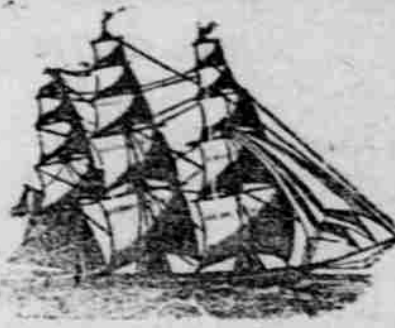

THE QUEEN'S PROTEST.

A Masterly Document.

Dole Outdone.

HONOLULU, H. I.,
June 28th, 1894.

To:—
SIR:—Having in mind the amicable relations hitherto existing between the government which you here represent, and the government of Hawaii, as evidenced by many years of friendly intercourse, and, being desirous of bringing to the attention of your government the facts here, following:

"I, Liliuokalani, by the grace of God and under the Constitution of the Hawaiian Kingdom, Queen, do hereby solemnly protest that I am now, and have continuously been since the 20th day of January, A. D. 1891, the Constitutional Sovereign of the Hawaiian Kingdom, that on the 17th day of January, A. D. 1893 (in the words of the President of the United States himself), 'By an act of war, committed with the participation of a diplomatic representative of the United States, and without the authority of Congress, the government of a feeble but friendly and confiding people has been overthrown. A substantial wrong has thus been done which a due regard for our national character as well as the rights of the injured people requires we should endeavor to repair;' that on said date, I, and my government, prepared a written protest against any and all acts against myself and the Constitutional Government of the Hawaiian Kingdom by certain persons claiming to have established a Provisional government of, and for this Kingdom, that said protest was forwarded to the President of the United States, also to Sanford B. Dole, the Chairman of the Executive Council of the said Provisional government, and was by letter duly acknowledged; that in response to said protest, the President of the United States, sent a special commissioner in the person of Hon. James H. Blount, to Honolulu to make an accurate, full, and impartial investigation of the facts attending the subversion of the Constitutional Government of Hawaii, and the installment in its place of the Provisional government; that said Commissioner arrived in Honolulu, on the 29th day of March, A. D. 1893, and fulfilled his duties with untiring diligence and with rare tact and fairness; that said Commissioner found that the Government of Hawaii surrendered its authority under a threat of war, until such time only as the government of the United States, upon the facts being presented to it, should reinstate the Constitutional Sovereign, and the Provisional government was created to exist until terms of union with the United States of America had been negotiated and agreed upon, also that but the lawless occupation of Honolulu, under false pretenses by United States forces, and but for the United States Minister's recognition of the Provisional government, when the United States forces were its sole support and constituted its only military strength, I, and my government would never have yielded to the Provisional government, even for a time, and for the sole purpose of submitting my case to the enlightened justice of the United States, or for any purpose; also, that the great wrong done to this feeble but independent state by an abuse of the authority of the United States, should be undone by restoring the legitimate government.

That, since the happening of said events, the Executive and the Congress of the United

States have formally declined the overtures of the said Provisional government for the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands to the United States.

That notwithstanding said recited facts, said Provisional government has continued to exercise the function of government in this Kingdom to the present date, and that its course, from the time of its inception to the present, has been marked by a succession of arbitrary, illiberal and despotic acts, and by the enactment and enforcement of pretended laws subversive of the first principles of free government and utterly at variance with the traditions, history, habits and wishes of the Hawaiian people.

That said Provisional Government has now recently convened and is now holding what it is pleased to term a constitutional convention, composed of nineteen (19) self-appointed members, being the President and Executive and Advisory Councils of said Provisional Government, and eighteen (18) delegates elected by less than ten per cent (10 per cent) of the legal voters of the Kingdom, consisting almost entirely of aliens, and chiefly of such aliens as have no permanent home or interests in Hawaii, and which said convention is now considering a draft of a constitution [copy of which is hereto annexed] submitted for its approval by the Executive Council of said provisional government consisting of the President and Ministers thereof.

That it is the expressed purpose of the said provisional government to promulgate such Constitution as shall be approved by said convention without submitting it to a vote of the people, or of any of the people, and to thereupon proclaim a government under such constitution, and under the name of the Republic of Hawaii.

That the said provisional government has not assumed a republican or other Constitutional form, but has remained a mere executive council or oligarchy, set up without the assent of the people; that it has not sought to find a permanent basis of popular support, and has given no evidence of an intention to do so; that its representatives assert that the people of Hawaii are unfit for popular government and frankly avow that they can be best ruled by arbitrary or despotic power, and that the proposed constitution, so submitted by said executive council of the provisional government for the approval of said convention does not provide for a template a free, popular or republican form of government, but does contemplate and provide for a form of government of arbitrary and oligarchical powers, concentrated in the hands of a few individuals irresponsible to the people, or to the representatives of the people, and which is opposed to all modern ideas of free government.

Wherefore, I, the constitutional sovereign of the Hawaiian Kingdom, on behalf of myself and the people of my said Kingdom do hereby again most solemnly protest against the act aforesaid, and against any and all other acts done against myself, my people and the constitutional government of the Hawaiian Kingdom, and I do hereby most earnestly request that the government represented by you will not extend its recognition to any pretended government of the Hawaiian Kingdom under whatever name it may apply for such recognition, other than the constitutional government so

disposed as aforesaid,—except such government shall show its title to exist by the will of the people of Hawaii, expressed at an election wherein the whole people shall have had an opportunity, unembarrassed by force and enderterred by fear or fraud, to register their preferences as to the form of government under which they will live.

With assurances of my esteem,

I am, Sir,

(Signed) LILIUOKALANI.

A NICE CRITIC.

Harold M. Sewall does not approve of President Cleveland's policy. That is really too bad for the unfortunate chief of the United States administration. Mr. Sewall does not keep his disapproval for himself, but he puts it on record in a letter addressed by him to the Democratic caucus in Bath, Me.

That Harold M. Sewall should disapprove of Cleveland's Samoan and Hawaiian politics is not to be wondered at, but that the *Advertiser* of all papers should reproduce his letter, quote and admire him seems a little inconsistent when we remember the treatment which Harold M. experienced during his brief, but eventful stay in Hawaii.

Mr. H. M. Sewall was at one time U. S. Consul-General to Samoa. His career there is none of our concern. The special point in Cleveland's Samoan politics which he objects to, is that he was relieved from his office. Out of charity we will not mention the immediate cause which made Mr. Sewall impossible in Samoa.

In Hawaii, this "critic" of Cleveland appeared one day in company with a "Doctor" Bowen. On board the steamer, the two gentlemen surrounded themselves with a halo of official mystery or mysterious officiousness,—and a strong odor of whiskey. "Doctor" Bowen presented himself as the editor of the *New York World* and as a confidential friend of Cleveland and a bearer of special dispatches to Mr. Blount with whom he was to act as a commission. Harold M. who had just, according to his own statement, refused a place in the administration as assistant secretary of foreign affairs devoted himself to the gentle sex and whiskey and sipped mysterious words about his important mission, his secret dispatches to Blount and his share in the "Commission." Occasionally, the whiskey became too strong for the little man and he would roll off his horse sprain his ankle and curse his dear friend Cleveland for having sent him to this God-forsaken country where even "the hosses (hic)" wouldn't go straight."

Both the alleged emissaries of the U. S. President seemed interviews with the Queen, and both approached the leading royalists with offers of services for the just and righteous cause of the Queen which they were led to espouse from the deep sense of justice and American honor (not whiskey) of which they both were full. If it should be convenient for the royalists to advance say \$10,000 merely as a matter of form to pay running expenses, the two gentlemen would work with still greater ardor in the cause of justice etc. The Doctor also wanted to know if it was worth his while to accept the post as minister to Hawaii. Was there any perquisites or some little chance for a profitable speculation? If so he would tell friend Cleveland that he would take it. Harold M. would under similar circumstances be willing to take the office as Consul-General—if he didn't take the assistant secretary job.

In the meantime Mr. Blount heard about the doings of the two alleged ambassadors and as was his habit said—nothing. He wrote a letter. To whom it was addressed, we do not know but an answer came from secretary Gresham in which the U. S. administration repudiated the two "tourists" in the warmest

terms and denied all knowledge of them in any shape, manner or form. Mr. Blount for once opened his mouth and allowed the contents of the Gresham letter to be known. That settled the career of the two important personages, but Mr. Gresham's action left a deep feeling ranking in the bosom of Harold M. against Cleveland, his government and his policy. He finally became an object of the *Advertiser's* strongest hatred, because he, while drunk, repeated something which Mr. Dole was supposed to have said and which was rather compromising to our brainy president. And of such, oh, Cleveland, are your critics made!

Commercial Imagination.

In a glowing article a few days ago the *Advertiser* spreads itself on the wonderful prospects which it says are in store for Mr. Thurston's trolley road which it is proposed to built in the back streets and along the beach to Waikiki. The warning words which we wrote for the benefit of those who might be galled into becoming stock-holders are scorned by the enthusiastic *Advertiser* and it is claimed that we lack commercial imagination. If that article is necessary to appreciate Mr. Thurston's different financial schemes we admit that we lack it and we are convinced that a large number of other people is devoid of it—more especially the stock holders.—As the trolley road has very small chances of materializing we shall devote no further space to discuss the merits and prospects of the project. We only desire to say the *Advertiser* if the following enterprises are the results of "commercial imagination." The Volcano House Company, the Bureau of Information Company, the Cyclorama Company, the Midwinter Fair Company, the guava jelly company, etc. etc. The promoter's imagination may have been of great pecuniary advantage to himself—the "commercial imagination" of his stockholders has been somewhat checked.
