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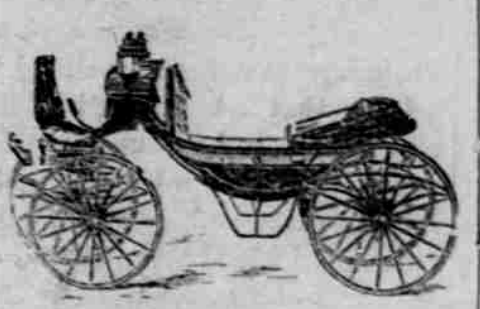

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HAWAII: HOLOMUA PROGRESS.

The Law of the Land is Established
in Righteousness.

HONOLULU, SEPT. 14, 1894.

THE SITUATION.

On the fourth of July the Republic of Hawaii was born. It was at first insinuated that the produce of the Stevens. Dole combination had resulted in an abort, but through artificial means it seems that there was a faint life in the weak being and that it made itself entitled to a place in the world. But they are not happy, those intellectual giants who father the infant. The republic of Hawaii is neither stable nor is it a success. It exists, and its god-fathers and sponsors wonder how to keep life in the puny orphan.

The republic was established more than two months ago. A new constitution was framed and the family compact secured everything for themselves. This move has not proven an undispensible success. Instead of finding the wealth, intelligence and the masses flocking to its banner the republic has learned that distrust, suspicion and open defiance are the reward of a revolutionary government that lacks the backing of the people. Mr. Dole who went into office with the goodwill of everybody, claimed to be a most intelligent conservative but determined man stands to-day in the light of a non compos mentis and realizes today the truth of the poetical saying: "Unesey rests the head that wears a crown."

Surrounded by the men whose unpopularity interferes with their business he is endeavoring to make a single-handed fight against the people of Hawaii. Finding himself among his colleagues as the man between the deep sea and the devil he has learned that popularity is only skin deep and that political friends are bubbles. The Hawaiian republic exists and so does its president. With the open hostility of the thousands and with only coldness from his often disappointed and defrauded friends the president to-day finds himself a very sick man, a man who has got a pronounced headache.

The country has gone to the devil. The problem before the people cannot and will not be solved by the present regime. It is a last, a desperate game to hold up the banner of the family compact and defend until the last ditch the alleged privileges of four alleged haole friends.

What is the situation to-day? Dissatisfaction and distrust in all ranks. Lack of power, lack of money wherever the government is mentioned. An empty treasury and a constant claim for food from the men who state that they made this government and to-day supports it. A scheme of nepotism and patronage never equalled in this country. Hopeless connections with Japan and yet more hopeless connections with the countries of old. A fruitless but expensive mission to Thurston who goes to seek new labor and new fields and an open assurance that Hawaii's present all hopes of a renewal of the treaty is *puu loa* and that the day of retribution has come.

Beyond doubt the day of retaliation is at hand. No government could exist in the world under the present circumstances. The treasury is empty. The private influences of S. M. Damon are temporarily checked, the haoles look with suspicion at the native and the latter hates his enemy of the race.

The death of Mrs. Mary Hanaka is announced. The deceased was a most respectable Hawaiian lady, for many years a resident of Lahaina. Among her numerous children are Messrs. James Campbell, Otto Isenberg and W. H. Cummings. Mrs. Hanaka died at the residence of Mrs. Campbell and the funeral took place this afternoon. The sympathy of the community is extended to the relatives of the departed lady.

The *Advertiser* is making an urgent plea to the editor of the *HOLOMUA* asking him to register. The "ostensible" editor of the *Advertiser* evidently doesn't know what he is talking about. The *HOLOMUA* has never advocated registration or advised the people to vote. We have constantly and persistently counselled the Hawaiians to make up their minds to the fact that the destiny of their country is in their own hands, and that they must not look for foreign help if they really desire to run their own government.

Two methods seemed feasible in this emergency. One was to fight and the other was to register and vote. It is fully left to the Hawaiians to decide which of the two measures they will adopt. We have no preference in the matter because we believe that the Hawaiians will come out victorious in both instances.

If the Hawaiians had made up their minds to go to the polls we believe that they would have been able to control the next legislature. If they concluded that fighting was the best we feel assured that the 11,000 could sweep the 2,000 into the sea, as Mr. Gresham pleasantly suggested to certain Hawaiians a short while ago. We are inclined to believe that the strength of the royalists is to be found in politics and political intrigue. The reform party had everything its own way in 1887. In 1890 they were taught a lesson. They have everything their own way to-day. A month from now the ballots might have told a different tale. However the people has made up their minds not to enter into the political arena. Time will show if they are correct. In the meantime we presume that they have decided to use the other alternative and we have no doubt that they will be equally successful in that enterprise.

As far as the editor of this paper is concerned the *Advertiser* ought to know that under Mr. Dole's constitution he cannot register or become a voter. Contrary to justice, decency and all liberal principles we find ourselves disfranchised after eleven years residence and deprived of the right to vote which we have exercised for eight years. We expect the *Advertiser* to retract the reflections cast on us for the sake of truth. It is not the habit of the *HOLOMUA* to preach one one and act another.

