
# St. Andrew's Priory Historical Notes

1867—Arrival of the Second Group of Anglican Sisters of Mercy of the Order of the Most Holy Trinity; Reverend Mother Lydia (Sellon), Foundress; Eldress Phoebe, Sister Beatrice, Sister Albertina, and companions, March 30.

Foundation, Dedication, and Opening of St. Andrew's Priory School, Honolulu, by Bishop

Thomas Nettleship Staley, I Bishop of Honolulu, H. M. the Dowager Queen Emma, and the Reverend Mother Lydia, Ascension Day, May 30.

1876—Death of the Reverend Mother Lydia, Foundress of the Society of the Most Holy Trinity and the Companions of the love of Jesus; Foundress and Benefactress of St. Cross School, Lahaina, Maui, and St. Andrew's Priory School, Honolulu; Restorer after three centuries of the life of the Religious in the Church of England, November 20.

1884—Death of Sister Mary Clara, in the 63rd year of her life, in the 32nd year of her entry into religion, October 6.


1885—Death of H. M. the Dowager Queen Emma, St. Mark's Day, April 25.

1890—Death of Sister Bertha, in the 67th year of her life, in the 40th year of her Profession, September 15.

Death of Eldress Phoebe, in the 69th year of her life, in the 41st year of her Profession, October 11.

1909—Laying of the Cornerstone of the new St. Andrew's Priory by Sister Beatrice, Sister Albertina, with Henry Bond Restarick, III Bishop of Honolulu, and Miss Abby Stuart Marsh, II Lay Principal, February 7.

1918—Arrival in Hawaii Nei of the First Company of Sisters of the Community of the Transfiguration: Sisters Caroline Mary and Amy Martha, to begin work at St. Andrew's Priory School, August 17. Sister Olivia Mary, Principal, delayed by illness, arrived February 9, 1919.

1921—Death of Sister Beatrice, in the 93rd year of her life, in the 44th year of her Profession, February 20.

1930—Death of Sister Albertina, in the 89th year of her life, in the 54th year of her Profession, July 20.

1938—Dedication of Sellon Hall by S. Harrington Littell, V Bishop of Honolulu, (St. Michael and All Angels), September 29.


1965—Dedication of Sellon Hall Second Floor Classrooms by Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, VI Bishop of Honolulu, December 6th (St. Nicholas Day).

1966—Dedication of Centennial Hall, by Harry Sherbourne Kennedy, VI Bishop of Honolulu, October 11.

# Gift to St. Andrew's Priory

Mother Edith Mary, the Superior of Ascot Priory (Sisters of the Holy Trinity, Ascot, Berkshire) gave to St. Andrew's Priory on the occasion of its Centennial observance one of Ascot Priory's great treasures—a beautiful small chalice and paten belonging to Dr. Edward Bouverie Pusey, a great Anglican divine of the 19th century, and one who used his influence to encourage Mother Sellon to establish the school for girls in Honolulu that became St. Andrew's Priory. In addition they gave to the Priory Chapel some beautifully made small altar linens.

Mother Edith and her companion Sister, Sister Pamela, won all our hearts, and we know they have left Hawaii with a great love for the place and its warm-hearted people.

This is an ideal way for youngsters to find enjoyment and real fellowship, as well as to enjoy the thrill of being near the ocean and the mountains for recreation.


# Maui Camp Program

Two family camp conferences are planned at Seabury Hall this summer. The first weekend camp on July 14-16; the second, August 18-20. The Reverend Charles Crane, Rector of Holy Nativity Church in Honolulu, will be the conference leader for the July camp. The August leader is yet to be announced.

Parents of the family will have an opportunity for four sessions under the leader's direction. Provision for children's recreation will be made. Afternoons will be devoted to family recreation using the school's pool, courts, and horses. Tournaments in bridge, tennis, pingpong, and horseshoes are planned. Families will be housed in the Seabury Hall dormitory.

The success of last year's family camp under the discussion leadership of the Reverend John Engelcke has given impetus to schedule two camps for this summer. Last year fifty-three adults and children were in attendance to make a full camp. Costs will be \$10.00 for adults, \$7.50 for children twelve years and older, and \$5.00 for children under twelve. Conferences will start with dinner Friday and end Sunday after dinner, with provision for staying in the dormitory until Monday after breakfast.
