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Bush denies federal disaster relief for Seth

The request of the CNMI government for federal disaster assistance in lieu of the damages wrought by super-typhoon Seth early this month was rejected by United States President George Bush, it was reported.

This was learned yesterday from acting Governor Benjamin T. Manglona who said that the US president was apparently not keen on declaring the affected portions of the CNMI disaster areas.

According to Manglona, the federal assistance supposedly from the Federal Emergency Management Agency may have been denied after federal officials may have felt that the assessment of the damages brought by Seth may have been "too exaggerated."

Federal disaster rehabilitation support funds was being sought to provide relief for those affected by the super howler, whose damages were reported to be somewhere near the \$3 million mark.

Initial reports placed damages to public facilities alone to be around \$2 million.

Although the CNMI may have been spared from serious harm, there was reportedly extensive flood damage in some homes and businesses.

Indications were that the FEMA may have felt that the damage was not serious enough to merit a disaster declaration from the president.

As of press time yesterday, an official correspondence from Bush was being awaited.

"The president has rejected our appeal for disaster assistance for super-typhoon Seth, but we are given 30 days within which we can lodge an appeal to the US government," discloses Manglona.

According to Manglona, the Governor's Office will be working to re-justify their position that the CNMI should be given relief fund for the victims of Seth in the CNMI.

Outbound Japanese tourist caught with ice

A Japanese tourist spent Thanksgiving Day in detention after he was busted for possession of one gram of crystal methamphetamine or "ice" minutes before he was scheduled to depart for Japan.

Customs officials arrested departing tourist Minoru Saito, 34, amanaging director for Ceres Company Agency Limited in Japan after a pouch containing worth of ice was confiscated from among his belongings.
Customs Chief Lt. Col. Pete
Reves said Customs officials

Reyes said Customs officials were alerted on Saito after he failed to clear the metal detector at the boarding entrance.

Authorities confiscated a

Authorities confiscated a glass pipe and a gram of ice stashed inside a sewing kit from among the contents of a pouch which the Saito had in his possession.

Saito was reportedly travelling with a group of other Japanese tourist and was scheduled to board a Northwest Flight bound for Japan.

Reyes said this is the first time they have arrested an outbound tourist and that it was also a first for Customs officials to see the "ice" in powdered form.

Senator says either council or delegation has to be out

Saipan Legislative Delegation Chairman and Senator Herman R. Guerrero recently announced his intention of coming up with a piece of legislation that would push for the abolishment of either the Municipal Council or the Legislative Delegation on account of an overlapping of duties.

According to Guerrero, he sees a need for a bill that would seek to reduce the number of legislative bodies since the redundancy will allegedly result to confusion, much less a waste of time and taxpayers money.

"Only one should exist to take care of local matters," said the senator, who is bound to bow out of public service as a legislator after he did not seek reelection in the last senatorial elections.

Guerrero recommended that the lawmakers should take a serious look at the viability of having too many legislative bodies. He mentioned that both the municipal council and the delegation are authorized to enact legislation concerning their particular areas.

He also pointed out that there

is also the House of Representatives and the Senate to take care of such a task although the two houses may be concerned more on national issues.

"The Senate and the House should be referred to as the 'state legislature' while either the delegation or the municipal council may be considered the 'local legislature'. But definitely, one has to go because it's a big redundancy," said Guerrero, who is also the Senate minority floor leader.

But one other argument brought up was that unless the municipal council is elected to serve only as advisers to the mayor, and the mayor will be working in conjunction with the delegation, then none has to go.

Guerrero said that two legislative bodies working in a similar manner in one senatorial district is something that should have been looked into by the government.

The senator, whose term of office expires at the end of the year, said that he is contemplating on drafting a bill that he will submit for the Eighth Legislature's consideration af-

ter he bows out of his Senate

"I would like to do this as a private person," said he, apparently so that his actions might be



Sen. Herman R. Guerrero void of politics. "I'm pretty sure I'll get a lot of people pushing for this."

