NO DNE 18 TAXED.

The El Dorado of taxpayer is the large village of Langenselbold, in the district of Hanau. It has a population of about 3,000 souls and a communal property of upward of \$3,000,000, the annual income of which is about \$100,000, nearly onethird of which revenue is derived from the rent of meadow land. The communal forests require the services of four foresters. The villages are not only fortunate enough to be entirely free from communal taxes, but they actually receive each year two cords of firewood and 20 marks of money. The gooseherd would scarcely swap places with many a village "dominie," for his income is fully 1,000 marks. The streets of the village are lighted free of cost, and when one of the villagers closes his earthly career he or she is taken to the last resting place "free gratis for nothing." In order, however, to check immigration into this new Canaan, the wise fathers of the commune have fixed the cost of acquiring the citizenship of the place at 500 marks .- [N. Y. Standard.

THREE CREAT FAMILIES.

SOCIAL INFLUENCE OF THE NEW YORK VANDERBILTS, POTTERS AND FIELDS.

I accidentally encountered \$200,-000,000 in a small jewelry store on Fifth avenue a few days ago. It was more than \$200,000,000, now that I think of it, for there were three men in the group; the oldest was Cornelius Vanderbilt, who was pale, clerical and solemn looking, with a cry against the disastrous effect of pleasant expression of the eye, and a American competition in the protendency to lean against posts and show cases. Beside him stood his brother, William K. Vanderbilt, in the most irreproachable of English clothes, with his mutton-chop whiskers brushed back from a weak, but good-natured face. Between the two men chatting amiably with them was Dr. Seaward Webb, their brotherin-law. Dr. Webb is the most popular of the men who have married into this family. The three men represented a vast amount of money, and they all entered the shop together to spend exactly twenty-five cents for a new crystal for Cornelius'

What struck me at the time as being most notable was the influence which a great New York family, like the the Vanderbilts, possess. Take Dr. Seaward Webb, for instance; he was a surgeon in St. Luke's Hospital when old Mrs. Vanderbilt took her daughter there one day on a visit of charity to the sick. The daughter fell in love with the young surgeon, married him, and, on the death of William H., Dr. Webb inherited \$10,-000,000 and an interest in the main portion of the estate. He became president of one of the largest downtown stock firms, was made director in the wealthiest trust company in the country, and became identified at once with the Lincoln Bank and other great institutions. Now he wanders about, the friend of millionaires, the most welcome of visitors to the boxes in the Opera House, and a pleasant and agreeable man about town. He is thick-set, beavy faced and not at all distinguished in appearance, but evidently a very good

Another of the great families in New York is just now being talked about through the death of its head, Bishop Potter. The Potter family must feel rather lonely now that it has only one Bishop left in its ranks. Its first Bishop was Alonzo Potter, of Pennsylvania. He was the father of the late Clarkson Potter, Howard Potter, the banker, and Eliphalet Potter, the president of Hobart College. Howard Potter is the father of James Brown Potter, whose wife is

studying for the stage.

The second Bishop was Bishop Horatio Potter, of the diocese of New York, who died recently at the advanced age of eighty-five years. He leaves two daughters and one son, who is a professor in a Southern university. A third Bishop is Henry Codman Potter, also a son of Bishop Alonzo Potter, and lately the assistant Bishop of the diocese of New York. The chances are that President Potter will be Bishop before he dies. He is the handsomest member of the family, has a distinguished presence and is an eloquent speaker.

Perhaps the third in importance in the great New York families, outside of the pure commercial aspect, is the Field family. Indeed it may be said that the Fields permeate the intellectual and venturesome fields of American life. They have every-where pushed themselves to the head in great enterprises, in the law and in education. Every body knows who David Dudley, Cyrus W., Mr. Justice Field and President Field, of Williams College, are, but besides four brothers, the sons, nephews and cousins innumerable are quartered in New York and, of course, successful, for the influence of the Field family is enough to build up a man in any walk of life here. For instance, Cyrus W. Field, Jr., went into one of the most successful brokerage houses in the city backed by no other capi-

tal than his name. These are three of New York's great families, and no matter how poor and distant a relation of any one of them may be, he is sure of success if backed by the influence of his kinsmen here. So there is something in family after all.—[Amos J. Cummings and Blokely Hall, in Philadelphia Press.

