THE WAIALAE RANCH.

THE CIRCUIT COURT.

Judge Cooper Transacts Busi-
ness in Short Order.

Nearly Every Case on the Calendar
Reported Ready for Trial.—
Divorce Suits Galore.

The May Term of the First Cir-
cuit Court opened at 10 o'clock this
morning, Judge Cooper presiding,
and a large majority of the legal
luminaries being in attendance.
There was also a sufficient number
of spectators, witnesses and jurymen
to more than occupy every seat in
the courtroom.

The Government was represented
by Attorney General Smith, whose
late assistant, A. G. M. Robertson,
sat beside him, together with De-
puty Marshal Brown.

Judge Cooper lost no time in pre-
liminaries but at once commenced
the calling of the calendar, which
contained a list of about 125 cases of
various kinds, from assault and bat-
tery upwards. The number of di-
vorce cases exceeds that of two or
three previous calendars.

Nearly every case called was indi-
cated by the attorneys interested as
being ready for trial, which was
something unusual in a calendar as
long as the one now before the
Court.

The ejectment case of Kailikea
Waianuhe vs. Kahookaamoku went
over for the term.

The appeal of Tuck Chee against
a decision of the Honolulu District
Court finding him guilty of extor-
sion was not prosecuted.

The case of the Republic of Ha-
waii vs. Edmund G. Norrie, on ap-
peal from the Honolulu District
Court on the charge of seditions
libel was set for trial at 9 a. m. to-
morrow. Paul Neumann will appear
for the defense.

Harada Matzukami and Ito, two
Japanese charged with malicious in-
jury, will also have their trial in the
morning.

After the calling of the calendar
the following cases were called up
and temporarily disposed of:

Republic of Hawaii vs. Patrick
Cullen, murder, plea of not guilty
entered. In this case Mr. Kinney
will assist in the prosecution and J.
A. Magoon will appear for the de-
fense.

The Republic of Hawaii vs. Ku-
mukoa, malicious injury; indictment
nolle pros'd.

Republic of Hawaii vs. H. Keawe-
amahi, housebreaking; plea of not
guilty entered.

Republic of Hawaii vs. J. K. Na-
kookoo, charged with malicious
burning in the second degree; de-
fendant allowed till 9 a. m. to-mor-
row to plead.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Punuku,
larceny in the second degree; plea
of not guilty entered.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Captain
Hill, barratry; nolle pros'd.

Republic of Hawaii vs. A. Herman-
son, manslaughter, demurrer over-
ruled and plea of not guilty entered.

At noon the court adjourned un-
til 9 a. m. to-morrow.

GENERAL NOTES.

Case No. 90, Edma G. Troussau
vs. B. Cartwright et al., an action
in assumpsit, will come up for argu-

ment on demurrer whenever the
court is not otherwise engaged;
Hartwell for plaintiff and Hatch for
defendant.

In the trover suit of D. Dayton,
administrator, vs. A. Dreier, a jury
trial was waived.

The rest of the cases on the calen-
dar were announced as ready and
liable to be called up at any time
which the attorneys and court can
agree on.

Notices of appeal from the deci-
sion of the District Magistrate in
the cases of The Republic of Ha-
waii vs. Lee Peng, charged with of-
fering and passing a fraudulent tax
receipt; The Republic vs. G. I. Par-
ker, charged with extorting the sum
of \$25 from Otaka, a Japanese pros-
titute; The Republic of Hawaii vs.
Sin Chong, charged with assault
and battery on Pang Moy, at Ewa,
and The Republic of Hawaii vs. Ka-
hahani, accused of maintaining a
che fa game, have all been filed in
the Circuit Court.

Although the calendar was unusu-
ally long it did not take Judge
Cooper over an hour and a half to
get through with it this morning.

Of the cases to be tried at the
present term there are fourteen to
come before the Hawaiian criminal
jury, six before the Hawaiian civil
jury and sixteen before the mixed
jury. Twenty-two cases will come
before the foreign criminal jury,
and twenty-three before the civil
one. Nineteen cases will be tried
before the Court, juries having been
waived in each. In addition to all
this work, sixteen divorce cases will
occupy Judge Cooper's attention on
Saturday mornings, and several new
cases of various descriptions are
liable to be added to the calendar
from day to day during the first
week's session.

