VANCOUVER AND CHINA LINE.

Amongst other recent schemes for facilitating the transport of passengers and merchandise across vast distances by land and by sea, the latest to be put in actual operation is the great round-the-world route from Liverpool to Halifax, thence by Canadian Pacific R. R. to Vancouver, and then to Japan and China by the new steamers of which the first, The Empress of India is now on her way to her Pacific headquarters at Vancouver, B. C. She is already reported at Port Said with a full complement of passengers who may choose their port of embarkation for the return voyage by Montreal, Halifax, Boston or New York and so home to Liverpool.

The Empress of India will be quickly followed by her two sister

ships the Empresses of China and Japan. A description of the first will serve for each of the three. They are 5,920 tons gross, 585 feet length, 51 feet beam, 36 feet depth, built of steel, divided into fifteen compartments, and has a cellular double bottom four feet in depth and seven feet under the engine-room. The engines are 10,000 horse-power in two sets of treble-compound in separate engine-rooms, the bunkers hold 1,600 tons of coal with a possible reserve of 400 tons more so disposed as to form a protection to the engines and boilers.

The contract speed was eighteen knots with forced draught, and sixteen and a half with natural draught. At her trial trip she made 18.68 knots and 16.06 continuous test for 500 miles.

Each ship is designed to carry 200 saloon passengers, 60 second cabin and 500 steerage, is lighted with electricity throughout and carries a search light on the bridge of 10,000 candle power.

Each vessel is fitted according to Admiralty requirements with two platforms forward and two aft, able to mount quick-firing guns of 4.7 inch bore. The passenger accommodation is said to be superb. Family cabins, dining saloon, library and boudoirs, first and second class smoking rooms, baths and every luxury and convenience. The outward bound passengers on the initial trip of each ship will visit Gibraltar, Naples, Port Said, Ceylon, Bombay, Singapore, Hongkong, Yokohama and Vancouver, thence by rail across the continent, with liberty to choose their own transatlantic route.

These ships may yet prove of great interest to the Kingdom. At a banquet given on the 13th of December, on the occasion of the launch of the Empress of Japan, the second of the trio, Lord Hartington stated that he trusted that through the agency of this company he hoped that direct communication would be opened up, not only with China and Japan, but also with the Australian colonies.

If this latter prediction should prove to be true, Honolulu will probably be a port of call, certainly, if the harbor be ready for ships they will not only call "off" the port and discharge and pick up a few passengers, but may come in and do a vast amount of business in a very short time, their cargo capacity being about 4,000 tons. But ships 120 feet longer than the Australia will want 27 feet of water and proportionate wharfage. When shall we be ready for them?

There are one or two just such snappers in town, and if some good old athlete who has been training at the Gymnasium for a few weeks would just take this class of amateurs, mop up a square or two of the streets with them, give them a lesson or two in different poses, etc., and a few other general ideas, it would be a wholesome set of lessons that would hereafter save lots of film.

It is a pleasure to take up such a clean, neatly printed sheet as that which is struck off monthly from the press of the Kamehameha School—strong is the contrast with some other sheets which seem to be printed with water and ink "half and half." On another page, the editor tells where the big boys have gone that have left the school, and what they are doing. Another large audience greeted the company, the house being filled in every part. His Ex. Governor Dominis, Mr. Jas. W. Robertson, H. M. Chamberlain, and Mrs. Robertson occupied seats in the Royal box. In the box on the opposite side were Hon. W. H. Cornwell and ladies. One of the upper boxes was occupied by Dr. Taylor of New York and a party of ladies and gentlemen. The front of this box was very handsomely decorated with flowers and evergreens. In the body of the house were a large number of our most prominent society people.

The leading character in Faust is undoubtedly Mephistopheles, which was personated by Mr. W. H. Hamilton. With regard to this gentleman's performance the voice of criticism must remain silent, and only that of the highest praise be heard. Such grand singing has rarely been heard in our opera house and in addition to his artistic qualifications as a vocalist his acting throughout was marked by dramatic feeling of the highest order. There is one prominent feature of Mr. Hamilton's singing and that is his clear enunciation. It always enhances the pleasure of an audience to hear what a singer is singing about. The large audience showed its approval of his efforts by the warmest kind of applause.

