Will Die with His Country.

PEKING, March 17.—The health of Li Hung Chang is again a matter of grave consideration to the Ministers of the powers. Mr. Rockhill, the American special commissioner, who visited Earl Li yesterday, says he is a physical wreck and apparently in a state of utter collapse, although mentally as bright as ever. Mr. Rockhill would not be surprised to hear of his death at any moment. The removal of Li Hung Chang by death or any other cause at the present moment would be very unfortunate. M. de Giers, the Russian Minister, said today:

"Li Hung Chang is a great diplomat and his influence with the Chinese court is absolutely unique. No other man in China approaches him in this respect. The influence is not temporary, but it is particularly effective at important moments in the history of China like the present."

Senor de Colonagan, Spanish Minister and doyen of the diplomatic corps, said:

"The Chinese court could not appoint a plenipotentiary of the same caliber and having equal influence with the Chinese and the foreigners. Although many of the Ministers of the powers object to his political methods and regard him essentially a trimmer, nevertheless they realize that he is the best possible man to represent China in the present emergency."

The Meade Arrived.

The U.S.A. transport Meade arrived yesterday afternoon from San Francisco. Two cases of measles on board the transport were reported.

The transport was not permitted to come close up to the wharf, and she was lying away from the wharf about six feet for some time after she entered port.

As the Meade came up to the wharf the band of the Fifth cavalry aboard struck up the Star Spangled Banner and the hats of all the men on the transport, and on the wharf as well, came off.

There are a number of passengers for Manila on the Meade and there are among them many people of note.

Where Fates of Nations is Decided.

COPENHAGEN, March 18.—Dowager Empress Alexander of Russia will arrive here tomorrow and will remain until after the celebration of the eighty-third anniversary of the birth of her father, King Christian.

The King and Queen of England were expected to be present at the celebration, but have postponed their visit until later in the year.

King Christian will go to Wiesbaden in April. Queen Wilhelmina of The Netherlands and her consort are expected here shortly.

LONDON, March 18, 5:40 p. m.—On the highest official authority the Associated Press is authorized to announce that the difficulty at Tientsin between the Russians and British over the construction of a railroad siding in territory claimed by both probably will be solved by the withdrawal of both the British and the Russian troops from the ground in dispute.

## THE ATTACK ON BISHOP WILLIS

We cannot understand why professed Christians should take offense at a special prayer for any man, woman or child in and out of his church. We thought that prayers were wireless telegrams to the Supreme Being, and that the question of mundane affairs should never interfere with those pertaining to religion.

Bishop Willis has, however, been taken to task because he, at the memorial service at St. Andrew's Cathedral in honor of the memory of the Queen of Great Britain, offered the following prayer:

"Almighty God, Who rulest over all the kingdoms of the world and disposest of them according to Thy good pleasure; we yield Thee unfeigned thanks, for that Thou art pleased to place Thy servant, Edward VII, upon the throne of Great Britain. Let Thy wisdom be his guide, and let Thine arm strengthen him; let justice, truth and holiness, let peace and love, and all those virtues that adorn the Christian profession flourish in his days; direct all his counsels and endeavors to Thy glory and the welfare of his people, and give them grace to obey him carefully and willingly for conscience sake; that neither sinful passions nor private interests may disappoint his cares for the public good; let him always possess the hearts of his people, that they may never be wanting in honor to his person and dutiful submission to his authority; let his reign be long and prosperous, and crown him with immortality in the life to come, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

"Most Gracious God, Who has set Thy servant Edward upon the throne of his ancestors, we most humbly beseech Thee to protect him from the gathering together of the froward, and from the insurrection of wicked doers; do Thou weaken the hands, blast the designs and defeat the enterprises of all his enemies, that no secret conspiracies nor open violence may disquiet his reign; but that, being safely kept under the shadow of Thy wing and supported by Thy power, he may triumph over all opposition; that so the world may acknowledge Thee to be his defender and mighty deliverer in all difficulties and adversities, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

King Edward VII will wish all the people of the world to pray for him, and ask God to support him in the performance of his high duties and weighty responsibilities, which affect one-quarter of the population of the earth. The prayer was offensive to some churlish Americans and the good Bishop was attacked in the Advertiser. In response His Lordship sent the following letter to the organ of the Devil's Partner:

"Honolulu, March 26, 1901.