Asked on what other changes he wants to see in the legislature, Guerrero indicated that members of the Saipan Legislative delegation should be elected rather than being automatically placed there after winning a seat in the House or the Senate representing the district.

Growing asphalt instead of trees

Environmental concerns have recently been the focus of attention for the world's most powerful nation. Only recently, the United States government has been pondering on how environmental wastes are to be managed in a manner whereby the clean living of its people are not jeopardized.

The CNMI in a similar effort, has been manifesting quite an awareness on the implications of an unhealthy surrounding. 
There is absolutely no reason to cut those trees as there is no apparent advantage with doing so.

Unlicensed drivers on the road increasing

The number of unlicensed drivers operating motor vehicles out on Saipan's major streets and thoroughfares has been on the increase in utter defiance of a seemingly helpless traffic police

This was confirmed by Bureau of Motor Vehicles Chief Matias Chargualaf who said in an interview Wednesday that law enforcement officers have been having a hard time to solve the perennial problem of people driving without licenses.

According to Chargualaf, out of the approximately 7,000 traffic citations issued by the police for various violations last year, about 1,700 or roughly 24% were issued to people for operating a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license on their person.

This was despite a steadily increasing number of license applicants that turn up at the BMV for written and practical driving tests.

According to BMV statistics, for the period January to June, 1991, a total of 1,386 new applicants for licenses have been realized as against 1,032 noted in the same period last year, a 34% increase.

"It is unfortunate that we cannot fully implement this rule on driver's license since the police seem helpless in weeding out this practice among the island's motorists," said Chargualaf.

Chargualaf said that the authorities are well aware of this problem but indicated that driving laws in the CNMI hinder efforts to solve it.

Right now, if one is caught driving without a license, he is just made to pay a fine of \$25 to \$50, a penalty that Chargualaf considers just a slap on the wrist.

"The fine is not that stiff such that people can easily afford it," said the BMV chief.

Aside from the seemingly light penalty, one of the reasons mentioned why there are a lot of people driving without a license is that they find a hard time securing a license.

The procedure in obtaining a license has been viewed to be a long process considering that it takes around three months from the time the BMV can schedule an applicant to the time they can take you out on an actual driving performance test.

Under the rules, an applicant has to undergo a written test after which his application is processed and a learner's permit is issued out. He is then scheduled for a practical test.

If one takes the driving test and fails in his first try, he is told to come back after one week to try the test again. If he flunks the second time, he is made to come back in two weeks time. If he still does not make it, he is made to come back in a month's time.

It is this kind of drivers that usually take to the road even without licenses since they get tired of waiting and coming back for their tests.

"They are taking an awful lot of chances by driving without a license," said Chargualaf. "They do not seem to understand the severity and the consequences of their action should they be pulled over or get into unforeseen accidents."

Chargualaf pointed out that these people seem to be content with just driving very carefully not minding the possibility that even though they are driving pretty good, there's always the possibility that somebody else is not and that he might get hit in the road.

"When this happens, even though he is not at fault, he would be faulted because he is operating a vehicle without a valid license, which a violation of the. law in itself," Chargual af pointed

He implied that a lot of these people are foreigners who need to go from one place to another so they go ahead and take chances.

If they get caught, a lot of them allegedly pretend they do not speak nor understand English just to make it difficult for law enforcement agents.

Another group which is being observed to be growing at an alarming rate are local juveniles under 14 who also get behind the wheel without going through the necessary licensing procedures.

"It is very hard to stop this problem of unlicensed drivers," said Chargualaf, who said that a solution may be to recommend that the legislature draft a bill that would provide more severe punishment for violators.

Last year, the Department of Public Safety conducted a threeday road block and found a good number of violators of the license rule.

The blockade was meant to check on vehicle safety standards and whether registration deadlines are being kept. During the check up, drivers were also checked if they had licenses, and this netted a lot of offend-

When asked if his office is contemplating on another road block in the near future, Chargualaf said he has not recommended such a scheme.

