## THIS YEAR'S SUGAR CROP

ABOUT TWENTY-TWO AND HALF  
MILLION DOLLARS.

Over Two Hundred and Eighty-Two  
Thousand Tons Produced in the Various  
Islands.

The entire sugar crop of the Hawaiian Islands, for the year from October 1st, 1898, to September 30, 1899, as computed from reports of the different plantations for the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association, was 282,807 tons, or 655,614,000 pounds. At \$80 per ton this represents a value of \$22,624,560.00. Latest quotations are 4 15-16 cents, per pound.

The Island of Hawaii produced 117,239 tons of this output, Kauai 65,359 tons, Maui 54,389 tons and Oahu 45,820 tons. The amounts in tons from the various plantations were as follows:

## NEW SUGAR CROP.

Several mills on Kauai will be started working on the new crop of sugar next week. A little of the old crop still remains unshipped. There are 2500 bags at Kekaha, 1875 at Koloa and 1250 at Makaweli.

## LIMES FUMIGATED.

In the matter of the eight boxes of limes brought here from Apia since the orders of the Commissioner of Agricultural ordering limes from the South Sea Islands destroyed, it has been decided to thoroughly fumigate them and allow them to be landed. The order forbidding importation was made on the information from Prof. Koebel that the Mediterranean fly was prevalent in the South Sea Islands. The eight boxes of limes were treated by a strong solution of lime water. This it is said entirely destroys all danger of the pest.

## NO LEONIDS LAST NIGHT

STAR-GAZERS AGAIN WATCH IN VAIN.

Professor Ingalls Thinks the Leonids May Have Changed Their Orbit or Met Destruction.

The watch for Leonids was repeated last night, with no better success than on the night before. Clouds obscured the heavens during a large part of the night, but there were enough intervals and patches of clear to enable all observers to see that the expected grand display did not come. Perhaps other watchers in more favored spots on the earth saw them, and perhaps they will come tonight or tomorrow.

Professor A. B. Ingalls of Oahu College was on the watch all night with his instruments, prepared to record observations, but he was rewarded only by one meteor, which is duly noted on the record. The professor will watch again tomorrow morning, from midnight on, and on Saturday morning the same.

"The cloudiness of the weather prevented anything like a complete watching of the heavens," said Professor Ingalls, "but it is certain, nevertheless, that the Leonids did not fall as they were expected to, and the one that I saw probably had no connection with the shower. It is possible that at other points on the earth the Leonids were seen just as in 1833 and 1865. Honolulu may not be favorably located for observing them."

"Another possibility is that the Leonids will not fall this year at all. It may be that the earth's contact with them in 1833 and again in 1865 or some other heavenly body, has destroyed them as a collection of flying bodies, or has thrown them out of their orbit so that they will not encounter our planet again. This is only a guess, to account for their seeming absence this time. If they should appear again, and if they do not appear then, we can only wait for news of what observers in other countries saw."

## THE SAN FRANCISCO VIEW.

Speculation There About the Charles E. Moody.

The ship Charles E. Moody, Captain Woodside, has cleared for Tacoma in ballast. Captain Anderson, now of the Lucile, will bring her back here with coal.

The following was published in San Francisco regarding the Moody on the second of this month:

"The general impression is that the Moody has been lost. She sailed from Norfolk, Va., for Honolulu and was last spoken on June 11th, 1 degree south of the equator. From that position she is now out 142 days, a very bad showing."

"Still there are some who take hope from the fact that the vessel occupied fifty-three days on the voyage down the equator. The usual passage is about twenty-five days. Another fact that is not generally known is that the Moody has only five white men in her crew. The remainder of the crew consisted of fifteen Japanese. Captain Woodside of the Moody telegraphed this fact the day before she sailed. The Captain is well known at this port, having formerly commanded the 'Sintrom'."

## SOLDIER BALL-PLAYERS.

There was a game of baseball this morning on the Makiki parade grounds between teams composed of members of the 29th Infantry and casuals on board the transport Pennsylvania. The game of the 29th was won by a score of 16 to nothing. This afternoon they are to play with Oahu college. The members of the victorious nine are nearly all in Company H. Most of them held places on a nine that traveled through Iowa recently, nearly all enlisting together at the end of the tour, and they will be worthy opponents for the college boys.

## NARROW ESCAPE.

KAUNAKAKAI, November 14.—A contest between two miniature yachts on Sunday led to a narrow escape from drowning. One of the yachts put out to sea. It was followed by two men in a sloop and led them a chase of about five miles before they came up with it. When near it one of the men jumped overboard to seize it. The sloop became unmanageable and it was an hour or more before the swimmer could be rescued.