An exclusive table for members of
the press in the courtroom would
be an accommodation that would be
much appreciated.

The names of either V. V. or C.
W. Ashford appear as attorneys of
record in about eighteen cases.

Society Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of
the Honolulu Mission Children's So-
ciety was held on Saturday evening
last at the residence of Prof. Rich-
ards. A paper contributed by Ed-
ward Bailey was read by Mrs. Frear.
Rev. Kenneth Duncan also contrib-
uted an essay. The treasurer's
statement showed the society to be
\$900 in arrears of the sum needed
for the year's contributions.

A Horrible Sight.

The drowned body of a Japanese
was found near the Kalih beach be-
low the Receiving Station this
morning. The police were notified
and the locality was visited. The
face of the dead man was a horrible
sight, having been eaten by crabs.
The body was identified as that of
the insane Japanese who escaped
from the quarantine station on
Saturday. The body was buried
this afternoon.

The Cavalry Corps.

The mounted patrolmen under
Alfred W. Carter rode out to near
Makapuu Point on Saturday after-
noon for drill. The men, who are
independent of the police mounted
patrol, were drilled in the different
cavalry tactics, doing well for the
first time. James Wilder acted as
bugler and repeated the orders on
the bugle. The men are all good
riders and looked well as they rode
into town.

The Salvation Army held a very
successful meeting last night, dur-
ing which two handsome flags were
presented to the corps.

SATURDAY'S BALL GAME.

Comes Near Breaking Up in a General Row.

The Unknowns wrested the first game of the League baseball series from the Stars on Saturday afternoon in great style. The attendance was not very large, owing probably to the fact that the game was not advertised. Nevertheless the boys put up fairly good ball. The Unknowns wore white and black with the letter U on the shirt. The Stars looked pretty in brown shirts and trousers and white caps, a star being prominent on the shirt front. Both teams seemed to be in fine fettle and after each had fifteen minutes' practice the bell was rung for the game. Captain Thompson of the Unknowns won the toss and took the field. The Stars failed to score in the first and second innings, but in the third Willie Wilder managed to cross the home plate through a misunderstanding between the ball and Unknowns fielders. In the third inning George Angus scored a base-hit, stole second and was sent home by a daisy hit by Willie Wilder. The last named was sent home by Harry Wilder. The Stars failed to score again until the fifth inning when Lionel Hart, Willie Wilder and W. C. Wilder each scored. No advance was made by this nine until the eighth inning when John Ganzel, first baseman, drove the sphere to deep center making a three-base hit and later coming home leisurely on a passed ball. This made the Star's total number of runs, 6.

The Unknowns who went one better than the Stars scored their runs as follows: Arthur Miranda secured first base on balls, stole second the ball being thrown over the second baseman's head and covered the home plate before the ball could be recovered. The second witnessed a comedy of errors on the part of the Stars, which resulted in Geo. Duncan, Geo. Wood, Chris Willis and James Thompson piling up four runs. Thompson made a beautiful drive in this inning. He hit for a home run and got it. Geo. Wood made a three-bagger in the fourth inning and was assisted home. The Unknowns failed to score until the last half of the ninth inning when Tom Pryce made the winning run, the score standing 7 to 6 in favor of the Unknowns.

The judgment was appealed to Harry Whitney, and the latter upheld Kaia's decision. Kaia was so elated over this action that he forgot himself and waved his hat. The Star players were quite incensed over the umpire's actions.

Lionel Hart and Harry Wilder of the Stars made a good battery, considering the short practice they have had. John Ganzel, first baseman is a "la la." He played a brilliant game.

Captain Thompson of the Unknowns did some very pretty playing on second. Pitcher Woods and Tom Pryce, battery, won applause for admirable work in their respective positions. Chris Willis was at home at first.

THE JAPANESE THEATRE.