Under the law, a police officer can stop and pull over any vehicle at any time if he feels that a vehicle does not meet safety standards. But to stop a vehicle to check on whether the driver has a valid license is beyond his powers since he must have a good probable cause.

"This is one of the reasons why the police can not solve the problem of unlicensed drivers.' said Chargualaf.

As a warning, Chargualaf hinted that the department is very much aware of this practice and that there is a growing number of unlicensed drivers on the road.

"Please take a second thought before getting behind the wheel, and drive without a valid driver's license," said the Motor Vehicle chief.

He indicated that his the department will penalize violators regardless if they can speak and understand English or not.

"We can assure offenders that we will make them understand."

Typhoon Yuri brushes Saipan, no major damages

Super Typhoon Yuri left the Commonwealth's area of responsibility Thursday afternoon leaving residents thankful that no typhoon related accidents and no major damages occured during the height of the storm.

Disaster Control officer Felix Sasamoto said Yuri made her presence known three days before its actually hit Saipan. By Wednesday noon, all government offices, schools and other private establishments were closed as Saipan was placed under Condition no. two.

Yuri made its closest point of approach to Saipan at about 12 midnight to 2 a.m. Thursday morning when it was spotted 205 statute miles to the southwest of Saipan.

Sasamoto said about 600 evacuees sought shelter from nearby schools which where temporarily made into evacuation centers while about 70 people from the Dandan and Koblerville areas where temporarily housed at the Red Cross shelter at Airport Road.

Except for a few whose homes have been toppled by the Yuri's winds, most of the evacuees were able to return to their homes early Thursday morning. Damages on Saipan was lim-

ited to a few eroded roads, toppled trees and shattered tin houses. As of late Thursday morning, utility crews were busy reconnecting power to several residential areas where power was cut-off Wednesday evening due to broken

While Saipan escaped much of

Yuri's wrath, Rota was not spared from the onslaught of the typhoon as Red Cross officials were informed that several families were rendered temporarily homeless while a num-

ber of residential areas also have been damaged by the typhoon.

Jerry Facey, Executive Director of the CNMI chapter of the Red Cross said they will be flying to

Rota to assist those who may be needing help. He said there are also plans of assisting the Red Cross on Guam in case their help would be

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CNMI to host first PAC-POWER Convention

The Commonwealth Utilities Corp. will play host to representatives of 15 utility corporations in the Pacific region who will be on island come June 1992 for the first convention of the PAC-POWER association.

Gov. Larry I. Deleon Guerrero agreed to co-host the said meeting while the Department of the Interior will be one of the cosponsors of the convention, CUC Executive Director Ramon S. Guerrero said during last Tuesday's board of director's meeting.

The association was formed last October in American Samoa through a meeting organized by the United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific.

Through the association, member countries are enabled to seek financial aid through the World Bank. Technology sharing and technical trainings will also be made possible through

the association.

As a member nation, CUC already played host to Perelini S. Perelini, chief engineer and Gary Sword, superintendent American Samoa Power Authority (ASPA) respectively, both of whom are on a four-day on-site visit of CUC to study the management and operation of the said agency.

The two ASPA personnel will are the first representatives of the Buddy-Training System which is one of the programs of the utility association.

The CUC was also chosen by Department of the Interior Assistant Secretary Stella Guerra to become host to representatives from other Pacific Rim nations whose utility companies are just starting to take-off. As of present, the CUC is the

only autonomous utility company in the Pacific Rim region. The agency has continued to remain on its present status despite suggestions to privatize the operations of the company.

Plans to arm Conservation officers studied

A Senate bill that would seek to authorize and enable Conservation officers of the Department of Natural Resources to carry firearms is currently under the scrutiny of the House Committee on Judiciary and Governmental Operations after the Senate passed the measure in a previous session.

Senate Bill 7-42, which was authored by Senate President Joseph S. Inos, would entitle the officers to have the powers of law enforcement officers to the extent of their jurisdiction as they go on the lookout for illegal poachers.