"Editor Advertiser:—In your editorial on the Anglican Church, in your issue of yesterday, you assumed that prayers for King Edward VII are regularly offered in St. Andrew's Cathedral, and you regard the practice as affording sufficient reason why American Episcopalians should desire to attend an American Episcopal Church rather than St. Andrew's.

"I quite agree with you that if such were the practice in the Cathedral

and other churches of the Anglican Church in the Islands there would be ground for dissatisfaction in the mind of American churchmen. Permit me, therefore, to state that no such prayers are used. From the moment the Islands became American soil the name of the sovereign of Great Britain was omitted from the state prayers in our public worship, and the prayer for the President, taken from the American book, was ordered to be used in all our churches. American Episcopalians have no need to go elsewhere to pray for the President, for whom, as well as for the Governor of the Territory, prayers are said at the morning and evening service.

"The notion that we pray for King Edward, which is voiced in your article, being very widely disseminated, I trust to your courtesy to make it known that the notion is not according to fact, and that as American and Anglican are in great measure convertible terms, the difference being that Anglican is more comprehensive, there is nothing to prevent American Episcopalians finding themselves at home in the Anglican Cathedral.

"If your cartoonist of this morning will read up "The Lady of the Lake" he will find that the position and words he has assigned to the outlaw chieftain, Roderick Dhu, do not belong to him, but to Fitz-James, when, all alone, he found himself confronted by a host of the rebel chieftain's warriors. ALFRED WILLIS.

We trust that Bishop Willis will continue to pray every day for King Edward and every other living soul, including even the men of the Advertiser.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

There is a cemetery near the Lunatic Asylum known as the Puea cemetery which is being desecrated lately. There were buried the retainers of the great aliis like Ruth and Pauahi. Now the ground is being broken up. Coffins are thrown about, and after the lids are burst the bones are scattered and the jewelry found with the dead servants of the aliis pilfered. We are told that the Puea cemetery belongs to the Bishop estate, but we refuse to believe that the trustees are aware of the wanton sacrilege of a sacred plot, as reported to us.

It is rumored that an act will be introduced in the near future by Representative Hooge, which will deprive more minors of honest work. We haven't seen the bill but it reads something like this: "An Act to prohibit minors from being employed in the Dry Business, on the Waterfront and in any place where 'cuss-language' is used. This Act shall take effect as soon as 'Billy' is Mayor of Honolulu." The act deserves the same attention as the act relating to minors working in saloons was granted. The Senate will kill both bills.

### Police on Scents.

Somebody played a practical joke in the Police Court the other morning. George Sea, the bailiff, took his chair when the Court opened and looked handsome as ever. Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth started calling the cases, and when on the point of claiming that John Smith had been drunk he stopped short, sniffed, sniffed again, looked around and fixed his beautiful dark eyes on George Sea, who looked uncomfortably. "Dead rat," suggested the magistrate, "cockroaches" whispered clerk Zablan and John Smith was fined. George Sea left his chair and went outside and David Kaapa sat in the bailiff's seat. Another "drunk" was called up, and it was believed that it was his breath which polluted the air. Kaapa, who is a very bright detective when he is asleep, felt that the prevailing scent was nearer to his vicinity. He smelt a rat in fact, but he was wrong. An investigation showed that someone had smeared the chair with Limburger cheese and that it was the chair and not the bailiff or detective from which the stench emanated. When the "practical joker" is caught, he will catch it if he will step down in the back yard.

### Dr. Russell Resigns.

The Senate will no longer be presided over by Senator Russell. The action of the Republican obstructionists had become unbearable to the President who read the following official communication this morning and then called Vice President S. E. Kaius to the chair:

"SENATE CHAMBER, March 27th, 1901.

"To the Senate: Having repeatedly called the attention of this body to the fact that the short time accorded to the Legislature is wasted in debate on trivial matters which are of no interest to the people of this Territory while the passage of measures which were promised by all the political parties are delayed; that little or no work is being done by the several committees as evidenced by failure to promptly report; that, as a whole, the Senate is practically, an inefficient body and that the short time remaining in which to perform the responsible duties, with which we are entrusted will prove utterly fruitless if present methods are continued.

