#### CONSULAR RESIGNATIONS.

The resignation of Mr. J. F. Hackfeld as Consul for Austria-Hungary, practically on account of his connection with large sugar plantations which employ alien labor, is an incident of such importance, in the conditions attaching to our labor system, as to merit attention and to be worthy of emulation and of following by other consuls similarly situated.

To a thorough gentleman with

be very anomalous and embarrassing. He is practically called upon to serve two masters whose interests are occasionally diametrically opposed to each other.

A judge is not permitted to participate in a decision of a case in which either he or his relatives or business associates are interested, and yet it has happened that a consul has been placed in the terribly trying position, nominally and indirectly perhaps, of being the employer of labor which labor finds cause to appeal to him, as the representative of his country, to remedy grave abuses perpetrated upon him by the plantation employees employed, nominally and indirectly perhaps, by the consul and his business associates.

It is not right nor just in principle. However upright, noble and highminded a man may be, however pure and honorable may be his intentions and conscience, and however high classed my be his integrity in public and private life, he cannot, as human nature has constructed us, perform these dual duties with perfect satisfaction to himself, his government, or those he proposed presecution for contempt has been selected to protect. We are all infallible, and it is very very hard to sacrifice self interest for public duty, however conscientious we may be. Like a swimmer with incipient cramp it is difficult with our best and our most virile exertions to throw out of us that insidious feeling which, unless defeated, means loss of life and moral honor.

The high character which Mr. Hackfeld has hitherto enjoyed in telry and the name of Mr. Clough, this community will be doubly appreciated for the example he has set to the other gentlemen who aspire to discharge duties which practically conflict with each other.

To the theoretical part of the problem there may be a plausible answer, but to the practical one, only one-Resignation. #### OUR LAND LAWS.

We have never been able to understand how our Solons could ever pass an act dealing with the disposition of public lands in which the rule of "first come first served" is paramount. To dispose of public lands in the manner of tickets to a theatrical show is preposterous. Before a title to a homestead is given by the agent of the public lands or his deputies a searching enquiry into the intentions and circumstances of the applicant should be made. We are told that the land agents make such enquiries and that blanks are filled up in which auswers are given as to the means, nationality and color of the teeth, of the person desiring the land.

As a matter of fact are these statesments true and the pledges of the applicants carried out? Is the law complied with? Are there not people, say in Waimea, Hawaii, who have no intention of residing on the homesteads which were granted to them under certain conditions, and who yet hold the lands without improving them and without the slightest effort on behalf of the is defending the alleged kahuna. Government to enforce the contract under which the lands were granted under the idiotic rule of "first come, first served?"

A controversy has recently arisen between a land agent and a citizen. That the agent's story in regard to the transaction is true we fully believe and that the man who got left was not entitled to the land we are assured of because he never intended to fulfil the conditions imposed by the law or take up a residence on the premises.

The matter has created some feeling among officials and private people interested in public lands and we think it would been the Letter part of the government to cancel the deeu given and put the land up at public auction. We think that all public lands should be sold at auction especially when applications are made which on the face of it are not bona fide. It is true that at an auction sale the capitalist has a great advantage over the man of moderate means, but even at an auction sale property can be sold under certain restrictions and conditions which would virtually bar the capitalist, who was simply speculating, from entering the field.

LUBECK, Saturday.—Emperor William, in celebrating the week's end at the yacht club luncheon here today, said:
