The Table Turned.

The Island of Moy, situated in the centre of the lake bearing that name in the Highlands of Scotland, is said to have been the scene of a dreadful tragedy. A great battle took place between the Cummins and the Mackintoshes, in which the former were defeated, and, being unable or unwilling to renew the war, peace was proposed and accepted. To celebrate it, the Mackintoshes were invited by the Cummins to a feast in their castle of Moy, the remains of which are still to be seen. RAILROADS.

The rapid advance in material wealth and prosperity which these Islands have witnessed during the past few years, is something wonderful as well as gratifying to contemplate, by those who were familiar with the old snail-pace of twenty or more years ago. Truly, the wilderness has been made to blossom as the rose, and wide tracts of land that were comparatively valueless have become in reality mines of wealth. And this is but the beginning of the era of prosperity that is to come. There are yet vast agricultural resources (vast in view of the limited size of the country) which are to be developed by the building of railroads. Kohala, on Hawaii already feels the stimulating influence of the iron horse; and when the rails are laid through the as yet comparatively undeveloped district of Hamakua, with its many thousands of acres of rich soil, the accumulated deposit of thousands of years,—a noble field for capital and enterprise will be opened up, and we shall show an annual export of sugar that will astonish ourselves, as well as the world. And there are yet other localities which might be named on the different islands, where the construction of railroads will ere long be found not only feasible, but demanded by the growing needs of the country.

Now the progress of science in these days is tending very much in the direction of a reduction in the cost of railroads. The Chicago Inter-Ocean recently made the mysterious but prominent announcement that an advanced step in railroading has been discovered, which will revolutionize that service and put it fifty years ahead of the age. It says the officials of six of the largest and most enterprising roads in the Mississippi Valley have been for several days discussing the new improvement, the nature of which will be soon announced. We shall watch with interest for this new revolution in railroading.

In our issue for Tuesday last, we had a short editorial ("we believe in short editorials") headed "Employers and Employees." The Gazette of yesterday has a short editorial on the same subject, using the same ideas and making the same suggestion with ours of the day before. Of course, it must have been only a coincidence. And if not, what then? It is the fashion for the big fishes to gobble up the little ones, and the little BULLETIN can't expect to be an exception to the general rule.

LEGISLATIVE.

WEDNESDAY, May 17.—There were but two petitions presented; one from Pauoa, near Honolulu, asking that \$3,000 be appropriated for the roads of that locality; and one from Makawao, Maui, that Government lands be sold to natives, and not at auction.

Mr. Gibson moved that the Assembly do now adjourn till Monday next. There was nothing for them to do. Opposed by Mr. Kapena, who said there ought to be something to do; and the motion was lost.

A resolution, requiring the opening of a road from Waihee to Wailuku, Maui, was referred to a select committee.

A resolution by Mr. Kalua, that when the House adjourn it shall stand adjourned until Monday next, was debated, pro and con, and finally passed, 17 ayes to 15 noes.

The Minister of the Interior, in accordance with a requisition of the House, submitted the accounts of the Post-office Bureau from April, 1880, to July, 1881, which were ordered printed.

Mr. Mott Smith from Committee reported the passport act as amended. Ordered printed.

The bill to authorize a Government loan of \$500,000 for immigration purposes was then taken up and discussed on its second reading. Some of the members suggested it be laid on the table. A disposition to carp at the bill as a measure in aid of the planting interest only, was manifested. Recess.

After recess, discussion of the Loan Bill was resumed. Mr. Bishop refuted the ideas of members as expressed, that this was a measure specially in the interests of the planters. Government has not paid anything for the importation of laborers for the past four or five years,—planters and other employers pay the expense of importation. But the planters have no use for women and children, and the Government has, for the purposes of population, not only people to pay taxes, but to become producers. Would favor the bill on that ground.

The motion to indefinitely postpone was lost, and the bill laid on the table by a vote of 22 to 18.

The resolution which was adopted before recess, to adjourn over to Monday next, was reconsidered and indefinitely postponed.

The bill to make the Hawaiian language the legal standard, was referred to the Judiciary Committee. Adjourned.

The "Tourists" appear again tonight at the Music Hall, with a new programme. The chief attraction, however, we expect will prove the "Pin-a-4," a burlesque (in black) of a burlesque.

The regular monthly meeting of the Y.M.C.A. to consider the usual questions of business, will take place this evening at 7.30 o'clock at the Lyceum. Report will be made in reference to plans for the new building. Full attendance is requested.

A mail for San Francisco per W. H. Meyer will close at the Post-office at 11 A. M.

The bark Anna Precht sailed from New Castle for this port the same day as the California. The bark Malay was to sail ten days after for this port.

The bark California arrived yesterday from New Castle N. S. W. She brought a cargo of 1294 tons of coal to Messrs. W. G. Irwin & Co.

The bark Kalakaua sailed for San Francisco yesterday. She took away 6311 pkgs sugar weighing 628,375 pounds, and 2339 bags of rice. Domestic value \$49,804.82.

Spreckels Bro.'s new vessel Emma Claudina left Hilo for San Francisco Monday, May 15th, with a full load of sugar from the Waiaken and Papaikou plantations.

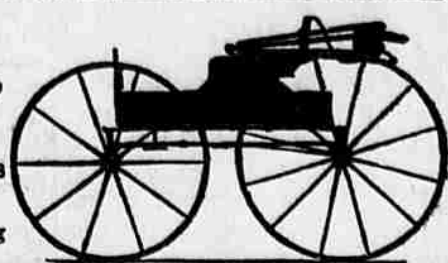

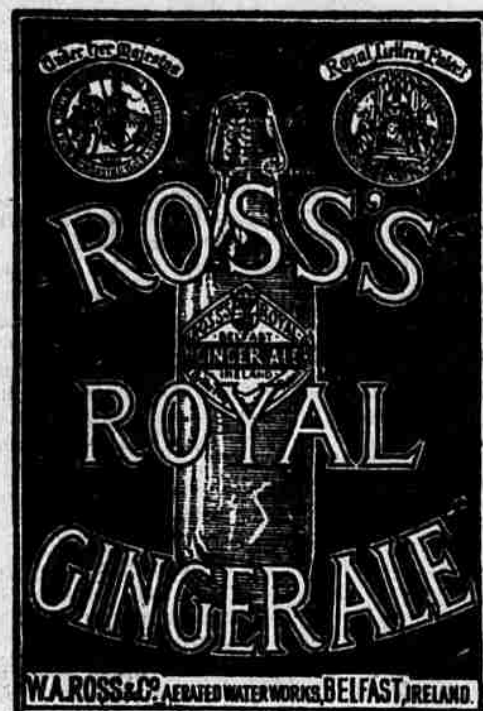