"In the name of all the people and of all the parties who have entrusted us with the high mission of state affairs, which involves life, justice and property and, in general, the good order of society and prosperity of this young Territory, upon which the people of the whole Union are looking with profound interest, I protest against such an order of things, and I appeal to the best elements of all parties and of all the people, to unite for the purpose of doing our plain duty to the people during the remaining half of the session. There is no time to waste. "Being convinced that I can more fully perform my duty upon the floor of the Senate, I therefore beg to tender my resignation as President."

A recess was taken immediately, and it was decided by the majority in caucus to make Mr. Kaius president of the Senate for the balance of the session.

During the recent trial of certain members of the Belton Park Club in England, who were charged with illegally employing a number of youngsters as caddies who should have been at school, it was stated that the caddies were given luncheon and tea. "Why did you give them tea?" the judge asked. The witness replied that it was usual to give caddies tea. "Ah," said the judge, thoughtfully, "I presume that makes them tea caddies."

# CORRESPONDENCE.

Wants the Band.

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:—

I regret very much to see that there is a movement on foot to strike out the band item in the appropriation bill.

I think if this is done a great mistake will be made, and a great injustice done to the poorer class of the people. For this is about the only chance a great many of them ever have of ever hearing good music, or of enjoying themselves. I also consider that as this band is about the only thing we have, in the way of amusements, it should stay by all means, and to put it out of existence would be little less than a national calamity. I, however, agree that the other islands should at times have the pleasure of having the band visit them.

Again if this country was bankrupt, or any other calamity had fallen upon us, there might be some reason for this measure.

But the fact is this country never was in a more prosperous condition. Take, for instance, the sugar industry, is it not now on a better paying basis than it ever was before, and is not this true of almost every other kind of industry, with the exception of coffee. It is true there is a stringency in the money market, but this is due to the rascally would-be company promoters that have flooded this country with worthless sugar stock, and who alone are responsible for the depression that exist at the present time. Now, if the members of the Legislature want to safe-guard the money of the public, let them pass a bill that shall make it a crime for company-promoters to receive *paid up stock*, or take any other unlawful means of defrauding the public.

### Will Die with His Country.

PEKING, March 17.—The health of Li Hung Chang is again a matter of grave consideration to the Ministers of the powers. Mr. Rockhill, the American special commissioner, who visited Earl Li yesterday, says he is a physical wreck and apparently in a state of utter collapse, although mentally as bright as ever. Mr. Rockhill would not be surprised to hear of his death at any moment. The removal of Li Hung Chang by death or any other cause at the present moment would be very unfortunate. M. de Giers, the Russian Minister, said today:

"Li Hung Chang is a great diplomat and his influence with the Chinese court is absolutely unique. No other man in China approaches him in this respect. The influence is not temporary, but it is particularly effective at important moments in the history of China like the present."

Senor de Colonagan, Spanish Minister and doyen of the diplomatic corps, said:

"The Chinese court could not appoint a plenipotentiary of the same caliber and having equal influence with the Chinese and the foreigners. Although many of the Ministers of the powers object to his political methods and regard him essentially a trimmer, nevertheless they realize that he is the best possible man to represent China in the present emergency."

### The Meade Arrived.

The U.S.A. transport Meade arrived yesterday afternoon from San Francisco. Two cases of measles on board the transport were reported.

The transport was not permitted to come close up to the wharf and she was lying away from the wharf about six feet for some time after she entered port.

As the Meade came up to the wharf the band of the Fifth cavalry aboard struck up the Star Spangled Banner and the hats of all the men on the transport, and on the wharf as well, came off.

There are a number of passengers for Manila on the Meade and there are among them many people of note.

### Where Fates of Nations is Decided.

COPENHAGEN, March 18.—Dowager Empress Alexander of Russia will arrive here tomorrow and will remain until after the celebration of the eighty-third anniversary of the birth of her father, King Christian.

The King and Queen of England were expected to be present at the celebration, but have postponed their visit until later in the year.

King Christian will go to Wiesbaden in April. Queen Wilhelmina of The Netherlands and her consort are expected here shortly.

