## A NEW COMMITTEE ESTABLISHED

(Press Release, TTPI, Jan. 20 . . .) A Special Joint Planning Advisory Committee consisting of members from the executive and legislative branches of the Trust Territory Government has been established by the High Commissioner.

According to its Chairman, Deputy High Commissioner Martin P. Mangan, the purpose of the Committee is to initiate a program of long-range planning for the Trust Territory and to consider means whereby existing organizations, the Congress of Micronesia and others, could contribute to planning without creating a new specialized organization.

Planning groups generally are responsible for giving voice to the goals and objectives of the community, gathering information in order to decide priorities and coordinate various programs and estimating how best to institute change, given various limitations on the rapidity with which growth may be attained.

The Committee is scheduled to meet the third week in February. Members of the Planning Advisory Committee who were appointed by President of the Senate of the Congress of Micronesia Tosiwo Nakayama and Speaker of the House of Representatives Bethwel Henry are: Senator Hiroshi Ismael, Ponape; Senator Isaac Lanwi, Marshalls; Senator Francisco Palacios, Marianas; Representative Luke Tman, Yap; Representative Jacob Sawaichi, Palau; and Representative Soukichi Fritz, Truk.

Members of the Committee appointed by the High Commissioner are: Eusebio Rechucher, Deputy Assistant Commissioner for Resources and Development, Vice Chairman; William A. ## KCCA MEMBERS MEET

#### APPROVE DEVELOPING PLANS FOR NEW STORE

At their Annual Members' Meeting Kolonia Co-op members gave their approval to the development of plans for a new store. They also heard reports of a successful business year with substantial savings.

The Board of Directors recommendation of 6% on shares and 60% cash and 40% share refund will result in paying out more than \$20,000 in cash within a few weeks. An additional \$1.8,319 received in shares from the Federation will be distributed to members in shares. This means a total patronage refund, cash and share of 12.8% of sales. And, man, that ain't hay!

## JAPANESE MEMORIAL TEAM VISITS

(Press Release, TTPI, Jan 18 . . .) Fifty representatives of the Japan Buddhist Cultural Association are in Saipan to visit burial places of their World War II dead.

Twenty-two/travel to Tinian Island aboard MV Ran Annim for an overnight visit, while 28 will reamin in Saipan. The entire group will return to Guam tomorrow afternoon.

The visitors are part of a group of 130 private citizens and priests who arrived in Guam from Japan earlier this week. A small party was scheduled to visit Peleliu, Palau, with approximately 75 remaining in Guam.

The memorial teams are part of the Japanese government's long-range project to locate and preserve the graves of thousands of its citizens who did not return.

The Association's visit to the Territory will receive extensive newspaper and television coverage in Japan.

In 1965 six members of the Association visited Truk, Palau and Saipan.

# S.S.GUAM BEAR BEACHED

For the information of our readers the following letter was received by the Distad Office from J. P. Lomax, Vice President and General Manager of the Pacific Far East Line (Guam) Ltd., Agents. Only part of the letter is being reprinted here.

At approximately 6:15 A.M. Local Time, January 14th, with cargo loaded at Pacific Coast Ports, Honolulu and Wake Island for Guam (plus some cargo loaded at Wake for San Francisco, Los Angeles and Honolulu), the S.S. Guam Bear was in collision and subsequently placed on the beach by the Master to prevent her sinking in deep water. She now lies inside the breakwater with her after end sumberged (and the cargo therein beyond saving), but her forward hold and deck are dry and the cargo therein reportedly intact.

The vessel herself has now been determined to be beyond saving at a cost anywhere near her repaired value and is, therefore. for practical purposes a total
loss. However, best estimates of the costs of discharging, sorting and
delivering the sound cargoes (based on advices from Mr. Walter Martignoni,
internationally known salvage expert, whom the company implicately on report
of the accident flew to the scene to assess the situation, as compared
to best estimates of values thereof, indicate that a cargo salvage operation
is economically justified.

