Board Reimburses McKay For Fees Paid Twice

At its last meeting, the board of supervisors voted the sum of \$44 to reimburse Judge W. A. McKay for fees collected by him on process papers served, which he turned over to the county treasurer, and which he recently had to pay over again to policemen who claimed these fees.

The case was one of those brought through Attorney Eugene Murphy against the district magistrate, and which he won in the local courts. It is claimed that there is a conflict in the statutes as to the disposition to be made of the fees for serving papers. It has been the custom to turn them as county realization, here on Maui, but under another law, it would seem that the police are entitled to them. This is claimed to be the course taken in Honolulu. The matter may be carried to the supreme court for decision.

Board May Soon Pass Sunday Movies Bill

The matter of Sunday movies will again be considered by the supervisors at their March meeting, and it is possible that this time the privilege will be granted. A petition of 145 names of Lahaina citizens was received at last week's meeting. Some of the members who previously voted against the proposition, have stated that they will not oppose it, if convinced that the people demand the Sunday shows.

COUNTY TO IMPROVE ARMORY.

The sum of \$950 was appropriated by the supervisors, at their meeting last week, for alterations to be made to the Wailuku armory.

These will include a messanerie floor above a portion of the main floor of the building, upon which lockers and storage space will be provided. The work is to be done by the Wailuku Sugar Company.

AUTO LIGHTS MUST BE DIMMED.

Without specifying how the object is to be accomplished, the board of supervisors passed a light-dimming amendment to the automobile ordinance, at its last week meeting.

After the first of March any headlights not provided with means for eliminating the objectionable glare, will be cause for arrest and fine.

GRADE LINES TO BE FIXED.

Permanent street lines and grades are to be established in the towns of Wailuku and Lahaina, as soon as the surveys can be made, and after this is done no new buildings will be permitted which do not conform to these lines. This was decided upon by the board of supervisors at its meeting last meeting last week, when the county engineer was authorized to employ an assistant engineer in order that the work may be put through promptly.

TENNIS FINALS THIS AFTERNOON

The finals in the Harry Baldwin cups tournament are being played off this afternoon, at the Punene courts. In the semi-finals, played on Wednesday afternoon, the results were — Walsh and Thomson beat Rosecrans and Baldwin, 6-3, 10-8, 6-0. Collins and Lindsay beat Engle and Duke, 6-0, 7-9, 6-3, 6-2.

CHEAP RATES FOR CARNIVAL.

Beginning with the down trip of the Mauna Kea tonight, the Inter-Island will sell special excursion tickets to Honolulu and return, on account of the Carnival, at \$8 for the round trip. An additional charge of \$1 each way is made for certain deck berths on both the Mauna Kea and the Claudine.

H. W. Kinney, superintendent of public instruction, left last week for an 8-weeks vacation trip to Japan.

Visiting Anglers Have Great Sport This Week

With about 500 pounds of fish as the result of a day's sport on the lee side of the island, J. W. Jump, F. K. Burnham, and H. L. Morris, mainland angling enthusiasts, arrived at the Maui Hotel on Tuesday, highly elated with their success. The catch they claim is a world record, and they declare that Maui waters have no equal in the world for game fishing. The party came over from Honolulu in Mr. Morris's motor boat which he brought with him from the coast. One of the fish caught by Mr. Burnham weighed 92 pounds.

Locey. This is a new move on the part of the association, but the impression is that it will be a good one.

The association is not surrendering its authority to the new managers, except in the matter of details and execution. Messrs. McPhee and Locey are required to frame the program for the days events in conjunction with the directors of the association, and the members' privileges remain the same as in the past. Maui County Fair Plans Taking Shape

The chamber of commerce and the board of supervisors are to be asked to lend their support to the Maui county fair, which it is planned to hold some time next fall. The republican territorial convention to elect delegates and alternates to attend the national convention in Chicago, on June 7, will be held in Honolulu, at 10 o'clock on Monday, April 3.

Of the 180 delegates which make up this gathering, Maui is credited with 36. These are to be chosen at precinct club meetings to be held on Saturday, March 25.

KUHIO COMING HOME.

It is reported that Delegate Kuhio will leave Washington for home in a few days to attend to private business. Because of this fact the Honolulu chamber of commerce this week voted to pay George McKinley McClelland \$700 per month to look after the Islands interests before congress.

Says Examinations Were Unfair.

Dr. H. Clemmens, a dentist of Honolulu, but who was formerly located in Wailuku, has appealed to the governor on behalf of two assistants in his office who took the dental board examinations and failed to pass. Dr. Clemmens claims that the men were discriminated against because he is not liked by other dentists in Honolulu.

HIGH SCHOOL DEFEATS PAIA.

The base ball game of the Maui High School and the Paia school, last Saturday, resulted in victory for the former by a score of 15 to 9. This was the second game for the championship of the two schools. The third game will be played tomorrow.

COLDEST OF RECORD.

According to Brother Frank, who is local custodian of the weather, Wednesday night was the coldest on record; the government thermometer showed 53 degrees. The nearest to this being 54 degrees.

The temperature drop was exceedingly sudden, the maximum on Tuesday being 85, while on Wednesday the maximum was but 75. According to weather prognosticators conditions are ripe for another period of stormy weather.

May Have Far Reaching Results--- Sweden Wants U. S. To Protest Against Great Britain--- Hanse Amends Free Sugar Clause

HONOLULU, Feb. — Wright and Lowry defeat O'Dowda and Low in opening tennis game.

Road committee cuts expenses by closing city stone quarry. Saves \$12,000 for needy work to done after June.

Lan opening bill goes to mayor.

Delegation of 6 may go to republican national convention in Chicago. Kuhio and Breckons likely to be two of these.

Japan transfers many officials. Consul-General Arita will be succeeded by Rokuro Moroi.

AEDEPSOS ISLANDS, Feb. 18 — Blind ruler of Serbians sends thanks to America for aid given stricken country. He assures Americans that war is but last outburst of ancient spirit of feudalism against modern love of liberty.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 — Sweden calls upon United States to protect neutral trades. Urges a pact against violation of international laws on high seas. Wants Great Britain brought to account. Lansing refuses action until submarine controversy is over.

Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia, presents new army increase bill.

War between factions wages over confirmation of Brandeis. Sherman Whipple, a well known attorney, extols him, while Morefield Story brands him as unscrupulous.

PARIS, Feb. 18 — Wind and water rush over many parts of Europe. North Sea coast of Germany and parts of France and Holland devastated.

LONDON, Feb. 18 — At convocation of bishops of Church of England, the bishop denounced air raids.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18 — By a vote of 84 to 20, in caucus held today by House democrats, repeal of free sugar clause of Underwood tariff law was adopted as party measure.

PARIS, Feb. 18 — French war office has issued orders to pay all German officers, prisoners of France, the same pay as French officers receive when on vacation.

LONDON, Feb. 18. — Denouncing use of automobiles and motorcycles for joy riding purposes only, war department has issued request that people stop this and other pleasures.

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 18 — Argentine government formally announces that in future it will forbid all exportation of sugar.

WASHINGTON, February 17—United States and Germany near Lusitania agreement, but raise second issue. Lansing asks for assurance that armed merchantmen will be warned before diver attacks. Authoritatively stated that Germany cannot accept suggestion that warning be given before submarines act.

PARIS, February 17—Allies believe Russian capture of Ezerum will be big help to cause. Newspapers and military critics dwell on importance of capture of city. Declare it gives Russia key to Asia Minor. French and Greeks hold Valdar river. Greeks occupied Vardar near Monastir being pillaged and many fleeing.

Berlin, February 17—Report from Cairo says Khedive is much discontented with recent situation. Rebellion faced, is rumor.

PETROGRAD, February 17—Much booty captured by Russians at Turkish garrison. 100,000 men taken and more than 1000 guns.

CONSTANTINOPLE, February 17—Official reports of losses sustained by one British expeditionary force near Batina amounted to 290 officers and men.

TOKIO, February 17—Owing to the fact Sweden has forbidden exportation of wood pulp, the price on paper here has increased 10 per cent. Paper exportation from Japan likely to be forbidden.

WASHINGTON, February 15—Because Germany has offered Nicaragua a greater sum than the United States for the Nicaraguan canal zone, it was urged in congress that pending treaty between the United States and Nicaragua be ratified.

Gen. Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff, appeared before House asking for large appropriation for aviation school at Newport News. Super-dreadnaught Pennsylvania will start on trial cruise next Thursday, according to order from Navy Department.

TOKIO, February 15—Special envoy from Pope Benedict will return to Rome by way of Honolulu by Chiyo Maru in April.

WASHINGTON, February 15—Repeal of free sugar clause of the tariff law reported to House by ways and means committee. Will urge prompt action of modified measure. Private advices from Washington say tariff will remain \$1.26.

LONDON, February 15—Germans gained trench lines from French in west zone. Berlin reports important successes in Flanders and France, while fighting again is general all along water front.