MAKAWAO (Maui), November 11.—The November meeting of the Makawao Debating Society took place last evening in the Paila Foreign church parlors, and a very interesting discussion was had. The question was "Resolved, that the world owes more to navigation than to railroads," led by W. S. Nicoll and D. F. Fleming on the affirmative and R. F. Engle and F. E. Ataxer on the negative. The vote resulted in favor of the affirmative. The question chosen for the next debate is "Resolved, that arbitration is the proper mode of settling national disputes."

## PEACE AT THE SETTLEMENT

TROUBLE CAUSED BY DROUGHT SMOOTHED OVER.

Agent Reynolds Holds a General Pow-Wow on Molokai and Restores General Good Feeling—The Trouble.

Agent Reynolds of the Board of Health returned from the Molokai settlement last night after having brought about a peaceful solution of a complicated cause of trouble as ever disturbed the peace of any community.

Along the foot of the hill within the settlement limits is a strip of land containing about three hundred acres, which because it is right under the hall receivers, even in dry seasons enough rain to keep it always green. It is fenced off from the rest of the land by a stone wall, and has been reserved for garden plots for the people of the settlement. They have made very little use of it, however, and in a few cases have not even conformed to the rules of the board by registering their several plots. During the long continued drought every other part of the settlement became as dry and dusty as a road, and the stock in the settlement, both that belonging to the residents, died in large numbers. In this state of affairs, Agent Reynolds some time ago authorized the police and others who were obliged to use their horses continually to gather them in this plot to graze, being careful not to permit them to destroy any garden plots.

This order and its execution caused no end of trouble. A committee was formed to meet Mr. Reynolds on his arrival last week to protest. The committee insisted that the Board of Health had no rights in that particular plot, and wanted all sorts of recompense for the use that had been made of it. Mr. Reynolds met the committee, explained the situation to them, and told them that the board had no rights, but that the people in the settlement had no rights unless they conformed to the rules of the board. Finally the matter was adjusted to the satisfaction of all, and peace was restored to the community.

## "IL TRAVOTORE."

Tonight's Performance and the Bill for Saturday.

In tonight's production of "Il Travotore" Nellie Andrews will sing "Leonora," A. J. Parmelee, "Marricco," Maude Leekley, "Azucena," and Lovette Rockwell, "Count De Luna."

On Saturday afternoon the "Musketoes" will be presented. This opera was made famous through a schoolroom second act. It is a true tale of fun, and calls forth the heartiest kind of laughter.

Saturday evening Offenbach's "La Belle Helene" will be given. The plot deals with the mythological "Helen of Troy," "Paris" and the "Ten Years' War." It is replete with comic situations and gems of melody. There are many interpolations to bring the forty-year-old favorite up-to-date. Amongst these is the "March of the White Town" by the chorus girls dressed in gold and silver armor. There will also be a cake walk, introducing George Best, who has claims as a champion in his line.

## LOST THREE HORSES.

The bark Mauna Ala lost three horses on the way from San Francisco, arriving here with thirty-three. The death of the three was due to the length of the trip, the vessel being 26 days on the way. Heavy seas, with light winds, were encountered, and the consequence was a lot of rolling and pitching. The bark got the swell from a storm in the north.

## TOOK TOILET ARTICLES.

C. H. Mann, a Chinese employed by the Hollister Drug Company is locked up at the police station charged with larceny in the second degree. He has been suspected for some time of stealing things out of the store. Yesterday a search was made of his room, and a large quantity of cigars, toilet articles, tooth-brushes, perfume, soap and that sort of thing were found there. The charge against him in the Police Court was the value of the property at \$95, but it is said that a great deal more than this has been taken. In Police Court this morning plea was reserved and the case went over until tomorrow morning. Meanwhile Mann's bondsman surrendered him.

## NUISANCE COMPLAINED OF.

Complaint has been made of a nuisance caused by the overflow of a cesspool connected with brick building on King street occupied by the Gazette Company and other firms. The cesspool overflows on to the government lot at the back and thence flows on the surface of the ground into Merchant street.

## LUMBER AND COAL ARRIVE.

The American schooner Oceanic Vance, Captain Murchison, arrived at noon today from Newcastle with 710 tons of coal. She left on the 9th of October, making a very good passage. The barkentine Skagit, Captain Robinson, arrived from Port Townsend with 610,000 feet of lumber.

