

## MEMORANDUM

TO: Chairman Fred Harris

### PROPOSAL FOR AN EXPERIMENT IN FUND-RAISING AMONG SMALL CONTRIBUTORS

This is simply the germ of a plan for experimenting with several techniques for raising funds simultaneously in several selected states where critical Senatorial, Congressional, and/or Gubernatorial campaigns will be waged in 1970.

The chief announced goal for the Democratic National Committee, under this plan, would be to find new or successful ways to raise money from small contributors for the 1972 campaign. The very effort itself should yield worthwhile publicity.

But other potential benefits could accrue to the Senate and House Campaign Committees, the participating state committees, and the 1970 candidates themselves: actual cash raised as well as several non-financial benefits.

### Background

Many people have proposed and sometimes tried (e. g. Byron Allen in Minnesota, Dan Kimball in California, Beardsley Ruml nationally in 1952) a variety of techniques for raising campaign funds from small contributors. Alexander Heard's classic book on campaign finance, The Costs of Democracy (Chapel Hill: University of North Carolina Press, 1960), is a virtual catalog of techniques.

A mistaken belief exists among many party officials that small contributor drives cost more than they raise. Though sometimes true, the verdict seems to point in the other direction. (Ken Birkhead, now of Senator McIntyre's staff, has thoughts on this from his DNC fund-raising experiences.)

Whatever the ultimate financial verdict may be on Dollars for Democrats drives (since I have seen only a detailed evaluation of the 1959 drive, which was favorable), there were clear-cut non-financial benefits such as

strengthening precinct organization, arousing party worker enthusiasm, and heightening voter interest.

### The Present Need

Virtually every Democratic Party committee -- from the DNC through the Comanche County Committee -- gives the impression of destitution. While only fat cats may ultimately bail the party out, the image of the Democratic Party as the "party of the little guy" desperately needs reinforcement. Goldwater in 1964 and Wallace in 1968 usurped the little guy's largesse. Any small-contributor drive, if well-publicized, can help the image -- and raise at least some money for the Democratic Party.

Even if new schemes designed to shift financial support from fat cats to small contributors should fail, additional pressure on Congress and the state legislatures to lower campaign costs (viz., the forthcoming Hart-Pearson TV proposal) or to authorize tax deductibility is the likely result.

### An Approach for 1970

My suggestion is to select several techniques from the grab-bag of proposals and adapt each one to a different 1970 campaign situation where money and motivation are needed. In a sense, this would be a competitive experiment (or demonstration): Which technique works best under which conditions?

The best compendium of small-contributor techniques I know is Alexander Heard's book. Some of the obvious ones are "A Buck a Month", payroll deduction schemes, panhandling by certificate, and chainletters, both postal and human. A little research and ingenuity should yield several new variants.

Perhaps some six state situations could be selected for 1970:

The Vermont Senatorial/Gubernatorial campaign in Vermont (I mention this because my idea germinated in conversation with Phil Hoff, who is interested.)

A similar Senatorial/Gubernatorial campaign in a Midwestern state.

Close Congressional campaigns in, say, California, Ohio, a Southern state, and Colorado. (The Colorado Second District would, I think, be ideal for generating funds and cross-factional collaboration.)

Further reflection might dictate doing everything through state committees, but I suspect that some Congressional District or county committees (e.g., Lancaster, Pa.; Montgomery, Md.; Ramsey, Minn.) would do a superb job -- if positive results are wanted.



Fundamentally, I see this as a DNC experiment -- coordinating and publicizing it -- in a search for money answers for 1972.

Obviously, the Senate and House Campaign Committees would have to be willing to collaborate, as would state and local committees in selected areas.

A lot of problems remain: sources of seed money, initial leadership, division of funds raised, possible interference with other fund-raising schemes, and intra-party rivalries.

But I think only Democrats would come out ahead -- even if the total dollars raised are less than ample. The non-financial benefits spelled out above -- publicity, heightened enthusiasm, pressure for legislation -- may be quite as crucial as money.





Dear Fred:

First, let me congratulate you on the tremendous initiative you have shown since assuming the awesome position of National Chairman.

