LONDON GOSSIP.

(BY PLANEUR.)

The somewhat bizarre action of the Maharajah Duleep Singh in announcing his intention of coming forward as a candidate for the parliamentary representation of Whithy, "at the next general election," without mention of politics and without placing himself in communication with either the political party in the borough, has caused no little surprise, stir, and comment. It may not be generally known that some twenty years ago his Highness with a large retinue was the tenant of Mulgrave Castle, near Whithy, the seat of the Marquis of Normanby, and became very popular in the town and neighbourhood, not only by reason of his princely munificence, but because of his ardour and success as a sportsman and his zeal for public improvement in the locality.

The new Police-master of St. Petersburg, General Gresser, is of a different stamp to the old one. Kozloff's favourite mode of inspection was to drive about full speed in a carriage with a mounted policeman, on special occasions, bawling in front. Gresser, on the other hand, goes about every day somewhere or other in disguise, or on foot in disguise, or on foot in mufti, with a result that two or three score of unfortunates have been caught napping, and the entire force is now nervously kept on the *qui vive*.

Another three weeks and there will be a regular exodus of noblemen from England, bound for the United States. I am told that during October not fewer than a couple of dukes, one marquis, four earls, a viscount, and two barons will go on a visit to different parts of America.

A company, with a name as long as your arm, is being started for the purpose of rabbit-farming on an estate situated near Woodbridge and Melton railway stations on the Great Eastern Railway. MORE ABOUT FIGURE-HEADS.

Finding that our last article on "Figure-heads" was slightly misconstrued by some readers, and wishing to be more explicit, we again revert to the subject. The officials to whom this title applies are those who are simply the nominal heads of their departments, and nothing more. They neither do any work themselves nor control those placed under them. It may be from want of actual knowledge, deficiency of practical ability, or lack of industry; or from all three causes combined. Whatever be the cause of any official's being a mere figure-head, to use a country's revenue, or a portion of that revenue, for the maintenance of such a questionable ornament is a wicked mis-use of money. Will any observant man, whether in office or out of it, whether favorable to the Government or opposed to it, deny that considerable of our small revenue has been, and is being, wasted in this way?

Of course, every department of the Public Service requires a head or chief, but no department requires a chief whose usefulness is limited to his ornamentalness. Some of the larger and more important departments need the entire time and attention of the chief to be devoted to directing, controlling, and superintending the work of subordinates: it is his duty to devise and command. Some of the minor and less comprehensive departments can only be well and economically served by chiefs who share in the actual drudgery of office. In every department the chief should not only have an intimate knowledge of what must be done and how to do it, but should also possess the will and industry to see that it is properly done. A chief destitute of these qualifications can be little, if anything, better than a figure-head; and all figure-heads detract from the efficiency of the Public Service, as well as uselessly subtract money from the Public Treasury.

Nothing but fitness entitles any man to any position. No one should be appointed either as head or subordinate who has not the necessary fitness. So long as those who have the appointing power are influenced by private and personal considerations our governmental system will continue to be encumbered by drones and parasites.

PREPARE.

Now that we have an Agricultural Society that is going to hold an Annual Show and give prizes, it is time for those who wish to win prizes to prepare for the competition. We reprint the following two rules to show what will be acceptable:

RULE III.—The object of the Society shall be the improvement of the Stock, the Plantation, Farm and Dairy Produce, the Trees, Fruits, Flowers, Vegetables, Grasses and Forage Plants, and the promotion of Pisciculture in the Kingdom.

RULE IV.—In furtherance of the objects named in Rule III., the Society shall hold an Annual Agricultural and Horticultural Show, and will offer liberal prizes for the best exhibits of Stock in various classes, of Plantation, Farm, and Dairy Produce, of Poultry and of Fruits, Flowers, &c.

The Rules and Regulations for the government of these shows, &c., will no doubt be published in time for the guidance of intending exhibitors, but it is time, right now, to make preparations and select the best means of putting in the best exhibit.

