TO EARN EASY MONEY.

One of the many money making schemes pushed through the late extra session by having an item inserted in one of the several appropriation bills, wherein and whereby the people of this Territory have been fleeced to the tune of \$6,000 for and on behalf of advertising the country, is that for a handbook to be issued by one Frazier who holds forth within the sanctum sanctorum of the Evening Bulletin. This, we consider, is one of the rawest and most galling attempts to pinch the taxpayers and is the boldest of daylight freezes upon the people and country at large, although it was largely endorsed by a majority of the business concerns of this city. It is impudence with a vengeance and that, by a white man for other white men, and no Hawaiian could be got to do the likes, but this impudence carried.

If we remember rightly, at the time it was being worked, an impression was created that the work was to be gotten out here, but instead it was contracted for with a Chicago printing establishment. Hawaiians voted for the item, because they felt that the work would be done in the country and that the money would therefore be spent right here amongst our people, brown and white alike. But such has not been the case. Instead of the money being spent right here, it has gone outside and to outsiders. To take it all in all, the legislators were fooled and duped into throwing away that much of the public funds and that extravagant Republican controlled Legislature is responsible for this robbery.

It is reported that the handbook is now here, it having arrived before

the Legislature adjourned since, but we have not yet seen nor been favored with a copy, in order to scrutinize and pass a review upon it, whether it was worth the effort and the expenditure or not. But, of course, we can patiently bide our time. It is nevertheless, safe to say that without the personal magnetism of a native in the employ of our contemporary, who took interest in pushing it forward, the item could never have passed. Yet a mistake was made in passing it. Why should the country bear the expense of advertising a man's wares and thereby create a record for him, besides lining his pockets? If this is another way of showing Americanism to Hawaiians, we'll none of it. It is much better to remain poor than fleece the people and rob the country to pay for getting out a man's work and thereby make money for himself at the expense of others.

Judge De Bolt has confirmed the authority of Humphreys & Watson to appear for Emma Claudina S Watson in the Spreckels case.

A P Taylor, of the Advertiser who recently underwent a severe and dangerous operation for appendicitis, is now able to drive out.

Gigliati Verginio, a native of Italy, was polished off by Judge Estes yesterday and adorned with the rights of American citizenship.

Captain H Klemme has purchased the John D Holt lease of premises at the corner of Queen and Richards streets and will move the Heslani beer saloon from the Orpheum block to it.

The bark Olympic, which arrived here a few days ago from a plague infected port in Chile, has finished discharging her cargo and is now awaiting sugar. She has been fumigated four times.

The Magoon disbarment case was finished in the Supreme court at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was submitted without argument. The George A Davis case was called at 10 o'clock this morning.

Acting upon instructions from Governor Dole, Secretary Carter caused the Government flags to be half masted during the hour of the regium Mass in honor of the dead Pope at the Catholic cathedral yesterday.

George W Klester, for several years connected with the local Customs house, has been granted a vacation of twelve months on account of bad health and will go to the Mainland. He may not return to the Islands.

Judge Gear has signed a decree approving the accounts of John Hind in the matter of the estate of Robert R Hind and ordering distributions. Receipts are given as \$83,810.85 and expenditures \$87,625.10.

J W Girvin was being urged by his friends for the office of immigration commissioner. Mr Girvin is an old resident of the Islands, is thoroughly acquainted with them in every way and besides is admittedly competent.

HOME RULE CONVENTION

Close! After Spending Much Gas in an Oratorical Display.

On reassembling yesterday afternoon, President Kalaokalani appointed the following a committee on the organization of precinct clubs: J M Poepoe, D Kalaokalani Jr, and D M Kupihea. Poepoe objected, saying that he was on the same committee last year and the party met defeat, and for that reason he felt that another should be substituted for him. But his objection did not stand.

Charles Notley suggested that the committee on Finance should be instructed to report weekly to the Treasurer. Kalaokalani offered a resolution to this effect and was adopted.

Then Notley gave a detailed statement of the affairs of the printing branch of the party, showing that the workmen had been paid in full, the editor and manager receiving nothing. After this, he started into another field, beginning the oratorical display of the afternoon, and was followed by the President, H M Kaniho, J M Poepoe, Kinney M Koahou, Chas K Makakau, J W H I Kibe and Z K Wai Kalsi.

When the oratory was brought to a close, it was decided that the next convention should assemble on the first Monday of July, 1904.

As each County will call conventions for the selection of County officers, the only County so far known as having set a date is Maui, which will assemble at Wailuku on September 8th next, opening at 9 a m, and that the President is to visit and open each County convention.

Adjournment sine die was taken at 4 o'clock.

Laukea and Advertiser.

Were my present attitude of opposition based on personal grounds, there might be some excuse for resorting to tactics of this kind. But if I was ever sincere in my life it is when I say that I believe the Advertiser and the faction it represents is and has been and always will be antagonistic to the people in the establishment of republican institutions in Hawaii. Two ladies escaped only by jumping out. The awning was of course demolished and flying parts of it demolished one of the store windows.

Father Mathias yesterday conducted the Pontifical requiem mass at the Catholic cathedral for the repose of the soul of the dead Pope. He was assisted by Fathers Francis and Clement. A large concourse of people attended the services. Secretary Carter was present for the Government and the following foreign consuls attended: A de Souza Canavarro, Portugal; A Raas, France; F A Schaefer, Italy; Mexico and Austria-Hungary; H W Schmidt, Sweden and Norway; H Focke, Chile; H R Macfarlane, Denmark.

Theo F Lansing will be the new Commissioner of Immigration. Governor Dole has sent down his appointment and has instructed Secretary Carter to make out the commission. Mr Lansing will take charge of the work as soon as he receives his commission.

Roosevelt is Being Criticized.