## TWO SUGAR CARGOES.

The ship George W. Curtis, Captain Canham, cleared today for San Francisco with 250 tons of ballast and 4645 bags of sugar, value, \$17,857.10. The brig J. D. Sprickels took 2407 bags of sugar, valued at \$12,935.

## WAR DRAMA AT ORPHEUM

BUGLES AND BAYONETS NOT ON THE BILL.

The Provost Guard Marches in Twenty Strong Looking for Men Who Had Overstayed Their Leave.

There was a military drama at the Orpheum last night which was not on the bill.

A little before 10 o'clock the audience heard the strains of a bugle sounding somewhere as though it were back of the stage, though in reality it was on Fort Street. Presently the doors of the theater opened wide and in came a provost guard of about twenty, with bayonets fixed, looking for men from the transports, who had overstayed their leave. They found plenty of them. There were a good many soldiers in the house, and most of them were long overdue at the vessel, but had no idea of leaving the show until it was over. They knew what the provost guard meant however, and there was a scurrying of the boys in blue and the boys in brown to make an exit without coming in contact with the provost guard. Few of them succeeded however. The guard was well handled and got nearly every man they were after. All the time the bugle just outside kept to his bugle right lustily, as though he were sounding a charge against the enemies of his country.

The rumor that a man had been shot on the street earlier in the evening gave a realism to the drama that was too much for some of the audience and they left. The play on the stage went on however despite the interruption.

There was considerable criticism of the action of the provost guard in making such an interruption of the performance. The soldiers in the audience were entirely orderly, and if they had overstayed their leave they might have been arrested as they came out of the theater. The theater pays a license and is attended by the general public, and to interrupt the performance in the way it was last night, it is pointed out is an injustice to both the management and its patrons.

## THE MONTH'S METEOROLOGY.

Professor Lyon's Summary of Weather Records for October.

The following is the meteorological summary for the month of October, 1899:

Temperature mean for the month, 75.7 Fahrenheit; normal, 75.3; average daily maximum, 81.4; average daily minimum, 71.4; average daily range, 10.0; greatest daily range, 21.0; least, 6.0; highest temperature, 85; lowest, 64. Barometer average, 29.971; normal, 29.966 (corrected for gravity); highest, 30.11; lowest, 29.81; greatest change in 24 hours, 6.10.

Relative humidity, mean of 9 a. m. and 9 p. m., 69.6; normal, 70.5; mean dew point, 65.3; normal, 65; absolute moisture, 6.86 grains per cubic foot.

Rainfall, 4.92 inches; normal, 2.29; total since January 1st, 21.59; this is 5.74 inches below normal.

Trade winds interrupted six days; normal trades for October 22 days. Cloudiness, 5.5 (tenths of sky); normal, 4.3.

The artesian well level rose during the month from 34.3 feet to 34.5 feet above mean sea-level. It is a question whether this rise is not partly due to the fact that the rice lands are dried at this period for the fall harvest.

A heavy rainfall from the north over nearly the entire group occurred between the 18th and 25th. The following 24 hour records are the leading ones: Kilauea, 8.40 inches; Pepee, 6.32 on the 17th; Paaloa, 5.70 on the 19th; Nahiku, East Maui, 5.97; Haleakala Ranch, 2.54; Wailie street, Honolulu, 4.31 on the 20th.

The first snow of the season fell on Mauna Kea and Mauna Loa on the 19th, accompanied by thunder and lightning at Hilo and elsewhere. Light earthquakes, Hilo, 29th and 31st, also at Waimea.

## DRIED HIS TEARS.

"Go home, now, and tell your mother the judge says you must go to school." The words dried the freely flowing tears which Charlie Kikili had vainly tried to stop by using his cap for a handkerchief. Charlie was before the District Court on a charge of truancy. The trial officer said that though he was six years old he had never been to school. He admitted however, in answer to a question by Judge Wilcox, that he had never notified the parents to send Charlie to school. The judge thought the parents ought to be notified before bringing the child up for truancy, and so dismissed the boy.

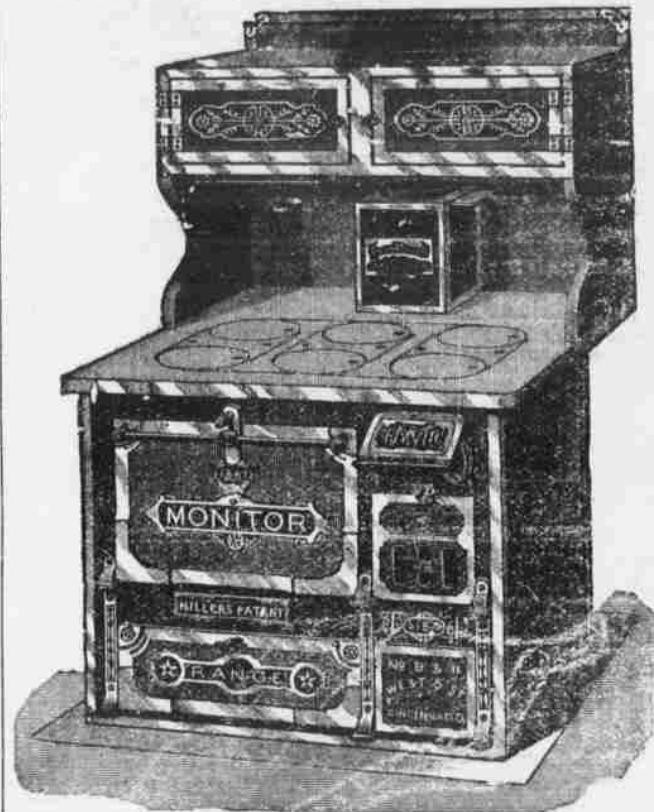

**WHO ARE THE TRAITORS**  
AMERICAN AMMUNITION USED BY INSURGENTS.

Concord, U. S. A. Stamped on the Shrapnel Used by Aguinaldo's Forces Against Uncle Sam's Troops.

ANGELES, October 17.—The fierce fighting of Monday morning was followed by a forced calm. Up to 3 o'clock in the afternoon, the enemy had fired but six shots, all of them being from one pounder. At 9:15 in the evening, the insurgents opened up a heavy fire upon our outposts. The attack was a spasmodic one, however, for, after fifteen minutes of heavy volleying, the firing ceased.

An astounding discovery was made, yesterday. Upon examination it was found that some of the shrapnel used by the rebels bore the stamp of "Concord, U. S. A."

It has been suspected for some time that the rebels had American ammunition in their possession, and this proved the fact. The Orient contains many adventures, (soldiers of fortune) who call themselves Americans. There is no doubt that if sufficient money was provided, they would turn traitor and conduct a filibustering expedition.

A study of the plan of attack leaves no doubt that it was carefully prepared. The enemy opened up simultaneously from three different positions, with artillery and small arms fire. The wounded are reported as out of danger.

The fourth Artillery, with guns and caissons, came up on this afternoon's train.

The year's sugar crop is a satisfactory one. We have gone ahead of the production of any previous period. People knowing that there is a stable government are willing to do their very utmost to get the best out of our productive soil.

Everybody wants to know what has become of the Leonids, the town has been sitting up to unseemly hours to see them, but they have never put in an appearance. The theory that the attraction of the earth has put the star shower out of gear is untenable, since there are records of the same shower going back as far as 702 of the present era. The probability is that we are so far west that the shower is over before we have a chance of seeing it. There may have been brilliant meteoric displays in the old world. It might be worth while looking up the records of 1833 and 1866.

## SOLDIERS.

The officers of the transports in the harbor are to be commended for the care with which they looked after their men last night. It is no small matter to let loose fifteen hundred men in a strange city and have the order that was kept. Shortly after midnight the provost guard was in evidence, and those of the soldiers who did not behave were promptly rounded up.

There was, it is true, a case of shooting, but it was in the interest of discipline. The man who was shot by the guard was a Negro sergeant. He was flourishing a revolver around and starting in to own the low section of the town. As he would not obey military orders to give up his pistol and behave, he received the punishment that military law allows.

Our own police are perfectly capable of handling even troops who come through and they have shown their ability time and again, but it is satisfactory to them to have the burden of handling, howling handfuls of blasphemy and drunkenness taken off their hands and attended to by those whose duty it is to see that discipline is preserved.

In all aggregations of troops there must be a substratum of rank and fellows. It speaks well that in spite of this fact there has never been any serious disturbance while the 60,000 soldiers of the United States have passed through our island port.

If one considers for a moment the poor pay, and the many discomforts of a soldier's life, and the fact that he may be going to his grave in the Luzon rice fields one can only echo the words of Lord Clive to the Parliamentary Committee "By God! gentlemen, I am astonished at my moderation."

## SAMOA.

The remarkable tripartite Berlin agreement has come to an end and the Samoan Islands will go either into American or British control, as it may be agreed upon between the two Anglo-Saxon powers. Under any circumstances the Island of Tutuila with its harbor of Pago-Pago is American property and the chances are that the whole group will become an appenage of the Great Republic.

That the tripartite arrangement was unworkable has been very evident almost from its inception. To the student of history it was a foregone conclusion, but statesmen are not always students of history, and then, moreover, they like to try experiments, and Samoa was experimented upon in somewhat costly fashion. Each signatory to the Berlin treaty has lost officers and men in petty quarrels for which the gallant fellows were far too good to die. The Samoan has been shrewd enough to play the jealousies of the local representatives of the powers, one against the other. It is by no means the first semi-savage who has learned the trick and profited by the folly of his superiors and betters.

But all this is over now. It matters very little which power becomes the ruler of Samoa, the end will be the same. The lands will be developed, order will come out of chaos, and the busy hum of industry will sound in the sleepy hollows of the southern archipelago. It will not be so dreamy as Stevenson enjoyed, but it will become practical and useful.

Looking at possibilities it seems probable that now that Germany occupies the whole of the line Island belt, Great Britain, with its interests in Fiji, will be quite willing to quit in Samoa and round out her southern possessions with Tonga. This latter is ripe to fall into her hands. There is dissatisfaction with the present ruler King George, and anarchy would come if his petty government were overthrown. Only a strong power can occupy the place. There is a good harbor at Tonga, while Apia is really only an open roadstead, the only true harbor in the Samoan Islands is at Pago-Pago which is in Am-

erican hands. Eventually New Caledonia will have to fall into Anglo-Saxon hands, but that will be in the far future of the next century.

Of course this is looking ahead some distance, but the way things are moving in the Pacific one can predicate results pretty fairly. The day for independent Polynesian monarchies has passed away. They have been bolstered up and the strong nations have done their best for them, but the progress of the world has decreed that they are not to be. Men of talent from the west have wasted their energies upon them, believed in them, sacrificed themselves for them, but to no purpose.

It is safe to say that the Pacific during next century will be divided between three powers—America, Germany and Great Britain. France though now having a foothold will in the coming years lose it. Not only will New Caledonia, but Tahiti will slip from her grasp. She has never been a colonizing power, though she has considerable foreign possessions. The people she deals with never assimilate. On the other hand Germans, Americans and British do. To the Frenchman there is but one Mecca—Paris. To the three former, the place that he makes his home, becomes his Mecca.

The events in Samoa are only another indication of what is going to happen in the Pacific within a very few years.

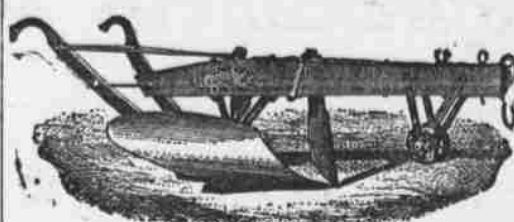

## SHOT BY PROVOST GUARD

SERGEANT JONES' PAUHAH STREET CAREER.

It Ends in the Hospital With a Krag-Jorgensen Bullet Through His Body. Guard Commended.

Pauha street last night heard the crack of the Krag-Jorgensen rifle which has become so familiar to the Filipinos by this time.

Sergeant Jones of the 25th Infantry (colored), received the bullet from the rifle right through the chest, the missile entering on the right side just below the collar bone and leaving below the shoulder blade. He is now at the Military hospital at Buena Vista and is reported as doing as well as could be expected.

He was shot by Private James E. McCallum, of the 39th Infantry, one of the provost guard from the troops on the Pennsylvania, in the discharge of his duty.

The affair occurred about 9 o'clock last night. Jones is a "casual" on the Pennsylvania, en route to join his regiment in the Philippines. In spite of orders to the contrary, Jones in some way carried his revolver with him when he went away from the ship. On shore he added to it a big load of liquor, and by 9 o'clock was in the condition known in the States as "a bad nigger." He insisted that he owned Pauha street. When he first came in contact with Provost Guard McCallum he was flourishing his revolver and asserting his ownership. McCallum ordered him to give up his revolver, which Jones with oaths and other assertions refused to do. The order was repeated with no other effect than to produce a further display of Jones' bellicose condition, and finally he pointed his revolver at the guard and threatened to shoot. McCallum had already warned Jones of the consequences, and when the revolver was pointed at him he used his Krag-Jorgensen first. Jones did not fall immediately, but continued to flourish his revolver and curse, and walked some distance. As he felt he threw his revolver away.

