THE PEOPLE.

"The People" is a term which has become very familiar of late to readers of local newspapers. The term in its widest application, embraces the entire population, including both sexes, all ages, and every nationality. In a restricted political sense it is understood to apply only to voters. Whether taken in its full and proper meaning or in its limited application, a mere section, class, or clique of the community is not "the people." For instance, the merchants are not "the people," neither are the planters, nor the retail traders, nor the mechanics, nor the laborers, nor the lawyers, doctors and parsons, nor the foreign residents, nor the natives, nor even the newspaper writers. Each of these classes belongs to the people and is a part of the people, but it takes them all together, and others besides, to make "the people." And yet a section, class, or clique will put itself forward with the presumptuous assumption and the audacious claim that it is "the people," reminding one of the little historical incident of three tailors on one occasion ostentatiously announcing themselves to be "the people of England." We have read and heard many times within the past few months that "the people" want this, "the people" don't want that, "the people" are behind this measure, "the people" are opposed to that move, and so on; when, as a matter of fact, "the people" in some of these instances might have been truthfully substituted by "a faction." It is not fair to credit "the people" with desires and wishes which "the people" have not expressed, nor safe to assert that they think thus and so without their authority. The writer met in the street an intelligent gentleman from

one of the other islands, two or three days ago, and was informed by him that "the people" on his island were greatly disappointed at the Supreme Court's finding in the veto case. Another intelligent gentleman, a near neighbor to the first, was met a few minutes later, who, after a little hand-shaking, said, "the people of our island are pleased with the Judges' ruling on the veto question." Each gentleman believed his own immediate surroundings to be "the people" of the island.

A beginning was made a little beyond the National Brewery, at Kalihikahi. The grade on each side of Kahauiki valley, across which the road traverses, has been considerably improved. The road across the valley is made of pulverized coral, generously donated by Mr. J. I. Dowsett for that purpose, and is as easy to travel over as Bethel street. A squad of men is also engaged at the summit of the

hill beyond Mr. Dowsett's ranch on the Ewa side of Moanalua valley, working towards town. A very steep pitch at that spot, which has always been an annoyance to travellers, is being blasted away. When the work commenced on this highway is completed according to plans and intentions, there will be an easy drive all the way from Honolulu to Ewa.

FOR OUR LAW-MAKERS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—We do not need party representation nor partisan misrepresentations. The newspaper press has become in these modern days a sort of grand jury, not for the authoritative decisions of a legal tribunal, but for the discussion and adjudication extra judge of many matters of public interest. But we do not need malignant destruction of men and motives from anonymous and irresponsible newspaper critics. Nor ought the government to be under the control of an irresponsible faction or secret organization. We want government officials whose idea of official responsibility is that "public office is a public trust," duty to be discharged honorably and wisely, as a minister's or physician's duty, not as a contract laborer's. Office holding is not taking a contract, whose terms are to be enforced by one party with penalties of whose sufficiency they are the judges, as they are also of the meaning of the contract. Give us a ministerial government by four such representative and trustworthy men as we have now in the Cabinet. If the fourth minister will not act in accord with his colleagues let him be required to resign, the three stating the facts on which their action is based. Make the Hawaiian Sovereign simply the permanent President of the Cabinet, holding office as does the Speaker of the House of Commons with no official responsibility except to behave with fairness, courtesy, and dignity. Give the Ministry more permanency in the tenure of office, and so make the office more honorable and desirable. Do not subject them, nor the Nobles, and so the whole Legislature to the various mischances of a biennial popular election. Then we shall have a check on hasty legislation, which is often unwise legislation, and from these conservative elements our elections will also be likely to give us honest and capable representatives, men of character and responsibility, rather than mere partisan tools or political adventurers.

SUPREME COURT ITEMS.

The attendance of jurors for this special term was concluded yesterday. Banco cases were heard to-day.

The Chief Justice yesterday forwarded the financial requisition of his department for the next biennial period to the Minister of Finance.

The statistical portion of the Chief Justice's Report to the next Legislature is being compiled by Chief Clerk Foster.

The jury in the probate appeal case came out of the room at 3 a. m. yesterday morning with a sealed verdict.

The mixed jury in the ejectment case of Cartwright vs. Kanelehuwa were not long in arriving at their verdict which was unanimous.

It is said that the defendant in the above case intends seeking for equitable relief, which plea was denied him in the suit at common law.

The land recovered by Mr. Cartwright as trustee of the late Queen Emma is situated at Kauluwela, near Montgomery Square, Honolulu.

The Clerk's office closed at noon to-day in honor of Washington's birthday.

The indexing of the laws of 1887 is being done by Mr. Hassinger, in the English version, and Mr. H. Smith in the Hawaiian version.

The printing of the Compiled Laws in Hawaiian is being prosecuted by the Hawaiian Gazette Company; Judge McCully, compiler, is supervising the proof reading, assisted by the deputy clerk.

A motion by H. M. Whitney, publisher Hawaiian "Gazette," and the publisher of the Hawaiian "Chinese News," respondents in the contempt matter, was heard this morning before the full Court.

The Intermediary Court will hear appeal cases from the district courts to-morrow. Judge Bickerton will preside.

The Schaefer-Wilfong case will be heard on Friday.




