The Lady's Will.

The will of Lady Francis Hope—who was May Yohe—which was made, signed and witnessed an hour before her departure for the Orient with Captain Putnam Bradlee Strong, is now locked in a lawyer's safe in New York.

The testament was drawn up hurriedly and Attorney Martin Stevens, who drafted the document, is the only person at this end of the continent who is aware of my Lady's bequests and beneficiaries. But a short time before the Nippon Maru sailed, Attorney Stevens was sent for and instructed to draw the will. When he returned to Captain Strong's stateroom with the document Customs Appraiser Jacob Shasn was requested to affix his signature as a witness.

"I know nothing of the contents of the will," Mr. Shasn says. "I was on duty on the Nippon Maru. I was acquainted with Captain Strong and he requested me to witness a document. The lady signed the will in her stateroom and I merely signed as a witness."

Boers Still In It.

LONDON, July 23.—The British War Office has received the following dispatch from Lord Kitchener, dated Pretoria, July 23:

"A train from Cape Town, with 113 details and stores, was held up, captured and burned at Scheepers, eight miles north of Beaumont West on the morning of July 21st. Our casualties were three killed and eighteen wounded. An inquiry is proceeding.

"French report that Crabbe, with 300 men, was attacked in the mountains near Craddock with Krutzinger at dawn July 21st. The horses stampeded. An all-day fight followed. Crabbe fell back on Mortimer. Our loss was slight."

Elks in Mormondom.

MILWAUKEE (Wis.), July 24.—Salt Lake city was honored by being selected as the next meeting place of the Grand Lodge of Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, and Grand Rapids, Mich., captured the first prize in the big Elks parade this afternoon. The Toledo "Cherry Pickers" were awarded second and the Chicago contingent third moneys. The Greenville (Miss.) lodge was given first prize for the most unique display in the pageant.

Albanians Behead Turks.

VIENNA, July 24.—Albanian insurgents and Turkish regulars have had several encounters on the Turkish frontier. Many have been killed and wounded on both sides.

It is reported that the Albanians cut off the heads of their prisoners and triumphantly carried them on poles through Albanian towns. It is also reported that the Turks massacred their prisoners.

A Hot Time.

Throughout the States of the Middle West the stilling, withering heat continues. It not only threatens a complete loss of crop, but has left the farmers without feed or water for their stock and without protection against fire. For over a month in Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and the Indian Territory the thermometer has been above the hundred mark, and scarcely a drop of rain has fallen. And now the drouth is extending to Kentucky, Tennessee, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Iowa, Nebraska and the Dakotas. The damage already done will run into the millions; but even that is slight in comparison with the losses that will result unless relief comes soon. The thirty-six days' drouth has been marked by frequent electrical disturbances, which for the moment brought a hope of relief, but they quickly passed. Some of the maximum temperatures reported yesterday are: Davenport, 104; Denver, 90; Des Moines, 100; Indianapolis, 96; Kansas City, 102; Memphis, 102; Omaha, 102; St. Louis, 106; St. Paul, 100; Springfield, 100; Washington, 98; Springfield, Mo., 106; Bismarck, 106.

Any Tysons Here?

FORT WORTH (Tex.), July 24.—There will be a meeting held in this city August 13th of the Tyson heirs for the purpose of arranging for the distribution of the vast fortune left by John Tyson, who died in Melbourne, Australia, two years ago, leaving an estate valued at \$52,000,000, about one half of which is cash in the Bank of England, the balance being in railroad and mining stocks and realty in Melbourne.

The call for the meeting was issued by Thomas U. and William Tyson, nephews of the deceased, and is being mailed to all heirs that are known to them, there being about twenty all told, four of whom live in Texas, two in this city and two in Johnson county. Thomas Tyson said today that United States Senator Charles A. Culberson would be retained to assist in settling up the big estate. The meeting is to be held at the State National Bank. A brother of the dead man who now resides at Trenton, Ky., will be here to attend the meeting.

Unruly Chinese.

