



A 2,000 mile speed test has been mapped out by the War Department for the eight armored cruisers of the Pacific fleet, the course being between San Francisco and Honolulu. The eight ships—the Tennessee Washington, Pennsylvania, Colora-do, West Virginia, Maryland, South Dakota and California — will gather at Seattle on Aug. 18 and will remain there ten days. The War Department has ordered that the supplies of the fleet, amounting to about \$500,000, shall be purchase in Seattle and Tacoma.

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
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
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
