A POINT.

In the brief prepared by the attorney's for the Government in the Veto case, the Attorney-General speaks of the King as not responsible to the law of the land. By this is evidently meant "subject to its authority." But the exercise of the Veto power is authority in making, and so determining, the law of the land. If exercised in a legitimate way, however different the King's decision may be from the wishes of the Legislature, he cannot be impeached for it, as guilty of any criminal offence. He exercises the responsibility conferred upon him by the law of the land. He is responsible, not to the law, nor to the Legislature, but to the people, just as is the President of the United States in the quotation made by the Attorney-General from Curtis' U. S. Constitutional History: "Because the President himself is responsible to the people for his official acts, and in order to accompany that responsibility with the requisite power both to act upon reasons and to render them, our Constitution has vested in him this particular and qualified negative." If the King has such a limited negative under our Constitution, he is responsible to the people for the wise use of it. Whether the present King is such a man as it would be wise to entrust with any such responsibility is not the question now under discussion. That the Constitution confers it upon him, independent of his Cabinet, does not deprive us of responsible Government by giving him such veto power. He is responsible for the use of the veto not to the Cabinet, not to the Legislature, but to the people.

OTHERWISE EXPRESSED.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—An article in Tuesday evening's BULLETIN, headed "Responsibility and Representation," and signed by "Independent," attracted my attention, and after carefully reading the same, although my views are not the same as his, must admit that I think the article in question is one of the best that has been written by those who favor the veto power. It is entirely free from any abusive language, and although I agree with "Independent" in a great many things, yet I cannot agree with him in the main question, and that is, does Article 48 of the Constitution "otherwise express" the act of the King. He says it does, and quotes from the constitution as follows: "If the King approve he shall sign," and then goes on to say that the advice and consent of the Cabinet is not essential to his approval; but let me ask him, do the words he has quoted "otherwise express" that his approval and signature is to be withheld on the advice and consent of the Cabinet? I think not, and fail to see anything in Article 48 that does

"otherwise express" the act of the King's approval, and such being the case, the same rule applies to his vetoing a bill which must be done by and with the consent of the Cabinet.

"Independent" would confer a great favor by pointing out the words in Article 48 which do "otherwise express" and come under the exception in Article 78 and by so doing would greatly oblige one who does not believe in the irresponsible. Veto.

[We will answer for "Independent." That gentleman's letter distinctly explains the point in the second paragraph. The same explanation has appeared many times over in these columns, editorially and otherwise. We are surprised that anyone with a knowledge of simple English should require an explanation, for Article 48, conferring the right of veto, exempts its exercise from the control of Ministers, provided in Article 78, about as clearly as can be. Article 48 exempts from Ministerial "advice and consent" by distinctly "expressing" that the King's signature to a bill and his refusal to sign are acts which depend entirely on his "approval" and "disapproval." A bill having passed the Legislature is presented to the King; "if he approve he shall sign it and it shall thereby become a law, but, if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the Legislature." Can anything be plainer? He "approves" first, he "signs" next; his "signature" depends on his "approval." If he cannot or does not "approve," he is not required to "sign." What can "advice and consent" have to do with "approval?" A man may be forced to give his signature, but he cannot be forced to approve the act. Approval can be no more compelled than faith, hope or any other operation of the mind. Surely when the act of "signing" is made to depend solely on the King's "approval," it is thereby made distinctly independent of Ministerial "advice and consent." If Article 48 had simply read, "if he sign or endorse it," omitting the word "approve," this would have changed the complexion entirely, making Ministerial "advice and consent" essential, as provided in Article 78. Ed.]

A MODIFICATION.
EDITOR BULLETIN:—I see in your account of the assault and battery against Mr. Bruce and his wife upon their niece which was tried in the Police Court on the 19th inst., you have represented that they were reprimanded by the Judge. If they were reprimanded, which I did not understand to be the case, then I take it, that they were considered guilty to a certain extent and should have received sentence of some kind or another. This, I take it, would have been right to the child, to the community, and also to themselves, as it would have afforded them a chance to appeal to a higher court.

But allow me to say in reference to your paragraph which was:—"It has been decided that Miss Minnie Olsen, Mrs. Bruce's niece, will remain at the English Sisters' School until arrangements are made to send her to the Norwegian colony in Wisconsin." They at least, are aware of no such decision, or by whom such a decision could have been rendered. The fact is, the child has been in their own personal custody since the day of the trial—was, from the Court room taken to their house, and has remained there ever since. If she is sent to the Norwegian Colony of Wisconsin or elsewhere, it will probably be by them and at their expense. They are not aware of the legal right of any one else to interfere in the matter; at least, they recognize none as existing on these islands. SOME CORRECTIONS.
EDITOR BULLETIN:—In your issue of Tuesday you say, "An attorney was yesterday mildly censured for drawing the will of a native woman in a language foreign to both the testatrix and the subscribing witnesses."

The attorney referred to did not see, feel, or hear any censure of him, either mild or otherwise, on that occasion and nothing of the sort appears in the record or proceedings, and the attorney did not then see, and does not now see, that there was any cause of censure of him. He was requested to write a will, and wrote it in English and gave it to a friend of the testatrix, who came to his office for it, and he (the attorney) was not present at the execution of the will, and had nothing to do with that.

He does not understand Hawaiian, and cannot translate English into Hawaiian, and was not asked nor paid to translate the will, and he did not incur it his duty to consider the expense and trouble of translating the will, without having been asked or paid to do it.

If the testatrix desired a translation of the will it was her duty to procure it.

If the learned judge had seen ground for censure of any body connected with the will, he could, and doubtless would have taken time to consider and investigate the matter, but he did not do that, and after hearing the witnesses and learning that the attorney wrote the will, he admitted the will to probate, with out calling upon the attorney for any explanation. The whole proceeding lasted about forty minutes.

You say in your article: "The Court remarked it was the duty of the attorney to personally propound the law in such cases." This does not appear in the record or proceedings, and the attorney did not hear it, and does not believe it.

The attorney was employed to write the will and nothing more and nothing less, and if he could have supposed that the writing of the will made it his duty to leave his office and business unasked and unpaid and run the risk of some contagious disease by entering her sick room, and undertaking "to personally propound the law" to her, he certainly would not have written the will.

You say, "A mere cousin in this instance was the sole devisee to the exclusion of an invalid husband"—this too, is a mistake.

This invalid husband sold all her land for all he could get for it, and made a deed of conveyance of it, as the land records will show, and he is not entitled to any consideration, and during her last illness and at the time of her death, and since, he was within a few hundred yards of the place of her sickness and death, and he knew all about the will, and that it had been filed for probate, could have employed counsel to oppose the probate, and he has since been removed to the leper hospital.

The exigency of the case did not