CANTON, (China), July 24.—A band of over forty armed robbers, for three successive nights, have been looting shops opposite Shattien. The Chinese authorities have made no attempt to interfere. The Chinese themselves are alarmed and predict serious trouble. It is understood the foreign consuls have been warned to prepare for an uprising. A magistrate of Shuntah reports that robbers are increasing in his district. Seventy-five robbers have been beheaded on Skertchali during the past two months.

The Tax Commission.

The Tax Commission, authorized by the legislative concurrent resolution passed at the close of the regular session, met and organized yesterday. The members of the body are: Appointed by Speaker Akina of the House, Representatives Emmeluth, Robertson and Makai; appointed by President Kaiue of the Senate, Senators Kalaaukani and Kanuha.

The session was held in the office of A. G. M. Robertson at 4 p. m. and the organization was effected by the selection of John Emmeluth as chairman.

A cordial invitation is extended to all teachers and the public generally.

A Serenade to Teachers.

By the courtesy of Acting Governor Cooper the Government Band will give a concert on board the U. S. Transport Thomas in honor of the teachers now on the way to Manila, at half past seven this evening. The Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Commissioners of Education, and the Heads of the Government departments will be present. All teachers in the City are invited to be present.

A PROMINENT WOMAN GONE.

Com Paul's Wife Dies After a Short Illness

New York, July 21.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: The death of Mrs. Kruger may have some influence in shortening the war. Kruger himself has been reported to be exceedingly despondent over the military operations, and the correspondence between Reitz and Stein has justified his discouragement. His domestic bereavement may cause him to lose heart for continuing the hopeless struggle. His Dutch physicians have been warning him for months against the consequences or excitement, since his heart action is abnormally weak.

A story is brought by influential South Africans that Commandant-General Botha was strongly disposed to surrender but did not consider himself at liberty to do so against the judgment of Kruger. General Botha has a family to provide for and is poor and without resources. South Africans assert he is dependent upon allowances which Kruger has agreed to make for him if he continues the struggle as long as possible.

PRETORIA, July 21.—Mrs. Kruger, wife of former President Kruger of the South African Republic, who died yesterday afternoon of pneumonia, had been ill only three days. She was 66 years old. Mrs. Kruger's long separation from her husband, combined with the death of her favorite daughter, Mrs. Smith, last week, had completely broken her spirit. Mr. Eloff, and many other members of the Kruger family, were at her bedside when she passed away.

LONDON, July 22.—All the morning papers publish kindly editorials concerning the death of Mrs. Kruger and express sympathy with Mr. Kruger. The Times begins thus: "The English people will feel genuine sympathy with the aged ex-President in the severe domestic bereavement which has befallen him." This is followed by an eulogy on Mrs. Kruger.

"Owing to the Sunday telegraph hours in Holland," says a dispatch to the Daily Mail from Hilversum, "Mr. Kruger was not informed of his wife's death until the evening. The news was broken to him by Dr. Heymans and Secretary Boeschoten. Mr. Kruger, who had just returned from church, burst into tears and asked to be left alone. He exclaimed: 'She was a good wife. We quarreled only once, and that was six months after we were married.' He prayed for a long time, and is now calmly sleeping, his Bible beside his bed."

"The Transvaal and Orange Free State flags flying above the white villa were draped and half-masted. Shortly before the news came a crowd of country girls had been singing a folk song outside the villa."

Big Sugar Fleet Arrives.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 20.—A fleet of nine vessels carrying nearly 16,000 tons of sugar arrived in port yesterday. The Diamond Head, with 23,264 bags aboard, was the first to get in. All of the vessels were outside in a bunch Thursday night, but the Diamond Head was the first to get the breeze and come in. She was followed in by the Marion C. Hillcott with 41,432, the Olympic with 38,081, the St. Katherine with 31,509, the Consuelo with 7,202, the Kailua with 22,646, the George Curtis with 48,828, the Transit with 15,300 and the Santiago with 27,100.

The best run was made by the brig Consuelo, which came up from Mahukona in seventeen and one-half days. The next best was the four-masted bark Olympic, twenty days from Honolulu, while the schooner Transit was close up with twenty one days from Kahului. The longest run of all was the bark St. Katherine. She was thirty-three days coming here from Hilo. For that matter, every one of the passages is long, and there is not one of the fleet that has not made the same run within twelve days.