Under the measure, these officers shall carry firearms issued by the Department of Public Safety while on duty provided that each shall at least possess the minimum hours of training specified in the rules and regulations of the DPS in the safehandling and operation of firearms, and in making arrests while enforcing Public Law 2-

Earlier, the Senate Committee on Judiciary, Government and Law chaired by Senator Edward U. Maratita recommended the passage of the bill to the full Senate after it found that confusion exists over the use of

firearms by Conservation officers. As a result, Section 4 (b) of P.L.2-51, codified under 2 CMC Section 5103 (b), has not been

implemented. The confusion centers on when and where the officers are permitted to exercise the rights granted to them under the above mentioned section.

In order to resolve the situation, the section has been amended by adding the words "to the extent of their jurisdiction", apparently to limit their ability to carry firearms only when they are acting within their capacity as Conservation offic-

In real terms, this means that these officers will possess weapons only when they are searching out for poachers since it appears that this is the only time such possession is neces-

"This was learned after consultation with Director of Fish and Wildlife Arnold Palacios. However, the director and the Committee feel it imperative to allow such possession due to the possible dangers attached and inherent in that activity," a committee report on the bill read.

An amendment entered to S. B. 7-42 was the addition of a provision that narrows down






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Surtax on certain activities on Saipan mulled

The Public Library as well as other youth programs on Saipan would benefit in terms of additional funds if and when a local bill establishing a surtax on certain activities on the island is made into a local law.

The said measure, otherwise known as the Saipan Surtax Bill of 1991, charges a surtax on new construction or expansion, textile and textile products manufacturing, land sales and long term leases on Saipan, and any transfer of corporate stock.

The bill, introduced by Representative Mametto U. Maratita, intends to generate revenues to be reserved only for the purpose of improving the library by acquiring additional books and to extend the hours its business hours. Part of the revenues derived would also be used to fund youth programs.

Under the act, the surtax imposed on new construction shall be paid by each contractor who executes a contract for the construction of a new unit, whether or not the contract is a prime or sub-contractor. Commercial units will be charged 1.5% of the construction cost.

Also, garment manufacturers on Saipan will be made to pay an amount equal to the 3% user fees set forth in 4 CMC 1423 to be paid by each garment manufacturer on Saipan.

With respect to land sales and long term leases, an amount equal to 1% of the total sales price which the seller or the lessor is to receive for the sale or lease of the land is proposed.

The surtax imposed shall be the responsibility of the seller or the lessor and shall be due and payable within 30 days after the sale or lease of the land.

For the purpose of the Act, a long term lease have been de-

fined as a lease term of more than ten years, including any option period that may be granted by said lease or agreement to lease.

Furthermore, no surtax shall be imposed on the sale or lease of land by the Commonwealth government or an agency thereof.

It was provided that failure to report and pay the surtax as imposed shall constitute a misdemeanor.

On the other hand, the transfer of corporate stock requires a surtax of 25 cents per share for any corporation whose principal office or place of business is located on Saipan.

The secretary of the corporation whose stock is being transferred shall be responsible for the reporting of such transfer to the Registrar of Corporations and the payment of the surtax to the Commonwealth government as imposed.

However, the amount of the obligation of the surtax shall be a matter between the transferee and the transferor.

Failure of any corporation to comply with the reporting of a transfer of its stock and the payment of the surtax imposed shall subject that corporation to a fine of \$500 and the loss of its corporate charter until the payment of the surtax.

The initial \$500,000 of revenues received annually as a result of this local revenue bill shall be reserved to improve the library by acquiring additional books and extending the operating hours.

Revenues in excess of the initial \$500,000 received annually shall be reserved for the youth programs on Saipan. However, revenues less than \$500,000 received annually, 20% shall be reserved for the youth programs.

Initiatives on coastal resources to nix reference to US law

A couple of legislative initiatives that will seek to eliminate reference to US law as basis for jurisdiction over marine resources and for the CNMI's claim to ownership of submerged lands off its coasts goes to the Board of Elections for certification.

This became evident after the House of Representatives recently passed on final reading. Senate Legislative Initiatives Nos. 7-2 and 7-3, which seek to amend Article XIV and Article XI of the Commonwealth Constitution, respectively.