The Attendance is Small but the Performance Interesting.

There was but a small attendance at the Japanese theatre on Nuuanu street Saturday evening. Those who were present however seemed to enjoy the play, which, as explained by the ticket-man, was based on ancient history. The stage was decorated with Oriental characters. On the mauka end was stationed the orchestra which consisted of a Japanese woman with an instrument somewhat resembling a banjo, and two male companions. The males chanted at intervals while the female thrummed on the instrument. There were two or three duels between male actors and the proverbial female sympathizer with the wounded always appeared on the scene. The costumes of Kimono were pretty and in some cases elaborate to a degree. Powder and paint were prominent on the visages of the actors and actresses.

The dressing rooms were in the rear. Those who did the touching up were all females. The actors are dressed in one apartment and powdered and painted in another room. There are three attendants in each apartment. When ready to go on the actors await the signal which is the striking of a tom tom.

As their expenses are light the theatrical company is doubtless doing well. An admission fee of twenty-five cents is charged. On Saturday no saki was sold or permitted to be drunk on the premises.

People are anxiously awaiting the meeting of the legislature.

It was a very quiet election, but nevertheless it resulted in a good selection.

The Anglican Church Chronicle for May is out. It is replete with the regular amount of church news and is fully up to its usual high standard, typographically and otherwise.

How long is the old fishmarket to be allowed to disgrace a progressive city like Honolulu? Even the very fish exposed for sale on its stalls would kick at their surroundings if they had heels to do it with.

An article in this morning's Independent, reprinted from the San Francisco Post and signed by Clarence W. Ashford, makes some very severe charges concerning the treatment of his brother and incidentally against the prison surgeon. As the writer is out of the country and not within the reach of a cane or a libel suit at the hands of those whose character he has endeavored to besmirch, probably the best way to treat him would be to give him all the rope he needs and let him hang himself.

The last edition of the War Cry received here contains some fine illustrations, notably one of the interior of the Royal Albert hall, London, and the new eight-story building just completed in New York for the headquarters of the army in America. It also contains nearly a page on Hawaii, with two splendid illustrations. The War Cry is improving with each issue and we are more than pleased to know that the sales of the paper in Honolulu are not exceeded in any city on the Pacific Coast outside of San Francisco, Los Angeles, Oakland and Stockton.

A report is prevalent to the effect that the government does not wish to call a meeting of the legislature for fear that the members representing the other islands will combine against Oahu and possibly oust a few of the present officeholders on that island. We do not believe there is a word of truth in the report and we have sufficient faith in the loyalty and integrity of every member of the legislature, whether called on to act next week or next January, to lead us to the belief that they will work, first, last and all the time, for the general welfare of the Hawaiian Republic, irrespective of personal, local or other differences.

THE NATIONAL BAND.

It Will Give a Series of Ten Concerts in San Francisco.

The members of the Hawaiian National band held a meeting yesterday evening to hear a proposition from Professor Libornio, bandmaster, who returned from the Coast on Friday last. Libornio offered inducements to the boys for a trip to San Francisco for the purpose of giving concerts. The band is to give ten concerts in the Metropolitan Temple. The hall has been secured by Libornio for that number of nights. The boys are to be domiciled in the American Exchange hotel. The passage to and from San Francisco is to be free as well as the hotel charges.

After a short consultation the boys accepted the proposition and on Wednesday afternoon the Hawaiian National band will leave on the S. S. Australia. The Quintette club will go along also. There will be about forty in the company. The steamer will arrive in San Francisco on May 15, and the band will give its first concert on the Friday following. The band will return to Honolulu on the S. S. Mariposa due here on June 6. Posters have already been printed in San Francisco heralding the arrival of the well-known band. After concluding the season if sufficient inducements are given the Nationals will play at other halls. At 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon the boys will assemble at W. Aylett's residence and march down to the wharf. It is regretted that the time is so short that no public farewell concert can be given before the departure of the band.

A Dream of the Future.

