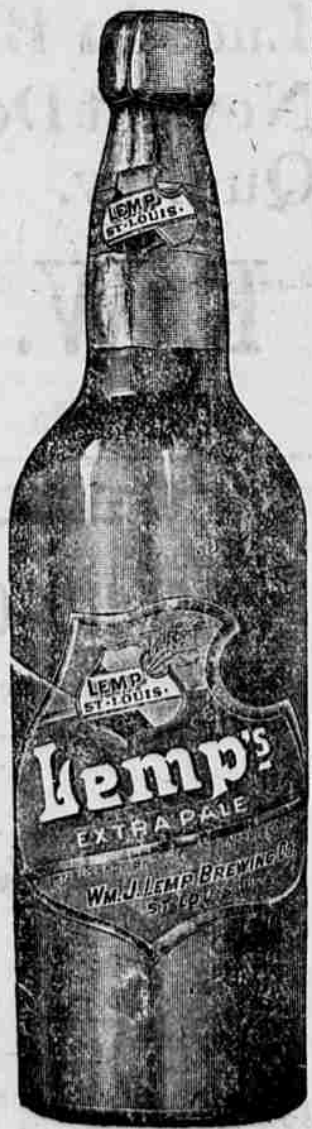

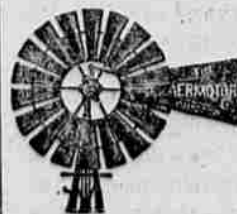

A GLOOMY OUTLOOK.

The gigantic strikes in the States will be felt all over the Mainland as well as in Hawaii. The strikers are stopping all commerce, they are ruining farmers and others who in no way are responsible for existing labor conditions. They will soon cause bloodshed and violence and it looks at times as if the prologue to the French revolution is to be rehearsed.

In referring to the strikers and the police in San Francisco, the Argonaut says editorially:

"While it is not a pleasant thing in San Francisco to see police officers guarding truckmen in the peaceful pursuit of their calling, there are more unpleasant sights than that. Among them is the sight of truckmen and teamsters being dragged from their seats and beaten into insensibility with bludgeons and brass knuckles. A few such cowardly assaults have occurred, and it is to prevent their repetition that the police have been guarding the truckmen. The police—chief, captain, and patrolmen—all deserve credit for their efforts during the strike to maintain order. They have taken no sides in the conflict, but have construed their duties to be what they are—the maintenance of order. The disturbed district is large and the police force is small. Nearly all the available men on the police roll have been drawn upon—clerks, detectives, and court bailiffs. The men have been very hard worked, but they have acted admirably. For the first couple of days they did not use their clubs, but were forced at last into active clubbing, as the mobs grew ugly. A number of the rioters have been badly beaten in consequence. Up to this writing the police have not been forced to use their pistols, and it is to be hoped they will not have to do so. As the employing draymen, however, now threaten to arm their teamsters in self-protection, bloodshed may be feared. All good citizens will deplore such an ending to this most unfortunate conflict. But there is a worse thing than bloodshed in the streets of San Francisco. It is that peace, order, and law should be overridden by rioters. These disturbances must be checked, and they will be checked, even if in addition to the police force of the city it requires the troops of the State."

We may be lucky after all that our

population is composed of so many different races, which never can join hands, and that our local strikes so far have only amounted to a tempest in a teapot.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

We are glad to see that baseball is being played in Kapiolani Park on Sunday. We certainly cannot see that any harm can come of enjoying a Sunday afternoon in a healthy and interesting sport. A Sunday in Honolulu is as dull and tiresome as it possibly could be in a puritan town a hundred years ago. We hope baseball on Sunday is a forerunner for the making of Sunday an enjoyable and truly restful day where body and mind can throw off the cares of the week. It is better for the young men to spend Sunday playing ball than to sit around the numerous green tables with stacks of chips before them or to swell beer all day at the different resorts.

The system of interpreters' attendance in the Courts is very faulty and causes many complaints. Judge Wilcox is frequently delayed in his work through their absence in the upper court. This morning there were demands for a Japanese, Portuguese and Norwegian interpreter. The Japanese policeman acted as interpreter, but it really not proper that he should do so. The official Portuguese interpreter didn't show up and it was evidently difficult to find a Norwegian interpreter. Absent official interpreters will be put on record whenever they stay away from the Courts and their salaries docked. Each court should have its own set of interpreters to avoid unnecessary delays of public business.

Hawaiian Mails.