We would urge upon the Board of Management the advisability of making the exhibition as attractive as possible, by the varied character of its classes, and to extend on the same general principles, if thought necessary, the category of articles already provided for.

If the Society is to be a success everybody must work for it, either as members or as competitors. Its advantage to the country would then be incalculable.

NOTES AND QUERIES.

LUNATIC ASYLUM ROAD.
The recent rain has reminded the people residing in the neighborhood of the Lunatic Asylum of their coming troubles. Their only apology for a road has had a slight coating of mud—not exceeding six inches in thickness. This is nothing more than a very dim foreshadowing—a weak foretaste—of what is to come when winter sets in. Then won't there be hard feelings and bitter imprecations! But all this may be averted, and turned into grateful emotions and sweet plaudits, by a little timely action of the authorities.

LONDON GOSSIP.

Montenegro, which has a population equal to that of an ordinary English provincial town, is about to be represented at the Russian court by an Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary. This is, perhaps, a preliminary step to the assumption of the regal diadem by Prince Nikita.

Under the heading "Old England in Babelsburg," a Berlin paper relates an amusing story of a visit paid to emperor William's summer retreat by one of those Englishmen who criticize and depreciate everything they see on the Continent, and never fail to assert that *that* is nothing to what we have in England. The Castellan's fair daughter was his guide. She began by showing him the *parterres*, but as he plainly showed her that he did not believe gardening was exercised out of Great Britain, she hurried indoors and began conducting him round the Imperial apartments. But she could not extract a single word of approbation; everything was grander in England. In despair she docked him of at least half a dozen *salons* and brought him to the last room on the list—the Emperor's study. And here something interested him immensely, viz., a collection of walking sticks. Brightening up a bit, the poor girl told him the history of each, how they had come from all parts of Germany as presents, all except this one, which His Majesty cut himself 41 years ago, and is his inseparable companion whilst residing at Babelsburg. It was an ordinary blackthorn, but it possessed some fascination for the Englishman. He could not take his eyes off it; he handled it with veneration, he smiled at it with admiration, and he sighed as he replaced it with its fellows. Whilst the girl was looking the door of the Imperial study, he whispered in her ear, "I'll give you thousand marks (£50) for the Emperor's favourite walking stick." The young lady indignantly refused to listen to the proposal. "Two thousand," he murmured anxiously. "I'll call my father if you don't go away at once," was her reply. "Five thousand!" "Father!" "Ten thousand!" "Father! Murder! Help! Police!" screamed the girl, and scuttled downstairs and away. The Englishman also retreated. Next day the Castellan informed Colonel von Lindequist, an Imperial adjutant, of the circumstances, and on His Majesty's return from Gastein he was also made acquainted with the story. The Emperor laughed heartily at it, and said: What a pity

I wasn't there. I would have sold the stick with pleasure. Ten thousand marks would have been a nice addition to the Pensioners' Fund."

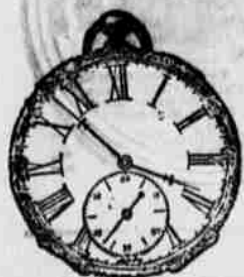

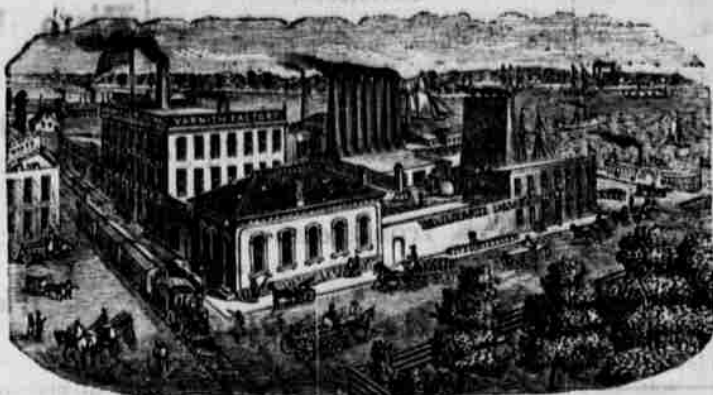
