## INDEPENDENCE DAY.

The General Committee on the 4th of July celebration held their final meeting at the Hawaiian Hotel on Thursday evening. The vacancies in the committee have all been filled and the meeting was fully attended and enthusiastic. The finance committee reported that the response to their appeal had been general and liberal, and that they were sure of ample funds for all the purposes of the proposed celebration. In addition to the usual salutes at sunrise, noon, and sunset, and the parade of the Antiques and Horribles in the early morning, there will be public exercises in the Hotel grounds at 10 a. m.; and a ball at the Music Hall in the evening.

The morning exercises will consist of an oration by Surgeon Ruth, of the U. S. S. Essex, reading of the Declaration of Independence by Mrs. E. R. Hendry, together with music by the Royal Hawaiian Band and singing of national airs. Refreshments for the public will be provided by the Committee at the Hotel.

We are glad to notice that the Committee, after some discussion, decided by a large majority, that no wines or liquors should be allowed at the ball. All subscribers to the fund for celebrating the day will be furnished with tickets for the ball. Any persons who have not subscribed but who wish to attend can apply to the members of the ball committee as announced in our advertising columns.

At the close of the meeting a unanimous vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. R. W. Laine for the public spirit shown by him in calling the American residents together and inaugurating the movement for a due celebration of the day.

The schr. Julia is off the Marine Railway. She is near the fish market. The ship Shandon is discharging the O.S.S. wharf. The schr. Lehua brought 503 bags of sugar and 115 sheep.

## LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS.

Look at C. Brewer & Co's Dividend announcements in this issue.

Mr. Pratt will conduct the Gospel Temperance meeting, at the Bethel Vestry this evening.

"Backsliding" will be Mr. Cruzan's theme on Sunday morning. "The Judgment" in the evening.

The Band will give an Extra Concert on Monday evening July 2nd, at the Hawaiian Hotel (Steamer permitting.)

To-day the Chinamen row in Quarantine will be released if nothing in the shape of disease is found amongst them.

There will be a special meeting of Algaroba Lodge I.O.G.G. at the lodge-room tonight. Do not fail to be present.

All Thursday night a house occupied the middle of Fort street just above Kukul street, having been left there by the parties shifting it.

The new building of Campbell's is progressing rapidly. Large quantities of brick and lumber are lying in front of it to be used shortly.

Some one has been piling up great heaps of rushes on the Waikiki road a few yards on the town side of Dodd's Baths. It takes up too much of the road and ought to be removed.

A reward is offered in another column by the 4th of July Committee for the arrest and conviction of a party guilty of an exceedingly mean and ungentlemanly act. We trust that the reward will be claimed.

We hear that the rates of insurance—both Fire and marine—are likely to be raised. One agency alone has lost during the last few months by the schooners Prince, Kaala, Mile Morris, and Meefoo, as much as two years premiums on its whole schooner business would bring in.

A "talky-talky" sociable was held in Fort St. Church Vestry on Thursday night. As a sociable it was rather dismal the sexes apparently having a mutual repulsion for each other and mingling as little as possible. Refreshments were served but no music, singing, or declamation was given.

Peace and Harmony seem to reign once more on the coming 4th of July celebration. This is a good thing. A national celebration of such importance should never be allowed to suffer on account of private misunderstanding. The G. A. R. have amply vindicated their innocence of the motives imputed to them and we congratulate them on it.

The Fourth of July arrangements as decided on Thursday night by the Committee are, morning 5 o'clock, Antiques and Horrible, 10 o'clock Exercises in the Hotel Grounds with His Ex. R. M. Daggett as President of the Day, Dr. Ruth as the Orator, and Mrs. Hendry to read the Declaration of Independence; Evening, Ball at the Music Hall with possibly a pyrotechnic illumination.

To-night Mr. and Mrs. Heimbürger give their farewell concert in Honolulu. In addition to good selections from the classical masters Mr. Heimbürger has arranged Hawaii Pono! with variations for the piano and transcribed God Save the Queen or as more people here know it under the name of America. A number of American national airs will be played also. So that the concert ought to be well attended for three reasons: 1st, the music is good; 2nd, much of it is popular; 3rd, this is the last chance of hearing Mr. and Mrs. Heimbürger.

HERE are some of the effects of the Liquor law. The mate of the schooner Jenny, Bill Kaoni, got intoxicated and went mad from the effects of it on Thursday. He is now insane in the custody of his relatives. A sailor of the Marion got drunk before leaving this port for Kukulhaele, and died shortly after arriving there from the combined effects of the liquor and a cold caught while drunk. One of the sailors on board the Bishop, when ordered by the mate to take the wheel being intoxicated, made an attempt to stab him with a knife. He was promptly put in irons and was taken to the Station House on the steamer's arrival here.

## A SECRET PRINTING OFFICE IN RUSSIA.

I went over all the rooms in which the work was carried on. The mechanism was extremely simple. A few cases with various kinds of type, a little cylinder just cast of a kind of gelatinous substance closely resembling carpenter's glue, and somewhat pleasant to smell; a large,

heavy cylinder covered with cloth, which served as the press; some blackened brushes and sponges in a pan; two jars of printing ink. Everything was arranged in such a manner that it could be hidden in a quarter of an hour in a large clothes press standing in a corner.

They explained to me the mechanism of the work, and smilingly told me of some little artifices which they employed to divert the suspicion of the *doornik* who came every day with water, wood, etc. The system adopted was not that of not allowing him to enter, but precisely the reverse. Under various pretexts, they made him see the whole of the rooms as often as possible, having first removed everything which could excite suspicion. When these pretexts failed others were invented. Being unable to find a plausible reason for him to enter the inner room, Mme. Kriloff one day went and told him that there was a rat there which must be killed. The *doornik* went, and certainly found nothing; but the trick was played. He had seen the whole of the rooms, and could bear testimony that there was absolutely nothing suspicious in them. Once a month they invariably had people in to clean the floors of all the rooms.

I was assailed by profound melancholy at the sight of all these people. Involuntarily, I compared their terrible life with my own, and felt overcome with shame. What was our activity in the broad light of day, amid the excitement of a multitude of friends and the stir of our daily life and struggles, compared with this continuous sacrifice of their whole existence, wasting away in this dungeon?—*Underground Russia.*
