NOTHING NEW.

From the published correspondence on the subject of Chinese immigration we learn that some 600 laborers are to be allowed to land here within a period of three months by steamers of the P. M. S. S. and O. & O. Cos. lines, facts that were made public six days previously from other sources, like the Protest.

We do not learn how many women are to accompany the males; we do not learn why any other good line of steamers, which, though unknown here, may be well-known in China, should not be allowed to carry them; we do not learn why the members of the Board of Immigration were not consulted in the matter; we do not learn why Chinese, with their small number of females, should be preferred to Portuguese, with their families, who are the most desirable class of laborers for the country generally; we do not learn why the planters, who are expected to absorb the labor, were not, as a matter of courtesy, informed of this proposed immigration two months ago; we do not learn if seventy-five per cent of this immigration is to be paid in Government bonds; and we do not learn anything further or anything definite about that Five Dollar business. In short we only learn what we knew before; and the people will not be content until they know everything. It is only a question of time and the information, now withheld, will be obtained.

Fort Street Church.

Notes From Mr. Cruzan's Sunday Evening Lecture.

Text: 10th chapter and 7th verse of Ecclesiastes:

Say not thou, What is the cause that the former days were better than these? for thou dost not enquire wisely concerning this."

Man possesses a natural instinct which prompts him to seek heights, and from there view his surroundings and the world below him. He who possesses this instinct never ceases until he has set foot on the highest point, but having reached it the grandeur of the scenery above, around and below him will make him more fully realize his nothingness.

So there are moral heights within; 1800 years ago Christ called upon all humanity to come up higher: have we obeyed? Men with long, doleful faces ask what is the cause that former days were better than these and point to a newspaper of the blackest kind wherein is chronicled a list of murders, defalcations and defamations, and consider this criminal record, a photograph of society. It is true that some men hold it their duty to publish these incidents, producing sheets which are not allowed in respectable homes, and can be printed and read only under cover of secrecy. Let us compare the literature of to-day with that of olden times. Homer and Virgil abound with passages which would mantle the cheek of every pure woman of to-day with a blush, yet such literature was read by the highest society in the ancient days of Rome. I do not believe that the world is growing worse, if so, Christianity would be a failure. I believe we are steadily improving and that our literature has improved.

Let us now look at the state of Society. Paul writes of the Romans—:Being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness, full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, backbiters, haters of God; despiteful proud, boasters, disobedient to parents. Which is the darker picture, Paul's epistle or the chronicle of to-day? The Roman Senate was full of corruption but what was the rule then is an exception to-day. Now honesty and uprightness is demanded of an official, not that we have driven stealing from our public offices but every community demands purity, integrity and straight forwardness and when an official is detected in cheating, deceit lying or stealing he is branded hunted down and driven from among us and behind the doors

of the penitentiary and prison he will find his only safety. The days of night, with strong arm and iron hand, is right, are no more. Government is made for man and not man for Government. This is not the age of divine right, he who would exercise it will perish unless he change. Take Christianity in Christ's church, it supplies more fully the wants of humanity than ever before, we are surely moving Christward, Heavenward. Because you who stand low and can not see things do not doubt their existence but come up higher and you will see the same things in the same light as they are seen by men and women who are on an eminence. You would like to be a Christian but the humility, self-denial and sacrifice are too great, yet God is with the man who undertakes this road upward. The royal road to true spiritual greatness lies through humility and must be traveled in humility. We must bow at the foot of the cross and he who overcomes sin and temptation will be raised to the throne.

LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS

WISEMAN has a house on Union street and a cottage on Emma street to let.

LILIHUA Street is being macadamized. Drivers think it would be better to attend first to King Street where there is much more traffic.

A MEETING of the Young Peoples Christian Temperance Union was held on Tuesday night. Several new members were admitted and a pleasant social evening was passed.

At the Police Court yesterday Owen Holt forfeited a \$12 bail for violating the hack rules; Sing Poo was fined \$10 and costs \$1 for heedless driving. Kaula, for furious driving was found not guilty. Three cases of drunkenness finished the business.

