San Francisco, June 14, per S. S. City of Peking.

— AMERICA —

The first Canadian Women's Em-

press shares up from 84 to 84 1/2,

without opening the exchange this

morning. Up to 1 o'clock this after-

noon 52,600 shares of Sugar

Trust were sold from the Exchange.

Wash., over rich finds of gold near

riously injured.

Members of the board of educa-

— EUROPE —

FRANCE VERSUS ENGLAND.

In the Chamber of Deputies Ri-

bot, the Minister of Foreign Affairs,

read France's note to Egypt.

France contends that the time has

arrived when England, in accordance

with the many declarations and

self-congratulations of her Min-

isters, and for the prosperity and

security of Egypt, ought to evacu-

ate the country. The note ex-

presses surprise that the powers do

not agree in recognizing that the

profits of conversion ought to be

applied to increasing Egypt's mili-

tary forces in order to enable her

to dispense with British troops.

Believing, however, that all the

parties interested are disposed to

give the subject frank consideration,

France asserts to the conversion

scheme, reserving the question of

evacuation for future negotiations.

M. Ribot declared that France de-

sired cordial relations with England,

but would lose no opportunity to

protest against England establish-

ing herself in Egypt.

In the Reichstag June 10, Chan-

cellor Caprivi, in reply to a ques-

tion said: "Gratifying signs of im-

provement are apparent in the re-

lations between Germany and France,

and I should regret to see them

again brought into trouble. In no

country are international relations

so difficult, or the necessity for in-

dulgent consideration so great as in

Germany." Several Alsatian de-

puties declared the passport regu-

lations injured their economic con-

dition and had no Germanizing in-

fluence.