I am pleased with this opportunity to express some thoughts on Party activities, because I have long felt that proper liaison between the National Committee and the Hill was woefully lacking.

Traditionally, National Committee operations have fallen into desuetude between national elections. By and large, Party functioning, fund raising, policy making and the host of other obligations incident to Party membership have been borne during those interim periods by the Administration when it was Democratic and by the Congress when the Administration was Republican. Obviously, we are faced with a case of the latter today, and so it is all the more imperative that the Congressional voice in the affairs of the National Committee be clear and strong.

I want to see a strong National Committee; but I want to see a strong National Committee that recognizes the existence of Congress and one in which the Congress has a real participatory role.

The figures show all too clearly that the total Democratic Congressional vote in a Presidential election year exceeds the Democratic Presidential vote, except in rare instances. Members of the

House and Senate have a better and more direct line of communication to the public back home than do National Party officials who might or might not hold public office, and who might or might not be beholden to the public will.

In summary, then, I believe that the task forces you have appointed, while they should be representative of a cross section of the Party and the Nation, should have strong Congressional representation maintained on them.

Sequential to the formation and structuring of these task forces is the necessity of seeing to it that they remain active and that they meet frequently, e.g., every month or every two months, similar to the recently agreed upon schedule for the Party Caucus here in the House.

On the mechanical side of the issue, there is a great deal of workaday assistance which could be rendered by the National Committee to Members of the House and Senate.

A few years ago, the National Committee initiated assistance programs designed to facilitate communications between Members of the House and the media in their respective Districts. On paper it was a tremendous idea. Somewhere along the line, however, it became hopelessly botched up, and I know I suffered some rather humiliating experiences with the media in Syracuse. For instance, on a number of occasions I made TV tapes which were to be processed by a National Committee contractor here in Washington, with a guarantee that the tapes would be processed and on their way within a matter of hours. On numerous occasions I contacted the TV outlets in Syracuse to let them know that I would have a 1- or 2-minute statement on subject X for that evening. As a favor to me, they would factor my statement into their schedule. More often than not, I would have to call the stations back and tell them to cancel the time slot because the film had not been processed, or the film had been destroyed, or the film had not been delivered to the airport on time.

The Committee also established a project whereby Members would tape a radio statement over the phone to the Committee and the Committee would then call the designated radio stations on a conference line and rebroadcast the tape to them. A fine arrangement, on paper. But frequently they would fail to call one or two of the stations,



thereby implying my partiality, or they would call the stations and fail to give them a lead.

I finally threw in the towel on both operations, although I felt and still feel that, properly run, they would be of tremendous assistance to a Member.

Another mechanical aid which the Committee could facilitate would be the establishment of a liaison system whereby Members could be notified when prominent Democrats, in or out of office, will be in Washington so that suitable arrangements could be made either for conferences or for picture taking sessions. This would not be too difficult to set up if it were structured along the lines of our Protocol Office. It would not only facilitate better personal communications among Party members across the Nation, it would provide a press advantage to individual Members of the House and Senate and would enhance the image of unity within the Party, which raises a collateral point.


Having lost the principal unifying element in the Party, i.e., the Administration, it is incumbent upon us to devise new methods, new projects and new tactics. I would hope that one of your first tasks as Chairman would be the selection of (a) key (man) men whose sole purpose would be to visit every section of the country in an effort to heal the wounds of '68 and to return to the fold those who left either frustrated or disenchanted.

These are but a few of the ideas I have been kicking around. I hope they blend in with your revitalization program. I shall be happy to sit down and discuss in more detail these and other thoughts at a mutually convenient time.

Again, thanks for offering me this opportunity to express my views.

Dear Dan:

For the past many weeks, we have been engaged in discussions of my campaign plans and prospects. At the same time, you have had under consideration the campaign problems of other Democratic senators who are up for re-election.

During our discussions, it was pointed out that the Republican Policy Committee has on its staff 21 persons while our Policy Committee employs six. It was stated that most of those on the Republican staff are engaged in essentially political work and that the Democratic Leadership does not look with favor on increasing the size of our staff.

