The bark Newsboy left on the 25th inst. with a full cargo of sugar valued at \$74,355.91, and the barkentine Modoc, which was towed from Honolulu by the Claudine last Wednesday, left on the 27th inst. with 735 tons, value \$19,804.14. The brigantine Jno. D. Spreckel, Capt. Christensen, arrived on the 27th inst., 134 days from San Francisco, with a full cargo of miscellaneous merchandise and 4 horses for Mr. H. Center of Spreckelsville. Mrs. Christensen, who with her sister, Miss Dora Ness, has made a pleasant visit to Maui friends since the captain's last trip down here, will return to the gay city of the Golden Gate, Miss Ness accompanying her home. We wish the ladies "aloha nui" and bon voyage, and hope to see them back here again very soon. Mr. Philip Mondt, for many years the efficient and deservedly popular cashier of the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Co., also takes passage for San Francisco in the Jno. D. Spreckel. It is with genuine regret his many friends say goodbye to one, who, by his quiet, gentlemanly kindness and genial manners has made himself highly beloved and respected by all who knew him. "Aloha" and "au revoir" is our heartfelt farewell greeting. All arrangements for the celebration of the 4th of July have been made, and the entries for the races closed, promising a splendid day's sport for connoisseurs of equine contests. Thirty-five horses have been entered for the eleven races on the program, and among them are some of Oahu's best trotters and runners. Look to your laurels, ye denizens of Maui, lest they should be snatched from your hands! Give the Honolulu boys a tussle, and beat them—if you can. Pledged to neither Side nor Party, But established for the benefit of all.

MONDAY, JUNE 29, 1891.

Perhaps very few of the public are aware of the latest improvements now in course of construction, by the Oahu Railway & Land Company.

The company have lately opened to traffic the peninsula lying opposite Pearl City, and the amount of improvement already accomplished is a full testimony to the enterprise of the company when the short time in which the work has been accomplished is taken into consideration.

The development of our material resources thus far accomplished by this corporation certainly exceeds any heretofore made by a private company in the interest of the public.

A large section of the country has been brought within reach of the Honolulu public, since the inauguration of the enterprise. Capital has been stimulated thereby, and land values have been largely increased from Honolulu to Honolulu. The improvements already made and now taking place at Pearl City are an earnest for those which will follow upon the peninsula.

The new improvements at the latter point consist, at present, of a line of railway running throughout the length of the peninsula, with a general clearing and laying out of lots along the sea-shore end, which will make one of the finest summer resorts in the Hawaiian Islands.

It is understood the company will soon erect a first-class hotel at the terminus of the railway, which will offer the best of bathing facilities to visitors. When the aims of the company are fully accomplished the vicinity will offer some of the finest residence sites on the Island of Oahu.

ANOTHER BURGLARY.

Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co.'s front store was entered through one of the nakai windows last night. The robber was barefooted like the one who made extensive rounds a week previously. His tracks were left on packages of goods between the window and office. Some of the goods were tampered about. A chisel was used on several drawers in the counting room, and its point broken in an attempt on one of them. About \$15 was taken partly from a drawer and partly in loose change left on a desk. The thief passed drawers where it happened that he would have got a haul on this occasion. He left the floor strewn with matches, and a relic of his visit was a partly burned \$2 greenback. Whether the greenback caught fire accidentally from one of the matches, or the robber used it as a taper to light his work, cannot be decided until he come forth to explain. The young men who sleep upstairs over the office heard nothing through the night. They left everything all right when they retired in the evening.

A GORGEOUS JEWEL.

The handsomest medal without question ever made in Honolulu is one just executed by Mr. J. Hubash for the Maui Racing Association. On the obverse side in black enamel is the inscription: "Maui Racing Ass'n. Corinthian Race, 1 mile dash, July 4, 1891." The reverse side has space for the name of the winner. The pin is on the back of a gold scroll from which depends by links on both sides the medal proper, circular in shape. In the center is a horse's head enclosed in a horseshoe, both of Etruscan gold, these emblems being in relief but protected by an encircling rim of burnished gold. Branching upward are laurel leaves of green gold in relief. The whole jewel is a splendid specimen of the jeweler's art, than which nothing finer is ever seen in imported work.

The leaders did surprisingly well both in acting and singing. Master Hart had a gorgeous make-up as Lord Chancellor, and his enunciation being good the humor of his lines was never lost. His solos would have done credit to a stage veteran, and his local hits occasioned great mirth. Harris and Clark made dignified little Earls, Harris, with a good deal to say, always making himself heard. Alec May, by his diminutive size and "cute acting" in bearing the Chancellor's train, made a hit inversely proportionate to his stature.

The girls awoke much enthusiasm by their good singing and clever acting. Miss Nell's solos evinced a beautifully clear voice, a fine acquisition to Honolulu's musical talent. Misses Weir, Bruns and Whitney did credit to their respective roles, all having good voices and being well up in the spirit of their different characters. The three leading fairies—Misses Stevenson, King and Reynolds—were bright and lively. The ballet was prettily executed. Its leaders were very fair-like and the figures by the company of fairies were done in unison and with thorough grace.

When the peers came filing in for the first time they received a perfect ovation of applause. It was a minute before their spokesmen could begin. They all looked so solemn and in their wigs and whiskers so comically grand that their appearance was irresistibly funny. Chorus by both the fairies and the peers, jointly and severally, were without exception well sung. They proved better perhaps than anything else the arduous work that Mrs. Gray has put into the training of so large a company of youngsters, most of whom of course had to be instructed in the music wholly by the ear. Prof. Berger's masterly drilling capacity, since he took charge of the rehearsals as leader, was also illustrated in the success of this first presentation of the opera. Mr. Thos. Gray is entitled, likewise, to a great share of the credit for satisfactory results. From the first he has been the drill master of the children for the stage, and the apparent ease with which every one found his or her place, in face of the great audience, attested the value of his patient directions. Mrs. Gray played accompaniments on the piano, supported by a detachment of the Royal Hawaiian Orchestra.

Her Majesty the Queen, Prince Kalaninui, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn, and ladies and gentlemen of the court, were in the royal box. Hon. W. G. Irwin's box opposite was occupied by His Excellency Samuel Parker and a large party of his friends.
