## The Color Line.

The Chicago Inter Ocean of Aug. 7 contains a long article from a Washington correspondent in regard to the race question and "society" generally at the National Capitol. In the article occurs the following:

The color line is becoming confusing and at times embarrassing in Washington. This being a Southern city in its prejudices, the color line is strictly drawn in all that pertains to society. So strong is this prejudice that there was quite a social hubbub last winter when a colored office holder appeared at one of the President's official receptions. But in Washington all negroes are not black, and neither are they all poor or illiterate. They have money and education, and they have fair skinned daughters who cannot be distinguished from the white women except by studying their genealogy. And in the miscellaneous hotel life of a great city it is not always practicable to trace the ancestry of all people you meet. Much has to depend upon appearances, and these are sometimes deceiving as to race as they are as to social station and financial condition.

There have been instances here in the shadow of the capitol when the mistake has been the other way. A few months ago when Congress was in session, Prince Jonah Kūhiō Kalanianaʻōle, delegate from Hawaii, and cousin of the late King Kalakaua and Queen Liliuokalani, and nephew of Queen Kapiolani, consort of King Kalakaua entered the House restaurant in company with several Southern members and they took seats at one of the most conspicuous tables.

Prince Kalanianaʻōle is a handsome man in his way, but he has the color of an Alabama cotton picker, and his features are decidedly African. A Western member, not acquainted with all the niceties of the color question and not able to distinguish between a black prince and a negro waiter made a remark about allowing negroes in the restaurant, which was overheard by the Southern members who were lunching with him. Of course the Western man apologized, but he is still unable to understand why a black man from Hawaii is any better than a black man in Washington or from Alabama.

There were other mistakes of similar character while the Hawaiian Prince was in Washington, and his greatest humiliation was in being mistaken for a common negro.

### Late War News.

Konzertun, Aug. 27.—The Japanese are advancing against the whole eastern front of the Russian line. So far the Russians have been successful in the skirmishing.

Liaoyang, Aug. 27.—The Japanese failed to occupy Anshanhou after a fight in which they lost thirty-two guns. Gen Kuroki has 100,000 men between Khoyan and Gutzia. Gen Nobzu is between Simoucheng and Khoyan and Gen Oku at Haibheng.

London, Aug. 27.—The steamer Lisbon has been stopped by a Russian cruiser in the Bay of Biscay.

Tientsin, Aug. 27.—Placards have been discovered at Tientsin urging the massacre of all foreigners.

London, Aug. 27.—In view of the lessons of the Oriental war, the Government has abolished its 4.7 and 6-in guns for the Navy and substituted 9-in guns.

## JACK IN POLITICS.

Secretary Jack Atkinson arrived by the S S Hawaiian yesterday morning and is the guest of Rev S L Desha. Mr Atkinson arrived to look after the convention preliminaries. —Hilo Herald.

So that is the business that took Secretary Atkinson to Hilo! Mr Atkinson is paid a big salary to attend to the business of the general public at the seat of government.

In place of attending to his work, however, he goes off for a long period to arrange for a purely party convention! What would the people of the mainland think should the Secretary of State go off to some place, to arrange for a Republican convention? They would, irrespective of party, condemn such action in the strongest terms. In this relation to the public, the positions of the Secretary of State and the Territorial Secretary are identical in their respective fields. Neither should dabble in politics; and by making himself the flunkay of the Republican party in this instance, Secretary Atkinson has surrendered his dignity and lost respect and esteem.

Probably the red worms in the water at Kaimuki are off shoots of the yellow gold that Senator Cecil Brown expected to receive out of the recent Pauoa water scandal.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

We heartily congratulate Hon R B Kidd on the receipt of a letter of thanks from W E Hearst. There is an amusing feature about this letter, however. It is something like the Hearst button early in June—almost every Democrat had one.

The Republican press of the city seem to have had dreams about the campaign fund of the local Democracy. We can assure them that there is no cause for alarm. The Democracy will be quite able this year to take care of itself and to pay all the bills contracted.