The *Advertiser* editor has evidently never studied the constitution. If he had he would have known that the Dole-Hatch clique has fixed things in a manner which gives a most absolute power to the government. The natives can vote, undoubtedly, but as far as foreigners are concerned only those who are *personae gratae* with the republic can exercise the franchise. The helplessness and cowardice of the framers of the constitution have been amply illustrated by such an *outrage* measure. They dared not make their republic dependent on popular support. They stole the name of a republic and tried with their stolen goods to cloak a most contemptible, a hypocritical and outrageous oligarchy. You change the constitution, Mr. *Advertiser*, and make this government a republic, pure and simple, and there will be no necessity to drum up people for registrations. From the editor of the *HOLOMUA* to the "devil" they will all be there.

Harry Miller of Pantheon fame has enjoyed a well earned vacation and looks *Al* again. He now dispenses the famous Enterprize beer which invigorates the body and cures all diseases, even *Advertiser* flukes.

J. J. Williams the popular photographer has taken a shot at president Dole and the picture is on exhibition in the window of the Hawaiian News Company store on Merchant St. The president looks well and holds in his hand a document looking like the Schuetzen Club ultimatum. The dust on the table is very realistic.

Fall of virtuous indignation the *Advertiser* bursts forth and tells the world that the attacks of the local royalist press on the mercenary journals in the United States are fruitless and without result. We never doubted it. But we fail to know when Mr. Armstrong the ex-companion of King Kalakana was authorized to speak on behalf of the republic papers of the United States. It might hurt them or it might not to be attacked by the *Bulletin*, "Ka Leo" and *HOLOMUA*. The fact remains, and the *Advertiser* editor cannot deny it, if he knows anything, that a gigantic scale of bribery has been used by the dealers in shingles, the planters and the non-descript paw-borers in Hawaii who label themselves representatives of the wealth, intelligence and influence of Hawaii-*nei*. That a certain portion of the United States' press has been bought cannot be denied. It has openly been confessed by the leading California journalists who belong to the Democratic party. "It is no use," said the editor of San Francisco's biggest paper, for you royalists to correspond with us or make statements in favor of the monarchy. The chink-chink of gold is there and the management instructed the editorial room to follow suit. We don't care a penny who wins the battle, but we want the coin."

The attitude of Mr. Dana of the *New York Sun* has been sufficiently conspicuous to prove that as far as Hawaii is concerned interested motives influenced the political standing of that paper. The Press of the U. S. may not have been in peril through the attacks of the royalist press in Honolulu. The defense by the *Advertiser* kills them outright! If they have any honor or decency yet at stake they should close up or spend the rest of their journalistic life in cursing the paper-eater, W. N. ARMSTRONG.

The proposition to form a society for the prevention of cruelty to animals is a step in the right direction. It is to be hoped that the undertaking will meet success and that energetic measures will be adopted to mitigate the brutality which now is shown to animals all over the country. A new method has been adopted by certain ranchmen in shipping of cattle which should at once be condemned. Mr. E. P. Low is following the Mexican style and his cattle is hoisted by the horns into the steamer instead of being transferred by the usual method of a sling. Out of his first shipment from the "Star" protected ranch of Punawawaa two animals were killed. The shipment was only 29 heads from the said ranch although our contemporary claims it to be 40. The cattle was shipped from Kiholo and it is to be hoped that the *Advertiser* which appears as the champion of the prospective society will step in and condemn any future act of cruelty from "the" want-his-rent-reduced-ranchman.

Cruelty.

The new management is deserving of the best wishes for success and the patronage of the public.

The thousands and thousands of people who read the daily papers and get the news happenings from the four quarters of earth, do so with little thought of the expense attached to getting out a paper and the trials and tribulations of the editor and frequent loss of money to the owners. The difficulties which set the paths of newspaper people vary according to locality; in the Northern States, where there are "nine months winter and three months very late fall," it frequently happens that the roads are blocked with snow, just about the time the paper supply is exhausted, so the editor has to fall back on his polished-surf book paper to get out his edition. In Vicksburg, Mississippi, away back in the sixties an entire stock of wall paper was used in getting out a weekly paper, newspaper was not obtainable.

In some places the people will demand a maximum of news, telegraphic and local at a minimum price, and then want to pay their subscription and advertising bills in wood or vegetables. But when Saturday night comes around the gentle and ungentle compositor rebels, when he is offered anything, but coin in payment for his services, and this accounts for the fact that half the editors in United States are troubled with insomnia. We have known compositors in country towns to actually refuse to live on a diet of roller composition and strike if the editor would not divide the contents of the paste pot.

In Honolulu, things are different; paper is manufactured in California, and the ocean never freezes so hard that the vessel can't run, so there is no delay there in getting a stock of paper; the "types" usually meet the business Managers on Saturday with a broad smile which they give in exchange for good gold coin, and the editors who do not wear search lights in their shirt fronts leave them off, because they do not wish to be mistaken by tourists for capitalists. The compositors, too, are of a better class than you will find on the Pacific Coast; they dress better, live better and are better citizens than you will find in other places, even at twelve and a half cent beer is not indelicate enough for them to take on "jig."