The Senate in an earlier session also passed the said measures, which were introduced by Senate President Joseph S. Inos.

The initiatives now stand to be put on the ballot in special elections sometime next year along with other important legislative initiatives currently deliberated by the Legislature.

With the measures, the people of the Commonwealth will be given the chance, through the initiative process, to express their sentiments on whether reference to United States law will be made as basis when determining jurisdiction over resources beneath the coasts of the Commonwealth.

Legislation by initiative calls for a measure passed by either houses of the lawmaking body to be voted on by the electorate. A majority vote will determine whether such a measure would become law or not, pursuant to Article XVIII (Constitutional Amendment) Section 3 of the Commonwealth Constitution.

Under that section, the legislature by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the members of each house present and voting may propose amendments to the Constitution.

An act of the legislature under this section is not subject to the veto power of the governor.

Thus, the Seventh Commonwealth Legislature bids that Section 1 of both Article XIV and Article XI be amended by deleting the phrase that implies that the Commonwealth has jurisdiction over the said domains "under US law."

The former will amended to read as follows: "The marine resources in waters off the coast of the CNMI over which the Commonwealth now or hereafter may have any jurisdiction shall be managed, controlled, protected and preserved by the legislature for the benefit of the people."

section would read: "The lands as to which right, title, or interest have been or hereafter are transferred from the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands to any legal entity in the Commonwealth under Secretarial Order 2969 promulgated by the US Secretary of the Interior on December 26, 1974, the lands to which right title or interest have been vested in the Resident Commissioner under Secretarial Order 2989 promulgated by the US Secretary of the Interior on March 24, 1976, the lands as to which right, title, or interest have been or hereafter are transferred to or by the government of the NMI under article VIII of the Covenant, and the submerged lands off the coast of the Commonwealth to which the CNMI now or hereafter may have a claim of ownership are public lands belonging collectively to the people of the Commonwealth who are of NMI descent."



Investigations continue on downed plane

Aviation officials are continuing their investigation of a Tuesday plane crash involving a Korean Airlines flight engineer who escaped from the accident with only minor injuries.

Bob Christian, owner of the Cessna 172N and president of the Pacific Islands Aviations Inc. said they have reason to believe that the accident was not a result of mechanical malfunction.

He said the aircraft was under a regular maintenance program and was even flown three days

before the accident by a Federal Aviation Administration exam-

The accident has left Cessna's pilot Nyeung Euyi Lee with a broken ankle. Lee, a licensed pilot, was airlifted to the Commonwealth Health Center in a Pacific Islands helicopter immediately after he was rescued from the wreckage.

Lee was rescued after Macaw Helicopters president Rufus Crowe received word from the Saipan Flight Service Station that a rented plane crash landed in an area half-way between the

CowTown resort in Marpi and Banzai Cliff. Crowe, who was on a charter flight with several clients, immediately flew to the scene and surveyed the area.

"I saw someone from inside the plane lift an arm," Crowe said in an interview. He a described the man to be "half inside the cockpit and half outside

The area where the accident happened was not accessible by foot and Crowe had to fly rescuers to the site. He also said that one of his clients also assisted in

Status of casino applicant clarified

The Tinian Casino Gaming Control Commission said today that the status of casino license applicant Asa Development & Investment, Inc. has apparently been misunderstood in some recent media accounts. Allegations that Asa and it's principal shareholder, Mr. Yukihiro Asai, maybe associated with Yakuza organized crime activities are contained in a report submitted to the Commission by the Division of Enforcement, said in a press release from the Commis-

No decision or position has been taken by the Commission as to the accuracy of the allegations or the suitability of Asa to be granted a casino license. That determination will be made by a vote of the Commission based on evidence presented by both the Commission's Division of Enforcement and Asa at a licensing hearing. The hearing will be conducted similar to any other administrative hearing with the Commissioners serving in its adjudicatory capacity. However, in accordance with the Tinian Gaming Act, the burden of proof lies with the applicant with regard to its suitability to be granted a casino license, the news release said.