THE SUCAR PRODUCTION OF THE

The Washington Department of Agriculture says, regarding the sugar production of the world during 1886: "The production of cane sugar has been carried on in the West Indies, Brazil, East Indies, and other countries, largely by slave labor, with clumsy machinery and wasteful pro-cesses. It has not been the result of very advanced mechanisms or science, though there has been progress and improvement. It is claimed that little more than half the sugar is extracted in the Louisiana manufacture. There is room for vast improvement, even

in this country, and should cheapen

the cost of the product and give adequate profit to the business. "Of the commercially reported sugar of the world half is now made in Europe, where, at the beginning of the century, its experimental cost was, perhaps, not less than a dollar per pound, and scarcely known except in the laboratories of chemists. By indomitable perseverance, with the aid of bounties by the Governments, the sugar of beets has nearly driven to the wall the cane product by low-priced and comparatively unproductive labor, reducing to an unprecedented figure the price, and revolutionizing commerce in sugar.

"Our consumption of sugar is enormous and rapidly increasing, amounting to about one-fourth of all the sugar reported from the countries of principal production, according to the table of M. Licht, the European au'hority on this subject. Our con-sumption in 1885 is reported at 1,245,574 tons, mostly cane sugar, but 96,125 tons of it was beet sugar from Europe. It is a serious reflec tion on American enterprise that this industry should remain in a languishing condition, unable to compete with foreign effort in this line, at the very moment when Europe is loud in outducts of agriculture. Within twentyfive years more than 2,000,000 tons will be required-almost sufficient to swallow up the present production of beet sugar or the whole of the present cane sugar of commerce. At a time when labor is in exceess of the demand, and corn and cotton and wheat and other staples of a primitive agriculture exceeds the wants of domestic and foreign markets, we scour the world for food products, costing more than \$200,000,000 per annum, the larger portion of which should be produced in the United States. This primitive and unenterprising situation must be surmounted by a more skillful, scientific and inventive agriculture."





HYPNOTIC TRANCES.

THEIR SUCCESSFUL APPLICATION AS A MEDICINE IN MANY CRITICAL AFFLIC-TIONS.

At a recent meeting of the Societe de Biologie, MM. Fontan and Segard read an interesting paper on the applications of suggestion to therapeutics. The writers have collected a hundred cases in which they have availed themselves of the possibility of putting their patients into an hypnotic state, to suggest a partial or entire cure. Their conclusion is that suggestion may be of great value in cases where disorders of the motor or sensory powers exist or even where there are anatomical disorders affecting the circulatory or secretory systems, such as follow upon traumatisms or upon general diseases, such as rheumatic diathesis and others. They have employed hypnotic suggestion in cases of traumatic arthrits, cerebral shock, urethof the patients were at all hysterical. From a perusal of the observations quoted by the gentlemen named, it would seem that the influence of the mind on the body is greater and deeper than has hitherto been imagined. The way in which MM. Fontan and Segard operate is very simple. The subject is put into a hypnotic trance (only three per cent, of the patients are refractory to this part of the process), and is told, for instance, that his knee (in a case of hydarthrosis) will work easily and without pain, or that (in a cases of dyspepsia) the most indigestible foods will be easily digested. The publisher of "Pickwick" sent out, "on sale or return, "1,500 copies of each of the first five numbers to all parts of the provinces, but the only result was an average sale of fifty copies of each number. The publication was practically a failure, and it was seriously debated whether it should be discontinued or not. In the fourth number Sam Weller had appeared on the scene, and fortunately at this juncture attracted great attention, calling forth great admiration by the freshness and originality of the conception. Sam was received with acclamation by all, and rose to an unheard-of by all, and rose to an unheard-of popularity. The sale of the ensuing numbers suddenly increased, and at the completion of the work it had attained to 40,000 copies! Messrs. Chapman & Hall were naturally very much gratified by this improved state of affairs, for "Pickwick" was saved from ruin, and when the twelfth number was reached they sent the author a check for £500 as a practical expression of their grati-fication. During the publication of the work Dickens received from the same source several checks amounting to £3,000, in addition to the fifteen guineas per number which it was agreed should be paid him. It was understood at the time that Messrs. Chapman & Hall made a clear profit of £2,000 by the sale of the "Pickwick Papers," after paying author's expenses.
