OCEAN STEAMSHIP SUBSIDIES.

The arrival yesterday morning of the *Suez*, the first of the line of the Oceanic Steamship Company, which proposes to run regularly between these Islands and the Coast—is an event of importance. It has become quite apparent of late that the rapidly increasing trade on this route requires more and better accommodation than we now have, both for freight as well as passengers. We are assured by the President of the Oceanic Company, that they will have in actual service on this route, before the end of twelve months, two boats which are being specially built for them, and that the *Suez* is merely chartered as a pioneer.

It is to be expected that the matter of subsidy for ocean steamship lines will come up for discussion in the Legislative Assembly. In the Appropriation Bill as submitted by the present Ministry, the item appears under the head of the Department of Finance, "Subsidy to Ocean Steamship Lines, \$50,000." The Pacific Mail Co. have been paid the past two years about half that amount, or at the rate of \$1,000 per month. Does the administration propose to subsidize both the Pacific Mail and the Oceanic Co.?—seeing that they ask for a sum total at the rate of \$2,000 per month for the two years. Or it may be that they intend to drop the Pacific Mail and subsidize the new line only. Undoubtedly we shall get some light on this subject when the item comes up, probably some time next week.

OUR LEGISLATORS.

It is quite plain, "are altogether too wise to wear themselves out by overwork during this hot weather. They had a very brief afterluncheon session on Tuesday, and adjourned to eleven o'clock on Wednesday. At half-past eleven yesterday there was no quorum, and those that did put in an appearance concluded that it was not worth while to try to have any session that day, and so they separated, to meet this morning, at ten o'clock. Grave matters of State should not be hurried.

Mr. Editor:—"Whom the gods wish to destroy, they first make mad." This ancient saying appears to be in course of illustration right here and now. I can't say positively as to the wishes or intentions of those mythical personages, "the gods;" but a somewhat familiar acquaintance with the Hawaiian people leads me to conclude that if not yet quite mad, they are fast drifting into that condition. Just look at the Legislative Assembly, for instance. Shortly after the elections last February, the present leader of the Ministry, then editor of the *Advertiser*, declared in that paper that the men elected were good specimens of the ability and patriotism of the country, and intimated that in fact they were the best men for the positions. Who believes that? No one, I venture to assert, who has paid any attention to the proceedings in the Assembly during the thirty days and more that it has been in session. Among the Representatives, instead of the energy and industry (often at fault, I concede) that used in former years to be apparent, the members now seem to lack both of those qualities in a lamentable degree. To be sure, they have no one particular man among them who is an acknowledged leader; and it must be added that those who in former years were bold and outspoken against an extravagant use of public moneys, such as is proposed, it would seem, by the present administration, are now but seldom heard to even expostulate. Whither are we drifting, and what must be the end of this legislative madness—or perhaps we should say legislative inanition? Are these the premonitory symptoms of a collapse? Would that the Hawaiians could be made to see the breakers towards which their ship of State is drifting. ALOHA HAWAII.

PRISON OVERSEERS.—Complaint has been made that some of the overseers of native lunas over gangs of prisoners at work, have been in the practice of showing partiality to some in the way of work, and it has been asserted that bribes have been received by such overseers. The question arises, how could a State prisoner have money in possession wherewith to give bribes? We hear that the subject is to be investigated by the Marshal.

Garfield, for from \$500 to \$1000. The latter is of the same stock with the Colt, hence the reservation.

The funeral of the late Captain Hope, of H.B.M.'s *Champion* was largely attended yesterday afternoon, the remains being deposited in the Nuuanu Valley Cemetery. The escort consisted of the King's Guards, Officers, Marines and Sailors of the *Champion*, who fired three volleys over the grave, which was made by the side of that of Capt. Macham, of H.B.M.'s *Vixen*, who died here some twenty years ago. Among those who followed the bier we noticed His Majesty's Minister of State, Foreign Officials, members of the Legislative Assembly, His Majesty's Staff and that of Governor Dominis, and many prominent citizens. During the progress of the procession, minute guns were fired from a battery of the Hawaiian Artillery and from the *Champion*.

WASHINGTON, June 5.—Chief Justice Carter and Judges James and Hagner, constituting the District Supreme Court in bank, to-day rendered a decision upon the last motion filed by Reed on Guiteau's behalf. The Chief Justice delivered the decision as follows: "In the case of Guiteau, the Judges who listened to the argument in the case have come to the conclusion that they have exhausted their powers upon it; that they have heard it patiently, fully and fairly, and that re-argument would bring no other conclusion than that already arrived at, and they decline to re-open the case for argument."

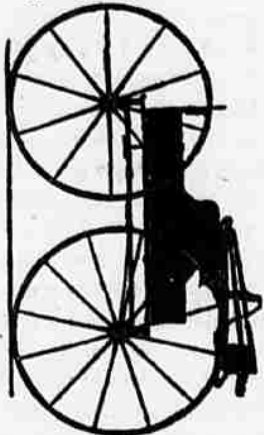

There is one woman in Burmah who will have her rights, peacefully if she can, forcibly if she must. London *Vanity Fair* says:

King Theebaw, of Burmah, the biggest bully and brute in the world, has at last found his match in a woman who can assert the rights of her sex. The queen was recently confined with her third child, which proved a daughter. Now King Theebaw desires to have an heir to the throne, and he resolved, therefore, like Napoleon, to provide himself with another wife. 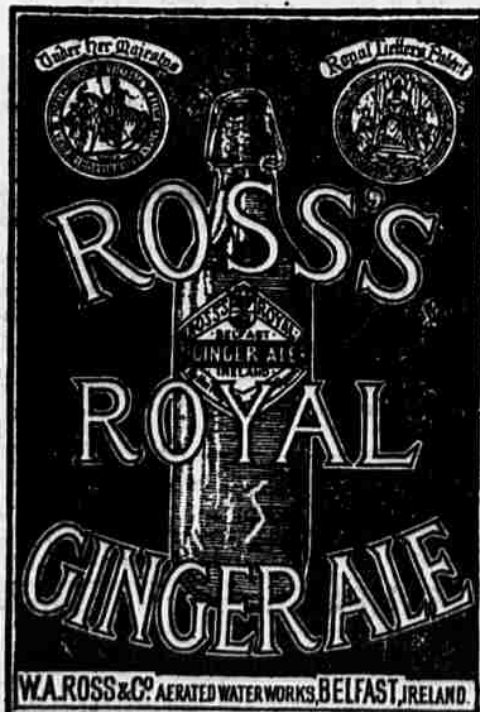