In deciding that the buses running between the end of the car line and the polo grounds this afternoon must carry passengers free of charge, if at all, is wholly correct. The buses being used are unlicensed. By meeting the cars in Kalihi they interfere with the business of hackmen who have to pay a heavy license.

The arrival of Secretary Atkinson on the steamer Hawaiian this morning, to remain until after the Republican convention is still further evidence that the young secretary is out of politics. Mr Atkinson is said to visit Hilo at this time on business connected with the Hawaiian Board of Missions. —Hawaii Herald.

Hip, hip, hooray!

Of all the arable territory of the United States, Hawaii is most sparsely populated. And yet it is said that there is no room for small farmers. —Advertiser.

You could take all of the Islands, together with the oceans between them, put them within unoccupied arable territory in a dozen places between the Mississippi river and California and it would be impossible to see them.

Pokini, the Hawaiian who was given the contract to renovate the post-office, has finished the job and the work was satisfactory in every respect. Hawaiian labor was used, and it was done, at the suggestion of the Federal authorities, as an experiment. The results speak for them selves. Hawaiian labor has proved itself, and it is to be hoped that the United States government will suitably recognize it in future contracts.

Ex-Governor Black in his speech nominating Roosevelt exclaimed: "The fate of nations is still decided by their wars. Peace will come here to abide only when the dreams of children are the accepted charts to guide the destinies of men." In other words: "Prepare for war, by making Mr Roosevelt president. If you want war, you want Roosevelt. If you want Roosevelt, you want war." Well, isn't that about it?

It, of course, will not do for a moment to have Judge Gear fall through his court room floor on top of the dignified fate of Superintendent Atkinson. The Judiciary should at all times encourage education rather than crush it out in this horrible manner. We therefore recommend that three posts be placed in the private office of Mr Atkinson of sufficient strength to keep Judge Gear at a safe distance skyward.

The attack of the Advertiser on the interview of Governor Carter relating to small farming is hard to

understand. If Governor Carter or anybody else made a mistake in regard to local possibilities of small farming, THE INDEPENDENT would probably be the first paper to take it up. But in his interview Governor Carter told the truth from start to finish. There is no room for criticism. It is impossible to understand why the advertiser criticizes unless it be that Thurston still has his pile of ballast somewhere to sell.

The Auditor is right in refusing to issue a warrant to P M McMahon for services rendered in the case of the Government against Cotton Bros & Company. Mr McMahon is a Government employee, and, as such, is drawing more than \$1,800 a year in salary. It is not only unreasonable but illegal for the Auditor to saction the payment to him of any amount, other than his regular salary, for work performed for the Government. The healthiest thing the Attorney-General can do is to drop the matter.

It is absurd for the United States to think that it can extend over Hawaii and the Philippines the same laws that are in vogue on the mainland. Conditions are entirely different. Manila has been simply ruined by laws that work all right in Massachusetts but cannot be made to apply there. Hawaii is up against the same conditions. What is wanted is something other than a military administration at Washington—an administration that will consider the needs of outside territories.

## Jeffries Still Champion.

The fight in San Francisco last night between the two giants, Jeffries and Munroe, resulted in a signal victory for the champion. In the first round Jeffries knocked the miner down three times, and in the second round put him completely out of business.

Cablegrams of each round were received at the Columbia and favorite saloons. Both places had large blackboards upon which the cables recorded as received. Large crowds thronged the vicinity, most of them interested spectators because they had bet on the fight. After all the news was in, a "social session" was held in the large hall at the Favorite. Mike Patton was present and for three hours entertained the big crowd with his songs and inimitable specialties.

## Mrs. Godfrey Rhodes Dead.

At about 11 a m this forenoon, after an illness of some duration, Mrs Godfrey Rhodes passed away to her long rest. She was the widow of the late Hon Godfrey Rhodes, being his second wife, and therefore aunt of the late Mrs Mackintosh and her surviving brothers, the Honorables Godfrey and Cecil Brown of this city and Mr Malcolm Brown of San Francisco. She was aged to nearly seventy years. The funeral will take place at 3:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from the Roman Catholic Cathedral.