WASHINGTON, August 14.—G. W. Carr, assistant superintendent in charge of the railway mail service in Hawaii, was in conference with Acting Postmaster General Shallenberger today. He says the volume of the mails in Hawaii has increased fully 100 per cent since the American regime began. Save for himself, two inspectors and three clerks from San Francisco, the entire Hawaiian postal system is administered by resident officials and employees.

The postmasters throughout the islands, besides the native Hawaiians and the Americans who were there before the American regime was installed, include English, German, Portuguese and other nationalities. None of the ninety or one hundred postoffices on the islands has had to call on the United States for employees of any kind.

Carr will return to Honolulu by the 15th proximo, when he will arrange transportation service for four years beginning next year. He will go from here to New York to look into the sea port mail service on the American line, preliminary to instituting a similar service on the Oceanic line between San Francisco and Honolulu, under which a postal clerk will be aboard each steamer.

Death of a Great Statesman.

NAPLES, August 11.—Signor Crispien died at 7:45 o'clock this evening. He was surrounded by the members of his family and several intimate friends. The news was immediately telegraphed to King Emmanuel and Queen Helena. The newspapers assert that the body will be conveyed by steamer to Palermo, where the municipal authorities will arrange for a great public funeral.

Canavaro May Leave.

J. M. Vivas has received a letter from A. de Souza Canavaro, the Portuguese Charge d'Affaires, dated San Francisco, stating that he would not return to Hawaii, but was about to leave for Portugal. Mr. Canavaro finds no relief in the climate of the Coast metropolis and wants to try his native air. He has been in Hawaii many years. His former wife is now Sister Saogamita, a Buddhist nun.

Reports from Hilo indicate that the Volcano is showing increased activity.

The engagement of Miss Floss Hill to Mr. Walter F. Drake is announced.

Monday, September 2, being Labor Day, all public offices will be closed on that day.

The steamship Ventura, from Sydney, for San Francisco, may arrive tonight.

A Japanese was fined \$200 in the District Court this morning for selling beer without a license.

The Eagles and the Red Men played yesterday afternoon at Kapiolani Park. The Eagles won with a score of 21 to 19.

Miss Ernestine Coughran has been succeeded on the Advertiser by H. F. Kinney. Miss Coughran goes to the Republic.

One acre of cane of the Honolulu plantation was burned on Saturday night. It is believed that the fire was caused by incendiarism.

The smugglers beat the E. O. Hall & Son team at baseball on Saturday afternoon. It was a good game but a small audience.

The decision in the Income Tax case had not been handed down at noon today. The Supreme Court will probably be in session this afternoon.

Colonel C. J. McCarthy and Mr. Lewis, of J. H. Lovejoy & Co., are expected to return tomorrow evening from an extended trip to the Bartlett springs where they have taken the waters.

A Porto Rican pleaded guilty to a charge of having been drunk but begged the mercy of the court, as he had a wife and two small children. The judge said that a man should have thought of his wife and his children before spending his money on rum and inflicted the usual fine.

A Japanese hackdriver was charged in the District Court this morning with leaving his horse untied at the wharf. He and a friend of his, also a hackdriver, told such an impossible story to prove their innocence that the Judge remarked "that he had heretofore been unaware of the existence in Japan of descendants of the late Annanias," and he fined the offender \$10 and costs.

Very little work was done in the Circuit Court. A case set for hearing this morning was continued by Judge Gear who said that the case was rather long and he wished to be present this afternoon at the Queen's birthday luncheon. Later on he found out that that pleasing event takes place next Monday, when all government offices will be closed on account of Labor Day.

The new 500 ton Spreckelsville mill is nearly completed.

A friendly boxing match may take place between Jim Fox and Lon Agnew.

The Leslie Baldwin, ship E. D. Carleton, Sch. Reporter and a bark arrived this morning.

Yoshikawa, a Japanese laborer committed suicide at Paia, Maui, on the 17th inst. by hanging.

Between forty and fifty acres of cane were destroyed at Kapalana, Hamakua, on the 21st inst.

Four acres of cane at Olaa were burned last week. The fire was caused by sparks from a locomotive.

The Hamakua forest fire is still gaining headway. The estimated loss to plantations and homesteads is \$100,000.

Eben Low of Puuwaawa has recently imported a splendid thoroughbred stallion which was safely landed at Mahukona.

The Postal authorities have fined the I. I. S. N. Co., \$200 for failure to deliver two bags of mail which arrived from Kauai on Saturday.

As Was Expected.

This afternoon the Supreme Court handed down its decision in re the constitutionality of the Income Tax Law, which is sustained, Justice Galbraith dissenting. A decision was also filed in re appeal of habeas corpus cases, Judge Gear's decision in the Circuit being reversed. Justice Galbraith gives a dissenting opinion.