Acting Chairman, Jose P. Cruz, said "If an applicant disputes the staff investigative findings, he is entitled to present contradictory evidence at a licensing hearing prior to a final decision being made. All accepted legal standards of due process apply to licensing decisions and the conduct of hearings. As with all who seek a casino license, the Asa application will be decided solely on the evidence presented at the hear-

The date for the Asa hearing to be held will be set by the Commission no later than December 2, 1991. All licensing hearings will be announced in advance and are open to the public for

Establishments to pay beverage consumed tax

Nightclub and restaurant owners are required to pay a three Percent (3%) tax on any beverage consumed or sold by any establishment licensed to serve alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises of the establishment.



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



CUC improves billing system

The number of utility customers who have been making payments based on a monthly "flat rate" continues to decrease as the Commonwealth Utilities Corporation (CUC) has ordered the installation of meters for both commercial and residential establishments.

CUC Executive Director Ramon S. Guerrero said the number of customers being billed on a "flat rate" basis has sharply decreased from 1,587 residents in 1989 to the current 568.

The said system will greatly enhance the revenue generating capability of the CUC which, according to Guerrero, is on its way to achieving full economic recovery.

Guerrero said during the meeting of the CUC's board of director's that the utility company is collecting at least \$3 million dollars in bills each month.

The situation was not the same three years ago when the CUC was still under the helm of the Department of Public Works. At that time, due to a poor billing system and incomplete documents, the utility company only generated half a million dollars a month in revenue.

Guerrero also said that there are still quite a number of uncollected amounts from customers who have filed complaints regarding their billings.

The island-wide disconnection campaign which the CUC is currently undertaking will also generate additional income from delinquent customers who have filed to update their utility payments.

Also on Tuesday, the CUC board signed a memorandum lifting the moratorium on power hook-ups for feeder 4 as a result of the newly established feeder 7. The new feeder is totally isolated and will only serve the vil-

lages of Tanapag, San Roque and the Marpi areas.

On the other hand, Guerrero said CUC's Lorraine Babauta is one among CUC personnel who will undergo highly specialized trainings on utility operations in

Singapore. A host of other personnel will be sent to Singapore in the coming months, Guerrero

Tim Villagomez, Commonwealth Utilities Corp. (CUC) Deputy Executive Director said on Tuesday the problem was immediately solved two days after a handful of government officials and parents were informed about the situation.

Villagomez said the problem was a result of a leak in the leaching field system which had school officials worried of raw

sewage overflowing the school grounds.


The school's sewer lines were apparently connected with the CUC's major sewer lines however, the contractor failed to hook-up the school's sewer system because of CUC's failure to approve the school's sewer application.

Villagomez also said that the Public School System did not need to come up with \$90,000 to have the school's sewer lines hooked-up with that of the island's major sewer system.

The deputy director said that it is the CUC's policy not to charge the PSS and the Commonwealth Health Center for utility services which the two agencies require.

USDA, HHS propose food labeling rules

The Bush Administration announced proposals for sweeping changes in food labels that will affect virtually all foods, according to news report from USDA. In announcing this most extensive food labeling proposal ever, Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Ann M. Veneman and Secretary of Health and Human Services Louis W. Sullivan, M.D., said the changes will help consumers select a healthier diet by providing accurate and reliable information about the nutritional content of food. The changes are expected to be fully implemented in 1993.

The HHS proposals cover most of the broad changes required by the 1990 Nutrition Labeling and Educating Act (NLEA). While meat and poultry products were exempted by the NLEA, Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan directed the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Safety and Inspection Service to issue nutrition labeling proposals for meat and poultry products in harmony with those for other foods, the USDA news release said.

The most important new rules in the proposal include:

Mandatory nutrition labeling for most processed foods, including consistent serving sizes in easily understandable measurements for most food cate-

Definitions for descriptive terms such as "light," "lean," and "fresh," to ensure consistent use of such terms for the benefit of consumers.

