go naked, home he can get drunk, run his horse, shoot rifle ball around, etc., but down here in the streets of Honolulu, where "civil liberty" reigns, he is not allowed to exercise any of those personal liberty antics. Our "personal liberty" is so hampered by "civil liberty" in Honofulu that we are not permitted to build a wooden house on some streets, nor a fine brick house in the street, nor to burn an old diseased shanty, nor dig holes in the streets without permission. But the hermit in the mountains could build and burn his house, or spend his useless life digging holes; no one would object. In the exercise of personal liberty, where there is no one to get hurt, you may throw around your leaded fists with the skill of a prize fighter, but you undertake that same thing in a crowd, knocking some sprawling, mashing the ear off one and the nose off another, etc., no plea of personal liberty would save you. Civil liberty would bind you hand and foot and for a time at least put an end to your personal liberty. Mr. Hammond would not feel like arguing up personal liberty, for a time at least, if he happened to be one that was hit. Yet drunken men often have both wounded and killed in their "personal liberty" fights. But Mr. Hammond says they must not be deprived of their personal liberty by law, because that would be "incompatible with that degree of freedom of will and of action which is inseparable from the individual in all communities, founded

upon what we call liberty." Even in civilized communities, men can enjoy the fullest personal liberty if they only do the right thing, but when they interfere with the rights of others they run against the civil law and their personal liberty is checked.

The business of the police and other criminal courts, the drinking women and the drunken men that are seen here, ought to admonish legislators to enact some wise restrictive law which may check their personal acts before they forfeit their civil rights and get into prison. Those now in prison are there because they used their personal rights too freely. Would it not be the proper thing to do, to restrict such wild personal acts before their authors get into prison. Such a law would injure no one that did right, and restrain only the possible wrong doer. "Civil liberty" would not be interfered with and "personal liber-