### The Row is Pau.

LONDON, March 18, 5:40 p. m.—On the highest official authority the Associated Press is authorized to announce that the difficulty at Tientsin between the Russians and British over the construction of a railroad siding in territory claimed by both probably will be solved by the withdrawal of both the British and the Russian troops from the ground in dispute.

We thought that prayers were wireless telegrams to the Supreme Being, and that the question of mundane affairs should never interfere with those pertaining to religion.

Bishop Willis has, however, been taken to task because he, at the memorial service at St. Andrew's Cathedral in honor of the memory of the Queen of Great Britain, offered the following prayer:

"Almighty God, Who rulest over all the kingdoms of the world and disposest of them according to Thy good pleasure; we yield Thee unfeigned thanks, for that Thou art pleased to place Thy servant, Edward VII, upon the throne of Great Britain. Let Thy wisdom be his guide, and let Thine arm strengthen him; let justice, truth and holiness, let peace and love, and all those virtues that adorn the Christian profession flourish in his days; direct all his counsels and endeavors to Thy glory and the welfare of his people, and give them grace to obey him carefully and willingly for conscience sake; that neither sinful passions nor private interests may disappoint his cares for the public good; let him always possess the hearts of his people, that they may never be wanting in honor to his person and dutiful submission to his authority; let his reign be long and prosperous, and crown him with immortality in the life to come, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

"Most Gracious God, Who has set Thy servant Edward upon the throne of his ancestors, we most humbly beseech Thee to protect him from the gathering together of the froward, and from the insurrection of wicked doers; do Thou weaken the hands, blast the designs and defeat the enterprises of all his enemies, that no secret conspiracies nor open violence may disquiet his reign; but that, being safely kept under the shadow of Thy wing and supported by Thy power, he may triumph over all opposition; that so the world may acknowledge Thee to be his defender and mighty deliverer in all difficulties and adversities, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen."

King Edward VII will wish all the people of the world to pray for him, and ask God to support him in the performance of his high duties and weighty responsibilities, which affect one-quarter of the population of the earth. The prayer was offensive to some churchly Americans and the good Bishop was attacked in the Advertiser. In response His Lordship sent the following letter to the organ of the Devil's Partner:

"Honolulu, March 26, 1901.

"Editor Advertiser:—In your editorial on the Anglican Church, in your issue of yesterday, you assumed that prayers for King Edward VII are regularly offered in St. Andrew's Cathedral, and you regard the practice as affording sufficient reason why American Episcopalians should desire to attend an American Episcopal Church rather than St. Andrew's.

"I quite agree with you that if such were the practice in the Cathedral

and other churches of the Anglican Church in the Islands there would be ground for dissatisfaction in the mind of American churchmen. Permit me, therefore, to state that no such prayers are used. From the moment the Islands became American soil the name of the sovereign of Great Britain was omitted from the state prayers in our public worship, and the prayer for the President, taken from the American book, was ordered to be used in all our churches. American Episcopalians have no need to go elsewhere to pray for the President, for whom, as well as for the Governor of the Territory, prayers are said at the morning and evening service.

"The notion that we pray for King Edward, which is voiced in your article, being very widely disseminated, I trust to your courtesy to make it known that the notion is not according to fact, and that as American and Anglican are in great measure convertible terms, the difference being that Anglican is more comprehensive, there is nothing to prevent American Episcopalians finding themselves at home in the Anglican Cathedral.

"If your cartoonist of this morning will read up 'The Lady of the Lake' he will find that the position and words he has assigned to the outlaw chieftain, Roderick Dhu, do not belong to him, but to Fitz-James, when, all alone, he found himself confronted by a host of the rebel chieftain's warriors. ALFRED WILLIS.

"March 26, 1901."

We trust that Bishop Willis will continue to pray every day for King Edward and every other living soul, including even the men of the Advertiser.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

There is a cemetery near the Lunatic Asylum known as the Puea cemetery which is being desecrated lately. There were buried the retainers of the great aliis like Ruth and Pauahi. Now the ground is being broken up. Coffins are thrown about, and after the lids are burst the bones are scattered and the jewelry found with the dead servants of the aliis pilfered. We are told that the Puea cemetery belongs to the Bishop estate, but we refuse to believe that the trustees are aware of the wanton sacrilege of a sacred plot, as reported to us.

