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

Preserved Fruits and Vegetables School Work and Photographs. Governor Cleghorn.

A portion of the exhibit for the Hawaiian section at the Omaha Exposition was on view at the agricultural bureau rooms yesterday. Last evening it was boxed and crated for shipment by today's steamer. Secretary Logan also leaves today and will have personal charge of the exhibit to its destination.

Big jars contained papaias, figs, mangoes, oranges, corn and potatoes, all of which looked as natural as in their pristine state. Aid in putting up these articles was given by Byron O. Clark, M. Lutted and Geo. W. Smith. The work is very creditable. In addition to the fruits in their natural state dozens of jars of jams and preserves were temptingly arranged.

A collection of articles from Kamehameha schools showing examples of work turned out in the various departments is one that will attract considerable attention. Along with this is a number of first class drawings and relief maps sent by Bro. Frank, principal of St. Anthony's school, Wailuku. All of the articles are the work of the scholars.

One of the finest collections of Hawaiian views ever gotten together forms an interesting portion of the exhibit. The photographers have all furnished their finest specimens, and they are first class examples of the photographer's art.

There were a great many other artcles. Great quantities of ferns and palms of the same varieties as grow in the Islands will be sent on. Considering the brief time which Secretary Logan has had the showing aiready made is a creditable one. More material will be gathered up to the time of Gov. Cleghorn's departure and will go forward under his supervision.

The lady screamed and Kearney, who felt that his record as a life-saver was a stake, threw off his coat and followed the dog. 

SCHEME FAILS

American Plan is Rejected at The Hague.

Virtual Abandonment Recorded Progress of Peace Conference. The Drafting Committee.

THE HAGUE, June 9.- The Peace Conference today entered upon its most important stage when the drafting committee of the third section took up arbitration. According to a foreign delegate, the American scheme does not seem to have obtained the support of many of the delegates. The Americans, it is added, have realized this, and have virtually abandoned the idea of pressing its adoption, and, therefore, it may be considered virtually abandoned, or, at most it will only furnish material for a few amendments, which will be submitted during the debate.

The Russian project is still kept ab solutely secret. M. de Staal, head of the Russian delegation, and president of the conference, has voluntarily withdrawn all claims to priority in favor of the British scheme. The Rus- of J. F. MORGAN, Queen street, or sian scheme will not be pressed and the other part will be incorporated with the British proposal in a definite scheme. The proposal of Sir Julian Pauncefoie head of the British delegation, has the advantage of not saddling the powers with the expenses of a permanent sitting tribunal, especially as the latter would have nothing to do during the greater part of the year, and the adoption of this scheme, with modifications, is considered certain. An appendix relating to organization in the Russian scheme of an arbitration tribunal proposes that the conwhen a request for arbitration is made, will each name a judge, who will form the tribunal.

The drafting committee was in session for three hours, although not a single conclusion was reached, with the exception of the acceptance of the British scheme as to the basis upon which to discuss the estimate of tribunal of arbitration. After the ses sion most of the members telegraphed their respective Governments, indicat ing that the discussion showed the necessity of having their instructions amplified.

It is understood that several of the cisco. delegates of the smaller powers expressed a wish that the permanence of the tribunal might be made more effective, and even moved amendments in this sense. The great powers, however, think it impossible, it is said, to go beyond Sir Julian Pauncefote's proposals.

NEW CABINET FOR FRANCE.

PARIS, June 14.-President Loube received M. Poincare this morning for the purpose of intrusting him with the task of forming a new Cabinet, M Poincare asked for time to deliberate and will give the President a definite reply at 6 o'clock this evening.

Finally M. Loubet appealed to M. Poincare's patriotism, and the latter thereupon consented to consult his friends. Although it is realized there are great difficulties in the way of his success, it is the general impression that if M. Poincare is in earnest h will succeed in forming a Cabinet.

DREYFUS WEPT.

LONDON, June 14.-The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph at Cayenne, French Guiana, says:

KITCHENER MAY GO TO INDIA LONDON, June 12 .- The Standard this morning says: We understand that the Vicercy of India (Lord Curzon of Kedleston) is anxious to obtain the services of Gen. Lord Kitchener in India for the economical organization of frontier defenses and expeditions owing to the urgent necessity of effeeting reductions in military expenditures. It is probable, therefore, that Lord Kitchener will be withdrawn from the Soudan and appointed to a high post in India.



eet Sugar Interest and Trust I vorable to Hawaii.

(The Financial Letter, S. F., June 9.) The full and permanent protection of Hawaiian sugars against semi-domestic productions, as well as against foreign competition, is completely assured. Private and reliable advices from the East say that the beet sugar interests habe been semi-officially informed of this fact, and in consequence will make no effort at the coming session of Congress to have a duty imposed on Hawaiian sugars. In the case of those of Puerto Rico, Cuba and the Philippines, however, tariffs will be imposed in the protection of the beet sugar industry. A measure to that end will be introduced in Congress and will have the support of the Secretary of Agriculture. These are either conquered or militarily occupied territories, and the Government has full discretion in the premises. It is different in the case of the Hawaiian Islands. They were not only annexed by treaty between the former Government of those Islands and the United States, which treaty was ratified by Congress, but the document contained a clause restricting future legislation by Congress in respect to Hawaii to the government of those Islands. In other words legislation is confined to matters relating to their interior government, and it is not the power of the American Government to legislate on subjects pertaining to matters between them and the United States proper, such as would be the imposition of a tariff on their sugars. TO REPLACE GAELIC

White Star Line to Have a New

Ship in the Ocean. SAN FRANCISCO, June 11 .-- Plans have just been approved by the White Star Line Steamship Company and turned over to Harland & Wolff, of Belfast, the builders of the Oceanic or the construction of a steamship for the transpacific trade. While the matter has not yet been definitely settled, the new boat will probably take the place of the Gaelic, and will run under the flag of the Oriental and Occidental Steamship Company in connection with the Pacific Mail and the Toyo Kisen Kaisha. The new steamship will be one of the biggest and best ever seen on this coast. She will be 560 feet in length, 56 feet beam, 38 feet deep, and will have a mean draft of about 27 feet. She will be equipped with twin screws and all the most modern appliances for the convenience and comfort of passengers and the rapid handling of cargo. When the New Oceanic and Pacific Mail steamers and this White Star liner go into commission the Pacific Coast shipping world will be able to form some idea of the modern steamer as she really is. Harland & Wolff recently turned out a vessel for the White Star line the Cymric, which is looked upon as the perfect type of a modern cargo steamer. Her measurement capacity is about 19,400 tons, and her dead-weight capacity about 12,000 tons, excluding coal. 