May we emphasize that the salvage operation is by no means a routine undertaking. While Mr. Martignoni is of the opinion that as matters now stand it appears feasible physically as well as economically, the situation could change for the worse, necessitating abandonment or cessation of salvage efforts. The order or removal of cargo will, of course, be left entirely to Mr. Martignoni's judgement as the salvage master in sole charge of and with sole responsibility for the operation.

Needless to say, the company regrets the loss of the vessel and a substantial portion of her cargo, but is grateful that there were no injuries or lives lost, as might well have been the case. (Newspaper release of January 15 with pictures is posted on the Administration Bulletin Board)

# EDUCATION CONFERENCE

(Press Release, TTPI, Jan. 20 ...) The Trust Territory Department of Education opened a general conference today in the Theater Building on Capitol Hill, Saipan. Following introductory remarks by High Commissioner W. R. Norwood and Assistant Commissioner for Community Services Janes E. Hawkins, the conference plan was presented by Conference Coordinator and Director of Education J. R. Trace.

The Conference then began work on the major item on its agenda--preparation of the budget. Other major items include a discussion of the Micronesian Teacher Education Center by its Director, Dr. M. Roseamonde Porter, and a presentation of Office of Economic Opportunity Programs, including Operation Head Start, by Jack J. Rosenblum, Field Representative for Territories of the Community Action Program of the OEO.

Other topics on the agenda will include the school construction program, the scholarship and vocational training programs, a review of Peace Corps operations and Federal programs, as well as plans for the summer of 1967.

In addition to headquarters Education Department staff and district directors of education, major participants in the Conference include: Assistant Commissioner for Administration Joseph F. Screen, Community Development Officer Francis B. Mahoney; Deputy Peace Corps Director for Micronesia Robert Burns and Westinghouse Overseas Representative John A. McColgan.

# BITS AND ENDS

To us, one of the "delightful" bits of irrational Americana is our obtuse preoccupation with taking vitamins and minerals. In the States nearly all the money spent on these preparations is wasted. Anyone (and this is most of us) getting an average diet of fresh or canned fruits and vegetables, some dairy products, eggs and protein needs no supplements of vitamins and minerals.

The sale of these products is big business in the United States. Advertising inculcates the suspicion that it would be better to be safe than sorry. Fortunately, most of the junk bought is relatively harmless. The consumer throws away his money and his kidnesys throw away the unneeded supplements. However, the oil soluble vitamins, A and D can be toxic in excess, especially to small children.

It is possible that Americans. adjusting not too well to the difficulties attendant on getting their customery foodstuffs at Ponape, may need some supplement; it is possible but not too likely. Those who are concerned can find at KCCA a product that beats pills — wheat germ, the highly nutritious vitamin-packed heart of the wheat grain. It is removed in the milling of flour because the wheat germ oil gets rancid if the storage of flour is prolonged. The so-called flour "enrichment" adds but a part of what has been removed.

The charm of this product is, that, toasted as it is, the product has a nutty flavor, can be added to scups, salads, etc. Or try the following muffin recipe for a Sunday breakfast treat:

l egg, well-beaten k cup sugar la cup milk toup salad oil la cup flour k ts. salt tsp. baking power l cup wheat germ

Beat together egg, sugar, milk and oil. Mix in the flour, sifted with salt and baking powder. Stir in the wheat germ. Fill greased muffin tins 2/3rds full. Bake in 425 degree oven 20 minutes or until golden brown. For variety, add ½ cub raisins, chopped dates or other fruit.

# POUCH NOT FOR PRIVATE BUSINESS

Mr. Robert Halvorsen, District Administrator, sent the following letter to all UMDA Business Associates:

I want to inform all business concerns that United Micronesian Development Association is a private organization and is not authorized to use Government pouch services. Correspondence and other out going mail to UMDA must utilize the existing U. S. Postal Services.