Within ten years, it is said, the city of New York will be heated and lighted, have all its machinery driven, and its laborious work done, by the utilization of the forces of the Niagara Falls. The idea has long been a dream. But two difficulties have always stood in the way—first, the purely mechanical obstacles to turning any part of so strong a current into electrical energy, and, secondly, the impossibility of profitably conveying electricity any great distance from the place where it is generated. The first of these has been overcome, and there are now on both sides of the Falls great works in course of erection that will generate, between them, electricity equivalent to three-quarters of a million horsepower. What this means may be judged from the fact that, a few years ago, it was officially estimated that all the machinery in New York State only amounts to 450,000 horsepower. The problem of transmission is a more serious one. The highly elusive character of electricity causes it to escape at every possible point, in spite of the most careful insulation. Mr. Nicholas Tesla, Edison's young rival, believes he has at last hit on a plan by which electricity can be conveyed several hundred miles without appreciable loss. If this problem of transmission is really overcome, New Yorkers and others will, it is said, have the forces of Niagara laid on their houses for everyday use at a cost of less than £3 each horsepower a year. —Ex.

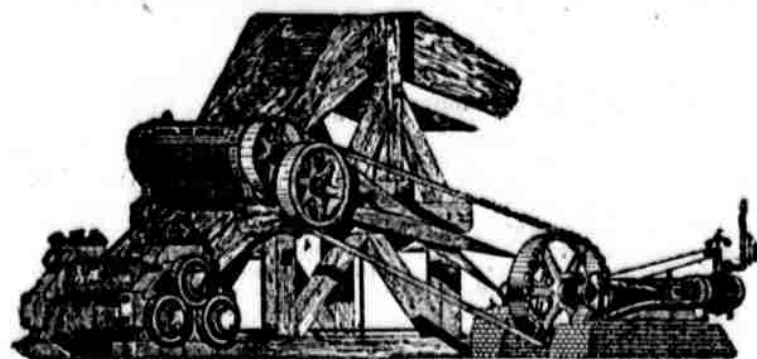

A Ship Canal for Sheffield

The steady development of traffic on the ship canal, and its daily increasing importance as an agent of national trade, give interest to the smaller but similar project in the adjoining county. Sheffield, like Manchester, has been eagerly seeking an adequate waterway to the sea, and now, through the enterprise of South Yorkshire capitalists and the assistance of the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway Company, she will probably get it. No English city has been so crippled in its trade by heavy railway rates. Some years ago one firm removed the whole of their steel rail making plant to Workington, and still manufacture on the seaboard to escape the cost of land transit. The Sheffield market for ship plates has also dwindled, because of the difficulty of competing with makers nearer the coast. The city maintains its reputation for the production of armor-plates, but the carriage rates and charges for this bulky and heavy material are enormous. The inconvenience, expense and trouble of reloading will be avoided by carriage along the canal, or rather series of canals, which the Sheffield and South Yorkshire Navigation Company have bought and intend to prepare for systematic traffic from Sheffield to Goole. It is doubtful whether the North German Lloyd steamers will ever penetrate to the canal basin near the Sheffield Corn Exchange, but though the South Yorkshire waterway will probably never bear such large ships as may be seen at the Salford quays or passing through the Estham locks, a great expansion of business is anticipated. The canal stretches from Sheffield to Tinsley, there joins the River Don navigation and runs through Rotherham, Mexborough, and Doncaster. At Stainforth it merges into the Keadby Canal, and a lock opens the way to the river Trent. By the Dove and Deane Canal communication is possible with Barnsley, and it is also intended by the construction of a new canal from Brainwith Lock to Sykehouse Bridge, to enter the Aire and Calder Canal. The company will have nearly 60 miles of waterway under its control, and though it only styles itself a barge canal undertaking, it proposes to make a big lock and basin at Keadby for the admission of vessels as well as barges, and may ultimately deepen and widen the canal or canals to allow the passage of boats of light draught into the basin in the heart of Sheffield. Meanwhile the various navigations have been formally handed over to the company, and last month directors were appointed to do all in their power to improve the waterway and foster trade on it.—Ex.
