ROUND THE ISLAND SEA TOURS

The government owned and operated MANUSINA, equipped with latest navigational gear, air-conditioned, and fitted with soft seats, now takes tourists around Tutuila Island three times a week. Tours go on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays and leave from the Customs Building dock area at 9:00 a.m. Estimated time of return is 2:00 p.m.



The Manusina calls at Aunu'u Island and also into about four remote villages. Villages on the picturesque north shore nestle in small coves, framed by green jungle-covered hills and cliffs. Villagers come out to the boat to obtain school supplies and mail. Put this down on your list as a must for the things you will do in Pago Pago.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE MUSEUM

Located on traditional Mauga-o-Ali'i (Hill of Chiefs), Government House itself an item of history and residence of the territory's chief executive, has also become a cultural museum. Visitors can call at the museum on Thursdays and

Fridays from 2 - 4 in the afternoon, or from 10 to 12 noon on Saturdays. Special visits for groups may be arranged by calling Mrs. Haydon directly. Fine mats, stone adzes, siapos (tapas), 'ava bowls, woven items, and many other cultural objects await to be viewed and photographed at Government House.

Government House was built in 1903 at a cost of \$18,651 and has been the home of our chief executives ever since. During World War 11 a Japanese submarine fired three bombs into Pago Pago harbor; one missed Government House by a few yards. That was all Samoa ever saw of the great war.

SEA PLANE SERVICE BETWEEN APIA AND PAGO PAGO

South Seas Airways, using a six-seater Piper Cherokee, is now operating four times a day, four days a week between Apia, capitol of Western Samoa, and Pago Pago. The first morning flight leaves the Pago Pago Inter-Continental Hotel area at 8:00 a.m.; the last one arriving back from Apia at 5:45 in the afternoon.

Air tours of Tutuila Island and flights to Ofu Island in the Manu'a group are also

NEW HOTEL ON TUTUILA

American Samoa's second hotel now promises to have 22 rooms ready by June 15. The owners say that a restaurant, bar, and swimming pool will also be completed by this deadline. Location is about one half mile west of the airport road and seven miles from town. There is no name yet for the new hotel, but refer to it as the Malaeimi Hotel – Malaeimi being the name of the place where it is being built. For those of you who were in American Samoa recently, think of the Air New Zealand personnel housing. That's the spot.