Conditions for statement of health claims on foods that contain nutrients that have a scientifically documented relationship with the risk of a disease.

In addition, the announcement covers the implementation of a voluntary nutrition labeling program for raw fruits, vegetables, and fish, as well as raw, single ingredient meat and poultry products.


"We must restore the credibility of the food label," said Dr. Sullivan.

"Our goal is to make the information on the label clear and useful, so that American consumers can make informed choices to improve their health and well being."

"As a congressman, Secretary Madigan was a key architect of the NLEA," Veneman said. "Together, USDA and DHHS have now laid the groundwork for a set of uniform nutrition labeling policies that take the guesswork out of planning healthy diets."

The Food and Drug Administration, a Public Health Service agency within HHS, regulates all foods except for meat and poultry products, which are regulated by USDA.

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CHC health care services upgraded by January

Major changes are happening at the Commonwealth Health Center to accommodate the growing number of its patients and to improve the quality of health care provided to the com-

Among the major goals of the hospital for the coming year is to improve the access of the patients to doctors and health care. One of the areas where major changes will be undertaken will be in the outpatient clinic, also known as ambulatory care.

"There are now adequate numbers of physician and physician assistants in every specialty to see patients in a timely manner," Director of Medical Affairs Dr. Christine-Ebert Santos said.

By January, there will be 53 doctors serving the public. This will include three obstetricians and the family doctors on Tinian and Rota. There will also be five physician assistants who will assist the staff take care of a large portion of the needed health

A new system which will allow patients easy access to doctors particularly during the peak hours of 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. and from 1-3 in the afternoon will also be introduced this coming

Starting January, physicians will also start seeing patients early in the mornings, starting this January. This is being accomplished by opening registration shortly after 7 a.m. enabling nurses to prepare patients by 7:15 a.m.

There will also be two physicians who will attend to patients during the lunch hour, without appointments. This includes a family practitioner and a paediatrician. Nursing and clerical staff work staggered shifts to accommodate the new patient flow scheme.

A New Acute Care Clinic will also be implemented to accommodate adult patients who come to the clinics without any appointments. The new clinic will be run in conjunction with the emergency room.

Adult patients with uncomplicated conditions will be assisted by an extra physician assistant starting from 7:30 a.m. to 4 in the afternoon. A triage nurse will also be on hand to determine the appropriate clinic or physician for each case and take vital signs on those to be seen in the acute care clinic.

Patients may still choose to see a doctor in ACII (ambulatory care clinic) on a walk-in basis while those who have multiple medications and chronic diseases will be referred to the ACII also.

Further changes in the ambulatory care will take place in January and February, including the full integration of preventive care for women and children. This will include immunizations, physical exams and prenatal care with acute and chronic care.

Public Health Administrator Fermin Sakisat is working in with the hospital and medical staff leaders on a reorganization of care for women and children.

The new changes being implemented at the hospital is part of the plans of Hospital Director Dr. Jose L. Chong and its Administrator Pete Untalan.






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
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TTPI radio frequencies assigned

Washington Resident Representative Juan Nekai Babauta has urged the CNMI government to apply to the Federal Communications Commission for a waiver that will allow the local government use of radio frequencies ordinarily assigned to the Department of Interior.

Babauta made his suggestion in his November 26 letter to Governor Larry I. Deleon Guerrero which also gave the Chief Executive information that a more technical application will have to be prepared in the future for the FCC to grant such waiver.

Before any waiver could be granted however, the FCC requires certification from the Interior Department which will make it clear that the CNMI's use of the said frequencies is essential.

Babauta said the FCC is currently in the process of licensing certain frequencies for use by the CNMI government and that the matter had already been cleared through the office of the DOI's Office of Information Resources Management and Telecommunications Systems Division headed by Pat Henry.





This may include a resubmission of another assessment of the typhoon's damages.

Several homes on Saipan were damaged extensively by Seth's furious winds and heavy rains, while power, water, and sewage systems were also damaged critically causing interruptions in the delivery of the basic utility services.