I believe this point raises broad questions which we cannot afford to drop until answers are found. As I have made clear, I do not have sufficient staff to do the research and writing jobs that I believe must be done if I am to mount an effective campaign in 1970. For reasons all too well understood, neither the Democratic National Committee nor the Campaign Committee are able to provide such services at this time.

These facts are not pointed out in the spirit of criticism. You and your associates have a tremendous task ahead, and I know from personal experience how hard you are working. But you and we must have the means to do the job. As we have mentioned on many occasions, the election of 1970 involves not only those whose seats are up. At stake also is control of the Senate.

The plain fact is that we were out-manned and out-gunned financially in the last election. To rely simply on the same staff arrangements and essentially the same fund-raising methods is to try to conduct

the coming campaign as though it were the campaign of 1968. Can we do that and win? I fear not. We must increase previous levels of campaign activity. Therefore, I strongly believe we should make two moves promptly:

1. We must provide more campaign muscle from within the Senate. This may be done either by increasing the size of the Democratic Policy Committee staff or by mobilizing assistance from other Majority Committee staffs to help do a political job. It is probable that the Republicans built up their Policy Committee staff to compensate in part for the additional committee staff enjoyed by the Democrats (as a group) on Capitol Hill as well as for help previously available to us from the executive departments. The latter is now gone. Therefore, we are trying to reverse an unfavorable political tide with much less concrete help than we had before. I realize that we have already been criticized for having more committee staff assistance assigned to the Majority than to the Minority (and we can anticipate more criticism) and that this may be a reason for the reluctance of the leadership to add to the staff of our Policy Committee. Nevertheless, we must have more staff assistance than is now mobilized if we are to be successful next year.

2. We must begin an investigation into campaign financing which will turn the spotlight on the fact that the Republicans are raising many times the amount available to us. We are constantly criticized for using labor money. Yet, during the last campaign, they spent several times what we did, failed to report it on time, and were criticized less. One purpose of such an investigation would be to induce the networks perhaps to repeat their offers of free time and make it available to Congressional races. Another would be to impress on the public the fact that money is increasingly more significant in deciding who will represent them in Congress. Several subcommittees could undertake such an investigation; the choice should be made after decisions on the angle of the study.

I recognize, of course, that the whole area of campaign financing regulation is such a mess that we have been hesitant to open it up.

In sum, I believe I am trying to say that we cannot expect to win the campaign of 1970 using the level of effort of past years. In 1964, we had going for us a new and popular legislative program, plus the White House

and prosperity with little inflation. Since then, we have run afoul of many issues and have been left in the dust politically and financially. Those who prefer the Republican brand of government see the chance of several decades to make their dreams come true. We must soon raise our sights if we are to put together a political program that will stop them.

On Wednesday and Thursday of this week the Senatorial Campaign Committee conducted two full morning conferences on the use of TV media in political campaigns. We had present four exceptionally talented experts who explained how critical the media has become and who emphasized how important it is to begin the media planning right now. We had very good staff representation, but very poor attendance by the candidates. Only one Senatorial candidate showed up for both days and three others for part of one day.

I am personally convinced that it is critically important that the candidate himself be directly and deeply involved along with his staff and the professionals in the development of the media campaign. No one but the candidate can make the final decision on what kind of image he wants to project on television and what variety of issues he wants to use.

From my own experience in developing TV/radio media campaigns four times in the past 10 years - - including 1968 - - it is pretty clear to me that the best political stuff put on the air in 1962 would have at best been mediocre in 1968, and passe in 1970. Any media campaign for 1970 that is not in the planning stage right now is behind schedule.

The four experts who appeared are willing to reschedule their appearances as soon as any group of six or seven Senators is prepared to set aside a morning to do it. The experts are: Joseph Napolitan, President, Joseph Napolitan Associates, Inc.; Shelby Storck, President, Shelby Storck & Co., Inc.; Leonard Grossman, President, Astrafilms, Inc.; Charles Guggenheim, President, Guggenheim Productions.

I have asked Nurdy Hoffmann to contact your office so that we can set up two more sessions as soon as possible. After these sessions we will bring in some experts in the use of radio and time buying. I hope we can reschedule these sessions within the next 30 days.