Miss Mouri as Margaretta gave a charming representation of the character, singing with great brilliancy and fully confirming the favorable impression created on the opening night. The jewel song was a vocal gem.

Miss Myers took the dual roles of Sibbel and Marta, and especially distinguished herself by her clever work.

Mr. Stantini as Faust was thoroughly successful, and the part of Valentino was well sustained by Mr. Langlois.

The chorus sang excellently, and the opera was mounted with much care, the whole stage arrangements as well as the effects and scenery, evidencing a laudable desire on the part of the management to give as perfect a performance as possible.

SHIPPING NOTES.

She returned again to Fanning's Island and remained there about 4 days. The return trip occupied 20 days. Favorable winds set in, and it is light N.E. winds set in. The Kaolaki sighted Hawaii one week ago, but encountered bad weather, and was unable to reach Honolulu sooner. She brings about 30 tons of guano from Fanning's Island. Mr. William Greig, owner of Fanning's Island, was a passenger by her. He is accompanied by his children, Mr. W. H. C. Greig, clerk with Lewers & Cooke, has returned from his trip to his natal land.

The steam-whaler Belvedere brought 70 barrels sperm oil.

The whaling bark Mars has cleared for the Arctic Ocean.

The steamers Kinau and Mokilewa due this morning from windward ports, and the C. R. Bishop, from Koolau.

The bark Santiago went to the old Custom House wharf yesterday to discharge coal.

The bark Sonoma will be docked at Fort street wharf to-day to discharge coal. She arrived here from Newcastle with about 1,100 tons coal on February 28th, and this is her first chance of finding a wharf to unload her cargo.

The steamship Australia sailed March 10 for San Francisco, with 22,500 bags of sugar, 2,270 bags rice, 1,233 hides, 3,314 skins, 778 empty barrels, and 3,321 bunches bananas. The shipper was: W. G. As the mainmast gallant yard was being lowered, a kink formed in the balyard, causing it to slip from the bits just as the order was given to the men to clear the space where the yard was to come down. The yard fell with a crash, striking the above-named sailor on the head, killing him instantly. It struck him also on the side, tearing it open and pulling the intestines, heart and other organs from within, making a ghastly sight. The ship surgeon could only view what was left of the poor fellow. It is thought he leaves a sister in Boston; he was a G. A. R. man.

Honolulu Athletes.

The Honolulu Athletic Association will give its first outdoor exhibition next Tuesday, March 17th. A number of prizes will be given to the successful competitors in the different races, etc. All competitors must deposit one dollar as an entry fee which will be returned upon their competing at the course. The Hawaiian Band will furnish music. The games will excite considerable interest, and as admission to the grounds is free, a large number will no doubt be present.

SUPPOSED INCENDIARY.

Hon. Antone Rosa's House Burned.—Almost Total Loss of Household Effects.

The Hon. Antone Rosa's house on Nuanu street, above School, was destroyed by fire on Tuesday morning. Mrs. Rosa, who occupied the front room of the building, was awakened from her slumber by some creaking noise outside, and she tried to run out, although suffering from illness. When she got into the parlor, she found almost the whole of the front veranda enveloped in flames, and rapidly gaining on to the main body of the building. Mrs. Rosa gave the alarm to the central station, and at the same time arousing her two daughters, who were sleeping in the room at the rear of the building. Mr. Geo. Rosa, who was in a small house behind the large building, was then aroused. Mr. E. S. Damon, son of Hon. S. M. Damon, who lives on the opposite side of the road, was the first to arrive at the burning house, and he described how the fire made quick work of the wooden structure, so quick that when the Mechanic Engine Co. 2 arrived half an hour later, the fire had everything in its grasp, and nothing could be done to save any of the furniture. Engine Co. No. 5 followed after the Mechanic, and the other fire companies arrived when these had full control of the fire. Everything valuable was swept away by the fire, and what was saved was an ice-chest and two bureaus. A bed, dearly prized by Mrs. Rosa, a piano, all silver utensils, and in fact, all the furniture, perished in the flames. Yesterday morning loving hands managed to find some clothing from the ruins and saved them, but most of them were either burnt or scorched by the fire, rendering them almost valueless.