Most of the affected families were from the low-lying areas of Tanapag and Kagman and in the homesteads of Dan Dan and Koblerville.

Close to a hundred residences and business establishments were damaged during the height of the typhoon rendering scores

of people temporarily homeless. Governor Lorenzo I. DL. Guerrero made a request for assistance in a letter to Bush dated November 6, just when the governors of Guam, American Samoa, and Hawaii were on island to attend the 12th annual Pacific Basin Development Council Conference which the CNMI hosted this year.

Seth posed a momentary threat to the holding of the yearly PBDC meet, packing center winds of 145 miles per hour with gusts of up to 150 miles per hour at about 1 a.m. Monday, a day before the conference proper began.

"The delegation should be an elected office since this should be a distinct and separate entity from the Commonwealth Legislature," he added.

Among his other recommendations were that the delegation, should it be continued to exist, must be funded by the full House and Senate. He asserted that in order for it to function effectively, the delegation must have at least three full-time staff to keep it going - one legal counsel, one secretary, and one assistant.

He lamented the present Saipan Legislative Delegation has functioned without a budget of its own and had to rely solely on the chairman's meager allowances as Senate minority leader. The delegation was also said to have no full-time employee to take care of delegation work, and had to rely on existing staff from the Senate and the Legislative Bureau.

"There must be something done to correct this, if the delegation is to function as it should." Guerrero said.

US House passes **Omnibus**

Insular Act

The House of Representatives of the United States Congress early this week adopted a House Resolution that details several issues of concern to the CNMI as an insular government under the flag of the US.

Last November 25, House Resolution 1688, known as the Omnibus Insular Areas Act of 1990 was reported to have been adopted by the US lower House and is now in the US Senate.

This was learned from CNMI Washington Representative Juan N. Babauta in a letter dated November 26, 1991 addressed to Governor Lorenzo I. DL Guerrero.

According to Babauta. although the measure received favorable action from the House, further Senate action may not be expected until next year.

"We have been given to understand that all of the Act's provisions have been reviewed by and are acceptable to the Senate Committee on Jurisdiction and that no additional provisions are contemplated by that body," said Babauta in his letter to Guerrero.

He pointed out that the reason why action on the measure was held was because the Senate has apparently worked toward adjournment by Thanksgiving Day and that its agenda is crowded.

Among several provisions in the Act of interest to the CNMI

Insular Areas Disaster Survival and Recovery - authorizes unspecified amounts to harden essential infrastructure and to provide for public health and safety in the event of disasters; provides for greater coordination in disaster response between the federal and insular area governments; increases the percentage of post-disaster federal assistance which may be spent on hardening facilities; clarifies Northern Marianas qualification for aid under the Stafford Act (42 U.S.C.) 5122).

Insular Areas Water Sewer, and Power Needs - directs the Interior Department to undertake a comprehensive study of these needs and recommend appropriate federal action.

Insular Areas Energy Assistance — authorizes \$.5 million per fiscal year for energy efficiency and renewable energy project grants.

General Services Administration Purchases — makes permanent the current year-toyear for the insular areas to make purchases through GSA.

Northern Marianas College endowment — authorizes \$3 million land grant endowment. This was reported to have been an amendment to the original



Gold potential in the Pacific ranks high

The study was conducted by

The southwest Pacific islands are rapidly becoming among the world's largest gold producing areas with an even greater potential existing in many promising areas which are virtually unexplored, according to a study by the East-West Center in Honolulu, Hawaii.

The study focused on Papua New Guinea, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu and Fiji.

In the past five years, gold production in the southwest Pacific has increased from 890,000 ounces to 1,330,000 ounces, and by the mid-1990s the western

Pacific rim (including Australia, the Philippines and Indonesia) could become the secondlargest gold producer after South Africa, the study said.

"The potential of the region has been confirmed by discoveries over the last decade or so of large gold deposits," but none of the four countries has been adequately explored, the study said.

"Even if the number of promising prospects is doubled over the next decade, the total will still be short of the number found in equivalent ground in the western United States," the study