CAPTAIN Fuller, Mr. A. W. Peirce and Mr. Thos. Sorenson, who constituted the board of surveyors of the Martha Ride-out, came to the conclusion that if repairs were once commenced on her here would be no knowing where to stop.

Two Americans an Englishman and a Hawaiian discussed loud and long the merits of their respective countries. All were at first opposed to the Englishman, but, knowing his fiscal superiority, they thought it best to cave in and England "bossed the road."

In the account of the Java disaster it is stated that Buettzory "suffered very seriously." The friends of Major Purvis will be sorry to learn that this is the place where his father and sister are living so that he has every reason to feel great anxiety on their account.

THE Superintendent of water-works states that there are no pipes on School street but that those on Emma street are the old ones which have just been taken up and will be removed to the Palace where they will be utilized for conveying water from the artesian well in the grounds.

ON the arrival of the W. G. Irwin yesterday it was rumored on the wharf that Moreno had returned from Italy with the three native boys who had completed their education and were prepared to take ministerial positions. The news spread quickly through town and was telephoned to Government house. They didn't come.

News was telephoned from Paulea on Tuesday that there was trouble among the laborers at Mr. W. C. Luce's residence. Two officers were at once sent to enquire into the cause of the trouble when it was ascertained that three boys had refused work. Authority was sent from the Station House to bring them to town without a warrant.

JAMES Dodd sent from the Coast by the W. G. Irwin 13 horses and a pony, all of which arrived in good order except one of the best horses that died on the voyage. Dodd intends using them for his buses and expresses as he is giving up his livery business altogether, and wishes to dispose of his buggies. The animals, which were bought in Sacramento and San Francisco are a very superior sturdy-looking lot of animals. Dodd himself will return at the end of this month.

At the Police Court on Tuesday three inebriates were mulcted; Ah Son, forfeited a \$5 bail, for driving without lights; Ah, was fined the same amount for the same offence; Pilipo, for assault and battery, forfeited \$10; David for larceny of a picture belonging to James Olds, was committed to trial at the Supreme Court, the picture, value \$50, was stolen from the Empire Saloon; J. Clemens or stealing two rings, was found guilty of larceny in the third degree, and sentenced to six months and a \$25 fine. An appeal to the Supreme Court was noted.

The sky last night after sunset was more brilliant than ever.

His Excellency Governor Dominis was taken ill in town yesterday at noon. He was taken home by Mr. Frank Pratt and attended by Dr. Rousseau, who is fortunately able to report that there is nothing serious the matter, and the Governor will probably be out again in a day or two.

MR. ATKINSON'S school roll now shows over sixty pupils. He has secured the services of Miss Wodehouse as a permanent assistant, M. Marquez as French master and Mr. J. Strong to teach drawing, and will probably, within a week, have another assistant; Advanced classes in Latin and French have been started and a class in book-keeping will commence work next week. Owing to the large number of pupils they will be for a few days a little crowded until extra desks, which have been ordered, are completed.

LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

Paris, Aug. 30.—The treaty of peace between France and Anam allows France to station residents in all the chief cities of Tonquin, who are to be accompanied by the necessary number of troops, and France may also construct forts on the banks of the Red river. The French resident at Hue is to have the privileges formerly refused, of private audiences with the sovereign of Cochinchina, Chinese money is to have currency throughout Anam and the commercial customs and system of taxation are to be regulated by conferences, to attend which the French envoy is about to go to Hue, the Anamites having requested the French legation at Hue to be reopened at the earliest possible day. Champeux has been instructed to proceed thither and assume charge of affairs. Decorations and presents for the king and the Anamite ministers will be sent to Hue shortly. The blockade between the island of Haiphong and Haiduong will be maintained for the present. Harman, the French civil commissioner for Tonquin, who negotiated the treaty of peace with Anam, has been appointed an officer of the legion of honor for his services. A cable will be laid from Saigon to Hanoi.—*Alta California*.
