

This is the question which a picked jury, summoned by Coroner Charles Chillingworth, wrestled with for the greater portion of yesterday afternoon and evening. At a late hour last night the verdict rendered by Messrs. Charles Wilson, R. C. Geer, Wm. Berlowitz. John H. Wise, R. Kellett and A. P. Taylor, was one in which the electric company was mildly censured, and at the same time suggestions were put forth for the appointment of an electrical inspector.

The verdict read as follows: That one, Charles Ah Fai, came to his death at Honolulu, Island of Oahu, Territory of Hawaii, on the 28th day of December, A. D. 1901, from an electric shock, received from a switch in the store of E. A. McInerny, in said Honolulu, connecting the wires in said store with the wires of the Hawaiian Electric Light Co., while said Charles Ah Fai was in the act of turning on the current, and if necessary precautions had been used by the Hawaiian Electric Light Co., it is the belief of this jury that the deceased, Charles Ah Fai would not

And in view of the expert testimony of the electricians adduced in the case this jury believes that the wires of the Hawilan Electric Light Co. are in a condition dangerous to property and life owing to improper wiring and lack of necessary attention.

Therefore, this jury recommends that the Superintendent of Public Works appoint a competent inspector to inspect all electric wires in the city of Honolulu, with the power to condemn and to perform all other such acts as in the premises may seem meet.

## JURY INSPECTS LAND AT PEARL HARBOR

66 Full and Complete's Lunch

Marshal Hendry Held Responsible for Disaster to Mule Wagon---Thoroughly Enjoyable Trip.

The members of the jury in charge of Marshal Hendry took the regular morning train, leaving the depot in Conolulu at 9:15 o'clock.

While there was no conversation between the members of the jury and outsiders except on boundary mattern, the jurors, among themselves, discussed the conditions of the land as they found them and exchanged ideas on everything pertaining to the leasehold desired to be condemned.

The land involved in the case was carefully studied on its own merits and as affected by surrounding lands. The proposed location of a dry dock was inspected with a great deal of interest and special attention was given to anything which in any way affected the property favorably or oth-



## NOT A GOOD

HUMPHREYS DISAPPROVES BONDS

JUDGE OBJECTS TO WAIALUA AND MCBRYDE PAPER AS SECURITIES.

Court Protests Trust Funds-The Master's Report-Minority Bondholders are Unsecured-Provision of Territorial Law-Circuit Court Business-Probate Matters.

Judge Humphreys declined to approve of investments in bonds of the Waialua Agricultural Company and the McBryde Sugar Company by the guardian in the estate of Annie T.

Parker yesterday morning. Guardian Alfred W. Carter had reorted in his accounts an investment pointed to report on the accounts as master, was directed by Judge Humphrevs to look into the affairs of the McBryde Sugar Company and give his opinion on the value of the bonds as a security for the investment of

peared for the guardian yesterday morning and claimed that the investment was a nerfectly safe security

The Minority Helpless. The attention of the attorney was called to a provision of the law of the Territory relating to mortgages, which makes the minority holders of mortgage bonds helpless in certain instances. A minority of the stockholders would be at the mercy of the majority in the event of foreclosure, although the \$750.000 issue of the bonds of the McBryde Sugar Com pany was fully secured by the property in pledge.

Judge Humphreys ordered the guar dian surcharged with the amount invested in McBrvde bonds and interest at six per cent from the date of investment. A written decision will be filed later.

The master's recommendation for an increase of the guardian's bond will not be followed, said Judge Humphreys, as being excessive. The amount will be fixed when the matter has been further considered.

"Where a plantation borrows \$750,-000 on a trust deed," said Judge Humphreys in answer to Attorney Robertson's argument, "which can only be foreclosed by consent of a majority of the bondholders, the minority of the bondholders are without any security at all. The minority bondholders, of which this estate is one, are unsecured. The minority have not one bit of security for their money. The majority are well secur-

Judge Humphreys said the bonds note, but that the guardian of an estate was not supposed to invest in promisory notes, however good they

"The master's report filed herein on the 12th day of December, 1901, was referred back by the court for further investigation as to the quality of the security of the bonds of the Waialua Agricultural Company, Ltd., in which the guardian has invested \$4,000, and those of the McBryde Sugar Co., Ltd., in which the guardian has invetsed

"In confermity with the instructions of the court, the master has made inquiry and taken evidence, according to the custom and practice of this court in such matters, from the officer and employes of both companies and of others. The evidence taken at the hearings and in connection therewith has been transcribed and the transcript is hereunto annexed and hereby, made a part hereof.

The Waialua Bonds.

The master finds: "1. As to the Waialua bonds. The capital stock of the corporation is \$4. 000,000, all outstanding and all paid up. The stock is quoted in the market at Honolulu at 55 per cent of its par value. The total assessed value of the corporation's property last January was \$3,500.000, and a large amount of noney has been expended upon permanent improvements during the present year. The trust deed which was given by the company on April 1st of this year to secure its bonded indebtedness authorizes the sale of bonds in the amount of \$1,000,000, of which \$610,000 worth have been sold and the balance of \$290,000 worth are still in the treasury of the company. Said trust deed contains the following clause: 'In case of default in payment of interest on any of the bonds hereby secured, the coupons therefor having been presented and payment demand ed, should such default in payment continue for the period of three months after such demand, then and thereupon the principal of all of said bonds, outstanding and unpaid shall, at the option of the holders of a majority of said bonds, signified in writing become immediately due and payable, provided that non-action of any of said bondholders in case of any defoult shall not extend and shall no effect any subsequent default or any rights arising therefrom.' Said trust leeds convey all of the property of the corporation. Though the property is new, it is well developed and is expected to pay dividends in a year.

The McBryde Bonds. 'As to the McBryde bonds. The capital stock of the corporation is \$3,500, 000, of which \$3,313,880 is outstanding and paid up and \$186,120 is in the treasury of the company. The stock is now quoted on the Honolulu market at about 25 per cent of its par value. The assessed value of the entire prop erty of the corporation last January is said to be \$1,242.815 and about \$792. | Gor. Punchbowl and Halekauila Sts

The trust deed given by the company conveys its entire property, authorizes an issue of \$750,000 in bonds and contains practically the same clause as to the right to foreclose upon non-payment of coupons as is quoted above. The entire issue of bonds has been sold. The company was organized in 1898, is being rapidly developed and is expected to pay its first dividends in a



To these gifts of good augury others vere soon added of meal, figs. a little piece of money, or a date covered with a light layer of gold-leaf-an expressive wish to the person who received the offering, for by it was shown the desire to call down upon him in the course of the coming year sweetness and abundance in the things necessar to life.