HONOLULU, February 14—Albert Waterhouse made manager of Edau. Goes to state of Johore, Malay, for 5 years. Immense timber tract there to be developed. Local capital is to undertake cultivation of rubber and coconut trees.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16 — Ships under Allies charter burned Fresh out-break of incendiarism on coast destroys steamer Dalton with 50,000 bags of sugar. Other ships lost. Cause of fire unknown.

BERLIN, February 16—Three British attacks made to recover trenches in southeast Ypres failed. French also failed in recovery of ground at Tahure. Stormy weather hampered activities generally. Snow storm swept east front yesterday.

HONOLULU, February 16—District Attorney Vaughan says Filipinos may not become American citizens. J. A. Wilder invents new tent for boy scouts. Invention will bring much publicity in Hawaii.

WASHINGTON, February 16—Admiral Grant says submarines are a first necessity for national defense. Points out to house committee need for large fleet to defend coast. Navy Department is against great speed. No encouragement given Congressman who talks of 25-knot divers. Grant recommends 183 submarines as minimum number.

HONOLULU, Feb. 16 — National guard wants regiment on each island. Renewed recruiting to raise 12 more companies on Kauai and Maui. Means enlistment of an additional 500 men. Practically all companies now have greater strength than government requires.

Stainback says Filipinos here may be citizens. Nothing in law, says attorney general, to prevent their naturalization.

Treasurer McCarthy leaves soon for Washington to float new bond issue. Will sell \$1,750,000 of bonds.

LONDON, Feb. 16 — Allies will fight till victory ends bloody war.

Slavs report capturing 9 forts which guarded outskirts of Ezerum, where Ottoman troops are isolated.

French report in Champagne district capture of advanced position.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16 — Bourbons flayed by Elihu Root in convention speech. Former senator denounces Mexican and Belgian policies as disgraceful. Accuses administration of condoning murder of Americans, and defilement of the Stars and Stripes. Says world's respect has been forfeited. "We have failed to carry out threats", says Root, "As result the word and faith of the United States is full of mockery."

BUTTE, Feb. 15 — Twenty-one persons believed to have perished today in fire in the Pennsylvania mine, owned by the Anaconda Copper Company.

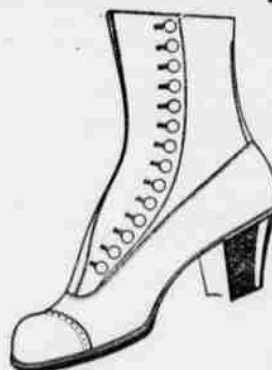

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING OR-
DINANCE NO. 27 OF THE BOARD
OF SUPERVISORS PASSED ON
JUNE 15TH, 1914, AS AMENDED
BY ORDINANCE NO. 32 PASSED
ON NOVEMBER 13, 1915, BY AD-
DING THERETO SECTIONS 18 A,
PROVIDING SPECIAL RATES
FOR WATER FURNISHED FROM
ANY OF THE WATERWORKS
SYSTEMS MENTIONED IN SAID
ORDINANCE TO CHURCHES AND
SCHOOLS TAKING WATER
THEREFROM.Be It Ordained by the Board of
Supervisors of the County of Maui:1. That Ordinance No. 27 of the
Board of Supervisors of the County of
Maui, as amended by Ordinance No.
32 of the Board of Supervisors, is
further amended by adding thereto
a new section to be numbered "18-A,"
reading as follows:"18-A." "Provided, however, that com-
mencing with the 1st day of January
1916, that rates to be charged for
water furnished from any of the water
works systems covered by this ordinance
to any church, or schools taking
water therefrom shall be as follows:
"For water furnished and used for
domestic and household purposes only
one (1c) cent per thousand gallons
for all water used, irrespective of the
amount so used."For water furnished and used for
purposes of irrigation three (3c) cents
per thousand gallons for all water
used, irrespective of the amount so
used; and"Provided, further, that none of the
provisions of said Ordinance No. 27,
as amended by Ordinance No. 32, re-
lating to minimum charges, shall be
held to apply to churches and schools
coming under the provisions of this
ordinance."2. Any and all churches and schools
desiring to avail themselves of the
provisions of this ordinance shall
make written application therefor to
the Board of Supervisors of the County
of Maui; such application shall set
forth the facts with sufficient definite-
ness as to enable the Board of Super-
visors to determine whether or not
such applicant is entitled to the priv-
ilege hereof.3. This Ordinance shall become ef-
fective upon its publication for 1
week in a newspaper of general cir-
culation, published in the County of
Maui and the posting of a true copy
thereof upon a bulletin board in front
of or near the rooms occupied by the
Board of Supervisors of the County
of Maui, at Wailuku, Maui, Territory of