Mrs. Rosa has been lying ill for a month, and it is with no small difficulty that she walked from her bed to give the alarm to the other members of the family.

Hon. A. Rosa is at Kauai carrying on cases at the Naniwai Court House. The news of this loss will reach him this morning by the steamer Mikahala. It was only a short while ago that his house was threatened by fire. Members of the Fire Company who arrived first at the scene of the conflagration, testified that they smelled kerosene oil in the front part of the building. And in a singular fact that the fire burned in spots on the veranda more thoroughly than in other places, showing where the oil was. The chairs that were placed promiscuously around the veranda when the people retired, were found to be piled around the door, proving the fiendish object the incendiary had in view.

The Native Sons of Hawaii.

This society met on Tuesday evening at Milliani Hall (Arion), for the purpose of making preliminary arrangements for celebrating Kamehameha III's birthday on Tuesday next, March 17th. It was passed that the society hold a meeting at their hall at 11 o'clock on that day, when selected speakers will give patriotic addresses relative to the occasion. One of the officers of the society will explain the principles under which the society was organized, so as to enlighten suspicious people who believe it to be a secret society. A luau will follow the addresses. In the afternoon the members will march out to the Makiki grounds to witness the sports given by the Honolulu Athletic Company. In the evening a calico ball will take place; invitations will soon be issued.

Squared Accounts.

A man by the name of Connelly took passage on the Australia Tuesday. He evidently did not wish to be covered with leis or chatted with by friends on deck. He had serious reflections; he went beyond the rude gaze of the public and to think. Captain Fehlberr with two assistants broke in upon his reveries just before the steamer sailed and politely asked for the \$85 due Mr. Gomez, the jeweler, which was perhaps cheerfully paid. Such is life in the tropics for those who wish to get off without paying their honest debts before leaving the Islands.

A large number of people assembled at the wharf Tuesday noon to witness the departure of the Australia. The Royal Hawaiian Band played farewell music making the scene both pleasant and affecting.

California Past and Present.

A recent number of the Fruit
Trade Journal contains an interest-
ing article under this heading,
the substance of which is as follows:

"In 1849, those who were attract-
ed to California by alluring stories
of the gold buried beneath its soil,
little thought that the day was not
far distant when the name of that
State would be so dear to the fruit
consuming population of the coun-
try. Happily, the once great dis-
tance between the East and Cali-
fornia has been greatly lessened by
the improved facilities of rapid
transit and quick transportation,
and we are obtaining a more in-
imate knowledge of the re-
sources of that semi-tropical State.
The pioneers of California found
the seasons of seed-time and har-
vest new and strange to them. In
June, they saw russet brown hills
and sun-parched plains, but a later
autumn and a longer winter of
verdure, springtime following har-
vest, and growth and vegetation
during what had been the winter
months in the home they had left.
Slowly the suggestions of nature be-
gan to be understood, and to-day the
arts of horticulture and agricul-
ture, as they are practiced in Cali-
fornia, are known nowhere else in
the world. The failure of the fruit
and vegetable crops in the East the
past year, caused large shipments
to be sent from that great garden
spot of America. In 1874, California
shipped East only 200 pounds of
raisins, and in 1889 sent 34,393,500
pounds. In 1880 there were sent
East only 590,000 pounds of dried
fruit and 5,180,000 pounds of green
fruit, while in 1889 the quantity
had risen to 33,000,000 pounds of
dried, and 50,000,000 pounds of
green fruit. The increasing de-
mand for fruits is shown by the
fact that thirty years ago, there
were imported into the country
300,000 boxes of citrus fruits. Since
1882 the shipments from California
have increased from 917,000 pounds,
to 20,000,000 pounds. Last year
Florida produced 2,150,000 boxes
and California 780,000 boxes, and
there were imported 3,354,963
boxes and 11,927 barrels of these
fruits alone, the sale having in-
creased fourteen fold.

Gift to Mills College.

Mrs. William Meek of San Lo-
renzo has just given \$3,000 for the
purpose of founding a scholarship
for Mills Seminary in memory of
her husband, who was one of the
first trustees of the institution. It
will be known as Mr. and Mrs.
William Meek's scholarship. This
makes the twelfth such scholarship
belonging to the college.—Call.