The affair occurred at the corner of Pauha and Nuuanu streets, and was witnessed by Captain Spilner, and Officers Smith and Parker of the police force. Jones was taken at once to Dr. Cooper's office where his wound was dressed and then he was sent to the hospital. McCallum was taken into custody, and to the police station, and word sent to his company commander. Lieutenant Frank came to the station and was present while Deputy Marshal Chillingworth heard the account of the matter from the officers who had seen it. It was very clear that McCallum had only done his duty, and he was immediately released to his military superiors. From them he has received only words of praise and it is said that he is likely to be promoted to corporal. He is a young man only about 21.

Captain Burt, the officer of the day at the time the shooting occurred, made a thorough investigation of the matter and says he is satisfied that McCallum did his duty bravely and well, and will recommend him for promotion.

### BUILDING A FLUME.

KAUNAKAKAI, November 11.—All of the plantation carpenters are very busy at present, some on houses for the Japanese laborers expected shortly. But the majority of them are at work on the flumes, which with the ditch and pipes, will convey the water from the pump in Kaunakakai gulch, to the cane land at Palau. The first flume is almost finished. It will be about a quarter of a mile in length.

There are about nine hundred acres of land plowed, ready for planting.

## WAIALUA ASSESSMENTS

SIXTH CALL IS DEFERRED AT  
PRESENT.

Stock is Now Rising—Assessments  
Hitherto Unpaid Will be Paid in a  
Lump Sum.

Notice has been given that the sixth  
assessment of \$10.00 per share upon  
Waialua stock, due November 15, and  
delinquent on the 15th of December,  
has been deferred until further action  
by the board of directors. As a result,  
apparently, of this action, the stock  
took an upward turn. On Monday it  
was quoted at \$123.50-\$124.00. Tuesday  
\$125 was bid and \$130 asked. Wednes-  
day holders asked \$135 and bidders  
offered \$132.50.

hitherto unpaid on some of the disputed  
stock would be paid up, and also in an-  
ticipation of the issue of 10,000 more  
shares, upon which there would be six  
assessments due at once. The agents  
are confident that the new stock will  
soon be issued without difficulty. There  
are reports on the street of plans to  
oppose the action in the courts, but the  
agents do not expect that any such  
course will be taken.

The matter of the disagreement over  
the question of issuing the new stock  
will be finally settled, it is said, before  
the corporation proceeds with the  
adopted plan.

DRIFTING LIGHTER.

## TO ENDOW THE BISHOPRIC

ACTION TAKEN BY ANGLICAN SYNOD.

Nearly Two Thousand Pounds Already in Hand for the Purpose—Personnel of the Mission Board.

The Diocesan Synod of the Anglican church continued its session last night. In view of the action of the synod favoring a transfer of the diocese to the jurisdiction of the church in America, it was resolved that the church here ought at the present time to be contributing its utmost to a fund to fully safeguard the integrity of the diocese. To put this resolution into effect, a committee was appointed under the presidency of the Bishop to raise an endowment fund for the Bishopric of Honolulu. There is already in the hands of the society for the Propagation of the Gospel, for this purpose, £1,777 17s. 5d.

St. Clement's organization is not represented in the synod. In connection with this fact the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That this Synod should instruct the standing committee to confer with representatives of the organization of St. Clement's with a view to bringing it into such a position as shall entitle it to representation in the Synod of the Anglican Church in Hawaii. The Board of Missions previously provided for was created with the following membership: Bishop Willis, Revs. E. H. Van Derlin, Alexander Mackintosh and V. H. Kiteat, and Commander Pond, C. S. N., Henry Smith, and L. Asen.

The Synod will meet again this evening.

## MRS. FERNANDEZ' DEATH.

Mrs. M. B. Fernandez, of Kapala, Kauai, died last Tuesday at her home after an illness of about three weeks. She was the wife of M. B. Fernandez, keeper of the Kapala store and was very well known in the community. The deceased left a child only a few weeks old.

## EDIBLE FROGS.

Large quantities of young frogs have made their appearance in the vicinity of George Kaihenui's and Doctor Yamamoto's residences. It is not known whether or not these are the first hatching from the original lot planted in the Waialua ponds by W. S. Wise nearly two years ago. It is said that young boys have been catching the frogs and destroying them. If this practice can be stopped Hilo gourmets may have a most delicious table delicacy within a few months.
