Streets that are sprinkled with salt water, it is claimed, require much less moisture than those on which fresh water is used. In drying the water leaves a hard crust and this keeps down the dust.



The wisdom of using sea water in street sprinkling is still one of the moot questions of what in modern nomenclature is called "state medicine." Since conditions have compelled its use in Honolulu an opportunity is afforded for exact and scientific observation as to its If you want to buy or sell either results and effects. Valuable additions to applied sanitary science can be made if the Board of Health or some of its members will cause reliable observations on the subject to be made. If sea water should be proved to be the most valuable for street sprinkling purposes, It will have an important bearing on plans for the increase of the city's water supply which must come up for consideration before the next Legislature.

## BUBONIC PLAGUE.

The bubonic plague has made its appearance in several parts of Europe. Public health authorities in every European country are taking active measures to prevent its appearance in their territory and to stamp it out if it should appear. Stringent orders in relation to shipping entering at Southampton, have been issued by the British authorities. Modern sanitary science has made a spread of this plague impossible in any of European civilization, thought it is not so many years ago that it was to be dreaded as much in Europe as in the Orient. One effect of the danger from this plague, notwithstanding it is impotent against scientific watchfulness, will be that sanitary science will join with trade in the demand for the opening up to the light of modern progress the countries of the Orient which are the source and hotbed of the disease.

In nothing has Japan shown her progress since Commodore Perry first brought to her the light of Occidental civilization than in her application of sanitary science. Her quarantine service is as thorough and scientifically conducted as that of almost any nation, and Japan has been taken from the list of Oriental countries which start epidemics to circumnavigate the globe.

What Japan has done for herself, the great trading nations of the world will demand that other Oriental countries shall do for themselves or permit other nations to do for them. The opening up of China to foreign trade will not have a greater commercial effect, than it will have a sanitary effect. The sentiment of common defense against plagues and epidemics will be a factor in the final settlement of the "Far East" question. There may be rivalries and competition among the nations for the trade of the Orient, but they are united when it comes to a question of protection against the plagues of the East.

Hawaii is situated where it is peculiarly in danger. So far the Board of Health by its vigilance has warded off this danger. There is no reason to suppose this will not continue to be the

## PURE FOOD.

The Board of Health has taken up in good earnest and made considerable progress in the pure food question. It is one that within the last few years has engaged the attention of legislatures and municipal boards all over the states. In the application and enforcement of laws on the subject the distinction should be borne in mind between adulterations and ingredients which are injurious to health and those which are simply a cheaper product than the one they are sold for. What is injurious ought to be prohibited. What is not injurious but is not what it is represented to be ought to be required to be sold for what it really is. There is no objection, for instance, to the sale of chicory. But it ought to be sold as chicory and not as coffee. So there are many other things which in themselves are useful and proper, but which too commonly are sold for something else. In an address before the Pure Food Congress held in San Francisco a couple of years ago, President David Starr Jordan of Stanford University gave it as his opinion that pure food laws ought to be based on the principle that every article of food or drink offered for sale if it did not show plainly and unequivocally by its appearance what it was, as ham and eggs for instance, ought to bear on the packages containing it a truthful statment of its composition. In that case every purchaser would know exactly what he was getting and if he choose the cheaper it would be because

# BEER WILL BE CONDEMNED

Prohibits the Sale Because the Beers Contain Salicylic Acid-Only the Bottled Goods Are Effected.

The Board of Health will at once proeed to the condemnation of bottled peers containing salicylic acid. At its meeting yesterday the board gave to Attorney General Cooper instructions in the matter. As soon as possible a note will be addressed to the dealers notifying them that the condemned beer must not be sold.

The principal beer effected by the order will be Enterprise in bottles. This is sold by one concern on Fort street and another on Nuuanu. The order does not refer to draught Enterprise, which is found pure and wholesome. It is of course plain that the deletelrous acid is placed in the bottle for export only. Arrangements will be made to replace it here with the bottle Enterprise put up for use in San Francisco.

The other beer effected is Pilsener, containing 5 per cent of the acid. This is sold in a number of saloons on Nuuanu street, but not in large quantities as the concerns handling it carry Pabst

as the concerns handling it carry Pabst ly demanded in the transaction of legal

as the concerns handling it carry Pabst and other beers.

At the meeting yesterday Dr. Emerson drew attention to the deleterious effect of salicylic acid in food or drink. Dr. Wood agreed with the remarks, but observed that the acid in catsups and the like could do yery little harm for the reason that only a small quantity could be taken at a time. The following resolutions were offered and unanimously adopted: mously adopted:

"Resolved, That salicylic acid is a deleterious substance when mixed with any article of food or drink and as such plete charge of all affairs appertaining injurious to health.
"Resolved, That the sale of any arti

cle of food or drink containing salicylic acid be prohibited."

The Board of Health will take up the The Board of Health will take up the Dr. Howard matter at its meeting next Wednesday afternoon. Nothing could be done yesterday for the reason that a transcript of evidence taken by the coroner's jury had not been received from the deputy marshal. There seemed to be a hitch in this matter. Dr. Howard had refused to sign the transscript of his own evidence, on the ground that, as submitted, it was not complete. Dr. Humphris, it was understood, had also declined for the same reason.

At the hearing both the marshal and the defendant will have the privilege of producing witnesses. It is understood that Dr. Howard is most anxious to have the case thoroughly investigated.
