THE POLICE COURT.

Fined \$100 for Selling Liquor Without a License.

Only seven cases appeared on Judge Perry's calendar this morning, five of which were put off until future dates. The other two, however, took up all of the morning session and His Honor did not have as easy a time as the shortness of the calendar would lead him to expect.

Hirschman is the name of the steward of the Mariposa who got left. Malia Barber, a lady residing on the corner of Merchant and Alakea streets with her daughter, testified that when she got home this morning between 1 and 2 o'clock she found a horrid strange man in her bed. He was undressed and sleeping the sleep of the innocent. She did not scream or go into hysterics but she did telephone to the police station to have the intruder removed, which was done in the prompt and efficient manner, for which Captain Parker's men are gaining an enviable notoriety.

In his own behalf defendant testified that he was the steward of the Mariposa, that he came ashore yesterday and fell in with Ziegler's boys, the result being that he became somewhat under the influence of liquor. Whether this is the natural result of "falling in" with Ziegler's boys the record does not show. The defendant next related how tired he was and that he wanted to seek his couch. A friend of his had promised him a bed in a house on Queen street. After trying the King street house and not being able to gain an entrance, to use his own words, "he become induced to think" that Malia Barber's house was the house of his friend, and went in and went leisurely to bed. Whether he did this as a result of coming in contact with Ziegler's boys or not he did not say. He wound up his testimony with these words: "Imagine my surprise when an officer awoke me and I found that I was sorry for the occurrence and tender an apology to the lady."

Whether moved by this tale of woe or not the Court found him guilty, but sentence was postponed until moved on by the prosecution.

A. Marques is an individual who keeps a store in Pauoa Valley where he has accumulated shekels enough to hire W. A. Kinney to defend him against the charge of selling liquor without a license on which he was tried this morning. What with paying his lawyer and the \$100 fine and costs, which His Honor charged up to him in behalf of the Republic of Hawaii, Mr. Marques' profits on groceries will not be as large this month as they otherwise would have been.

Kakaio, charged with feloniously stealing, taking and carrying away all at once the sum of \$12, the property of J. Silva, will have his hearing to-morrow morning.

The Call says it would not be a laughing matter to the Hawaiian Government if the deposed Queen should marry a Japanese Prince who could train the Mikado's eye on the islands.

A matter of importance which should have the attention of the legislature early in the session is the revision of the jury law. When the existing one was made there was a strong feeling against the government and the officials felt that it was impossible to get a conviction unless the jurors had taken the oath to support the government. We cannot believe that men who swear to render a verdict according to the evidence would be any more honest because of being supporters of the government. Nor do we believe the number of acquittals would be increased by the fact that the evidence was sifted by men who had not seen fit to take the required oath. The law reflects upon the probity of the men who, under another form of government, were considered eligible to decide the guilt or innocence of a man upon the evidence presented.

But aside from this the present law inflicts a hardship upon the men who are considered sufficiently honest to serve as good men and true. Under the old order of things citizens who were in a panel for two successive terms were excused for two years; now, we understand some of these men have served for four terms with no signs of a vacation ahead of them. The percentage of convictions under the present law is not greater than under the old one, and we fail to see why it should be if the cases are decided on the evidence and the prosecution fails to introduce the required testimony.

"Let annexation come and men will adjust their affairs to suit conditions," said a prominent military man this morning, "and if people cannot make a living here with annexation let them go to the United States or Africa or some place where they can."

But what about sugar and rice?

"Let it go; let everything go that cannot exist with Hawaii a part of the United States. We must have stability, and we cannot get it with this present government."

In other words we are to let everything go so that we may sit under the banyan and hear the flapping of the wings of the American eagle. Never mind our industries; let them droop; the clatter of the machinist's hammer does not furnish half the music as the American eagle could in one single squawk. The policy of our military friend is on the plan of the survival of the fittest, and the men who have built up our industries and who, by their generosity, made the city a beauty spot are to go unless they can stand adversity. It's a very pretty theory to ponder over, but in practice just now it is impracticable. In the conditions and then make another bid for annexation. People argue that with annexation there would be such an influx of people that our population would double in a short time. So it would, and a large proportion of the new arrivals would be of a class that could not pay their personal taxes at the end of the year. This

is not a farming country and our soil is suited only for certain products: let it be developed by those who are here and the country will be better off, a thousand times, even with a few years of a government that is not considered stable, than to kill our mainstay for the sake of becoming American citizens. Hawaii has never had to maintain a "poor house," but with annexation at this time it would be one of the items for consideration in the appropriation bill.

The Latest Silver Craze.

It has come to pass that a collection of silver all in the shape of spoons is no longer thought as interesting as a collection of silver made up of many quaint and curious things having different shapes and uses or no use at all. The curio silver table of latest fashion has sometimes a silver lamp of exquisite shape, picture frames of silver, bonbon boxes, odd spoons, a piece of embroidery heavy with gold and silver threads, filigree silver from Venice and pretty things made from silver in all parts of the world. Such is a collection that is not easily called together, and its owner values it accordingly.—*New York Post.*

Armies of Europe.