It is rumored that an act will be introduced in the near future by Representative Hooge, which will deprive more minors of honest work. We haven't seen the bill but it reads something like this: "An Act to prohibit minors from being employed in the Dray Business, on the Waterfront and in any place where 'cuss-language' is used. This Act shall take effect as soon as 'Billy' is Mayor of Honolulu." The act deserves the same attention as the act relating to minors working in saloons was granted. The Senate will kill both bills.

### Police on Scent.

Somebody played a practical joke in the Police Court the other morning. George Sea, the bailiff, took his chair when the Court opened and looked handsome as ever. Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth started calling the cases, and when on the point of claiming that John Smith had been drunk he stopped short, sniffed, sniffed again, looked around and fixed his beautiful dark eyes on George Sea, who looked uncomfortably. "Dead rat," suggested the magistrate, "cockroaches" whispered clerk Zablan and John Smith was fined. George Sea left his chair and went outside and David Kapa sat in the bailiff's seat. Another "drunk" was called up, and it was believed that it was his breath which polluted the air. Kapa, who is a very bright detective when he is asleep, felt that the prevailing scent was nearer to his vicinity. He smelt a rat in fact, but he was wrong. An investigation showed that someone had smeared the chair with Limburger cheese and that it was the chair and not the bailiff or detective from which the stench emanated. When the "practical joker" is caught, he will catch it if he will step down in the back yard.

### Dr. Russell Resigns.

The Senate will no longer be presided over by Senator Russell. The action of the Republican obstructionists had become unbearable to the President who read the following official communication this morning and then called Vice President S. E. Kaue to the chair:

"SENATE CHAMBER, March 27th, 1901.

"To the Senate: Having repeatedly called the attention of this body to the fact that the short time accorded to the Legislature is wasted in debate on trivial matters which are of no interest to the people of this Territory while the passage of measures which were promised by all the political parties are delayed; that little or no work is being done by the several committees as evidenced by failure to promptly report; that, as a whole, the Senate is practically, an inefficient body and that the short time remaining in which to perform the responsible duties, with which we are entrusted will prove utterly fruitless if present methods are continued.

"In the name of all the people and of all the parties who have entrusted us with the high mission of state affairs, which involves life, justice and property and, in general, the good order of society and prosperity of this young Territory, upon which the people of the whole Union are looking with profound interest, I protest against such an order of things, and I appeal to the best elements of all parties and of all the people, to unite for the purpose of doing our plain duty to the people during the remaining half of the session. There is no time to waste. "Being convinced that I can more fully perform my duty upon the floor of the Senate, I therefore beg to tender my resignation as President."

A recess was taken immediately, and it was decided by the majority in caucus to make Mr. Kaue president of the Senate for the balance of the session.

During the recent trial of certain members of the Belton Park Club in England, who were charged with illegally employing a number of youngsters as caddies who should have been at school, it was stated that the caddies were given luncheon and tea. "Why did you give them tea?" the judge asked. The witness replied that it was usual to give caddies tea. "Ah," said the judge, thoughtfully, "I presume that makes them tea caddies."

## CORRESPONDENCE.

Wants the Band.

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:—

I regret very much to see that there is a movement on foot to strike out the band item in the appropriation bill.

I think if this is done a great mistake will be made, and a great injustice done to the poorer class of the people. For this is about the only chance a great many of them ever have of ever hearing good music, or of enjoying themselves. I also consider that as this band is about the only thing we have, in the way of amusements, it should stay by all means, and to put it out of existence would be little less than a national calamity. I, however, agree that the other islands should at times have the pleasure of having the band visit them.

Again if this country was bankrupt, or any other calamity had fallen upon us, there might be some reason for this measure.

But the fact is this country never was in a more prosperous condition. Take, for instance, the sugar industry, is it not now on a better paying basis than it ever was before, and is not this true of almost every other kind of industry, with the exception of coffee. It is true there is a stringency in the money market, but this is due to the rascally would-be company promoters that have flooded this country with worthless sugar stock, and who alone are responsible for the depression that exist at the present time. Now, if the members of the Legislature want to safeguard the money of the public, let them pass a bill that shall make it a crime for company-promoters to receive paid up stock, or take any other unlawful means of defrauding the public.