Thirteen million bayonets prop up the Czar's throne. That is the full strength of the Russian army on a war footing. Germany comes next, but after a long interval, with 3,700,000 soldiers; Italy has 3,155,000 and France 2,850,000, including 350,000 auxiliaries. Austria's fine army which in quality is reckoned scarcely second to Kaiser Wilhelm's contains a maximum of 1,794,175 men. England at home and in her colonies can mobilize a force of 662,000. The little martial republic of Switzerland can summon 486,000 soldiers to her banners in an emergency, and even poverty-cursed Spain boasts of 400,000. Austria, of all the powers, has the most burdensome military establishment. Her annual expenditures on her army are \$255,000,000, while Russia's, with an army seven times as large, are only \$186,000,000. In proportion to size, England's army is perhaps the most costly. Her 662,000 men require \$89,000,000 annually for their support, or only \$38,000,000 less than the amount which provides France with an enormous host of more than four times England's numbers.—Boston Journal.

The Sovereign's Body-Guard.

The most extraordinary precautions are taken in Spain to provide for the safety of the Sovereign at night. His slumbers are watched throughout the night by the Montero de Espinosa, a body of men who for 400 years have enjoyed the exclusive privilege of guarding their royal master or mistress from sunset to sunrise. They are bound by tradition to be natives of the town of Espinosa and to have served with honor in the army. They lock the palace gates with much ceremony and solemnity at midnight and open them again at 7 o'clock in the morning. Their fidelity to the person of their Sovereign does not admit of question.

Shipping Notes.

The waterboat is kept busy carrying fresh water to the Philadelphia.

The Philadelphia is still taking on coal and is now loaded down to the water line.

Steamers leaving to-day are the Keauhou for Makaweli and the James Makee for Kapaa.

The China made her last trip from this port to San Francisco in 6 days, 22 minutes.

The schooner Wm. Bowden arrived in San Francisco on May 26th, 22 days from Kahului.

The bark Sumatra will probably be dismantled and broken up, as necessary repairs will cost more than she is worth.

The German ship Marie Hackfeld from Liverpool for Honolulu was spoken on May 21st in latitude 46 N., longitude 12 W.

The schooner Wm. Bowden, formerly in the Spreckels line, has been chartered to load lumber from Puget Sound to Port Pirie.

The Helen Brewer is discharging rock ballast brought all the way from New York. It is being removed by government teams for use in street work.

The Caryphene sailed out of port this morning with a five-knot breeze. She proceeds to Port Blakely and from thence to Adelaide with lumber.

The dredger is working close up to the Nuuanu street wharf. After completing the work in that vicinity it will commence at the boat landing where it is rapidly shoaling.

The Lehua is off again on another cruise. It is reported that she will be returned to her owners shortly, not having accomplished the object for which she was chartered.

A large force of men are at work on the steamer Kauai at the Mail dock. The vessel is being virtually remodeled in her upper works. She is also being scraped from stern to stern. When the repairs are completed she will look like a new ship.

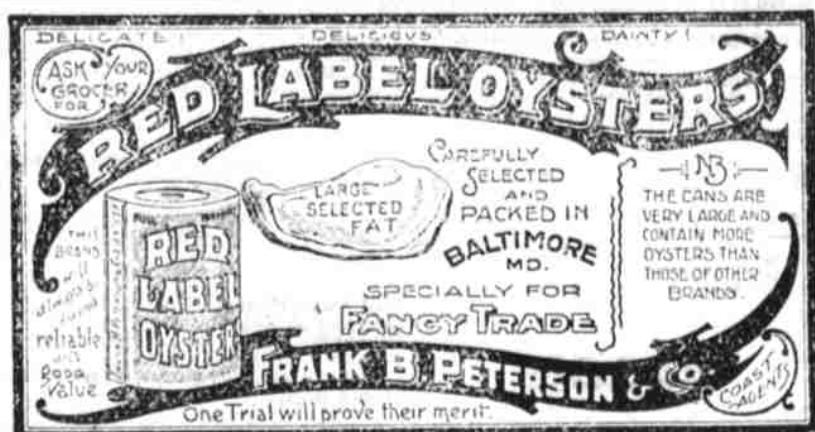

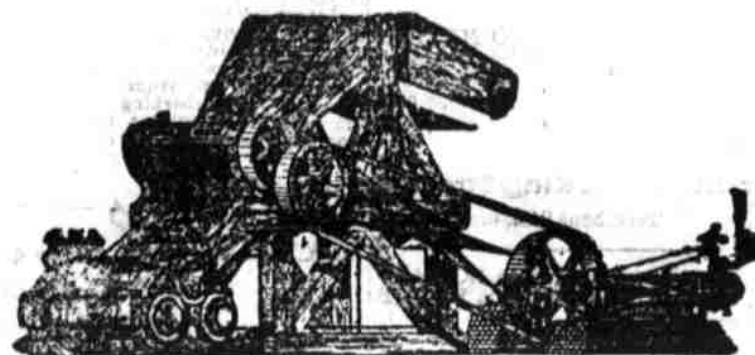

A gentleman who declines to al-
low his name to be mentioned
states that efforts are being made
by a prominent hotel man in San
Francisco to organize a company
with \$300,000 capital for the pur-
pose of building and furnishing a
mammoth hotel in Honolulu.

The house will be built in the
